

A NOTE FROM OUR PASTOR

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

"Let the word of Christ dwell in you richly; teach and admonish one another in all wisdom; and with gratitude in your hearts sing psalms, hymns, and spiritual songs to God. 17 And whatever you do, in word or deed, do everything in the name of the Lord Jesus, giving thanks to God the Father through him" (Colossians 3:16).

What made you become a disciple of Jesus? Each of us carries a story with us about when and why we decided to follow after Jesus. In the life of the church we have the beautiful opportunity to see the growth of faith in people, whether it is promising to help teach little babies about faith, hearing about the lives of our confirmation students, welcoming a young adult who has deep questions, or learning about the legacy of faith in our life time members of the community. 

Financial Comments / Observations:



- 1.In August, \$9,000.00 of the \$15,000.00 received from the Charles Schwab Organ Fund cash account in July was used to pay operating expenses.
- 2. When the insurance carrier changed to GuideOne earlier this year, the first quarterly bill was delayed and paid in July. The next quarterly bill was paid in August. Quarterly insurance bills were paid in both July and August with the next bill due in November.
- 3. The five largest operating expenses in August were:
- •1.) \$7,682.34 Pastoral expenses (payroll, Board of Pensions, etc.).
- •2.) **\$5,623.38** Insurance, liability & umbrella.
- •3.) \$4,281.28 Staff payroll & payroll processing expenses.
- 4.) \$1,037.91 Facilities & Maintenance, Wire's, A/C & supplies.
- 5.) **\$490.52** Electric expenses (3 buildings).
- 4. The operating net income / (deficits) were (\$7,200.38) in August and (\$16,985.71) Year To Date.
 - The actual August operating expenses were \$1,653.49 above the average monthly budgeted expenses.
 - The actual August operating incomes were \$3,046.89 below the average monthly budgeted incomes.
 - The Year-To-Date operating expenses were \$1,667.46 below the average YTD budgeted amounts.
 - The Year-To-Date operating incomes were \$1,346.83 above the average YTD budgeted amount.

- 4. In August, the value of the MassMutual Investment accounts increased \$6,229.71 to \$359,143.52.
- 5. The total endowment fund at the end of August was \$364,196.04. The total en downent fund was up \$6,142.35 since the beginning of August and up \$24,530.41 since January 1, 2024.
- 6. The August community dinner expenses were \$0.00. The donations collected at the dinner were \$35.00. The total cost to the church for all community dinners since September 2021 is \$545.48.
- 7. The Men's breakfast expenses for August were \$0.00. The donations collected at the breakfast were \$0.00 because the breakfast was not held in July and August. The 2024 Per Capita is \$42.50 for each of the 203 members of our Church. (The number is the membership of FPCH on December 31, 2022.) The total amount due in 2024 is \$8,627.50 or \$718.96 monthly. In August, \$0.00 was received for Per Capita leaving the total received in 2024 at \$2,769.28 or 32.1% of the amount due. No Per Capita payment was sent to the Presbytery of the Highlands of NJ in August leaving the total sent in 2024 at \$2,769.28 or 32.1% of the total amount due.

BUILDING ON GENEROSITY (BOG) CAPITAL CAMPAIGN

- Donations received during August, \$35.00.
- Total donations received from church members, non-members and anonymous from September 2019 (the BOG Kickoff dinner) through the last day of August 2024, \$646,940.02.
- Expenses paid using the BOG funds in August, \$0.00.
- Total BOG funds are \$13,339.26. The breakdown is \$8,489.26 for the next BOG project with an additional \$2,500.00 designated for parking lot pavement and \$2,350.00 designated for the Chapel range hood replacement.

Sharing God's Bounty

Our Vocation as Stewards

A steward is someone who oversees the affairs for someone else. That person is a caretaker, an administrator, and a manager for an owner. In the time of Jesus, the steward represented a trusted overseer of a household. Jesus said in Luke 12:42, "Who then is the faithful and wise manager, whom the master puts in charge of his servants to give them their food allowance at the proper time?"

As God's stewards, we realize that we have been gifted with much. As recipients of God's blessings, we are managers, not owners. As Paul said in 1 Corinthians 4:7, "What do you have that you did not receive?" Everything we are, have, and will be are gifts from God. We have been blessed so we can be a blessing to others. Each of us receives varying amounts of talents and treasures, but all of us are called to be faithful in the stewardship of what we receive. In the words of Jesus, "From everyone who has been given much, much will be demanded; and from the one who has been entrusted with much, much more will be asked" (Luke 12:48).

