

## CIMETIÈRE NOTRE DAME DE LA SAGESSE

Bienvenue au Cimetière Notre Dame de la Sagesse  
Welcome to Our Lady of Wisdom Cemetery in St. Agatha, Maine

My name is Sr. Jacqueline Ayotte, a Daughter of Wisdom

We are here to recognize and acknowledge the people who have served our parish of St. Agatha and the surrounding areas. The cemetery has been in existence since 1906. I will share facts about the persons buried here. 210 Sisters have served in St. Agatha and 29 are resting here. 55 sisters who came from France and 12 remain on our soil; of 42 sisters from Canada 3 sisters are here; 108 served from the USA of which 14 are here as well. We are truly on holy ground!

### **Soeur Anselme**

Marie Françoise Gauthier was born on February 2, 1844 in Loudeac St. Brieuc, France, the daughter of Jean Marie Gauthier and Julienne Poupart. Soeur Anselme made Profession September 29, 1866 in St. Laurent-sur-Sèvre, France. **She was one of the four foundresses of Notre Dame de la Sagesse Convent arriving in Ste-Agathe, Maine on October 1, 1904.** She served as catechist. Chère Soeur Anselme died in Ste-Agathe September 26, 1930.

### **Soeur Victorine de St. François**

Victorine Olive Eugénie Magois was born June 23, 1876 in St. Hilaire de Talmon en Vendée, France. The daughter of Jean François Magois (propriétaire) et Marie Victorine Laidet. Soeur Victorine made Profession on February 2, 1899 in St. Laurent-sur-Sèvre, France. **She was one of the four foundresses of Notre Dame de la Sagesse Convent arriving in Ste-Agathe, Maine on October 1, 1904.** She served as a nurse and sacristan. Chère Soeur Victorine died in Ste-Agathe on March 28, 1927.

### **Soeur Ste. Émerentienne (Converse)**

Léontine Veronique Joséphine Coquenlorge was born on March 29, 1882 in St. Hilaire de Chaléons, Loire-inférieure, France, the daughter of Jean-Marie Coquenlorge et Mélanie Rousseau. Soeur Émerentienne made Profession on February 2, 1909 St. Laurent-sur-Sèvre, France. Chère Soeur arrived at Notre Dame de la Sagesse in Ste-Agathe on February 9, 1909. She served for 40 years as cook and gardener until she died in Ste-Agathe on January 9, 1949.

### **Soeur St. Justin (Converse)**

Louise Marie Guyomar was born on February 6, 1874 in Moelan, Finistère, France, the daughter of Jean-Marie Guyomar (Cultivateur) and Marie Corentine Guigoures. Soeur St. Justin made Profession on September 29, 1893 as a Soeur Converse in St. Laurent-sur-Sèvre, France. She arrived at Notre Dame de la Sagesse in Ste-Agathe on April 14, 1907, where she served as cook and gardener for 55 years. Soeur St. Justin died in Ste-Agathe on December 23, 1961. She is the Sister who served the longest in Ste-Agathe.

### **Soeur Ste. Placidie**

Anna Catherine Joby was born on March 24, 1862 in Brest, France the daughter of François and Anna Legae Joby. Soeur Ste. Placidie made Profession on February 2, 1891 in St. Laurent-sur-Sèvre, France. She arrived at Notre Dame de la Sagesse in Ste-Agathe on September 8, 1910 and served as a teacher. After only 5 months, Soeur Ste. Placidie died on February 23, 1911. La première Fille de la Sagesse qui dormira son dernier sommeil dans la terre du Maine. She is the first Daughter of Wisdom to be buried here.

### **Soeur St. Sernin**

Marie Madeleine Durand was born on September 4, 1880 in Fay, Loire Inferieur, France, the daughter of Paul Durand and Marie Madeleine Charpentreau. Soeur St. Sernin made Profession on September 29, 1901 in St. Laurent-sur-Sèvre, France. She arrived at Notre Dame de la Sagesse in Ste-Agathe on July 6, 1930. Soeur St. Sernin worked as a housekeeper until her death on July 29, 1939 in Ste-Agathe.

