

A holy Saturday poem Written by Avery Arden, Binary breaking worship, <u>binarybreakingworship.com</u>

they wanted—no, they needed to touch you one last time.

so they trudged the tombward path with their perfumes and their spices their strips of cloth to cocoon your body in for its final transformation back to dust

their shoulders almost broken with grief, heavy as the cross that crushed the life

that crushed the life from your flesh.

let me fall in step behind them. let me take my place in that line of broken hearts bearing a cross of grief together. let me shoulder my share of the burden and let me not rush to the first fingers of dawn, frail and trembling, reaching past a rolled-back stone to empty space where your corpse should be—

no. let me linger in the moment when your corpse still lies there and anguish fractures the air into splinters that cut the lungs.

this moment matters: your brown body with the breath pressed out by the inexorable boot of Empire matters.

and the moment that comes after cannot ease this one.

it never has, and it never will, for

there are still bodies broken, breathless, beaten down by Empire's brutality or else its apathy.

and you, with us to the last, still lie among them you hold them close and share their final exhalation be it in a hospital bed, the street, a cell.

so let me not sprint to sunrise when your body can still be found nestled with cold bodies in their graves.

blessed be the hands that carry the spices and perfumes, water and cloth! blessed, blessed be the throats worn rough with sobs yet refusing to be silenced, broadcasting the crime lest some claim ignorance.

i'll not dishonor them by racing past to the future reunion of form to dust, breath to body, lover to loved before they're ready.

keep watch! soak in! be present with them! this moment is holy.

I believe we rush too quickly to the resurrection. Now, stay with me here. I've been in the ministry for 20 years and by far more people attend worship on Easter than they do on Maundy Thursday or Good Friday. I get the reason- we all want to know that God can redeem anything even the evil of the world. I do, too.

Yet I believe that in order for the resurrection to have deep meaning and to transform us, we should allow ourselves to move through the events of the Last Supper, Jesus's arrest and trial and the crucifixion. In between the lines of each event we find the battle of every human emotion as Jesus offers himself. He reflects back to us the ugliness of our capacity for sin and evil. But thanks be to God he doesn't let that be the last word.

This last half of Lent as we move into Holy Week, I invite you to find a way to move through the holy moments of grief and despair so that the celebration of Resurrection Sunday may transform our grief from the inside out. Thank you to Avery Arden who wonderfully illustrated the "in between" we may feel while we wait for the resurrected Lord. I look forward to sharing with you in the journey to the cross and resurrection. May Jesus' presence be the transformation that we all need.

BOOKS FOR YOUR READING PLEASURE

To prepare us for Easter and Jesus' resurrection, I am recommending some titles that will help understand the return of our Savior and why we celebrate Easter.



Emily Belle-Freeman has written *Celebrating a Christ-Centered Easter*. Told in first person narrative of seven disciples, it is the story of Jesus from the Crucifixion to the Resurrection. You will learn lessons and simple traditions to follow. This book will show you how to implement the teachings of the Easter holiday to enrich your lives.



The Lion, the Witch, and the Wardrobe is a C.S. Lewis classic and is book two of The Chronicles of Narnia Series. It takes you on the adventures of four siblings who travel through a wardrobe to the land of Narnia. There, the kids see a land overtaken by the White Witch. When almost all hope is lost, Aslan, the Great Lion, returns to bring about change through his ultimate sacrifice. This is a great book for your teenagers to see the symbolic

meaning of the life of Jesus and his disciples.



Cynda Strong has written and illustrated stories through poetry in her colorful book *The Resurrection*. It is part of the Arch Books Bible Series and is appropriate for kids ages 5-9. Rather inexpensive, it can be purchased online at many Christian bookstores. Give it a try to help your youngsters learn the story of Jesus' return after the crucifixion.

Financial Comments / Observations:

- 1. There was an \$18,000.00 shortfall in February. \$12,000.00 came from the Endowment with \$6,000.00 'borrowed' from Building On Generosity. The \$6,000.00 will be paid back to Building On Generosity from the Endowment in March.
- 2. The five largest operating expenses in February were:
 - \$7,896.73 Pastoral expenses (payroll, Board of Pensions, etc.).
 - \$5,587.23 Insurance (liability for quarter).
 - \$5,540.00 Snow removal and salting (3 buildings).
 - \$4,279.01 Staff payroll & payroll processing expenses.
 - **\$3,372.90** Gas (3 buildings).
- 3. The operating net income / (deficits) were (\$19,217.41) in February and (\$18,454.27) Year To Date.
 - The actual February operating expenses were \$10,914.02 above the average monthly budgeted expenses.
 - The actual February operating incomes were \$4,636.73 below the average monthly budgeted incomes.
 - The Year-To-Date operating expenses were \$13,480.61 above the average YTD budgeted amounts.
 - The Year-To-Date operating incomes were \$2,359.68 above the average YTD budgeted amount.

- 4. In February, the value of the MassMutual Investment accounts decreased \$0.98 to \$354,099.07.
- 5. In February, the value of the total Endowment Fund decreased \$12,112.81 to \$357,049.02. This includes the \$12,000.00 used to pay operating expenses.
- 6. The February Second Saturday Free Community Dinner was not held. The total cost to the church for all community dinners since September 2021 is \$693.02.
- 7. The February Men's breakfast was held at River Star Diner.

