

A special thank you to Harper and Veronica from the confirmation class, who joined us and were such a big help with the kids!


We're so grateful for the opportunity to learn and grow in faith with your wonderful children.



Financial Comments / Observations:

- 1. The five largest operating expenses in August were:
 - 1.) \$7,668.62 Pastoral expenses (payroll, Board of Pensions, etc.).
 - •2.) \$5,810.25 Insurance (quarterly bill).
 - •3.) \$3,815.20 Staff payroll & payroll processing expenses.
 - •4.) **\$800.00** Cleaning (Church & Chapel).
 - •5.) **\$686.72** Electricity (Church, Chapel & Manse).
 - 2. The operating net income / (deficits) were (\$9,671.62) in August and (\$26,350.86) Year To Date.
 - •The actual August operating expenses were (\$1,005.39) above the average monthly budgeted expenses.
 - •The actual August operating incomes were (\$4,999.57) below the average monthly budgeted incomes.
 - •The Year-To-Date operating expenses were (\$7,949.47) above the average YTD budgeted amounts.
 - •The Year-To-Date operating incomes were \$10,931.95 above the average YTD budgeted amount.

- 3. In August, the value of the MassMutual Investment accounts increased \$6,472.95 to \$361,609.10.
- 4. In August, the value of the entire Endowment Fund increased \$6,610.96 to \$368,502.87.
- 5. The August Second Saturday Free Community Dinner was not held. The total cost to the church of all community dinners since September 2021 remains at \$693.02.
- 6. The August Men's breakfast was not held because it is suspended in the summer.

The 2025 Per Capita is \$43.50 for each of the 205 members of our Church. (The number is the membership of FPCH on December 31, 2023.) The total amount due in 2025 is \$8,917.50 or \$743.13 monthly. In August, \$0.00 was received for Per Capita leaving the total received in 2025 at \$2,849.62 or 32.0% of the amount due. No payment was sent to the Presbytery of the Highlands of NJ in August leaving the total sent in 2025 at \$2,849.62 or 32.0% of the total amount due.

BUILDING ON GENEROSITY (BOG) CAPITAL CAMPAIGN

- Donations received during August, \$40.00.
- Total donations received from church members, non-members and anonymous from September 2019 (the BOG Kickoff dinner) through the last day of August 2025, \$651,941.02.
- Expenses paid using the BOG funds in August, \$2,000.00. This expense was paid to Schichtel Restorations, the final payment to restore and replace the two center front doors of the Church.
- The total available BOG funds are \$4,234.28. The breakdown is \$1,484.28 for the next BOG project with an additional \$2,750.00 designated for the Chapel range hood replacement.
- Donations breakdown by source:
 - 5.4% \$35,048.76 from nonmembers
 - 86.0% \$560,567.05 from members
 - <u>8.6%</u> <u>\$56,325.21</u> from anonymous & dinners
 - 100.0% \$651,941.02 Total

Sharing God's Bounty Fearing God

As stewards, we are managers, caretakers, and trustees of all that God entrusts to us. Through grace, we respond to God's love and care. We live our lives and return our gifts out of gratitude and thanksgiving for who he is and what he does for us. However, if we do not include a fear of the Lord in our thinking as well as an acceptance of his grace and love, our understanding of God is incomplete. The fear of the Lord results from a recognition of our sinfulness and the separation from a just and holy God that sin causes. As our judge, God holds us accountable. He cannot and will not tolerate our sin. Because of original sin, we, by ourselves, are incapable of pleasing God. Out of his love, God sent his Son, who had no sin, to the Cross for our sins. "In him we have redemption through his blood, the forgiveness of sins, in accordance with the riches of God's grace that he lavished on us with all wisdom and understanding" (Ephesians 1:7-8).

In 2 Corinthians 5:9-11, Paul refers to our need to fear the Lord. "So we make it our goal to please him, whether we are at home in the body or away from it. For we must all appear before the judgment seat of Christ, that each one may receive what is due him for things done while in the body, whether good or bad. Since, then, we know what it is to fear the Lord, we try to persuade men." This passage does not refer to justification because, through faith in Christ, we are justified forever. What it does refer to is the question, "What have you done with your life through faith?" We are responsible for our actions. We will "appear before the judgment seat of Christ" to answer for what we did as his stewards. We can't avoid our accountability.