### **Soeur Célestine de St. Paul**

Marie Aristine Mauger was born on March 15, 1873 in Bangot, Morihan, France, the daughter of Pierre Mauger and Marie Célestine Malatie. Soeur Célestine de St. Paul made her Profession on November 14, 1894 in St. Laurent-sur-Sèvre, France. **She was one of the Foundresses of the Edmundston, N.B. Community on May 29, 1905.** She arrived at Notre Dame de la Sagesse in Ste-Agathe in September 1928 where she served as a seamstress. Soeur Célestine died on November 12, 1940 in Ste-Agathe.

### **Soeur Marie Rose**

Marie Madeleine Baconnais was born on July 4, 1859 in Les Moutier Loire, France, the daughter of Clair Baconnais and Madeleine Limbert. Soeur Marie Rose made her Profession on February 2, 1879. in St. Laurent-sur-Sèvre, France. She arrived at Notre Dame de la Sagesse in Ste-Agathe on December 15, 1905. After serving 37 years as receptionist and housekeeper. Chère Soeur Marie Rose died in Ste-Agathe on March 20, 1942.

### **Soeur Léonie de la Croix**

Antonia Doyard de Lamotte was born on September 28, 1874 in Valognes(Maucha), France, the daughter of Louis Clement and Françoise Léonie Pioline de Lamotte. Soeur Léonie made her Profession on June 8, 1903. She arrived at Notre Dame de la Sagesse in Ste-Agathe on September 26, 1905, where she served as a boarding school and piano teacher for 37 years. Chère Soeur Léonie died in Ste-Agathe on August 20, 1943.

### **Soeur Yvonne Marie**

Marie Françoise Le Bruno was born on March 29, 1865 in Belle en Terre, France, the daughter of Yves Le Bruno and Marie Françoise Le Bienvenne. Soeur Yvonne Marie made Profession on November 21, 1886 in St. Laurent-sur-Sèvre, France and arrived at Notre Dame de la Sagesse in Ste-Agathe on June 2, 1949. Chère Soeur Yvonne Marie died in Ste-Agathe on August 6, 1960.

### **Soeur Modeste de St. Augustin**

Augustine Émilie Mineau was born on March 31, 1880 in Cholet, France, the daughter of Augustin Jule and Modeste Victoire Pineau. Soeur Modeste de St. Augustin made Profession on September 29, 1903 in St. Laurent-sur-Sèvre, France and arrived at Notre Dame de la Sagesse Convent on March 23, 1905. She served as a teacher in the first district school which opened on April 10, 1905. Soeur Modeste also served as superior and teacher of Marie Mediatrix Convent in Madawaska as well as Notre Dame du Mont Carmel in Lille. After serving the St. John Valley for a period of 60 years la Chère Soeur Modeste de St. Augustin died in Ste-Agathe on July 6, 1965.

### **Soeur Marie Eugénie de la Croix**

Amedée Roy was born on September 5, 1876 in Blois, France, the daughter of Jules Roy and Eugénie Souvent. Soeur Marie Eugénie de la Croix made Profession on September 29, 1902 in St. Laurent-sur-Sèvre, France and arrived in Ste-Agathe on January 15, 1906 as a teacher. Soeur Marie Eugénie established the high school in Ste-Agathe, where she served as principal for 30 years. From the earliest years, **Soeur Marie Eugénie worked with state officials** and was greatly admired by State Commissioner Dr. Payton Smith, **who helped her start the school.** Upon retiring as principal in 1935, la Chère Soeur served the Daughters of Wisdom in Ste-Agathe as portress and spent long hours as staff advisor on the "Echoes de la Sagesse" newsletter. Chère Soeur Eugénie de la Croix died in Ste-Agathe on August 2, 1946.

