

A NOTE FROM OUR PASTOR

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

Around this time three years ago I was joyfully unpacking boxes in the Manse, our new home. Or I should say, I was filled with joy to be here for our ministry and our home, but not to unpack boxes. I look back at the past three years with gratitude. When we embarked on this journey of ministry together I knew that God had brought us all together at the right time. I knew that many people prayed to bring the community and our families together.

Every time I step into the pulpit and look out over the community I can feel the spirit at work. It's in the wiggly little ones in the pews, the looks of folks who come to the church for the first time, the nudges of teenagers in the balcony, the head nods of our more seasoned folks in the pews. National Library Lover's Month in February is dedicated to the people who love whole buildings devoted to reading, housing, organizing, categorizing, finding, studying, and otherwise loving books. For all you book lovers, here is a list of titles about these topics.



Dear Reader: A Love Letter to Libraries by Tiffany Rose: A young girl writes her "love letter" to libraries and books, expressing the need for diversity and the importance of representation within stories. This is a perfect book for kids ages 4-8.



Mr. Penumbra'a 24-Hour Bookstore by Robin Sloan: Clay Jannon is a laid-off Silicon Valley tech worker who begins working at a dusty bookstore with very few customers, and he discovers one secret after another. The mysterious old books, along with the store's owner, lead to a 500-year-old secret society. This is a great book for our tweens and teens.



The Library Book by Susan Orlean: On the morning of April 28, 1986, a fire alarm sounded in the Los Angeles Public Library. The fire was disastrous: it reached two thousand degrees and burned for more than seven hours. By the time it was extinguished, it had consumed four hundred thousand books and damaged seven hundred thousand more. Investigators descended on the scene, but more than thirty years later, the mystery remains: Did someone pur-

posefully set fire to the library—and if so, who?

SOUPER BOWL OF CARING SET FOR **FEBRUARY 9TH**

In 1990, a simple prayer: "Lord, even as we enjoy the Super Bowl football game, help us be mindful of those who are without a bowl of soup to eat" was delivered to a small youth group at Spring Valley Presbyterian Church in Columbia, SC led by Brad Smith, who was serving as a seminary intern at the time.

This gave birth to an idea. Why not harness the energy and enthusiasm of Super Bowl weekend, a time when people come together for football, food and fun, to unite the nation for a higher good? Individuals and groups could collect dollars in soup pots and canned food for those in need and send every dollar and food donation DIRECTLY to a local charity of THEIR choice.

The first year, they invited 22 area churches to join the team and collected \$5,700 with 100% of donations distributed to local-area charities.

That was 1990. Since then, Tackle Hunger, with its signature Souper Bowl of Caring event has become a national, grass-roots, youth-inspired movement where ordinary people are doing extraordinary good. Over \$198 MILLION in dollars and food has





been generated while benefiting thousands of

soup kitchens, food banks, meal programs and other hunger-relief charities in local communities.

This year, FPCH will be participating for our 25th year as we encourage those attending church to wear apparel from your favorite team: high school, college, or professional. And then, resolve to bring at least one canned food

item to church and/or donate at least \$1 as you leave worship on February 9. All proceeds will benefit our Little Pantry.

NEWS FROM THE DEACONS

The Deacons wish to welcome three new members to their board: Dennis Huff, Jose Irby, and Jean Zetterberg and want to thank Pat Gohlich, Janette Hendershot, and Justin Simmons for their service over the past three years.

In news regarding the Little Pantry, we are considering purchasing metal locking cabinets this month since we are experiencing spoiled meat being left on the shelves and glass containers freezing and exploding. We are also thinking about creating a new sign stating that this pantry is run by FPCH and does not belong to others. We would like to keep it open 24 hours a day for people in need, but we are facing challenges. More information will follow after our meeting in February.

During the month of December, the congregation sponsored 97 Christmas Poinsettia Flowers at \$5 each, earning a profit of \$485.00. In addition, we sold 30 Christmas ornaments at a profit of \$300.00.

