




BOOKS FOR YOUR READING PLEASURE



Sy Montgomery's *The Soul of an Octopus* is a tender and heartwarming exploration of the physical and emotional world of octopuses. Montgomery reveals the brilliant minds of octopus, their sense of humor and curiosity, and their ability to connect with humans. The book is a moving love story and a fascinating revelation on what octopuses can teach us about the meeting of two different minds. This book is a delight to read about Montgomery's visits with Athena, an octopus who resides in Boston's New England Aquarium.



In *The Hidden Life of Trees,* forester and author Peter Wohlleben makes the case that the forest is a social network. FPCH APPLIES FOR HOMELAND SECURITY GRANT

Recently, The New Jersey Department of Homeland Security announced a Nonprofit Security Grant Program. A team from our church consisting of Pastor Erin, Al Ravo, Diane Hall, Dennis Huff,



and Pete Miller researched what the grant was offering, the submission requirements, and decided to take advantage of some great project funding opportunities. The grant submission was due on December 22,2024 and we should receive notification by May 1, 2025.

Based upon a thorough site evaluation previously conducted by the Department of Homeland Security, we were able to identify 5 major projects to submit. They include repairs to the front doors, replacement windows for the church basement and annex, additional perimeter fencing, exterior lighting, and a security system throughout the site. If we receive the grant we will begin work in May, with a projected completion date for all projects by December 31, 2025.

As always, thank you for your continued support of our missions. If you have any questions or suggestions, please be sure to reach out to a Deacon.



- 4. The total endowment fund at the end of November was \$371,767.38. The total endowment fund was up \$8,656.47 since the beginning of November and up \$32,101.75 since January 1, 2024.
- 5. The November community dinner expenses were \$0.00. The donations collected at the dinner were \$0.00. The November Community was not held. The total cost to the church for all community dinners since November 2021 is **\$693.02**
- 6. The Men's breakfast expenses for November were \$0.00. The donations collected at the breakfast were \$0.00, the breakfast was held at River Star Diner.

The 2024 Per Capita is \$42.50 for each of the 203 members of our Church. (The number is the membership of FPCH on December 31, 2022.) The total amount due in 2024 is \$8,627.50 or \$718.96 monthly. In November, \$0.00 was received for Per Capita leaving the total received in 2024 at \$2,811.78 or 32.6% of the amount due. No payment was sent to the Presbytery of the Highlands of NJ in November leaving the total sent in 2024 at \$2,811.78 or 32.6% of the total amount due.

TEACH YOUR CHILDREN HOW TO PRAY

NEW YEAR'S EVE

Welcome back to our "Teach Your Children How to Pray section. As a way to introduce the new year, I have selected a sacred moment within the home for remembering God's blessings in the past year, designed for children of school ages and older.

Materials: basket/box labeled with the year AND pencils and scraps of paper.

Time investment: varies

How to:

- **1.** In January, place a large box or basket in a prominent location in the house with the year labeled on it.
- **2.** Throughout the year, put significant items in the basket, such as ticket stubs, programs, church bulletins from important holidays, etc.
- **3.** Use scraps of paper to write down or draw pictures of important memories and events that happened.
- **4.** On New Year's Eve, take turns pulling items from the basket and reflect upon where God was present in that day.
- **5.** Conclude by holding hands and saying, "Thank you, God, for the many ways you were with us last year, in good times and in difficult ones. We are thankful for the many blessings of this year. Amen. "

Notes:

- It might be tempting to put only happy memories in the box, but consider also adding memories of more challenging times as well (evidence of hospital stays, bulletins from the death of a loved one, etc). God is with us in good and difficult times, and it is valuable to remember sad times, too.
- The age listed for this activity is school age and up. Certainly, younger children
 can be a part of the family moment in which the memories are shared and recalled, but it might be more challenging for them to remember to add to the
 basket.

Variations:

- Instead of collecting memories throughout the year, try to sit down on New Year's Eve and remember key moments throughout the past year.
- Use mealtime as a time to write down memories.
- Gather together on a specific day of the week to write down memories to add to the box.