### **Sister Nathalie Marie**

Mariane McCann was born October 21, 1906 in New York City, New York, the daughter of Thomas McCann and Nathalie Swane. Sr. Nathalie made Profession January 16, 1925 in Ottawa, Ontario, Canada and arrived in Ste-Agathe February 27, 1940 and served as St. Agatha High School Principal for 13 years. Sr. Nathalie died February 8, 1953 in Ste-Agathe, Maine and is buried in the Sister's Cemetery.

### **Sister Catherine of the Cross**

Florence Malvina Nadeau was born October 7, 1907 in Keegan, Maine, the daughter of Louis Nadeau and Euphemie Jalbert. Florence graduated from St. Agatha High School in 1925. Sister Catherine made Profession January 16, 1927 in Ottawa, Ontario, Canada and arrived in Ste-Agathe in 1945 and served as an elementary teacher for two years then as a high school teacher until 1953. She became principal in 1953 and remained until 1966 when St. Agatha High School became Wisdom High School. Sister Catherine died on May 26, 1995 in Lewiston, Maine and she is buried in Ste-Agathe.

### **Soeur Maria de Bethlehem**

Rose Thinkham was born on July 19, 1890 in New York, the daughter of Edward Thinkham and Maria Mond. Soeur Maria de Bethlehem made her Profession on January 16, 1921 in Ottawa, Ontario, Canada. She arrived in Ste-Agathe on March 29, 1949, serving as a nurse. Soeur Maria died in Ste-Agathe October 13, 1953.

### **Soeur Gerard Magella**

Marie Anais Yvonne Ethier was born on May 28, 1891 in St. Emile de Suffolk, Québec, Canada, the daughter of Henri Ethier and Marie Roy. Chère Soeur Gerard Magella made Profession on January 16, 1918 in Ottawa, Ontario, Canada. She arrived at Notre Dame de la Sagesse on August 16, 1937 serving as cook. Soeur Gerard Magella died June 12, 1938 in Ste-Agathe.

### **Soeur Edouard de l'Enfant Jésus**

Melinda Thérèse Letendre was born on June 22, 1895 in Ste. Hyacinthe, Québec, Canada, the daughter of Edouard Letendre and Fortunate Brodeur. Soeur Edouard de l'Enfant Jésus made Profession January 16, 1922 in Ottawa, Ontario, Canada and arrived in Ste-Agathe on September 10, 1940. She served as a housekeeper at Notre Dame de la Sagesse. She got very sick in January and died on March 9, 1941.

### **Sister Alfred de St. Gabriel**

Yvonne Lucienne Morin was born April 16, 1914 in Hammer, Nipissing, Ontario, Canada, the daughter of Alfred Morin and Mathilda Proulx. Sister Alfred made her Profession on August 2, 1933 in Ottawa, Ontario, Canada and arrived at Notre Dame de la Sagesse in Ste-Agathe on November 10, 1935. She was assigned to Madawaska on September 28, 1941. She returned to Ste-Agathe on October 12, 1961 where she died on January 8, 1966.

### **Sister Cecile du Christ Roi**

Cecile Dora Ouellette was born April 2, 1922 in Caribou, Maine, the daughter of Israel Ouellette and Leonie Picard. Sister Cecile made Profession on February 2, 1940 in Ottawa, Ontario, Canada. After a fifteen-year missionary assignment to Spain Sister Cecile arrived in Ste-Agathe in April 1974 until March 26, 1986. She served in a Nursing Home as a Certified Nurse Assistant and Director of Activities. Returning in 1999, Sister Cecile stayed in Ste-Agathe until June 2001 at which time she needed nursing care. She died in Frenchville, Maine September 21, 2001 and is buried in the Sisters' Cemetery in Ste-Agathe.

### **Sister Yvonne Germaine**

Germaine Odile Dumond was born January 16, 1921 in Ste-Agathe, Maine, the daughter of Antime Dumond and Yvonne Leclair. Odile graduated from St. Agatha High School in 1938. Sister Yvonne Germaine made Profession February 2, 1940 in Ottawa, Ontario, Canada and spent 37 years as an Elementary Teacher in Haiti. Sister Yvonne Germaine came to Ste-Agathe from Haiti in May 1983 and left for Litchfield, Connecticut December 1983. She returned to Ste-Agathe in 1985 serving as bursar and volunteering her services until she left for Sound Beach, New York on April 11, 2003. She died on November 11, 2009. Her family requested that she be buried here.

