

Thursday is First Responders, Veterans and Senior Citizens Day.




All Veterans, First Responders and Senior Citizens (age 65 & over) are admitted FREE.


Exhibitors with motorized vehicles (golf carts and ATVs)

Please be smart when operating a motorized vehicle. Anyone not following the rules will have their privileges revoked and be removed from the fair grounds. Follow the manufacturer's specifications on the number of people allowed on the golf cart/ATV. The use of two (2) wheel-motorized vehicles is prohibited.

1. Exhibitors, campers, and concessionaires must register motorized vehicles. Registration hours are 9 to 11 a.m. daily.
2. Registration is to be done at the lower fair office. Tags will be issued when the driver of the vehicle registers the following information:
 - A. Valid Driver's License
 - B. Proof of Insurance
 - C. Registration fee of \$25.00
3. Motorized vehicles are to be used in the exhibit areas only. They are not permitted on midways.
4. The following do not need to register their motorized vehicle.
 - A. Electricians
 - B. Fair Board Members



- All campers will be at their site by 9 p.m. Monday, Sept. 13 and will be removed by sundown Sunday, Sept. 19.

• **No electric heaters or air conditioners.**

• Truck campers must be securely blocked when removed from truck.

• All campers/vendors must have the ability to contain all gray water and make arrangements for the proper disposal of said water - NO EXCEPTIONS! Failure to comply with this regulation will result in expulsion from the fair grounds and citation from the Erie County Health Dept. and PA DEP.

• Campers must be self-contained or Jerican.

• ALL campers will be required to sign gray water disposal agreement

• NO Campfires.

General Fair Rules

1. All exhibitors agree to be bound by the rules and regulations of the Albion Area Fair. **All participants over 12 years old must have a booster button - Tuesday - Saturday.**
2. The Fair Management reserves the right to amend or add to these rules and regulations as its judgment may determine.
3. Reasonable care will be taken to protect all exhibits, exhibitors and spectators from injury and damage, but the Fair is not, in any way, to be held responsible for negligence on the part of spectators and exhibitors. Accidents, loss or damage of exhibits by water, fire, theft, or otherwise, whatever may be the cause or extent of the damage or loss, will not be the Fair's responsibility.
4. **All Livestock Entries must be pre-registered by Sept. 1. All other Entries must be pre-registered by Labor Day.**
5. Entries will be made according to classification. Premiums, as listed, may be given for meritorious exhibits. In cases where there is no competition, judges may give an award such as they deem the exhibit is worthy to receive. Same rule applies where there are fewer entries in any class than the number of premiums offered. The judges may, at their discretion, award a prize or prizes of such grade as the exhibit deserves. The Fair reserves the right to determine how many entries they will accept from any exhibitor in the same class or, in case of livestock, the same breed. The decision of the judges shall be final in all cases except where mistakes, fraud, misrepresentation or collusion, not discovered at the time of the award, is proved. In such cases, the Superintendent, Manager or Secretary of the Fair show, or such referee as he/she may appoint, may make the decision with his/her approval. The case may be appealed to the Fair Management of Show Commission from whose decision there can be no appeal.
6. It shall be the responsibility of the exhibitor to make known the proper name of the article or breed of livestock he is entering. Any item entered improperly will be disqualified to receive a prize but the judges will make the correct name on the entry tag for the benefit of the owner so that the same mistake in entering need not be made for the second time.
7. All entries must be grown or produced by the exhibitor since the last fair by the person whose name appears on the entry tag. Excludes wine and beer.
8. Superintendents of a Department reserve the right to refuse acceptance of any entry. Furthermore, the superintendents reserve the right to bar from competition animals, vegetables, flowers, and manufactured articles of decidedly inferior quality and those not possessing sufficient merit to warrant recognition.
9. The Fair Management may, at any time, order the removal of any exhibit or part of exhibit in bad condition and any article unfit to show may be excluded. No exhibit may be removed before 9 p.m. Saturday except by consent of the management.
10. Exhibits not picked up by 10 p.m. Saturday will be disposed of at the discretion of the Superintendent.
11. Every exhibit accepted for premiums **MUST BE GIVEN AN ENTRY TAG**, Which must be plainly marked, showing **THE NAME OF THE EXHIBIT**. In the case of livestock, the breed name must be given on cards large enough that the breed name is readily identified by the viewers or, if the livestock is grouped together according to breeds, one large sign to designate the group will be satisfactory. However, the award ribbons must be placed on the stall or pen of the individual winners for the duration of the Fair or show. Failure to comply with this regulation **WILL RESULT IN FORFEITURE OF PREMIUMS**. It will be the duty of the Fair or Show officials to see that this regulation is complied with. Where award ribbons are stolen or destroyed, the exhibitor may receive a duplicate at the close of the Fair or show, which shall be supplied by the Fair free of charge. No claims for premiums or other awards will be honored after December 31, 2021.
12. During the judging, buildings, except livestock arenas, are to be closed to everyone except fair officials, judges, and necessary attendants. No exhibitor or his agent shall communicate with the judge during time of determining the awards, except to answer questions proposed by the judges. Any exhibitor interfering with the judges while making awards shall forfeit any premium to which he/she would otherwise be entitled.
13. All livestock offered for premiums must be the property of the owner thirty (30) days or longer.
14. No person shall be allowed in the ring while stock is being judged, except judges, Superintendents and necessary attendants.
15. Should any animal awarded a prize be disqualified, the animals gaining the lower prizes shall move into the next higher position if, in the opinion of the judges, the animals are worthy of such prizes.
16. When on exhibition in the ring, each animal must be under halter and the owner or employee must have full control of animal.
17. Joint ownership considered to be as one owner in accordance with registration papers.
18. All campers and trailers must be parked in areas designated by the fair management and must pay all fees.