Throughout January, we collected hats, scarves, mittens and gloves. We have already delivered approximately 140 pieces to Hatchery Hill, Willow Grove, and Great Meadows schools and will distribute the rest of our donations in early February. Thank you to all who contributed to this mission.

We continue to visit our Homebound Members who cannot attend church so that they feel supported and a part of the congregation.

Finally, we will vote in February to allocate different percentages for Deacon Budget items. We will discuss Congregational Assistance, Outside Organizations, and Administrative line items.



Financial Comments / Observations:

- 1. \$15,000.00 was transferred from the Mass Mutual Endowment fund to pay operating expenses.
- 2. \$3,000.00 was used in December and the remaining \$12,000.00 is in the Designated Donations Account as Endowment funds.

The five largest operating expenses in December were:

- a. \$7,378.77 Pastoral expenses (payroll, Board of Pensions, etc.).
- b. \$4,336.43 Staff payroll & payroll processing expenses.
- c. \$2,542.00 Worker Compensation Insurance.
- d. **\$2,410.00** Snow removal and salting (3 buildings).
- e. \$1,759.17 Gas (3 buildings).

- 3. The operating net income / (deficits) were (\$2,276.53) in December and (\$29,338.45) Year To Date
 - The actual December operating expenses were \$2,829.37 above the average monthly budgeted expenses.
 - The actual December operating incomes were \$3,052.84 above the average monthly budgeted incomes.
 - The Year-To-Date operating expenses were \$7,528.82 below the average YTD budgeted amounts.
 - The Year-To-Date operating incomes were \$6,867.27 below the average YTD budgeted amount.
- 4. In December, the value of the MassMutual Investment accounts decreased \$22,233.34 to \$346,431.76. The \$22,233.34 loss includes the \$15,000.00 transferred to the checking account to pay bills.
- 5. The total endowment fund at the end of December was \$361,442.50. The total endowment fund was down \$10,324.88 since the beginning of December and up \$21,776.87 since January 1, 2024.
- 6. The December Community was not held. The total cost to the church for all community dinners since December 2021 is \$693.02.
- 7. The Men's breakfast was held at River Star Diner.

The 2024 Per Capita is \$42.50 for each of the 203 members of our Church. (The number is the membership of FPCH on December 31, 2022.) The total amount due in 2024 is \$8,627.50 or \$718.96 monthly. In December, \$85.00 was received for Per Capita bringing the total received in 2024 to \$2,896.78 or 33.6% of the amount due. A payment of \$85.00 was sent to the Presbytery of the Highlands of NJ in December bringing the total sent in 2024 to \$2,896.78 or 33.6% of the total amount due.

The 2025 Per Capita amount is \$43.50 for each congregation member.

SPECIAL COLLECTIONS SET FOR 2025

As you all are aware, our Mission and Outreach Ministry holds special collections throughout the liturgical year that are sponsored by the Presbytery of the Highlands. They are outlined below for you.

Presbyterian Disaster Relief for the California Wildfires: this will occur in the month of March this year as a special collection to support those afflicted by the fires that have been ravaging the Los Angeles and surrounding areas in California.

One Great Hour of Sharing: held between March 5-April 20th. All money collected is divided among three programs - The Presbyterian Hunger Program, the Presbyterian Disaster Assistance, and the Self-'Development of People.

Pentecost Offering: held between April 21-June 8. It supports at-risk children, youth, and young adults. 50% is retained by the church and goes toward scholarships to Camp Johnsonburg; 50% supports ministries with youth and young adults; 10% supports child advocacy/children at risk.

Peace and Global Witness: held between Sept 7-Oct 5. This offering enables the church to promote the Peace of Christ by addressing systems of conflict and injustice across the world. 25% is kept to support local efforts; 25% is kept by mid-councils to support regional efforts; 50% supports peacemaking, reconciliation, and global witness.

Christmas Joy Offering: held between Dec1-Dec 21. This offering supports Presbyterian church workers and their families in times of need. 50% goes toward the Assistance Program of the Board of Pensions; 50% goes toward Presbyterian related schools and colleges equipping communities of color.