### **Sister Catherine of the Sacred Heart**

Thérèse Cecile Doucette was born January 11, 1936 in Madawaska, Maine, the daughter of Alexis Doucette and Catherine Dufour. Thérèse is a 1954 graduate of St. Agatha High School. Sister Catherine made Profession August 2, 1956 in Litchfield, Connecticut. She arrived in Ste-Agathe from Gate of Heaven School, Ozone Park, New York in September 1970 and left in December 1972. Sister Catherine served in the missions of Malawi, Africa from 1962 to 1966 and in Papua, New Guinea from 1972 to 1976. She spent the years 1982 to 1997 working as translator for the Men's Union of Superiors General in Rome. Sister Thérèse was assigned to Bristol, Connecticut where she continued her work of translating. She came to Montfort Heights in June of 2004 and died in December 30, 2004 in Bangor, Maine. She is buried here.

### **Sister Catherine of Jesus**

Alexandrine J. Audibert was born on November 1, 1919 in Fort Kent, Maine, the daughter of John Audibert and Catherine Collins. Sister Catherine of Jesus made Profession on February 2, 1939 in Ottawa, Ontario, Canada. She arrived in Ste-Agathe April 4, 1966 serving as a bursar. Sister Catherine died in Ste-Agathe on December 26, 1969.

### **Sister Adeline de la Croix**

Marie Ida Jeanne Soucy was born February 4, 1907 in Lille, Maine, the daughter of Joseph Soucy and Delina Bouchard. Sr. Adeline de la Croix made Profession on February 2, 1930 Ottawa, Ontario, Canada. She was assigned to Notre Dame de la Sagesse Convent in Ste-Agathe on September 25, 1961 after serving for 35 years at the St. Charles Hospital in Port Jefferson, New York as a practical nurse. Sister Adeline devoted her time to caring for the sick sisters and students. Sister Ida died in Ste-Agathe on November 1, 1981.

### **Sister Ubald de la Croix**

Cecile Bouchard was born on September 7, 1927 in Frenchville, Maine, the daughter of Ubald Bouchard and Helene Ouellette. Sister Ubald de la Croix made Profession on February 2, 1946 in Ottawa, Canada. She served as a seamstress and Pastoral Minister. She assisted the elderly for 51 years until her death in Lewiston, Maine on June 10, 1997. She is buried here.

### **Sister Florent du Rosaire**

Yvette Raymond was born on December 25, 1916 in St. David, Maine, the daughter of Florent Raymond and Edith Bouchard. After graduating from Notre Dame de la Sagesse in 1934, Yvette entered the Congregation and made Profession on February 2, 1936 in Ottawa, Ontario, Canada. Sister Florent du Rosaire served as an elementary school teacher in Lille from 1954 to 1960 and in Madawaska from 1960 until 1988. Sister Yvette then retired to Ste-Agathe on November 18, 1988 where she stayed until her death on December 8, 1998.

**Note:** It is Sister Yvette's nephew, Donald Raymond who follows in service making sure that the St. John Valley events are recorded and available to all.

### **Sister Lucille du Rosaire**

Annette Picard was born May 1, 1916 in Grand Isle, Maine, the daughter of Vital Picard and Delia Picard. Annette came to Ste-Agathe as a student but devoted herself to working in the laundry for four years before entering the community. Sister Lucille made Profession February 2, 1935. in Ottawa, Ontario, Canada. **A Foundress of Maryview Hospital in Portsmouth, Virginia**, she came to Ste-Agathe in August of 1950 to work with the boarders until she left for Ozone Park, New York May 16, 1957. Sister Annette adapted readily to the needs around her. In the early part of her ministry she did community services such as cooking, laundry in the seminary, schools and hospitals serving in this capacity in Ottawa, Canada, Brooklyn and Long Island, New York. She later took a Nurses' Aide Course. She then served in St. Charles Hospital and Sound Beach, Port Jefferson, New York. Retiring in 1990 Sister Annette returned to Ste-Agathe on October 18 and has been at the service of the Church and the Ste-Agathe Community. She was a member of the Spirituality and Worship Commission. Throughout her ministry she was recognized as a talented seamstress. The Ste-Agathe Historical Society are the beneficiary of this talent. Sister Annette died on November 2, 2013 in Frenchville, Maine.

