YEARLY REPORT

VOLUNTEERS: Without the help of our crew of volunteers, keeping house in a three-story mansion with both an attic and a basement would be a daunting task. However, every Wednesday morning at nine o'clock, armed with dust clothes, mops, vacuums, and elbow grease, a small army of volunteers shows up, and "voila!", a clean, dusted, and shiny museum emerges. They also repair broken things, create displays, file paper work, hang pictures, and create order in our store rooms. Thank you, D'Aune, Jessie, Verla, Jane, Karen, Brenda, Kathy, (our regulars) and those of you who show up for an hour or two when you can. Levi and Ricky, two members of Weiser High School's Proud Sound, used their community service requirement to dig out our old WHS band uniforms (of various vintages) and created a WHS Band display in the School room. Colorful!!

We are also blessed with volunteer Jeri Kleppin who, for many years has worked at filing, identifying, and repairing the over 4000 photographs of local people, places, events, and happenings. Along with that she has now undertaken to save the degrading images on film, and negatives in our archives. Mrs. Walker comes in on Mondays to help Jeri. For a year Lisa McKnight has worked on scanning those 4000 photographs onto thumb drives to preserve them in case of fire or other catastrophe.

TOURS: Thanks to our new system of "You call – We come" we have been able to show people through our museum throughout the year. As a result we have entertained guests from out of town, people new to our community, curious passers-by, and occasionally groups who call ahead. Without exception they are amazed (stunned) by the quality and quantity of displays. Thank you, board, for all your hard work.

CABIN: With the matching grant we received from the Idaho Heritage Foundation we have been able to stabilize, repair, and paint the Harper Cabin. Doug Parker Construction did a wonderful job of analyzing the problems, and bringing the support structures up to code. We hope to have it furnished, and ready for visitations in the spring (thanks to those volunteers we mentioned).

DISPLAYS: With generous donations from our Nisei friends we have completed a display honoring the contributions of our Japanese Community. (Third floor, first door to the right) We have received a roll-top desk originally from the Washington Hotel, and it is being installed in our "Lawyer" room. In the basement the Court Street Cruisers have up-dated and modified their Garage Display, and added better lighting. Thanks to Plischke's, our Rancher Room received donations from local rancher, Paul Striker – even the old military saddle his Daddy insisted he use when he was learning to ride (about age 3). Look for a big addition to our Native American Room. Not done yet, but will be shortly.

PLANS: We are hoping to create a research center so that visitors can utilize the thousands of records, family histories, photographs, historical books, etc. that we have available in our library.

Treasurer Report

Fiscal Year 2021 vs 2022

The fiscal year for the Snake River Heritage Center runs from October 1st to September 30th. The previous fiscal year mirrored some of the volatility existing in the current financial world overall. Revenue was down 41.22% while expenses increased 28.72%. Some of the more significant expense increases were seen in building maintenance and repairs as well as utilities. Much of the decrease in revenue was due to the fact that the previous year saw some grants awarded. We had a net positive for fiscal year 2021 with a net profit of \$21,916.48. Net profit for 2022 was \$1,779.68 which represents a negative 98%.

Fiscal YTD Review

For FYTD23 we are seeing donations similar to the previous FY; however, utilities continue to rise. We are currently seeing an increase in utilities of 30% as compared to the same period last year. Other than the increase in utilities, typical expenses have been kept in check. The restoration project on the cabin was complete using grant dollars received from the previous FY and represents much of the increase in expenses for FY 2022 compared to FY 2021.

Treasurer Commentary

Scott Manser has been the treasurer for the last couple years and has recently resigned. We would like to thank Scott for his dedication to SRHC and for all his hard work on the board and as treasurer. Scott will be missed! I have agreed to serve on the board as treasurer and know I have big shoes to fill and look forward to serving.

The board would also like to thank all those who support SRHC, we couldn't function without you! Your time and financial support are critical to our success! Thank you!