19. No intoxicating beverages or drugs permitted on the grounds.

- 20. No unauthorized persons allowed on the fairgrounds after 11 p.m. any day of the fair.
- 21. Each animal must be judged outside of stall or pen area. No premiums paid unless the exhibit is judged.
- 22. No ticket drawings will be held or announced in the fair office at any time.
- 23. Unsportsmanlike conduct is grounds for disqualification at the discretion of official in charge.
- 24. Any misuse of parking passes will result in loss of parking privileges.
- 25. Concessionaires may not have vehicles on midways after 11 a.m.
- 26. No dogs or any other animal not being exhibited on the fairgrounds is permitted on fairgrounds at any time. The service animal must have four legs.
- 27. The fair management reserves the right to remove any person(s) engaged in any type of unacceptable behavior. "Unacceptable" is purely at the discretion of the fair management. No refunds will be given to person(s) removed.
- 28. In accordance with Pennsylvania Crimes Code: No person shall give or offer to give away any live animal except fish as a prize in any game or contest.
- 29. No pets, drones, selfie sticks, sky lanterns, hover boards, bicycles, skateboards or roller blades permitted on the fair grounds.
- 30. Any illegally parked vehicles will be towed at owner's expense. All Parking Passes must remain clearly visible in the vehicle window at all times.
- 31. The following areas are non-smoking: Grandstand area during events, all buildings and barns.
- 32. No paging except for emergencies.
- 33. No selling any items on fair grounds unless you are a contracted vendor.
- 34. Exhibitors, campers, and concessionaires must register motorized vehicles. Registration hours are 9 - 11 a.m. daily at the lower fair office. Tags will be issued when the driver of vehicle shows the following information: A. Valid Driver's License, B. Proof of Insurance, C. Registration fee of \$25.00. Electricians and Fair Board Members do not need to register their motorized vehicle. Motorized vehicles are to be used in the exhibit areas only. No driving on Midways.
- 35. No food production and no open flames of any kind in the big tent. No campfires on the campgrounds.
- 36. It shall not rain.

Note: Not all exhibits will be on display after 9 p.m. Saturday as entrants begin clearing barns and buildings.

Albion Area Sportsmen's Club

The Albion Area Sportsmen's Club began in 1948 with objectives to promote the interests and general welfare of its members; to promote cooperation between landowners, sportsmen and the Game, Fish and Forestry Departments; to work for and encourage proper legislation relative to game, fish, forestry, streams and conservation of our natural resources; to promote and protect the best interests of the sportsmen of the community, county, division and state.



IAFE (International Association of Fairs and Expositions) National Code of Show Ring Ethics

Exhibitors of animals at livestock shows shall at all times deport themselves with honesty and good sportsmanship. Their conduct in this competitive environment shall always reflect the highest standards of honor and dignity to promote the advancement of agricultural education. This code applies to junior as well as open class exhibitors who compete in structured classes of competition. This code applies to all livestock offered in any event at a livestock show. In addition to the "IAFE National Code of Show Ring Ethics," fairs and livestock shows may have rules and regulations, which they impose, on the local, county, state, provincial and national levels.

All youth leaders working with junior exhibitors are under an affirmative responsibility to do more than avoid improper conduct or questionable acts. Their moral values must be so certain and positive that those younger and more pliable will be influenced by their fine example. Owners, exhibitors, fitters, trainers and absolutely responsible persons who violate the code of ethics will forfeit premiums, awards and auction proceeds and shall be prohibited from future exhibition in accordance with the rules adopted by the respective fairs and livestock shows. Exhibitors who violate this code of ethics demean the integrity of all livestock exhibitors and should be prohibited from competition at all livestock shows in the United States and Canada.

The following is a list of guidelines for all exhibitors and all livestock in competitive events:

1. All exhibitors must present, upon request of fair and livestock show officials, proof of ownership, length of ownership and age of all animals entered. Misrepresentation of ownership, age or any facts relating thereto is prohibited.

2. Owners, exhibitors, fitters, trainers or absolutely responsible persons shall provide animal health certificates from licensed veterinarians upon request by fair or livestock show officials.

3. Junior exhibitors are expected to care for and groom their animals while at fairs or livestock shows.

4. Animals shall be presented to show events where they will enter the food chain free of violative drug residues. The act of entering an animal in a livestock show is the giving of consent by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer and/or absolutely responsible person for show management to obtain any specimens of urine, saliva, blood, or other substances from the animal to be used in testing. Animals not entered in an event which culminates with the animal entering the food chain shall not be administered drugs other than in accordance with applicable federal, state and provincial statutes, regulations and rules. Livestock shall not be exhibited if the drugs administered in accordance with federal, state and provincial statutes, regulations and rules affect the animal's performance or appearance at the event. If the laboratory report on the analysis of saliva, urine, blood, or other sample taken from livestock indicated the presence of forbidden drugs or medication, this shall be prima facie evidence such substance has been administered to the animal either internally or externally. It is presumed that the sample of urine, saliva, blood, or other substances tested by the laboratory to which it is sent is the one taken from the animal in question, its integrity is preserved and all procedures of said collection and preservation, transfer to the laboratory and analysis of the sample are correct and accurate and the report received from the laboratory pertains to the sample taken from the animal in question and correctly reflects the condition of the animal at the time the sample was taken, with the burden on the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person to prove otherwise.

At any time after an animal arrives on the fair or livestock show premises, all treatment involving the use of drugs and/or medications for the sole purpose of protecting the health of the animal shall be administered by a licensed veterinarian.

5. Any surgical procedure or injection or any foreign substance or drug or the external application of any substance (irritant, counterirritant, or similar substance) which could affect the animal's performance or alter its natural contour, confirmation, or appearance, except external applications of substances to the hoofs or horns of animals which affect appearance only and except for surgical procedures performed by a duly licensed veterinarian for the sole purpose of protecting the health of the animal, is prohibited.

6. The use of showing and/or handling practices or devices such as striking animals to cause swelling, using electrical contrivance, or other similar practices are not acceptable and are prohibited.