### **Sister Candide de l'Enfant Jésus**

Marie-Reine Cecile Corriveau was born March 8, 1924 in Frenchville, Maine, the daughter of George Corriveau and Rose Anna Côté. Sister Candide made Profession August 2, 1948 in Ottawa, Ontario, Canada. Sister Candide served in Madawaska as a substitute teacher from August 1973 until she came to Ste-Agathe August 21, 1986. She is a member of the Spirituality and Worship Commission and serves as lector and choir member while continuing to be involved in the parish and Community life. Sister Candide served as community co-ordinator 1987 - 1991 and 2000 to 2003. Sister Candide died on October 17, 2016 in Fort Kent, Maine.

### **Sister Aurelie de la Croix**

Thérèse Michaud was born October 4, 1921 in Ste-Agathe, Maine, the daughter of Emile V. Michaud and Agnes Picard. Thérèse is a 1938 graduate of St. Agatha High School. Sister Aurelie made Profession February 2, 1940 in Ottawa, Ontario, Canada. She came to Ste-Agathe December 31, 1976 and left for West Virginia in August 1980. While in Ste-Agathe she worked as a Visiting Nurse and was community co-ordinator. Sister Aurelie served in Lewiston, Maine Throughout her life, she worked with the poor and the elderly. She retired at Montfort Heights in 2008. Throughout her life she worked with the poor and the elderly. She died in Madawaska, Maine on February 12, 2021 in her Hundredth year of life.

### **Sister Irene de Notre Dame**

Joan Cecile Ayotte was born January 8, 1938 in Frenchville, Maine, the daughter of Lawrence Ayotte and Irene Albert. Joan graduated from St. Agatha High School in 1955. Sister Irene made Profession February 2, 1959 in Litchfield, Connecticut. She served in the New York area as cook from 1960 -1967, then studied and taught in the NYC Public schools until 1975. Sister Joan came to Madawaska February 15, 1975, teaching in Fort Kent High School and Madawaska middle and elementary schools until June 1998. Sister Joan came to Ste-Agathe June 5, 1999, a Certified Nurses Assistant, she worked at High View Manor, Madawaska and for Valley Home Health Agency. She worked for Hospice, the Aroostook Area Agency on Aging and the St. John Valley Faith Volunteers Caregiving Coalition in ministering to the elderly. From 2006 to 2022, as a founder, she was an integral part of Long Lake Public Library, a legacy we leave for the presence of the Daughters of Wisdom in St. Agatha. Sister Joan died on October 15, 2024 in Madawaska, Maine. She was my sister and a partner in mission.

## Sr. Lawrence de Notre Dame

Jacqueline Sylvia Ayotte, born on December 12, 1939 in St. Agatha, Maine, daughter of Lawrence Ayotte and Irene Albert. I made Profession on February 2, 1961 in Litchfield, Connecticut. I was an elementary teacher and served at St. Mary Gate of Heaven in Ozone Park, New York. I came to Madawaska, Maine from Holy Angels School in Chesapeake, Virginia in August 1968 and retired to St. Agatha in June 1999. The Ste-Agathe Historical Society started preparations in 2003 to celebrate the Daughters of Wisdom Centennial in 2004. I took the list of the sisters' names and worked with Sr. Lise Therrien, archivist in Rome for more information about each sister. Those are some the facts I just shared with you here. Since I am the last Daughter of Wisdom to enter the community from St. Agatha, I felt it was important for me to find this information. It has been and continues to be a privilege to discover the possibilities that exist in our community to simplify and make life better for the people we serve. My involvement with the founding of Long Lake Public Library is the last project that I believe is a living legacy of the Daughters of Wisdom's presence in St. Agatha.

