5. He was thankful for their partnership in the gospel. (Philippians).
6. He was thankful for their history of mutual affection. (2 Timothy).

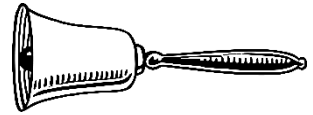
May God send a cornucopia of good things your way this Holiday Season.

Comments: During September income was under expectations as we had budgeted to receive some of our annual contributor's donations, which didn't happen. We still anticipate receiving these donations before the end of 2020. On the expense side, we were over-budget for building maintenance by \$2k as we had our annual elevator tests, repaired one of our air conditioners and our semi-annual fire suppression test in the kitchen. Even with the building closed we still have to have our testing done.

Trinity's "Women of the Bible" study group recently rediscovered Mary's joy at saying YES to God and her song of liberation touched our hearts. "My soul magnifies the Lord, and my spirit rejoices in God my Savior, for he has looked with favor on the lowliness of his servant. Surely, from now on all generations will call me blessed; for the Mighty One has done great things for me, and holy is his name. His mercy is for those who fear him from generation to generation. He has shown strength with his arm; he has scattered the proud in the thoughts of their hearts. From the Trinity Climate Crisis Committee for November:

Folliott Sanford Pierpoint wrote the hymn "For the Beauty of the Earth" one day in the late Spring of 1864, near his native city of Bath, England, when violets and primroses were in full bloom and all the earth seemed to rejoice. He climbed up a hill and sat down to rest and meditate. The panorama before him inspired him to write these beautiful lines.

*For the Beauty of the Earth, For the Beauty of the skies,
For the love which from our birth Over and around us lies
For the beauty of each hour Of the day and of the night,
Hill and vale and tree and flower, Sun and moon and stars of light,
For the joy of ear and eye, For the heart and mind's delight,
For the mystic harmony Linking sense to sound and sight,
For the joy of human love, Brother, sister parent, child,
Friends on earth, and friends above, For all gentle thoughts and mild,
Lord of all, to thee we raise This our hymn of grateful praise.*

In this month of November, when we traditionally celebrate the Thanksgiving Holiday, perhaps we can reflect upon the words and spirit of this hymn. Giving thanks for the environment that surrounds us, the precious environment that we want to preserve for future generations.

When I look at the stars and planets through one of Ed's telescopes, I can't help but remember that picture of the Earth, that was taken by the Voyager space probe from beyond the major planets, Earth as a small blue dot. But human life on that 'pale blue dot' is dependent on human actions. Our scientists tell us that unless we take rapid action to reduce greenhouse gasses and other pollutants, much of the earth will become too hostile for human life. When they say the threat is "existential", they mean the very existence of human life as we know it may end.

We give thanks for the blessings of this earth. But we are stewards (caretakers), not its owners. Ours to care for and enjoy, but not to squander.

As we lift our praises of thanksgiving, let us take action to nourish and repair this 'blue dot'. If we all do whatever we can, we CAN make a difference--For The Beauty of the Earth!

Green Hint: Eliminate Food Waste.

Food waste in the US occurs mostly in stores and at home--either because it spoils on the store shelf or before we can eat it.

According to an NRDC (National Resources Defense Council) study, Americans throw away up 40% of the food they buy. We can combat food waste by shopping for what is needed, eating leftovers, composting scraps, and donating to food banks. It is estimated that curbing food waste could avoid a whopping 70.5 gigatons of CO₂ (carbon dioxide). This is something we can all participate in, being especially mindful of those in our community who may not have enough to eat.
