We got a room dedicated for the library and got to work! It was cleaned and freshly painted, with students eargerly helping out!




We took old bookshelves that were too tall and unstable for a children's library . . .

We even had story time with little books . . .




. . . and the biggest books we've







ever seen! Wow!










A finished mural that simply says READ in Arabic, Kiswahili, and English. *That's what we do – we get kids to read!* 




A wonderful mural with a wonderful message

Baobabs are indigenous to Africa and can survive - and thrive - in environments where other trees cannot. Baobabs stand proud and tall, and are a great source of food, water, shelter, and medicine. They are a traditional place where people would gather to pass on knowledge, much like schools today. Some baobabs have lived for thousands of years, making them a symbol of wisdom, resilience, vitality, adaptability, and perseverance.

Different groups of students gave entertaining and informative presentations . . .








And grown-ups gave thanks and motivational speeches, encouraging students to read more and study hard