7. Direct criticism or interference with the judge, fair, or livestock show management, other exhibitors, breed representatives, or show officials before, during, or after the competitive event is prohibited. In the furtherance of their official duty, all judges, fair and livestock show management, or other show officials shall be treated with courtesy, cooperation and respect and no person shall direct abusive or threatening conduct toward them.

8. No owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person shall conspire with another person or persons to intentionally violate this code of ethics or knowingly contribute or cooperate with another person or persons either by affirmative action or inaction to violate this code of ethics. Violation of this rule shall subject such individual to disciplinary action.

9. The application of this code of ethics provides for absolute responsibility for an animal's condition by an owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer or participant whether or not he or she was actually instrumental in or had actual knowledge of the treatment of the animal in contravention of this code of ethics.

10. The act of entering an animal is the giving of consent by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person to have disciplinary action taken by the fair or livestock show for violation of the Code of Show Ring Ethics and any other rules of competition of the fair or livestock show without recourse against the fair or livestock show. The act of entering an animal is the giving of consent that any proceedings or disciplinary action taken by the fair or livestock show may be published with the name of the violator or violators in any publication of the International Association of Fairs and Expositions, including Fairs and Expositions and any special notices to members.

11. The act of entering an animal in a fair or livestock show is the giving of verification by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person that he or she has read the IAFE National Code of Show Ring Ethics and understands the consequences of and penalties provided for actions prohibited by the code. It is further consent that any action, which contravenes these rules and is also in violation of federal, state, or provincial statutes, regulations, or rules may be released to appropriate law enforcement authorities with jurisdiction over such infractions.

IMPORTANT: ALL HEALTH PAPERS MUCH BE CHECKED BEFORE UNLOADING

Official identification of animals is required.

All animals must be free of infectious and contagious diseases. Fair board decision is final.

Be sure to use only grooming products that are approved for use on meat and dairy animals when fitting your animals for show. Unapproved products may contain ingredients that result in unacceptable residues in the meat or milk. If you are not certain that a product is residue safe and approved for use on meat or dairy animals, do not use it!

• • • Important • • •

If upon slaughter, treatment with drugs, biologics, or any chemical from fitting products, is the cause of condemnation of a carcass, the loss of the carcass and any other damages will be borne by the exhibitor.

GUIDELINES FOR CARE OF ANIMALS

It is the responsibility of each exhibitor to care for animals in a manner that is responsible and ethical. Following are some guidelines for the treatment of animals exhibited at the show.

Restraining Animals

- Animals should be tied or penned in a manner that will not hurt the animal or restrict its breathing in any way.
- Animals should be tied so that all four feet are firmly on the ground and they have enough room to stand comfortably and lie down.
- Animals should be tied so that they are not able to injure animals tied near them.
- Animals unaccustomed to each other should not be penned

together. Any type of rough handling, which could harm the animal, is prohibited. The use of whips, canes and show sticks should be restricted to showing only and then be used only to guide the animals, not punish them. Remember, animals will respond quicker and better to quiet, gentle handling than loud, rough handling.

Bedding

All animals should have bedding that is dry and clean. Pens should be cleaned regularly to keep the animals clean and comfortable. If non-traditional bedding, such as carpeting, is used, it should be regularly cleaned (at least twice daily) to keep the pen free from manure.

Feeding and Water

Animals should be well-fed and have access to clean water regularly. Realizing that many market animals must have restricted amounts of feed to maintain the proper weight, animals must be fed adequate amounts of feed to meet the animals' basic requirements. Animals not allowed reasonable access to feed and water will be disqualified from the show.

Blanket/Sweat Collars

Any type of material, such as blankets or sweat collars, should be large enough to permit normal body functions such as breathing, eating, drinking or lying down.

Transportation

Animals should be transported in a way that is both safe and considerate of the animal's well-being.

Health

It is the responsibility of the exhibitor to provide proper health care for their animals through routine inspection and consultation with health care professionals. The improper or illegal use of drugs or antibiotics is prohibited. If education is indicated, be sure to follow the label directions and allow more than the stated withdrawal time.



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Albion Area Fair Livestock Health Requirements

Based on 2021 Pennsylvania Department of Agriculture

Animal Health Recommendations for Animals for Exhibition, Including Commercial Exhibition

Pennsylvania Cattle:

Fair Requirements:

1. A Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) issued after May 1, 2021
2. All animals must be free of infectious and contagious diseases and a statement of this should be written on the CVI.
3. Cattle shall be identified by an official ear tag or other unique identification device approved by PDA. Official identification includes:
 - A USDA-issued National Uniform Ear tagging system (NUES) ear tag having a US shield; or
 - A 15-digit Animal Identification Number (AIN) ear tag starting with "840" (including RFID) or
 - Other official identification approved by PDA. (Brands and breed registrations with tattoos are not acceptable).
4. A current rabies vaccination administered by a licensed veterinarian for animals 3 months of age and older (observe appropriate slaughter withdrawal time).

Out of State Cattle:

Requirements:

1. A Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) issued within the 30 days prior to the date of importation is required.
2. Vesicular Stomatitis (VS): This applies to cattle entering PA from states that experienced a Vesicular Stomatitis outbreak in the last 12 months. In these cases an accredited veterinarian shall determine whether the animals are free from VS, and animals shall be accompanied by a CVI with the following statement signed by the accredited vet: "All animals identified on the CVI have been examined and found to be free from VS. During the past 90 days, these animals have neither been exposed to VS nor were located within 10 miles of a site where VS has been Diagnosed."
3. All animals must be free of infectious and contagious diseases and a statement of this is required on the CVI.
4. Federal regulation (USDA) requires official animal identification. Official ID will have a US shield and includes:
 - A USDA-issued National Uniform Eartagging System (NUES) tag; or
 - A 15-digit Animal Identification Number starting with "840" ear tag (including RFID) or
 - Other official identification approved by USDA. (Brands and breed registrations with tattoos are not acceptable).
5. A current rabies vaccination administered by a licensed veterinarian for animals 3 months of age and older (observe appropriate slaughter withdrawal time).
6. Tuberculosis Requirements:
 - No test is required for animals originating from animals originating from states or zones designated as accredited free by the USDA.
 - All exhibition animals originating from states or zones designated modified accredited advanced by the USDA must test negative within the 60 days prior to the date of importation. The negative test results and date of test must be included on the CVI or the animal must be accompanied by a negative test report (a copy of the original report is acceptable).
 - All animals originating from states or zones designated modified accredited by the USDA must originate from herds in