Two Priests and parishioners:

**Rev. Ernest Etenaud** was born March 3, 1836 in St. Martin, France. The son of Jean and Veronique Cherpentier. He was ordained May 25, 1861. **Fondateur et premier Curé à Ste-Agathe**, Founder of the parish in 1889-1899. He came to the convent to retire in 1918 and died March 25, 1921

**Rev. Nicholas Canuel**, was born October 4, 1858 in Rimouski, Bas-Saint-Laurent Region, Québec, Canada, son of Nicolas et Genevieve Langis. A Diocesan priest, he came to Ste-Agathe in 1918 and served as Convent Chaplain until May when he got very sick. He died on August 28, 1918.

**Berthe Thérèse Etenaud Côté** was born June 22, 1863 in Paris, France. The daughter of Henri Etenaud. She served as housekeeper for Fr. Etenaud. She married Dr. Isidore Côté from Frenchville. She died on January 6, 1906.

**Papias Dionne** was born 1834 and he died November 12, 1907.

Julie Martin Dionne was born 1847 and died April 11, 1924, spouse of Papias.

We read in the chronicles that when Papias got very sick, they came to the hospital and Julie stayed in the convent after his death. They were benefactors.

**Delina Guerrette** was born in 1862, the daughter of Jean and Rosalie Martin. She died on March 20, 1941.

**Anastasie Paradis** was born in 1874. She was the daughter of Isaac et Hortense Bard Paradis. She died October 20 1958.

Both Delina and Anastasie helped in the kitchen and lived at the convent.

The people who are in this holy ground have claimed their eternal reward and are part of the glorified Church. We ask that they accompany us as we continue in the service and mission of the Church.

All praise and honor to our God! This is truly holy ground!

This photo, taken in the summer of 1944, shows our visiting cousins, the Soucys, my brother Bobby, sister Jeannine, myself, and a neighbor, Jean Guy Cyr, crouching in front of our home in St. Agathe on Main Street (Rte 162). It is the only picture I have of Coolidge School shown on the top right.

I attended Coolidge School from 1945 to 1947 after which Montfort School was built. Both my mother and father attended that school to the 8th grade. My mother from 1926 to 1934 and my father from 1921 to 1929. Living the closest to the school, my father's first job was to start the fire in the wood stove each cold day for 1 cent a day.

The school had around 30 desks and chairs in 6 rows. The rectangular, iron, wood stove was in the front right of the room, about 2 ½ ft high. On the top half of the front wall hung a large blackboard, used and erased for each class in turn throughout the day. The lower grades had the luxury of listening in on 6th-, 7th-, and 8th-grade classes, while silently completing their lessons or waiting for their turn for instruction. All the while, their fertile minds absorbed all they heard and saw. What an advantage for a gifted child.

The classes only had a few students each. Sylvia Caron was my only classmate. She started school with me in 1945. I waited for her to walk from her home each day and join me. We got to school and played outside until the teacher rang the brass bell. After saying the Pledge of Allegiance and singing a patriotic song, each class was called in turn for that day's lesson, went up front near the teacher's desk, recited their lessons and got further assignments.... always quietly.

On cold days, the oldest boys kept the stove well fed and red hot in that drafty school. One cold winter day, we had a near disaster when the stove's front right foot gave out. The front door flew open and red-hot coals fell on the wood floor. No fire alarm to pull, not even a telephone to call for help. The closest phone available was down the road at Mr. Octave Cyr's house. One of the older boys ran for the snow shovel in the entry and scooped up the coals and the half-burned wood out

the front door into the snow. The teacher told the students to get handfuls of snow to throw on the smoking floor. Early dismissal that day and no school until the stove was repaired.

What most fascinated me was when the teacher pulled down the large maps from the “map box” on the top right wall while teaching Geography and History to the older classes. Europe, Asia, oceans, mountain ranges, Wow, fascinating.