The 2025 Per Capita is \$43.50 for each of the 205 members of our Church. (The number is the membership of FPCH on December 31, 2023.) The total amount due in 2025 is \$8,917.50 or \$743.13 monthly. In February, \$426.81 was received for Per Capita bringing the total received in 2025 to \$2,205.62 or 24.7% of the amount due. A payment of \$743.13 was sent to the Presbytery of the Highlands of NJ in February bringing the total sent in 2025 to \$1,486.26 or 16.7% of the total amount due.

The 2025 Per Capita amount is \$43.50 for each member of the congregation.

Building On Generosity (BOG) Capital Campaign

- Donations received during February, \$64.00.
- Total donations received from church members, non-members and anonymous from September 2019 (the BOG Kickoff dinner) through the last day of February 2025, \$649,952.02.
- Expenses paid using the BOG funds in February, \$826.98. The payment was to everOn to complete the upgrade and inspection of the fire alarm system.
- The total available BOG funds are \$5,642.28 plus \$6,000.00 to be repaid for a total of \$11,642.28. The breakdown is \$6,392.28 for the next BOG project with an additional \$2,500.00 designated for parking lot pavement and \$2,750.00 designated for the Chapel range hood replacement.
- Donations breakdown by source:
 - 5.3% \$34,389.76 from nonmembers
 - 86.0% \$559.257.05 from members
 - <u>8.7%</u> <u>\$56,305.21</u> from anonymous & dinners
 - 100.0% \$649,952.02 Total

Sharing God's Bounty The Fields Are Ripe

Easter is the most joyous, the most victorious celebration of the church year. It is an opportune time for us as stewards to "Declare his glory among the nations, his marvelous deeds among all peoples" (Psalm 96:3)! What deed can be more marvelous than the resurrection of our Lord from the dead? Yes, "Christ has indeed been raised from the dead, the first fruits of those who have fallen asleep" (1 Corinthians 15:20), and we, too, shall be raised from the dead to live with him forever in Heaven.

As stewards of the Gospel, we have this good news to tell. Jesus reminded us of the urgency of the proclamation of his redemption. We read in John 4:35 that Jesus said, "Do you not say, 'Four months more and then the harvest'? I tell you, open your eyes and look at the fields! They are ripe for harvest." There is a need for us to tell this message effectively, passionately, clearly, and with perseverance so that all may be led by God's grace to respond to Christ's gift of salvation.

Along with pronouncing this good news with our own lips, we have a responsibility to give. We respond to the needs of others by taking groceries to our food banks, by contributing funds to be used for helping families with various financial difficulties, by sending money to areas hit by natural disasters, such as floods and hurricanes. What greater need is there than to provide financial support for those who minister to the greatest need of all ... the spiritual needs of Jesus' lost sheep? Our giving should be done willingly, cheerfully, generously, even as God in Christ has given to us.

Jesus promised that, as we carry out his commission to "...make disciples of all nations ..." he will be with us "...to the very end of the age" (Matthew 28:19, 20). Paul reminded us that "God is able to make all grace abound to [us], so that in all things at all times, having all that [we] need, [we] will abound in every good work" (2 Corinthians 9:8). Every day, the Holy Spirit provides opportunities for us as stewards to tell the good news and to give according to our abilities that the message of God's love in Christ may be spread throughout the world. Easter is our reason: Christ is risen! He is risen indeed!

TEACH YOUR CHILDREN HOW TO PRAY

Have a Family Sunrise Easter Breakfast

Getting up before dawn to watch the sunrise is a special treasure that is not easily forgotten. This Easter morning tradition of a sunrise breakfast creates a sacred space in which memories are cultivated for life. Some families already have this tradition and gather together in community for a sunrise service. For those who don't, however, why not do it at home? Breakfast can be as simple or elaborate as you wish. The most important element is simply gathering together as a family and enjoying the time together.

DESIGNED FOR ALL AGES.

MATERIALS: Breakfast foods and a printout of John chapter 20:1-18.

TIME INVESTMENT: One hour

HOW TO:

- 1. The night before, set the table, inside or outside or near a window to see the sunrise.
- 2. Plan to wake everyone in time to be ready at the table about 10-15 minutes before sunrise.
- 3. Serve breakfast and have everyone seated. Begin with a prayer of your own or use this one: "God of darkness and light, we give you thanks for this Easter morning. As we sit here in the dark, we are excited to experience resurrection in a new way as the sun rises and light fills the sky. Help us to have a meaningful breakfast together as a family. Amen."
- 4. As you eat breakfast together, have someone read the John passage slowly.
- 5. Notice the first line: "Early on the first day of the week, while it was still dark..." (20:1a) Notice if it is still dark outside and notice that this show it was outside when Mary went to eh tomb. Ask, "How do you think Mary felt when she went to the tom in the dark?" If you are able to eat outside, listen to the sounds.
- 6. Enjoy breakfast together and as it gets brighter share thoughts and experiences that come to mind. Ask questions that occur to you or use one or more of the following:
 - What part of the story is most interesting to you?
 - Does the light happen all at once, or does it seem to occur gradually?
 What does this tell you about the resurrection?
 - In the story, Mary calls Jesus a teacher. How is Jesus a teacher to you?
 - How do you think people felt when they realized that Jesus was alive?
 - Resurrection means coming back to life. What are some things that re mind you of resurrection in the world?
- 7. Close your time together with a prayer: "Thank you, God, for this resurrection breakfast, a time to focus on you and the mystery of resurrection. Help us to celebrate Easter and to share its message of hope and promise. Amen."

NOTE: The beauty of this tradition is that it starts the morning with a spiritual focus and centers the day in family and faith. It also serves as a great foundation on which to build other traditions as the years go on. Add your own special recipes and surprises at breakfast.
