



#### **Financial Comments / Observations:**



- 1. The five largest operating expenses in May were:
- •1.) **\$8,148.41** Pastoral expenses (payroll, Board of Pensions, etc.).
- •2.) \$3,969.87 Staff payroll & payroll processing expenses.
- •3.) \$1,279.52 Gas (3 buildings).
- •5.) \$1,262.00 Water & Sewer (3 buildings).
- •4.) \$573.15 Facilities Supplies & Maintenance (3 buildings).
- 2. The operating net income / (deficits) were (288.65) in May and (\$22,256.01) Year To Date.
- •The actual May operating expenses were **\$2,779.11** below the average monthly budgeted expenses.
- •The actual May operating incomes were \$598.90 above the average monthly budgeted incomes.
- The Year-To-Date operating expenses were \$9,251.48 above the average YTD budgeted amounts.
- The Year-To-Date operating incomes were \$5,328.81 above the average YTD budgeted amount.

### **MAY 2025 FINANCIAL \$NAPSHOT**

#### **CONTINUED**

- 3. In May, the value of the MassMutual Investment accounts increased \$11,890.46 to \$340,632.63.
- 4. In May, the value of the total Endowment Fund increased \$3,918.01 to \$347,305.26. This reflects the \$8,000.00 used to pay operating expenses.
- 5. The May Second Saturday Free Community Dinner was not held. The total cost to the church of all community dinners since September 2021 remains at \$693.02.
- 6. The May Men's breakfast was held at River Star Diner.

The 2025 Per Capita is \$43.50 for each of the 205 members of our Church. (The number is the membership of FPCH on December 31, 2023.) The total amount due in 2025 is \$8,917.50 or \$743.13 monthly. In May, \$43.50 was received for Per Capita bringing the total received in 2025 to \$2,711.12 or 30.4% of the amount due. No payment was sent to the Presbytery of the Highlands of NJ in May (the \$43.50 will be included with the June payment) leaving the total sent in 2025 at \$2,667.62 or 29.9% of the total amount due.

### **BUILDING ON GENEROSITY (BOG) CAPITAL CAMPAIGN**

- Donations received during May, \$405.00.
- Total donations received from church members, non-members and anonymous from September 2019 (the BOG Kickoff dinner) through the last day of May 2025, **\$650,796.02.**
- Expenses paid using the BOG funds in May, \$1,780.00. The payment was to Jensen Tree Experts for pruning trees at the Church and Chapel.
- The total available BOG funds are \$6,789.28. The breakdown is \$1,539.28 for the next BOG project with an additional \$2,500.00 designated for repairs to the center front doors of the Church and \$2,750.00 designated for the Chapel range hood replacement.
- Donations breakdown by source:
  - 5.3% \$34,293.76 from nonmembers
  - 86.0% \$560,177.05 from members
  - <u>8.7%</u> <u>\$56,325.21</u> from anonymous & dinners
  - 100.0% \$650,796.02 Total

We appreciate the support of this compassionate ministry.




### SIX SCOUTS EARN EAGLE STATUS

Did you know that less than 4% of all scouts earn their Eagle Scout Award? Six scouts here in Hackettstown, between July 10,2021 and February 2, 2025, earned their Eagle Scout status. Attainment of this goal is no easy feat and the five boys, all from Troop 158, and sole girl from Troop 143, were recognized on June 8th at their Court of Honor ceremony, held at the FPCH.

Andrew Kmetz (7/6/21) distributed cards to patients at Hackettstown Medical Center and placed signs on the lawn of the hospital to encourage and cheer up those who were receiving care at the hospital. An-





Matthew Kmetz (11/27/23) worked with Willow Grove and Hatchery Hill Elementary Schools to create five sensory hallways at the schools. These hallways included sensory corners and buckets to allow special needs students to calm down, refocus, and return to class ready to learn after using them.

He replaced broken bricks, cinder blocks, and stair treads on the foundation of the structure. He also removed, sanded, and painted metal benches, handrails, and decorative pieces and

reinstalled the pergola, devoting over 280 hours.





# Sharing God's Bounty

### Checking on our Job as Stewards

A young boy walks into a small drug store and asks the druggist, "Could I use the telephone?" The druggist replies, "You certainly can," and shows him where the telephone is. The boy calls a grocery store and asks the man who answers the phone, "Is your grocery store looking for someone to stock the shelves?" The man says, "No, we already have a stock boy." The boy inquires, "If he isn't doing a good job, maybe you need to get someone who will do a better job." The man replies, "No, we are pleased with the work the boy is doing," so the boy hung up the telephone.

The druggist hears the conversation and says to the boy, "I'm sorry you didn't get the job." The boy says, "I don't need a job, because I am the stock boy. I was checking to see what they thought of my work."

What if we could call God to ask about the job we are doing as his stewards? If it were possible to call, what kind of response would you expect to hear? Would God see you as a person who acknowledges all that you have as having been given to you by him and yourself as a manager, not an owner? Would God tell you that you are using your time, talents, and treasures in ways that please him? Would God commend you for feeding the hungry, for sheltering the homeless, for giving generously to those in need? Would God be pleased with what you are giving to his church? Would God tell you, "Well done, good and faithful steward?"

Unfortunately, we all fall well short of God's standards, but, because of what Christ did for us on the cross, we are forgiven for all the times that we have failed to be faithful stewards. With God's grace given to us through his Son, we can be molded and transformed into God-pleasing stewards. In Christ, we can be stewards who do God's work well.
