Comments: We continue to operate like we have since the pandemic hit. Our personnel and utilities continue to run under budget due to reduced programming. The only over-budge item this month was our building maintenance. Even with the pandemic we have building issues that need to be taken care of: backflow test, grease trap cleanout and boiler certifications.

We continue to be Thankful that our members and friends continue to donate to Trinity's mission. Through eight months we continue to operate near our budgeted deficit level. We hope we can continue to receive strong donations so we can balance our general operating fund by year end.

Dear Friends,

How is it with your soul? Mine has been prayerfully hopeful as I witness to justice in our community; so, in a spirit of ongoing justice work, I share in faith a perspective I believe our congregation must hear. Daniel Kirk, Trinity UCC member, wrote the powerful message below as his soul was stirred in response to the murder of Ahmaud Arbery on February 23, 2020. My own spirit laments and grieves the death toll of racism while finding prayerful hope here in this faith community. Thank you, Daniel, for allowing the republishing of your words.

Daniel writes, "As a black man who walks to work, walks for fun, and jogs for exercise, watching the video of #AhmaudArbery is terrifying. I often wonder what the people who see me think. I know I mean no harm and that I don't wish to even draw their attention, but something about that video is striking. Maybe it's the angst, or the violence, or even just the familiarity with being a black man on a jog. Most days my biggest fear is dodging traffic. But some days it's a different fear. The fear that the freedom to move, to stay in shape, to clear your mind can be deadly. Not for all of us, but for some of us.

The men who committed this act say that Ahmaud looked like a suspected burglar. Yet, they are no officers of the law, no citizen deputized to make arrests, and yet they felt it was their duty to stop him and detain him. And when he refused, they killed him for resisting.

I have seen comments from people who say he should have complied and waiting for the police to sort out the confusion. But if two armed men stop you on the street and say the police are coming or that they plan to take you to the police, are you likely to believe the police will help you out. I saw a quote recently, and I can't remember it's origin, that said if someone comes to your door to have a conversation with a loaded firearm brandished, are you really having a conversation?

I guess I would close by saying, that sometimes being black is scary. You feel no different, you live your life without bringing harm to others, and at the end of the day your aim is to suck as much joy from your 24 hours as you can. But then an event takes that joy from you. I'm hundreds of miles from Ahmaud, and yet, I feel as close to him as my own family... who I plan to hug extra tight this evening."

If you, like many of us, feel a stirring call to faithful anti-racism, please consider attending the faith formation series, "Anti-Racist Faith," to be held over the next few weeks, as an opportunity to connect with one another here in our community. The program details are on page 6 of this issue. Christ is with us in our journey; and none of us walk alone.

"Have many children and grow in number. Fill the earth and be its master. Rule over the fish in the sea and over the birds in the sky and over every living thing that moves on the earth.

I love autumn and it is a perfect time to get lost in the wonder, awe and appreciation for our world. We are all worried about what is happening to our Earth. Indeed, we are trying our best to keep our world as beautiful as God made it. Our intentions are good: we recycle, we turn off lights, our yards look messy but are full of life, we are awake and thinking about ways to decrease our carbon footprint. We educate ourselves and we pray.


We all know the Genesis story of creation and the seven days in which God determined how the Earth would be through many eons past and then what our sliver of geological time would also become with human life dominating the globe. To help make sense of our time and our place in this continuum I meditated on Genesis 1:25-31. All was well and made sense except for the words "subdue, dominium and master" these words immediately caused me to have pause. So, I looked up the etymology of the word dominion since this is the one that confuses me the most. Here is what I found: from the Latin "dominium" the source means "property" and "management", from "dominus" we understand the meaning as "lord and master", and finally from the base word "domus" we glean "house or household" Finding these explanations increased my understanding of the scripture. We do not own the Earth but rather live here as tenants or as grounds keepers, or even as the managers of a grand estate. We are tasked with conserving resources, keeping the air, water, and the fertile ground clean and beneficial for all. We are fulfilling God's will to be guardians of our home and to honor the task given to us in Genesis.

Kevan has been using hymns as prayers in the Wednesday night Zoom prayer service. It is comforting to say the words we have often sung while together in our sanctuary. So, to find that comfort and support in our environmental struggles against global climate change I went to my collection of hymnals. In my childhood hymnal I found, "For the Beauty of the Earth" and "All Things Bright and Beautiful." In our New Century Hymnal there is a whole section of hymns under Stewardship and Creation, starting on page 556 to 569. Praying with hymns to praise God and all of creation will raise our spirits. Knowing that as Christians our decisions are based on the word of God is comforting. We are given the support, the ethics and motivations to automatically make us stewards, caretakers and masters of our home. So, this Fall carry on your efforts in peace and have faith that there is much good yet to come for us and for the Earth.

Hopefully increased nature visits will also be combined with a healthy dose of "turning aside". Stopping to admire the intricacy of goldenrod flowers or noticing that there are several varieties of the plant in the same area is "turning aside" to take a closer look - to drink in the wonder – to survey the Creator's handiwork.
