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



Daniel Hilty a Church consultant from a Lutheran "think tank" in Grand Rapids Michigan says that any large-scale facility renovation requires a congregation to tolerate a tremendous amount of change and disruption. It's critical to share information, listen to concerns, and acknowledge grief and loss. But perhaps the most important task is reminding the congregation of the "why" behind all of the changes. Structural renovation of a building no matter how needed and important as it is, is not renewal of a church.

To hear some church growth coaches tell it, all you need is a Praise band and a coffee bar to grow a church. People may come to the rock band coffee bar, but that does not qualify as discipleship as Jesus lived and taught it.

On Ash Wednesday we recite a wonderful example of discipleship; It reads: "As disciples of Jesus Christ we are called to struggle against everything that leads us away from the love of God and neighbor. Repentance, fasting, prayer, study and works of love help us return to that love."

We paid almost \$400 for Roto Rooter to clean out a clogged toilet in the Narthex, causing our building maintenance to be over- budget. Other expenses were in line. Our contribution income was \$5100 under-budget..

The cost of the renovation will be spread out over a 3year campaign fund drive. One third to funded by congregational giving and fundraisers, one third to be funded by grants from outside entities and the last third to be covered by Trinity's endowment fund.

The Renovation Team has spent many hours meeting together or with the various contractors and suppliers. We have discussed, debated and decided upon plans and materials that we think will make Trinity the best community place.

As you can see from the above lists, there are many items, services and people that will make this renovation complete. What can I do for you?

This phrase "What can I do for you?" is expressed many times throughout the day. Whether you are looking to buy a new pair of shoes or trying to find a certain item on a grocery store shelf, someone will ask you this question.

People ask each other "What can I do for you?" when there is a problem they would like to help with. In circumstances like a funeral, illness, emotional stress or financial need, concerned people ask this. They truly want to help but sometimes do not know how to help.

In the early 1990s, when Trinity was evaluating whether to stay as a downtown church or move out of the City, we asked the downtown "What can I do for you?". The answer was to remain downtown to provide a place for the community to gather for celebrations, meetings, educational events, meals, etc. This led to the major renovations that were done in the early 1990s. Now in 2024, Trinity needs to renovate our facilities so we can continue to be a place of community.

The same question should be asked by the congregation in regards to the renovation project Trinity is currently undertaking- "What can I do for you?". Members and friends may want to help financially but do not know to what extent they can help. It was suggested this info of financial needs for the renovation be given to you so you can decide how you want to help financially. You can see what the items or services cost and donate accordingly.

This first list contains the contractors and suppliers who have worked with the project thus far: Vince Mariola Construction Ltd, HLH Engineering Consulting LLC, EcoSeal, Tri Mark appliances, Martin Interiors, Koorsen Fire and Security and numerous sub-contractors used by Vince Mariola Construction. Everyone of these has asked the Renovation Team "What can I do for you?" and we have been working with them to do the best that we can for Trinity.

This second list contains items or services that are needed to complete the project and the cost of each item listed. Some of these are in the Renovation Catalogue in the narthex and are included here so you can see the project's costs in its entirety. NOTE: this list does not include change orders or situations that need repaired/relocated in the process of construction.




The Kitchen and Fellowship Hall Renovation project was coming along nicely until the last 2 weeks of May when we experienced some "damp issues". First a first floor toilet overflowed due to a clog and the water ran into the ceiling in the basement. The clog continued to the drain pipe by the kitchen where it caused sewer water to back up into the kitchen. As a drain company was clearing this clog, a piece of their equipment fell through a crack and thin area of pipe so it became stuck. To recover this equipment the Fellowship Hall floor had to be dug up. Upon further inspection, it was discovered that drain pipe was in poor shape. So to prevent more tearing up of the new Fellowship Hall floor in the future, a solution has been found to repair the drainpipe all the way from the kitchen to the street.

More "damp issues"- the large PVC pipe buried under the sidewalk by the back entrance that drains downspout water to the street had a large crack in it. The downspout water had been flowing into Trinity's foundation and not to the street! During the week of June 3, the sidewalk was dug up and the pipe was replaced. The rusted, leaking downspout is also being replaced.

Until all the "damp issues " are resolved, the project will be on delay as of June 4. We want to make sure everything is dry before we finish placing the flooring in the rest of the hallway and the kitchen.

The progress on the renovation has slowed down by a month due to the repair work that needs done on the pipe beneath the church. This work includes descaling the pipe, pressure flushing and then vacuuming out the debris. It will then need to dry before the liquid sealant is injected and a ballooning technique spreads it to where it will seal the interior of the pipe. This repair began June 21st and should be complete by the time this Topics gets to you. The projected project completion date is now late July-early August. There will be quite a flurry of activity as we move the new chairs from Gilmore's garage to Trinity, take old chairs to Habitat ReStore (if they will accept such a large number) and the final move back into the kitchen and Fellowship Hall. There will be ample opportunity for you to help, just keep looking to the ebulletins on Fridays and the Sunday bulletins to keep you informed as to when these events will happen.