The teachers I remember were Jeannine and Esther Chamberland. Loretta Collins, Elsie Chasse and Rachel Ringuette sometimes filled in.

I learned to love school and learning in that quaint little red schoolhouse called Coolidge School. I feel privileged to have experienced that early education and have loved learning to this day.

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## HENRY MICHAUD & SONS WELL DRILLING

While here on a family visit from California this past fall, Kim Michaud Benson found a Social Studies assignment she had done when she was a student at Wisdom High School. This was done for a Social Studies Class taught by Mr. Landry and dated April 26, 1993.

What follows is a copy of the assignment submitted by Kim Michaud.

## **THE WELL DRILLING INDUSTRY IN ST. AGATHA, MAINE**

The town of St. Agatha was once part of Frenchville. St. Agatha became its own town on March 17, 1899. The beautiful Long Lake certainly attracted the first settlers to the area.

In 1946, Henry Michaud started a business of drilling water wells. The business wasn't very profitable when he started, so he had another job, cutting wood. As time passed, more people wanted these water wells, and the business became more profitable.

Henry Michaud had a family of five. When his youngest son, Paul Michaud, was fourteen years old, he started helping with the business. He learned how to drill wells by watching his father work. When Pepere retired, his son took over the business. It was in 1969 when he started to work independently.

Now, the well drilling business is more profitable than it was many years ago. Also, the rigs now used are more modernized than before. Now Dad would like someone else in the family to take over the business, but he doesn't think anyone will.

### **INTERVIEW**

**WHEN WAS THE BUSINESS ESTABLISHED?** 1946

**WHEN DID YOU START WORKING WITH PEPERE?** When I was fourteen years old.

**HOW DID YOU LEARN ABOUT WELL DRILLING?** I learned to drill wells by watching Pepere.

**WHERE DID PEPERE DRILL MOST OF HIS WELLS?** He worked mostly in the St. John Valley. He drilled some wells outside of St. John Valley, but not often, because he had a hard time speaking English.

**WAS THE BUSINESS PROFITABLE?** When he first started, Pepere had another job, which was cutting wood, but after a while, the well-drilling business became more profitable.

**WHEN DID YOU TAKE OVER PEPERE'S JOB?**  
1969

**HOW DID MACHINERY DEVELOP OVER A PERIOD OF TIME?** Before electricity, everyone pumped water by hand. After electricity was discovered, people used electric pumps. That's when Pepere started his business. He used different rigs to drill wells.

**DO YOU THINK SOMEONE IN THE FAMILY WILL TAKE OVER THE JOB?** I hope so, but probably not.

### **The following is an excerpt from a 1978 Bangor Daily News article:**

“Nine years ago, when Henry Michaud’s health declined, Babe took the reins, covering a two-hundred-mile business radius in northern Maine. As the firm expanded, he added a pair of used Ingersoll-Rand T-3 “DRILLMASTER” rigs to keep up with it. Last year, he expanded into pump installation as well.

In recent years, Babe has drilled wells for local paper firms and other businesses, as well as doing municipal wells. Other wells are installed for lumber and forest camps. But he drills the most wells for residential customers, whether comfortably in town or roughing it in a log cabin in the North woods. Irrigation wells for Maine potato growers are also important. As Babe puts it, “If potatoes sell, we drill more wells.”

Last fall, Kim was visiting her parents, Babe & Yvette Michaud, when the report reminded them of a funny family memory. When Kim was in first or second grade, she told her parents that she knew how to read, write, and do math and that she wanted to drill wells and drink beer when she grew up. It turned out that her love for math and numbers led her down the financial services path instead.

She also provided us with additional information about her grandfather, Henry’s business as follows:

Henry Michaud and Sons Well Drilling was purchased, in part, from Jos Morin in circa 1946 and from Simeon Guerrette in circa 1947.

Henry had his first stroke in 1956, but was still able to work.

