

In this month's The Presbyterian Outlook, Rev. Dr. Sam Codington provides a



book review of *The Prayer or Unwanting: How the Lord's Prayer helps us get over ourselves and Why that Might be a Good Thing.* Author David Williams tells how he struggles with prayer and the common desire to look for magic prayers to give us what we want. He goes on to explain in his book how The Lord's Prayer is not a means to fulfill our desires, but as a prayer that "changes the heart of our wanting." Rev Codington believes we are living in a consumer culture which causes us to desire products that we


don't really need. He suggests that all people are searching for a simple return to the heart of prayer.

Graceful Influence: Making a Lasting Impact through Lessons from Women of the Bible by Lori Stanley Roeleveld: Ever wonder if you're making a difference



in your world? The stories of biblical women answer, Yes, you do make a difference! Roeleveld offers the chance to realize the power of your influence by examining the lives of pairs of women from the Bible. As you read, you will discover how their contrasting choices allowed them to influence future generations. And whether their decisions were wise or unwise, God was able to use their stories to make Himself known. The relevance of their struggles will shed light on the challenges modern women face in making similar choices.

Author Glenys Nellist wrote 'Twas the Season of Lent in poetry and prose for-



mat and Elena Selivonova illustrated this lovely 40 day devotional and storybook that explores the life, words, and works of Jesus and encourages families to draw closer to God during the Lenten Season. Nellist focuses on Jesus's mission to the least, the lost, and the lonely, with each story and accompanying prayer prompt encouraging children to try to be more like Jesus and to do what God calls them to.

The Deacon Board met on February 11 to discuss their monthly agenda. They elected and appointed new officers for 2025.

In Little Pantry news, the Deacons will purchase one metal locking cabinet for the storage room in the Chapel once repairs are completed. We will continue to keep the pantry open 24 hours a day; however, we are establishing a schedule for restocking the shelves.

We have made a number of deliveries of winter accessories to Hatchery Hill, Willow Grove, and Great Meadows schools. We will offer one more week of collecting items the first week in March.

We are preparing for our clothing drive on May 3rd. In this newsletter you can find a list of items that are accepted and not accepted. You may drop off items at the church shed, or if you would like to drop off in person, collections will be held on April 29th from 5:30-7 PM and on May 3rd prior to the truck's arrival at 9 AM.

We are hoping to take part in this year's Town-wide Garage Sale in April. Proceeds will go to the general church fund. Since the town has not yet set a date, listen during announcements for more information.

Please note that we will once again offer an opportunity to sponsor Easter Flowers. This will take place between March 16 and April 6.

Finally, the Deacons have approved the purchase of five additional choir stoles for this growing program.



- 3. In January, the value of the MassMutual Investment accounts increased \$7,668.29 to \$354,100.05.
- 4. The total endowment fund at the end of January was \$369,161.83. The total endowment fund was up \$7,719.33 since the beginning of January.
- 5. The January Second Saturday Free Community Dinner was not held. The total cost to the church for all community dinners since September 2021 is \$693.02.
- 6. The Men's breakfast was held at River Star Diner.

The 2025 Per Capita is \$43.50 for each of the 205 members of our Church. (The number is the membership of FPCH on December 31, 2023.) The total amount due in 2025 is \$8,917.50 or \$743.13 monthly. In January, \$1,778.81 was received for Per Capita bringing the total received in 2025 to \$1,778.81 or 19.9% of the amount due. A payment of \$743.13 was sent to the Presbytery of the Highlands of NJ in January bringing the total sent in 2025 to \$743.13 or 8.3% of the total amount due.

The 2025 Per Capita amount is \$43.50 for each member of the congregation.

Building On Generosity (BOG) Capital Campaign

- Donations received during January, \$155.00.
- Total donations received from church members, non-members and anonymous from September 2019 (the BOG Kickoff dinner) through the last day of January 2025, \$649,888.02.
- Expenses paid using the BOG funds in January, \$3,882.00. The payment was to everOn for the initial upgrade and inspection of the fire alarm system.
- The total available BOG funds are \$12,555.26. The breakdown is \$7,305.26 for the next BOG project with an additional \$2,500.00 designated for parking lot pavement and \$2,750.00 designated for the Chapel range hood replacement.
- Donations breakdown by source:
 - 5.3% \$34,389.76 from nonmembers
 - 86.0% \$559,207.05 from members
 - <u>8.7%</u> <u>\$56,291.21</u> from anonymous & dinners
 - o 100.0% \$649,888.02 Total

Sharing God's Bounty

What Have I Done for Him?

Lent is a season in the church year during which we particularly focus on the sacrifice Jesus made for us to pay the debt we owed for our sin. We know there is no way we can pay the debt ourselves. Only the sinless Son of God could do that. We have access to heaven only by grace through faith in Christ Jesus.

