

BOOKS FOR YOUR READING PLEASURE

This month, I am providing you with books about life's lessons. The first two are appropriate for people of ALL AGES. The second is a book I have taught to my highs school students.

"Once there was a tree...and she loved a little boy." (*The Giving Tree*)

So begins a story of unforgettable perception, beautifully written and illustrated by **Shel Silverstein**.



Every day the boy would come to the tree to eat her apples, swing from her branches, or slide down her trunk...and the tree was happy. As the boy grew older he began to want more from the tree, and the tree gave and gave and gave.

Shel Silverstein has created a moving parable for readers of all ages that offers an interpretation of the gift of giving and a serene

acceptance of another's capacity to love in return.

The Boy, the Mole, the Fox, and the Horse by Charlie Mackey is a book Rev. Jeannette Hile recommended to me a few years ago. It is a book about friendship and compassion and kindness, about self-discovery and acceptance, about resilience and hope. The four main characters travel an ever-changing landscape similar to our own and discover how to endure all types of obstacles and question what it is like to live in our world. This is truly a book of the human spirit appropriate for kids of all ages.





Published in 2006, *For One More Day* is the story of a mother and son, and a relationship that covers a lifetime and beyond. What would you do if you could spend one more day with a lost loved one? Author **Mitch Albom** explores this question in his best selling novel about Chick Benetto. I have taught this book to my high school students in the past and they come away with a true

understanding of the importance of relationships within family.

The Deacons continue to work diligently to maintain their missions. At their August meeting, they discussed items regarding school donations, community events, and future activities planned for the Fall.

The Deacons have received a **request from the local schools** for **water bottles.** Listen to the announcements before worship for more information about this ministry.

Thank you to all who donated diapers and wipes for **The Free Market** which will take place on **September 21**. Drop-off date is September 20th, noon-6 PM, for any members who wish to donate unneeded or no longer wanted items for this ministry. See the related news article about what we are accepting.

The new date for our **Clothing Drive is October 5th**. If you plan to drop off clothes on that day, please do so between 8-9 AM. An additional drop off date will be October 1st, between 6-7:30 PM.

To upgrade the kitchen in the Chapel, the Deacons have purchased and installed a **commercial-grade mixer**. Our cooks have met and experimented with operating the mixer as preparation for the next community dinner. Mama's donated \$100 toward the purchase of the mixer. We extended a warm thank you to the Schiano family for their generous gift for this utensil.

In August, the Deacons made **ornaments** with a picture of the church and the stained glass cross. A few pieces of the stained glass from the broken window will be included along with a note on the history of the window. Lorinda posted an article and a picture of the ornament on the church's website.

As requested by Carol Miller, some of the money given in memory of Edna Ort has been moved to the Yarn Girls.




BACKPACK PROGRAM OVERVIEW

Sharing God's Bounty Seek Contentment

Many people spend years seeking contentment not realizing that contentment is a state of mind independent of external circumstances. True contentment comes from knowing that God is in control and that he will provide for you.

As a child of God, you are no doubt aware that our society is trying hard to make you discontented. Advertisements suggest you can't be content without an expensive house, a new car, an exotic vacation, big investments, and the latest in clothes. Society tries to make you believe that happiness and contentment are within your reach if you just acquire a few more things.

Contentment does not consist of the size of income or net worth. It has nothing to do with the size of your house or year of your car. Contentment can't be bought at a department store or travel agency. Real contentment is not related to circumstances or things.

For some, acquiring money can become a preoccupation and an obsession. It's possible to become a slave to wealth. Greed will not allow contentment, because it will always urge you to acquire more. No matter how you try, you cannot be satisfied by worldly things. The love of money can potentially possess a person's life like no other emotion can. Jesus spoke to the issue of greed in Matthew 16:26 when he asked, "What good will it be for a man if he gains the whole world, yet forfeits his soul?" The things you possess will only contribute to fleeting happiness, not an enduring peace and contentment. "But man, despite his riches, does not endure; he is like the beasts that perish" (Psalm 49:12).

With money as your security, pride, self-centeredness, and self-sufficiency take over and replace your trust in God to provide. You can be like the Rich Fool, who gave himself credit for his success and desired even more. You can push God out of your life.

When God is your security, you can be content. The Apostle Paul knew both the secret of contentment and how to receive it. "I have learned to be content whatever the circumstances. I know what it is to be in need, and I know what it is to have plenty" (Philippians 4:11-12). Without Christ, you will never achieve contentment, but a relationship with Christ will redirect your focus from transient earthly pleasures to things of eternal significance. Keeping your eyes on "the prize" (Philippians 3:14) will bring about gratitude in your heart for what you have rather than desiring what you don't have. May the words of the psalmist be an expression of your heart: "Whom have I in heaven but you? And earth has nothing I desire besides you. My flesh and my heart may fail, but God is the strength of my heart and my portion forever" (Psalm 73:25-26).

One is Nearer to God's Heart in a Garden than Anywhere Else

For instance, he told me that he frequently slept in the cemetery "just down the hill" and that sometimes a few baby bears slept with him. I cautioned him, "Watch out for the Mama bear! She'll protect her babies." He then continued his story and I continued to listen, trying to be his friend. Then came the day that I saw an indentation in his forehead, about the diameter of a dime. I didn't ask any questions. Eventually, he pointed to the dent and said "Afghanistan. I was shot." I didn't want to dampen his spirits by focusing on the injury, so I said, "I'm glad you can get around and be my friend, in front



of our beautiful church, beside the comfort of a flower garden." He smiled, and that told me plenty. Then I said, "I'm so glad to have your company. You make my work at the garden seem easy."

This was God's heart - so present, so effective - in our garden. It created warmth and understanding between two people who couldn't be more different in personal identity. Then came the time when my friend stopped coming. I don't know what happened, but I'll never stop thinking about him . . . praying for him.

TEACH YOUR CHILDREN HOW TO PRAY

FOCUS ON GOD'S BEAUTIFUL CREATION (pp 208-209)

With our societal addiction to cell phones and other electronic screens, sometimes I wonder if we miss out on really absorbing the beauty of nature all around us. We're so eager to capture and share everything around us. We take pictures and videos, but do we really let beauty sink deep into our souls and leave a permanent impression there? This practice encourages deep observation of nature and creation of mental pictures of the world around us that use all five senses.

Designed for Ages 4+

Materials: None

Time Investment: 5-15 minutes

HOW TO:

- 1. Go outside and find something beautiful to focus on: a sunset, a flower, a beautiful sky, or anything else interesting.
- 2. Instruct everyone to notice all of the details they can about the beautiful thing and talk about them together. Ask questions such as: "How does it look? Are there any sounds associated with it? If you can touch it, how does it feel? Does it have a smell?" Take a good look at this object, more than you might normally, and notice details you might not have noticed before.
- 3. After some time of observing together, go back inside and try to recreate the memory again. Instruct everyone to close their eyes. Ask questions such as: "Can you still picture the same scene? What do you remember? What was the most beautiful part, in your mind?

NOTES: This practice is fantastic for vacation or other special times when it is tempting to rush through the "to do" list without pausing to notice the beauty all around. Similarly, when visiting an art museum or other attraction, use this practice to help make lasting memories of the visit.

VARIATIONS: After coming inside, try to recreate the scene by drawing or painting it. Do the "three snapshots" activity: At the beginning of an important day, instruct everyone to plan to take three mental snapshots of special or beautiful moments in the day. At the end of the day, ask each person to recall his or her snapshots and share with others.