which all animals 12 months of age and older are tested negative within the 12 months prior to the date of importation; and the individual animals to be imported (all ages) are tested negative within the 60 days prior to the date of importation and at least 60 days after the negative whole herd test was completed. The negative test results and date of test must be included on the CVI or the animal must be accompanied by a negative test report (a copy of the original test report is acceptable).

Pennsylvania Equine Animals:

Fair Requirements:

1. A Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) issued after May 1, 2021
2. All animals must be free of infectious and contagious diseases and a statement of this should be written on the CVI.
3. All equine animals must test negative for Equine Infectious Anemia (EIA) by an official test within the 12 months prior to the opening date of the exhibition. Laboratory test results must accompany each animal to its final destination (a copy of the original lab report is acceptable). The CVI shall specify the date of sample collection and EIA test results. Foals less than six months of age accompanied by a test-negative dam are exempt from EIA testing requirements. If the foal is not accompanied by the dam, a copy of the dam's test results must accompany the foal to its final destination.
4. A current rabies vaccination administered by a licensed veterinarian for animals 3 months of age and older.

Out of State Equine Animals:

Fair Requirements:

1. A Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) issued within the 30 days prior to the date of importation is required.
2. Vesicular Stomatitis (VS): This applies to horses entering PA from states that experienced a Vesicular Stomatitis outbreak in the last 12 months. In these cases an accredited veterinarian shall determine whether the animals are free from VS, and animals shall be accompanied by a CVI with the following statement signed by the accredited vet: "All animals identified on the CVI have been examined and found to be free from VS. During the past 90 days, these animals have neither been exposed to VS nor were located within 10 miles of a site where VS has been diagnosed."
3. All animals must be free of infectious and contagious diseases and a statement of this is required on the CVI.
4. All equine animals must be test negative for EIA by an official test within the 12 months prior to the date of importation. Laboratory test results must accompany each animal to its final destination (a copy of the original lab report is acceptable). The CVI shall specify the date of sample collection and EIA test results. Foals less than six months of age accompanied by a test-negative dam are exempt from EIA testing requirements. If the foal is not accompanied by the dam, a copy of the dam's test results must accompany the foal to its final destination.
5. If an equine animal has resided in Texas or New Mexico for a cumulative total of 30 days or more within the six months preceding the date of entry into the Commonwealth, that animal must be test-negative for Babesia caballi and Theileria equi on a competitive enzyme-linked immunosorbent assay (c-ELISA)



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test, or a Department-approved equivalent test, with the test occurring within the 30 days preceding entry into Pennsylvania. The date of test and the test results shall be written on the Certificate of Veterinary Inspection.

6. A current rabies vaccination administered by a licensed veterinarian for animals 3 months of age and older.

Pennsylvania Goats:

Fair Requirements:

1. A Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) issued after May 1, 2021.
2. All animals must be free of infectious and contagious diseases and a statement of this should be written on the CVI.
3. Individual official animal identification is required for all goats. Official ID includes:
 - A USDA ear tag with a US shield; or
 - A legible tattoo with herd and individual identification recognized in an approved USDA Scrapie database a.k.a. scrapie tattoo (flock ID in the right ear–state postal code and letters/numbers–and individual animal ID in the left ear); or
 - A breed registration tattoo if the animal is accompanied by a registration certificate and the tattoo is legible.

Out of State Goats:

Fair Requirements:

1. A Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) issued within the 30 days prior to the date of importation.
2. Vesicular Stomatitis (VS): This applies to goats entering PA from states that experienced a Vesicular Stomatitis outbreak in the last 12 months. In these cases an accredited veterinarian shall determine whether the animals are free from VS, and animals shall be accompanied by a CVI with the following statement signed by the accredited vet: “All animals identified on the CVI have been examined and found to be free from VS. During the past 90 days, these animals have neither been exposed to VS nor were located within 10 miles of a site where VS has been diagnosed.”
3. All animals must be free evidence of infectious and contagious diseases and a statement of this is required on the CVI.
4. Individual official animal identification is required for all goats. Official ID includes:
 - A USDA ear tag with a US shield; or
 - A legible tattoo with herd and individual identification recognized in an approved USDA Scrapie database a.k.a. scrapie tattoo (flock ID in the right ear–state postal code and letters/numbers–and individual animal ID in the left ear); or
 - A breed registration tattoo if the animal is accompanied by a registration certificate and the tattoo is legible.
5. Tuberculosis testing requirements:
 - No test is required for animals originating from states or zones designated as accredited-free by the USDA.
 - All animals originating from states or zones designated modified accredited advanced must be test negative within the 60 days prior to the date of importation. The negative test results and date of test must be included on the CVI or the animal must be accompanied by a negative test report (a copy of the original report is acceptable).
 - All animals originating from states or zones designated modified accredited must originate from herds in which all animal 12 months of age and older have tested negative within the 12 months prior to the date of importation; and the individual animals (all ages) to be imported have also tested negative within the 60 days prior to the date of importation and at least 60 days after the negative whole herd test was completed. The negative test results and date of test must be included on the CVI or the animal must be accompanied by a negative test report (a copy of the original test report

is acceptable).