Paul “Babe” Michaud – In 1963, at the age of 16 or 17, he bought his own well driller rig from Alberique Charette in Madawaska. He took out a six-thousand-dollar loan and paid it off in one year. In the same year, he also bought a pick-up with a snowplow, for \$3200.00 and paid in cash.

In 1971, Henry had his second stroke. Paul was in Trade School in Ohio and working for his brother-in-law, Bernie McCarthy, as a steam pipe fitter. This is when Babe came back home to buy and take over the well-drilling business.

In 2003, the business was sold to Danny Marquis and became Marquis & Michaud Well Drilling. In 2024 or 2025, Matt and Josh Chamberland, Dale & Ellen Chamberland’s sons, became the new owners Chamberland Well Drilling.

## The Cement Block House

A St. Agatha Landmark - The Cement Block House

A St. Agatha landmark disappeared in June of 2024. It was a home to many families and even the Town Office in the early 1940's. The following information, submitted by Gloria Collin Sirois, details how her family was involved in the ownership of the cement block house.

"The property the house sat on was purchased by my grandparents, Levite & Josephine (Marquis) Collin on April 24, 1916. They bought it from my great-grandparents, Joseph & Elizabeth Collin.

Levite and Josephine had married two years earlier in Fort Kent, Maine where my grandmother was born. They were married on January 5, 1914, at St. Louis Church in Fort Kent.

According to what my dad, Gerard Collin, and his sisters, Alberta and Constance, told me, my Pepere Levite built the house on the property he had purchased from his father and mother.

I have researched the property records and obtained copies of the deeds from the Bureau of Records in Fort Kent, Maine, in 2007. My aunts and cousins had planned a family reunion for the summer of 2007, and I thought it might be interesting to have the deeds available for my dad's surviving siblings and their children to see the records of Levite and Josephine's family home.

After purchasing the property, my Pepere Levite went to Canada and bought the cement blocks that formed the house's exterior. The blocks were "fancy blocks," because they had something mixed into the cement that looked like shiny flecks. (It may have been mica or something similar.) The blocks were transported across the St. John River and then moved to the landsite and used to build the house.

I never saw the interior of the house, but my dad and my aunts told me it was a nice home with a beautiful staircase going up to the second floor, where the bedrooms were located.

My grandparents raised thirteen children in that house. They had two children when they built the house, but the others were all born there. The family included Clarence, Gladys, Bernadette, Emily, Aline, Gerard, Grazilla (Grace), Morel, Alberta, Kathleen, Constance, and Jacqueline. Another child, Bertil (Betsy), my aunt Gladys' daughter, was raised by my grandparents.

My Memere and Pepere farmed the land, as did most of the families in the area during that era. When the Great Depression came along, times got really tough, and my grandparents lost the farm and house in foreclosure.

The family moved to Madawaska and then moved to Forestville, Connecticut, around the middle of 1940. My Dad said he was about 15 years old when the family moved to Connecticut. There were jobs available in Connecticut, and things were not that great in Maine. They lived in an apartment in Forestville for a few years, and then they bought a three-family home in Bristol, Connecticut.

The "Cement Block" House was a home for quite a few families after my grandparents' foreclosure. The home eventually fell into disrepair, and at one time was used as a bottle and can recycling center. It continued to deteriorate until it was finally demolished, and the lot was put up for sale."

## Project Save the Pelletier/Marquis Museum House

The house is situated on its original site and dates back to 1854, with the smallest portion of the house having been built by Andre Pelletier. The house represents an older working-class home, typically of commoner status, and is thought of as a sort of an “everyman’s home.” Humble in appearance, the rock foundation, low ceilings, square-headed nails, and buckwheat insulation provide proof of its importance as a significant historical structure. A series of various ownerships includes Horace Sylvain, Nere Picard, and Xavier Deschaine, and in 1927, it became the property of the Marquis family until the death of Mrs. Annie (Chasse) Marquis in 1976. A year later, it was purchased from Clarence Marquis (\$4500.00) by the historical society. The 2026 project to save the structure will begin with setting a firm footing to prevent the house from sinking and repairing any issues encountered during the process.