In Proverbs 9:10, we are told what is meant by "fear of the Lord." "The fear of the Lord is the beginning of wisdom, and knowledge of the Holy One is understanding." As children of God, we revere him and submit to him. He is the exalted King. "For I am a great King,' says the Lord almighty, 'and my name is to be feared among the nations'" (Malachi 1:14b). We are blessed because, not only do we stand in awe of our great King, but we also rejoice in him. "Serve the Lord with fear and rejoice with trembling" (Psalm 2:11).

Through the fear of God, we see ourselves as we are ... small and sinful. Fear helps us see our need for God's mercy and grace. We submit to God because we understand our state of helplessness. The fear of the Lord is indeed the beginning of wisdom.

Give your heart to Christ, and let him direct your giving. In order for you to be what you should as a church member, you must first define and confirm your stewardship obligations and commitments between yourself and the Christ who gave his all for you. Stewardship of time, talent and possessions is the very heart of Christian discipleship and our way of expressing our love in response to God's amazing grace.

TEACH YOUR CHILDREN HOW TO PRAY

A Prayer for Social Justice

This month, as we provide a special offering for Peace and Global Witness on October 5th, I ask that you encourage your children to reach out to others who are marginalized in society for whatever reason. Ask your children to pay attention to others in school who may not be treated kindly by others. Perhaps they can ask the student to sit with them at lunch time or to play on the playground during recess. Maybe they can invite the child over for a play date at your home. NOTE: If your children are older, adjust the activity accordingly. Maybe you can suggest they provide a donation to our Little Pantry located in front of the Chapel or they can participate in community service, advocate for policy change by contacting elected officials, or they can support minority-owned businesses. They can also engage in creative and educational activities like organizing community murals, participating in spoken word poetry, or having discussions based on stories and books.

Partaking in these activities will help your children to learn about the four pillars of social justice: human rights, access, participation, and equity. Without these four principles, social justice cannot be achieved.

Jesus taught and demonstrated that social justice is a central theme of his message, particularly through his proclamation in <u>Luke 4:18-19</u> to "bring good news to the poor," "release to the captives," and to "let the oppressed go free." His teachings, including the <u>Great Commandments</u> to "Love your neighbor" and the Beatitudes, which emphasize caring for the marginalized and vulnerable, linking spiritual and social well-being. His actions and words challenge societal norms by prioritizing the needs of the poor, the ill, and the oppressed.

I hope you can encourage your children to start their day off with this small prayer: "O God, the King of righteousness, lead us in the ways of justice and peace. Inspire us to break down all tyranny and oppression, and grant that every person may receive what is rightfully due to them. May we all care for one another. Amen."

Thank you for the opportunity to provide you with some suggestions for ways to encourage prayer in the lives of your children.

The **Peace & Global Witness Offering** enables the church to promote the Peace of Christ by addressing systems of conflict and injustice across the world. Through the Peace & Global Witness Offering, congregations are encouraged and equipped to find and address the anxiety and discord that is prevalent throughout this broken and sinful world.

This offering is an annual event of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) that supports peacemaking and reconciliation efforts at the local, regional, and international levels. Funds from the offering are distributed with **25**% retained by local congregations, **25**% used by mid-councils (presbyteries/synods), and **50**% sent to the <u>Presbyterian Mission Agency</u> for national and global initiatives to address conflict and injustice. The offering emphasizes the church's role in promoting Christ's peace by addressing systems of injustice and fostering reconciliation

What it Funds:

- Education: Provides education for those involved in peacemaking.
- Advocacy: Supports advocacy for peace and justice in cultures of violence.
- Reconciliation: Funds efforts to reconcile people and systems fractured by conflict.
- **Witness:** Encourages congregations to actively witness to God's gift of peace in their communities and the world.

Won't you join me on Sunday, October 5th, to provide any gift that you can toward this offering? It is an offering that would mean a lot to many people, including those in our own congregation.