Pennsylvania Rabbits:

Fair Recommendations

1. A Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) issued after May 1, 2121

Fair Requirements

1. All animals must be free of infectious and contagious diseases.
2. An Animal Owner or Caretaker’s Verification of Veterinary Consultation Relationship statement for the animals being exhibited must be included on the fair registration form.

Out of State Rabbits:

Requirements:

1. No rabbits or their products, such as meat, pelts, hides, carcasses or other items, and no equipment, exposed feed, forages, or conveyances or other items or associated materials may enter the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania from a Commonwealth, State, Territory or Country where Rabbit Hemorrhagic Disease (RHD) has been diagnosed in the prior twelve (12) months or there is a reasonable suspicion it exists unless they meet the following requirements:
 - a.) All live rabbits must be accompanied by an ICVI and must be examined by an accredited veterinarian within the seventy-two (72) hours prior to the date of shipment to the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. The ICVI must include statements by an accredited veterinarian certifying that:
 - i. All rabbits in the shipment have been examined for and found free of infectious, contagious or communicable diseases;
 - ii. All rabbits have originated from a single premises that has no signs of infectious, contagious or communicable disease in rabbits;
 - iii. There have been no movements of rabbits onto the premises of origin within the 90 days prior to the date of shipment;
 - iv. The rabbits have had no contact with wild or captive rabbits other than their cohorts in the 90 days prior to the date of shipment.
 - b.) No rabbits or their products, such as meat, pelts, hides, carcasses or other items, and no equipment, exposed feed or conveyances or other items or associated materials may enter the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania from a premises exposed to, contaminated with or known to be affected with RHD, or where there is a reasonable suspicion the disease exists or the rabbits have been exposed to or infected with RHD. Fair management has the authority to impose additional requirements designed to prevent the spread of contagious diseases.
2. Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) issued within 30 days prior to the date of importation.
3. A statement on the CVI attesting that all rabbits listed on the CVI are free of signs of infectious and contagious disease.

Section 9: Pennsylvania Sheep

Fair Requirements:

1. A Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) issued after May 1, 2021.
2. All animals must be free of evidence of infectious and contagious diseases and a statement of this should be written on the CVI.
3. A current rabies vaccination administered by a licensed veterinarian for animals 3 months of age and older (observe appropriate slaughter withdraw time).
4. Individual official animal identification is required for all sheep. Official ID includes:
 - A USDA ear tag with a US shield; or
 - A legible tattoo with herd and individual identification recognized in an approved USDA Scrapie database a.k.a. scrapie

tattoo (flock ID in the right ear–state postal code and letters/ numbers– and individual animal ID in the left ear); or

- A breed registration tattoo if the animals are accompanied by a registration certificate (copy acceptable) and the tattoo is legible.

Out of State Sheep Fair Requirements:

1. Federal regulation (USDA) requires a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) issued within the 30 days prior to entry into PA.
2. Vesicular Stomatitis (VS): This applies to sheep entering PA from states that experienced a Vesicular Stomatitis outbreak in the last 12 months. In these cases an accredited veterinarian shall determine whether the animals are free from VS, and animals shall be accompanied by a CVI with the following statement signed by the accredited vet: “All animals identified on the CVI have been examined and found to be free from VS. During the past 90 days, these animals have neither been exposed to VS nor were located within 10 miles of a site where VS has been diagnosed.”
3. All animals must be free of infectious and contagious diseases and a statement of this is required on the CVI.
4. A current rabies vaccination administered by a licensed veterinarian for animals 3 months of age and older (observe appropriate slaughter withdraw time).
5. Individual official USDA scrapie animal identification is required. Official scrapie ID includes:
 - A USDA ear tag with a US shield; or
 - A legible tattoo with herd and individual identification recognized in an approved USDA Scrapie database a.k.a. scrapie tattoo (flock ID in the right ear–state postal code and letters/ numbers–and individual animal ID in the left ear); or
 - A breed registration tattoo if the animals are accompanied by a registration certificate (copy acceptable) and the tattoo is legible.

Pennsylvania Swine Fair Requirements:

1. No swine species shall be exhibited in Pennsylvania unless each animal:
 - Is accompanied by a certificate of veterinary inspection (CVI) issued within 14 days of the fair;
 - Is permanently identified by an official 840 series radio frequency identification (RFID) ear tag and the ear tag number is recorded on the CVI;
 - Has been visually inspected and found to be free of signs of contagious disease immediately prior to unloading at the exhibition by an accredited veterinarian or swine health monitor appointed by the fair board or livestock show committee.
2. All breeding swine exhibitions are to occur prior to the arrival of any market swine:

- Breeding swine must be removed from the animal exhibition premises prior to any market swine arriving.
- Breeding swine animal exhibitions shall arrive, exhibit, and depart in a period no greater than 72 hours.
- Swine birthing exhibitions and educational displays which are not competing may occur concurrently with market swine animal exhibition, as long as, reasonable precaution is made to ensure the biosecurity of the swine birthing exhibition or educational display.

3. All Market swine exhibited in department sponsored market shows shall move directly to a PDA or USDA licensed slaughter facility following the animal exhibition and may not be diverted to premises other than a recognized slaughter establishment or a slaughter market in which the sales are designated slaughter only sales.