Be sure to check the newsletter each month to learn more about these special offerings when they are scheduled. Please consider these worthwhile opportunities to assist those in need.

Sharing God's Bounty

Each household has its own routine. We go to work; we help the kids with their homework and attend their events; we make the meals, clean the house, and do the laundry. Our days are full – sometimes too full. So full that time for the Lord is abbreviated or omitted altogether. Then comes Ash Wednesday, the beginning of Lent. It's just what we need to get back on track. We gather together for worship. We hear again about Jesus' ministry, about the events that eventually lead up to his crucifixion, about his zeal for the Lord's house. We hear his prayer for his disciples and his words of comfort and preparation to them.

Our hearts are turned to Christ instead of toward ourselves. We ask for grace to love and serve as he did, sacrificing self for the good of others. "Greater love has no one than this, that he lay down his life for his friends" (John 15:13). Paul comments, "Very rarely will anyone die for a righteous man, though for a good man someone might possibly dare to die. But God demonstrates his own love for us in this: While we were still sinners Christ died for us" (Romans 5:7-8). God loved and chose us, the unlovely, to shed his grace upon. We are reminded that, "since God so loved us, we also ought to love one another" (1 John 4:11).

"Love one another." Not just our close friends or those who agree with us, but "one another." We can't do it, can we? Some people are just too hard to love. Some people are not deserving of our gifts and our attention. Some people aren't interested in the love we have to offer. The command remains: "Love one another."

Now is a good time to read John 15. Here we find the secret of loving and serving. Here we find the source of love, of faith, of everything we need. That source is Jesus. He is the Vine. He sustains and nurtures us, the branches. He enables us to bear fruit, to "love one another." He calls those who obey him. His friends and tells us he will give us whatever we ask in his name. So we pray, Lord, let us "love one another."

Too often we fail to understand that Christian instruction about money is one of the best opportunities we have to teach our children about God's love for us, and his ownership of all things.

The way we use money is the extension of our personal characteristics.

By teaching our children the Christian use of money, affording them control of money and the need to make decisions about money, we also confront them with the meaning of discipleship and Christian stewardship.


SECOND SUNDAY RECAP

TEACH YOUR CHILDREN HOW TO PRAY

Wind Prayers for the World

Many cultures and countries have the custom of having flags in the wind. The image is a reminder that as the wind blows, the prayers are carried away with it and everyone who is touched by the wind benefits from the prayers. Flags are left up, even when they are weathers and worn, and, then, eventually burned. In this prayer, the family makes their own prayer flags together and hangs the outside. For Christians, a prayer flag is a way to talk about the presence of the Holy Spirit. Evidence of the Holy Spirit's work is all around us, even if we cannot see it at times.

DESIGNED FOR AGES 6+

Materials:

- 1. 5x10 inch squares of fabric
- 2. Hot glue gun or fabric glue
- 3. Yarn
- 4. Fabric markers, or fab ric paint and paint brushes

Time Investment: 30-60 minutes

How To:

- 1. Explain the prayer flags saying, "This prayer is special because we will write or draw it on out prayer flag and hang it outside. Then, when we look at our prayer flags outside, we will see them moving in the wind and remember how the Holy Spirit always hears our prayers. We can imagine that our prayers for the world will be spread around the whole earth, just like the wind."
- 2. Ask each family member to answer the question, "What is one thing that you hope for our world?"
- 3. Give each family member a fabric square and fabric markers (or paint) and say, "Let's draw a picture of what our prayers would look like or write a word to represent our prayer."
 - It is easiest to orient the rectangles vertically. When the flags are completed, the top two inches will be folder over the string to hand, making a fine inch by eight inch rectangle. Instruct family members tallow this room at the top for the flags to to be folded over.
- 4. After designs are complete and dry, hang the flags. Cut a piece of yarn long enough to hold all of the flags with 2-3 inches of room between each. Fold the top of each flag over the yarn and secure it with hot glue or fabric glue.
- 5. Find a place outside to hang your flags.