We are all stewards. Some of us are faithful stewards who manage God's blessings in God-pleasing ways, while others mismanage them. Others have chosen to be selfcentered stewards who only serve themselves. Some of us may want to be good stewards but lack wisdom. To illustrate this point Paul Lindholm, in his book First Fruits, told the story about a man who on a hot summer day decided to stretch out with his pet monkey under the shade of a large tree. When a fly disturbed him, he ordered his pet monkey which was beside him to keep the fly away. The fly landed on the man's nose and the monkey killed it with a stone badly bruising his master's nose. The monkey was faithful but not wise. We can be stewards who at times will do foolish things, but because of his faithfulness, God will forgive us and give us the wisdom we need to be fruitful and God-pleasing stewards.

As God's stewards, we understand that we are on a journey with Jesus Christ to serve God's world wherever we are placed. As God sent Jesus, we are sent. We have a high vocation that requires us to have hearts filled with God's love and minds focused on God's will. As the Apostle Peter wrote in 1 Peter 4:10, "Each one should use whatever gift he has received to serve others, faithfully administering God's grace in its various forms."


BILL CORS DONATES ORGAN TO FPCH

YOUTH: GET READY FOR SOME FUN ACTIVITIES

This year, our Christian Education Committee named Lorinda Ravo our Special Events Coordinator and she has been planning a number of activities for our children to attend.

One event includes a trip to Cineopolis sometime in November to a viewing of *The Best Christmas Pageant Ever. More* information about availability for this viewing will be in our next newsletter. On December 22, we will present our Christmas play which is a "Lorinda Ravo original" and involves congregation members of all ages.

TEACH YOUR CHILDREN HOW TO PRAY

In the 21st century, we need to get creative with helping our kids of all ages to use the tools they have at their disposal. To that end, Traci Smith adapted a special prayer from Lilly Lewin based on her "free range worship." This practice uses the smartphone as a tool to bring focus to the prayer rather than seeing it as a distraction. ... This practice teaches how to use technology in service of spiritual practice rather than against it and is designed for ages 10+.

MATERIAL: Smartphone with at least 15 minutes of battery life remaining (preferably one smartphone per participant, but if need be, one phone per family.)

TIME INVESTMENT: 5-10 minutes HOW TO:

- 1. One family member will act as the leader, and others will be participants. Rotate who serves as the leader to give everyone a chance to participate in the prayer.
- 2. The leader will call everyone together and explain the Smartphone Prayer. Say, "This prayer moves through five different activities on our smartphones. Each is one minute long. I will tell you what to do for each activity and then start my timer. When the timer rings, look up at me and listen for the next mission.
- Go through the five missions as follows, making sure the leader sets his/her timer after each instruction and calls everyone back together before presenting the next mission:
 *Minute 1: Go to your text messages and take a look at the last five people in the recent messages, whether they are people you text regularly or people you don't know at all. Take this minute to pray for each of the five people listed there.
 *Minute 2: Go to a news app or website and scroll through the headlines. Pray for what jumps out at you as a prayer need this day.

TEACH YOUR CHILDREN HOW TO PRAY

- *Minute 3: Go to the notepad and spend this minute typing out whatever comes to mind: praise, gratitude, confession, or requests to God.
- *Minute 4: Go to your favorite social media site and spend this minute praying for the people who come up on your feed during this minute.
- *Minute 5: Go to your photos. Take this moment to scroll through the most recent twenty of so photos. What prayers come to mind? Lift them up to God now.
- 4. Follow up: After the five minute prayer is over, take a couple of minutes to talk about the activity together using one or more of the following questions:
 - a. Was there anything surprising or unusual that you heard from God when you were using your cell phone to pray today?
 - b. What was the most important prayer that came through today?
 - c. How can we incorporate this attitude of prayer as we use our smartphones throughout the week?
 - d. Does technology draw us closer to God or farther away? Talk about your opinion.

NOTES:

Though this practice aims to use technology as a toll for fostering and encouraging spiritual practice, I (Traci Smith) strongly encourage the practice of turning off or unplugging from electronic devices. This is a good practice during the season of Lent.