Out of State Swine

1. A Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) issued within the 14 days prior to the date of the show is required. The CVI shall include a statement verifying that the swine have not been fed raw garbage.
2. Vesicular Stomatitis (VS) Statement: This applies to states that experienced a VS outbreak in the last 12 months. In these cases an accredited veterinarian shall determine whether the animals are free from VS, and animals shall be accompanied by a CVI with the following statement signed by the accredited veterinarian: “All animals identified on this CVI have been examined and found to be free from VS. During the past 90 days, these animals were not located within 10 miles of a site where VS has been diagnosed.”
3. All animals must be free of evidence of infectious and contagious diseases and a statement of this is required on the CVI.
4. Has been visually inspected and found to be free of signs of contagious disease immediately prior to unloading at the exhibition by an accredited veterinarian or swine health monitor appointed by the fair board or livestock show committee.
5. Individual animal ID – must be permanently identified by an official 840 series radio frequency identification (RFID) ear tag and the ear tag number is recorded on the CVI.
6. Brucellosis Testing Requirements:
 - No test required if the animal originates from a validated brucellosis-free state or brucellosis-free herd. All others must be tested negative within the 30 days prior to the date of importation.
7. Pseudorabies Testing Requirements:
 - Sexually intact swine over 6 months of age shall originate qualified PRV negative herd or be test negative to an official pseudorabies test within 30 days prior to importation.
 - No pseudorabies testing required for all other swine

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


Rules:

1. If you are in 4-H or FFA, you must send your entry to the 4-H Superintendent. Otherwise, you will show and collect only the open show prize money. You will NOT be allowed to show in Grooming and Showmanship or collect the prize money from 4-H.
2. No adult entries accepted under 54 inches.
3. Only mail in entries will be accepted and must be received by Aug. 31.
4. Stalls will not be available to anyone until Tuesday at 9 a.m.
5. All horses must remain on display until 9 p.m. Saturday, unless released by the superintendent or vet
6. Walk your horse to ALL rings.
7. Use the entry gate and the exit gates, (west end of the ring) during halter classes.
8. Horses must be under control at all times.
9. Exercise horses in the morning or at the designated time, by the Superintendent only, in the practice ring by the draft horse barn. Your horse must be in the barn by 11 p.m.
10. NO HORSES permitted in front of the barns or bleachers at any time for any reason. This could cause your dismissal from the fair.
11. Stalls and feed areas SHALL be CLEANED by 9 a.m. by the Exhibitor during as well as after the Fair. Stalls must be cleaned and all horses removed by 9 a.m. on Sunday morning after the Fair.
12. No "For Sale" signs or other advertisements permitted in the barn.
13. No one other than the owners/designated caretaker are permitted in the stalls or in the front of the horses.
14. No sitting on anyone's horse or on the stall between horses, while in the barn. This is an automatic dismissal.
15. Anyone who is asked by a committee person to do something and refuses will be asked to leave and will not be accepted in any of the following years.
16. The Albion Area Fair is not responsible for the loss or injury of handlers, riders, animals, spectators or property.
17. No chairs or other items placed in the alley ways or center walkways for any reason, if asked to move them and refusing to do so will be grounds for dismissal from the Fair.
18. Superintendent will designate the use of the wash rack.
19. All horses must be fed and watered at least twice a day by the owner or designated care person. This person MUST be introduced to the Superintendent.
20. You must wear boots or shoes with hard soles (no sandals, flip flops or open toed shoes), while around horses or while in their stalls.
21. All exhibitors will be held responsible for the following: friends, family or any other persons helping with the exhibitor's animal. ALL PERSONS HELPING WITH EXHIBITS MUST BE INTRODUCED TO THE SUPERINTENDENT AND WILL BE MADE TO SIGN ALONG WITH THE EXHIBITOR ON THE SADDLE HORSE BARN RULES. ALL SADDLE HORSE RULES WILL APPLY TO THE ABOVE PERSONS.




Horse Show Rules

1. Your entry number from Tuesday, given by your barn superintendent, is your Fair Horse Show Number. No other number will be given. The number goes with the horse, not the rider.
2. Age determined as of January 1st, 4-H rules apply in those divisions.
3. The Albion Area Fair Assoc. is not responsible for any loss or injury to the riders, animals, spectators or property.
4. Fair exhibitors only. Must have animal in barns. No entry fees.
5. Boots must be worn. Sneakers, sandals, work boots, etc. are prohibited. Approved riding boots required.
6. Riders 18 years old and under must wear an ASTM/SEI approved protective headgear while riding or driving.
7. Judge's decision is final and must be accepted in a sportsmanlike manner.
8. Horses must be led to and from show arena, practice ring and barn.
9. You must dismount before leaving the ring in timed events.
10. Animals should be under control at all times! You may only ride in the practice ring or areas designated by committee. You may not ride around the fairgrounds, including areas west of warm up area.
11. Animals will be ridden one time only per class.
12. The committee reserves the right to change, combine, or cancel any classes at the committee's discretion.
13. Please make tack and rider changes 2 classes before your class.
14. Tack changes will be limited to 4 minutes between classes.
15. Western hats are optional in game classes.
16. Entry numbers only will be paid, not the rider!
17. **Classes 3 - 8 on Thursday are not eligible to canter/lope at any time during shows. Any person riding in a beginner's class is not eligible to canter/lope at ANY point during the Fair. Canter/loping/galloping in a timed event will be cause for disqualification.**
18. Riders may be led in timed events, however, they will be placed behind riders who are not led, regardless of time. No exhibitors should be led during a performance class.

Glossary of Terms

3 BLOOMS - 3 individual flowers on separate stems with foliage attached to stem.

DISBUDDING - The removal of lateral buds along the stem of a flower to promote the development of a large terminal bloom for exhibition purposes.

SPIKE - A lengthened flower cluster in which the flowers are practically stemless. Ex. - Gladiolus

STALK - The stem or axis of a plant, especially a non-woody one.

STEM - Any main or lateral axis of a plant which develops from a bud, possesses nodes and internodes, and bears leaves and buds at the nodes.

ACCESSORY - A subordinate object in an arrangement, other than plant material, container, base, staging & mechanics.

FEATURED ITEM - An object dominate in the design.

BACKGROUND - The surface against which a design is seen. may be used as a frame of reference or be incorporated into the design.

UNDERLAY - Fabric, cardboard, etc. placed under design. May form a continuing or contrasting background color.

ARTIFICIAL - Imitation flower, foliage, branch, fruit or vegetable manufactured to simulate natural appearance. Artificial plant materials are not permitted in Standard Flower Show.



HOBBYIST: You may enter as an exhibitor in this division if you engage in a hobby or craft for pleasure. If you occasionally have the opportunity to sell your item for little or no profit, you may still enter this division.