While we cannot repay Jesus for what he has done for us, his love does require a response. Paul, speaking of our ministry of reconciliation, wrote, "For Christ's love compels us . . ." (2 Corinthians 5:14). We remain on earth to carry out the tasks which Christ left for us to do: to feed the hungry, clothe the naked, care for the sick, and visit the prisoner, (Matthew 25:31-46). James admonished us that ". . . faith by itself, if it is not accompanied by action, is dead" (James 2:17). We provide the funds that support our pastors, teachers, and missionaries. Again, we can quote Paul writing in 1 Corinthians 9:11-12. "If we have sown spiritual seed among you, is it too much if we reap a material harvest from you? If others have this right of support from you, shouldn't we have it all the more?" Certainly each of us is addressed by the Great Commission: "Go and make disciples of all nations . . ." (Matthew 28:19). The following words from Frances Ridley Havergal are a poignant reminder that Christ's love and sacrifice for us require a response:

Thy life was given for me, Thy Blood, O Lord, was shed That I might ransomed by, and quickened from the dead. Thy life was given for me, What have I given for Thee? And Thou hast brought to me Down from Thy home above Salvation full and free, Thy pardon and Thy love. Great gifts Thou broughtest me, What have I brought to Thee?

We are saved by grace through faith for works. Let us pray for the desire to be good stewards of the gifts of salvation, health and wealth, and time and opportunity which God has given us that we might have a part in the furthering of God's kingdom.

We need not give up the pleasures and luxuries of this life. God does not call us to be ascetics, but he does call us to a right sense of proportion in administering our substance.


The question is: "If I have this for myself, then what should I do for God?" This is the question into which the whole matter of stewardship resolves itself.

GET READY FOR LENTEN BIBLE STUDY

Lent begins on March 3rd and Ash Wednesday is on March 5th. Wednesday, March 12th marks the start of our Lenten Bible study at 6:30 PM in the Conference Room and continue through Wednesday, April 16th.

Those who join us for this Lenten study will be reading the book *The Eternal Current: How a Practice-Based Faith Can Save Us from Drowning* by Aaron Niequist. Niequist reflects upon a time



when he was feeling spiritually empty and realized that God must have a wider vision for worship and community. He believes Christians do not need to enact faith in a traditional way. They can enact faith through a "practice-based faith."

According to an Amazon review, "This book is about loving one's faith tradition and, at the same time, following the call to something deeper and richer. By adopting some new spiritual practices, it is possible to learn to swim again with a renewed sense of vigor and divine purpose."

TEACH YOUR CHILDREN HOW TO PRAY

The Three Pillars of Lent: Prayer, Fasting, and Alsmgiving

Lent takes place over 40 days. This practice invites families to devote 40 complete days of prayer, fasting, and almsgiving by focusing on a different activity each day (excluding Sundays).

Designed for ages 6+.

Varied Materials.

Time Investment: 10 minutes or less per day.

HOW TO: PRAYER

- 1. At the beginning of Lent, make a list of 40 words that your family will use to anchor your prayer practice.
- 2. At the start of each day, review the day's word and think about the word throughout the day.
- 3. At the end of the day, gather for prayer time as a family, review the word, and discuss it in one of these ways:
 - Draw a picture that represents the word
 - Share a photo you took of something that represents the word
 - Share what the word means to you or how it affected you throughout the day
 - Share how the word might be connected to the Lenten journey.
- 4. Close by thanking God for the word and for looking forward to the next day's challenge.

(Note: if you miss a day, just pick up where you left off)

HOW TO: FASTING (FROM TECHNOLOGY)

1. Decide together as a family how long the screen fast will last and for how long. The "buy-in from the whole family is the most important and most challenging part of implementing this practice. Consider these questions for discussion:


Why do we want to do a technology fast as a family? How will it help us, spiritually?

- Should we try a fast for a short period of time every day or for a long time period of time once per week?
- Which activities would be excluded from the fast? (Answering phone calls in case of an emergency, for example)What will we do if someone breaks the fast? How should we gently remind each other?
- What will we do when the fast is over? How do we celebrate?
- 2. At the start of the technology fast, gather together and have a short conversation, reminding everyone of the mutually set parameters fro step one. Start the fast with a short prayer: God, thank you for guiding our family as we made this decision to focus on you and one another by laying our technology aside for awhile. Please help us on this journey to encourage on another and learn new things. We ask for your Spirit's help in this. Amen."
- 3. End the fast with a celebration together, such as a family outing or meal. HOW TO: ALMSGIVING:
- 1. Decide upon providing some food to your local Little Pantry rather than giving money. Decorate a large box and each day, beginning on Ash Wednesday, put a non-perishable item into the box. After the 40 days, deliver the box to the church so the congregation can see what you have done.


