

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ, A Story to Tell, Thanks and Giving Season

When my daughter was in preschool we began telling stories together. She would start, "Once upon a time." I would continue after the introduction. 

NEWS FROM THE DEACONS

The Deacons continue to work diligently to maintain their missions throughout the year.

In Little Pantry News, Seventh Heaven Farms recently made a large donation. Although Nicole from the farm was upset that food was apparently being taken primarily by only a few people, the Deacons at this time choose to continue with the free open access to the Pantry. In addition, as noted in the special dates in November, we will be seeking donations from our congregation for the Thanksgiving season. See the separate article regarding this endeavor.



Our Free Market in late September and our Clothing Drive in early October were hugely successful. We collected 295 bags of clothes and shoes, 16 bikes, toys, and strollers, amounting to approximately 2,149 pounds and earning us \$449.80. Our next clothing drive is tentatively scheduled for May 3, 2025. Extra drop-off date will

be April 29 from 5:30-7 PM and on May 3rd between 8-9 AM. We discussed the possibility of offering a pick-up service for church members only. We will report back to you about this at a future date.

Kyle Larga, a scout seeking to earn his Eagle badge, has been approved to build a pergola in our prayer garden. We anticipate completion of this project by June, 2025.

As you have witnessed in the final pages of the newsletter, we have a form for Christmas Poinsettia flowers. This form will be distributed in church on November 17, 24, and December 1, 8. We hope you will consider sponsoring a flower "In memory of" or "In Thanksgiving for" a loved one.

Finally, our confirmation students spent time taking Halloween photos of our youngsters and their families on October 27th. We are glad many children enjoyed this event.



- 3. In September, the value of the MassMutual Investment accounts increased \$5,521.25 to \$364,664.77.
- 4. The total endowment fund at the end of September was \$369,742.32. The total endowment fund was up \$5,546.28 since the beginning of September and up \$30,076.69 since January 1, 2024.
- 5. The September community dinner expenses were \$281.54. The donations collected at the dinner were \$73.00. The total cost to the church for all community dinners since September 2021 is \$754.02.
- 6. The Men's breakfast expenses for September were \$89.80. The donations collected at the breakfast were \$81.00.

The 2024 Per Capita is \$42.50 for each of the 203 members of our Church. (The number is the membership of FPCH on December 31, 2022.) The total amount due in 2024 is \$8,627.50 or \$718.96 monthly. In September, \$0.00 was received for Per Capita leaving the total received in 2024 at \$2,769.28 or 32.1% of the amount due. No Per Capita payment was sent to the Presbytery of the Highlands of NJ in September leaving the total sent in 2024 at \$2,769.28 or 32.1% of the total amount due.

Sharing God's Bounty We are Accountable

The need for us to be accountable is well illustrated in the Parable of the Talents found in Matthew 25:14-30. Three servants were entrusted with a lot of money before their master went on a journey. One servant was given five talents, one two, and one one. They were given a period of time to put their funds to work. In Matthew 25:19 we read, "After a long time the Master of those servants returned and settled accounts with them." The servants knew the Master would return from his trip, and they would have to give an account of the money given to them.

There would be a Day of Judgment, an accounting of their responsibilities. Two servants were very faithful and went out and invested their talents wisely, and they heard the words we all want to hear, "Well done, good and faithful servant." For those who do well, the accounting is a time for rejoicing. If a man is able to turn his talents from five into ten, he is praised for doing good work.

The parable is truly a picture of life itself. We are born into the world with certain talents and abilities which we do not choose. They are gifts from outside us, talents from God. Each of us is given a period of time in which to use these talents—our life span. Then at the end, beyond death, comes judgment, an accounting to render of our days upon earth.

As stewards, we understand our need to be responsible in our stewardship because we know that at some time we will be held accountable. Our accountability provides an encouragement for us to use our time, talents, and treasures faithfully and properly. Accountability does imply hard work and effort. It conveys our responsibilities, not to take our tasks lightly. However, we know that God is always with us, and, with his help and strength, we can accomplish much.

We are accountable to God because he is the creator and owner of all. We become his stewards because he has chosen to entrust us with his love, grace, and mercy for which we are to render faithful and wise service. As the Apostle Paul said in 1 Corinthians 4:2, "Now it is required that those who have been given a trust must prove faithful." Jesus' words, recorded in Luke 12:48 are, "From everyone who has been given much, much will be demanded; and from the one who has been entrusted with much, much more will be asked."

God, who loves us and calls us each by name, will enable us to be faithful and accountable stewards.

TEACH YOUR CHILDREN HOW TO PRAY

This activity is designed to put a Bible verse in a decorated matchbox to keep as a reminder that God's word is always with us. It is impactful because the action of hiding a piece of paper in a tiny box feels like hiding away a secret. It provides a very ceremonial feel and allows children to explore the idea of telling their most profound thoughts to God and hiding them away in a special box. This is designed for children ages 6 and up.

MATERIALS:

- 1. Empty matchboxes
- 2. Construction or scrapbook paper
- 3. Glue
- 4. Scissors

TIME:

20 minutes to make the box plus 30 minutes for the activity.

HOW TO:

Explain to the children that you are going to make a very special box, but do not reveal the box's purpose at first.

- 1. Cut a strip of paper that will wrap around the matchbox to cover it.
- 2. Glue the paper in place over the matchbox.
- 3. Cut small pieces of paper that, when folded, will fit inside the matchbox.

EXPLAIN AND USE THE PRAYER BOX:

1. After everyone has had a chance to make a box and cut the pieces of paper, explain the purpose of the box - it is a prayer box. Family members can write their special prayers on their pieces of paper, fold them up, and put them into the matchboxes. Explain, "We can put our prayers in our boxes knowing that God hears each of our prayers, even if God doesn't always respond in ways we would have wanted.

EXPLAIN AND USE THE PRAYER BOX:

2. Help children find special places to put their boxes, and encourage them to take out old prayers and put new prayers in when they have special prayer requests to God.

NOTES:

- 1. Reassure children that their boxes are private, between them and God, and that you do not need to know everything they put in them.
- 2. Use this activity to answer the children's questions about prayer as they come up: "Why is it hard to know if God heard my prayer?" OR, "I prayed for grandpa to get well and he still died! Did God ignore my prayer?" Answer honestly and don't be afraid to say, "That is a mystery."
- 3. Model the use of boxes by having one of your own and talking about it.

VARIATIONS:

- 1. Use another type of box instead of a matchbox.
- 2. Decide which prayers you would like to write down as a family rather than have it be an individual project.