Occasional selling is defined as seasonal selling or holiday selling - not year round activity. This item must be made during your spare time at home - exceptions being: making ceramics at ceramic class.

You may not -

- Display in a boutique or business establishment
 - Be affiliated with a place of business
 - Participate in the area of your entry unless your job description does not connect you with your craft or hobby - Such as cashier in an arts and crafts store
 - Hold a business card
 - Hold a vendor's license
 - Make your item at a place of business or at work
 - Sell at a craft show
 - Give instruction in a specified field
1. Pre-registered entries will be received from 9 a.m. - 8 p.m. on Monday of the Fair. Entered items will be available for pick up after 9 p.m. Saturday or from 10 a.m. to noon on Sunday. Please bring exhibitor number to claim entry.
 2. Entries will be judged on Tuesday and judging will be closed to the public. Judging will be from 9 a.m. to noon or UNTIL all judging is completed and the exhibits are in place.
 3. Judges may withhold awards in any class and their decision shall be final. No one will be admitted to the building while judging is in progress.
 4. NO late entries will be accepted.
 5. No piece can compete in more than one class, that is, an article can be judged only once.
 6. Original artwork (no copies) not previously shown at the Albion Area Fair will be eligible for ribbons. "Original" means not copied.
 7. No nude, sexually suggestive or violent art, photographs or crafts will be accepted.
 8. NO "For Sale" tags are permitted on any entry.
 9. It is the responsibility of the individual exhibitors to read the specific details in each section to see that their pieces qualify and fulfill the requirements of that class.
 10. Violation of any department rules constitutes a disqualification.
 11. Due to limited space, entries may not be displayed to their fullest advantage. This will not affect the judging in any way.
 12. This department is intended to show our local amateur talent. PROFESSIONAL WORK WILL NOT BE ACCEPTED. Individuals are designated "professional" if the exhibited talent is their major source of income.
 13. All entries must be made since the close of the last fair and by the exhibitor only.
 14. Photos must have been taken in the past year by the exhibitor.

 17. Items cannot be entered in other classes if there is a specific class already offered, i.e. if you enter a doll in "Doll, porcelain" you may not enter another porcelain doll in crafts.
 18. Names on paintings must be covered for judging.
 19. Grossly oversize/overweight items will be subject to prior authorization and may be turned down due to space availability.
 20. We encourage typed or printed paragraphs of explanation submitted with any unusual entries for benefit of viewers.
 21. Care will be taken with all items, but we are not responsible for damage to articles while on Fairgrounds.
 22. To enter the Senior Citizen division of any department, the exhibitor must be at least 65 years of age.
 23. Only clean items will be judged on neatness, method use, originality and technique. 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



3. Have not been a former local Fair Queen winner, nor a former PA Fair Queen contestant.
4. Not hold any other title for any other community group or pageant during her reign.
5. Have parental or guardian consent to enter the competition.
6. Be single, have never been married, have not been pregnant nor given birth to a child.
7. Act in accordance with the PA Fair Queen Behavior Policy.
8. Meet all time commitments, Queen obligations and Fair Queen Dress Code as set forth by the PA Fair Queen Program.
9. Attend fund raisers, publicity events and all scheduled practices.
10. Attend/work all days of the Fair.
11. Must have an entry in the 2022 Albion Fair. Entry may be in ANY department or category.

PA Fair Queen Behavior Policy

The Contest's governing board shall have the sole discretion to determine whether, in its judgment, the Queen, Alternate or Contestants may continue to participate in the Program, in the event that the Board determines that any statement or representation is not true and accurate, or that any action is inconsistent with the rules, standards and dignity of the Program.

The following will be considered violations of the Policy and will be grounds for immediate disqualification, dismissal and/or being banned from future Queen competitions.:

1. Any infractions of any Queen Contest Rules.
2. Smoking, drinking alcoholic beverages, chewing gum, foul language and/or public displays of affection to dates/boyfriends while wearing crown and/or sash and representing the Queen Program.
3. Engagement in any illegal/unpartisan, unethical, indecent and/or morally questionable behavior, including but not limited to online representations on the Internet such as social networking sites (Facebook, Twitter, Instagram, etc.).
4. Use of any illegal controlled dangerous substances or abusing the use of alcohol or other dangerous substances. (There is zero tolerance for illegal controlled substances and/or abusing the use of alcohol).
5. Any defamation of the Queen Contest, its winners and contestants, and the Fair or the PA Fair Queen Program and their Directors and Committee members, whether it be oral or written. This includes postings on the social media.
6. Any uncooperative or unsportsmanlike conduct before, during, or after the competition.
7. Appearing in crown and banner at any event without an official invitation from an authorized event coordinator or event board member.
8. COVID NOTE: Anyone who is exhibiting symptoms, has a temperature, and/or answer yes on the questionnaire will be directed to leave the area, avoid contact with others and go straight home, immediately, to seek further testing and/or to quarantine.

PA Fair Queen Dress Code

Wearing of the Fair Queen crown and/or sash is to be considered an honor and privilege. The bearer is now an ambassador representing herself, her family, her community and her Fair.

While fashion styles may change, good taste does not!

Therefore responsible, appropriate and professional appearance is expected while the Queen is wearing her crown and sash:

1. Attire that is conducive to the specific appearance or event (i.e. business casual, formal, etc)
2. No jeans, sneakers, flip flops or boots. Alterations may be made to the jean/footwear rule only if:
 - A. severe weather or unsafe conditions exist and
 - B. the Fair Queen's official Coordinator or Board Member has approved an alteration consistent with the professional appearance expectation.
3. It is strongly recommended that closed toe shoes be worn when in livestock areas, for safety reasons.
4. No visible piercing (other than earrings) or tattoos.
5. No outfit that shows cleavage.
6. Dresses/skirts must be no shorter than the height of a dollar bill (approx. 2.5") from the bottom of the dress/skirt hem to the top of the knee cap.
7. No clothing that advertises, promotes or glorifies the use of alcohol, tobacco, drugs, or anything inconsistent with the dignity of the Queen program.
8. Queens are permitted to wear formal gowns.
9. Junior Miss is permitted to wear semi-formal tea length dresses. Not full length gowns. Dresses must pass the dollar bill rule.

Pull will be made on dirt track. Weigh-in at track from 5-6:45 p.m.

All contestants MUST use Old Albion Road to enter the fairgrounds.

All participants over the age of 12 must have a booster button or day pass to enter fairgrounds.

Rules:

1. All pullers must wear shoes, helmet, shirt and long pants.
2. Pullers and track personnel, only, allowed in the pulling area.
3. Puller and track personnel only allowed on the track unless others are authorized, personally by superintendent.
4. Whenever the sled is pulled back to the starting line, the next driver has two minutes to hook up and start his pull, after the sled is set.
5. The number one puller will be the test puller and may take the pull if working condition of the sled is satisfactory, as determined by the track judges. He may then have the option to take a second pull in the third position and forfeit the first pull distance. If the sled needs adjustment, the first puller after each adjustment will pull as the first puller of the class. All decisions must be made before the puller is unhooked from the sled. On any re-pulls caused by equipment malfunction, the puller will immediately re-hook. If the number one puller is disqualified on his test pull, he is still able to take a second pull (in the third position).
6. Once a puller drops out of the class, he may not re-enter the class.
7. Tractors can only be used in one class pull, drivers may compete in different classes on different tractors.
8. If the tractor touches lines or the sled hits the markers, the driver will be disqualified.
9. Puller may stop before the 25 foot marker and re-pull as long as they did not cross the side lines. Each puller will be given two attempts to start sled within 25 feet.
10. All tractors will be weighed and hitch height checked with the driver sitting on the seat, and with his/her helmet.
11. Front weight bar measured from center of rear axle forward may not exceed 84". Rear weight bar and weights measured from center of rear axle backward may not exceed 18". Tractor width including weights and bars may not exceed 4 feet and must fit on the scales. All weights and bars must clear the scales to avoid damaging the equipment. If the tractor fails to clear the scales (the weight bar or weights hit) you will be disqualified for the day or until the problem is rectified.
12. Weights may be moved from one place to another after weigh in as long as no more weight is added. Tractors will be confined to a line up area after crossing the scales. Any tractor leaving this area will be disqualified.
13. All weights must be safely secured to the tractor. No weights are permitted on seat or deck and cannot be higher than the seat. Anything lost during the pull is cause for disqualification. If the front of the tractor tires are in the air when the flagman flags the tractor indicating the pull is over, and the contact with the ground causes an object to be lost; the puller will not be disqualified.
14. Top 3 tractors in each class must weigh out.
15. All pullers must start with a tight hitch. All tractors must have a stationary minimum 1 1/2" horizontal "D" ring or a horizontal hitch approved by the track official. No portion of the tractor may interfere with the weight transfer machine, chain or hook during the pull or while being hooked or unhooked.
16. Any tractors may shift gears without stopping during the pull.
17. No adjustments can be made as the tractor is pulling down the track.
18. All classes must have a tractor type seat with a back or aluminum with a 3" back and the seat must stay in position during the pull. The driver must remain in the seat, but not on the seat back, with one hand, full grasp (no finger tipping) on the wheel at all times and both feet remain straddling to the tractor or be disqualified.
19. Tractor puller must keep their machines under control at all times on and off the track as determined by the track judges. No excessive speed will be permitted on the grounds of the pull. There will be only one warning, the second time you will be told to load up and leave and your entry fee will not be refunded.
20. All tractors must have a hood, grill, seat and fenders suitable for protecting the driver; and all pulleys and belts must be covered, except the starter generator belt. If tractor is not equipped with the factory side shields then you must have a 1/8" solid shield or 3/16" aluminum secured on opposite side of cam to top of the block on modified and stock altered class tractors.
21. All tractors must have working brakes and working reverse. Stock altered may choose not to have working reverse, but then must unhook themselves.
22. Only four cycle tractors are permitted.
23. Exhaust may be altered to straight pipe, but must discharge vertically, at 90° upward.
24. No dual wheels, tire chains, studded, ATV, mini sprints, 4x4 tractors, implements or webs are permitted.
25. Pump gas only, must meet .750 specific gravity. No alcohol fuels. No electric fuel pumps except in stock altered class. No pressure tanks. No additives.
26. All tractors must have stock ignition.

27. Wheelie bars are required for your safety. Wheels must be 1 1/2" wide, minimum. Pads must be in a fixed position and 1 1/2" wide, minimum with a 3 square inch minimum. Wheels or pads measured from trailing edge of the tire to the front edge of the wheel or pad must be 5" and no higher than 5" from the ground. Stock, modified and altered stock class tractors must have a kill switch and it must be in operation and easily accessible.
28. Fighting between pullers will be grounds for disqualification of all parties involved. Complaints will be heard and rule on in a reasonable manner. Any and all protests made to a rule violation by an individual (plaintiff) must be accompanied by a \$100 fee which will be refunded to the plaintiff if the other person (defendent) is found to be in violation of any rule. If there is no violation of the rule, the money will be given to the defendent.
29. If the track official senses a violation of failure to comply with these rules, he may without the posting of the \$100 request that the tractor in question prove compliance to the rules. This may happen at any time.
30. No drinking of alcoholic beverages or use of illegal drugs will be permitted on the grounds of the event and no intoxicated or drug impaired driver will be permitted to pull.
31. Drivers may not smoke cigarettes, cigars or pipes while hooked to the weight transfer machine.
32. Registration closes 15 minutes before the pull is scheduled to begin. Drivers must arrive early, pick their classes and register. No changing of classes will be permitted after the pull begins.


