

- 3. In July, the value of the MassMutual Investment accounts increased \$2,093.97 to \$355,136.15.
- 4. In July, the value of the total Endowment Fund increased \$2,067.87 to \$361,891.91.
- 5. The July Second Saturday Free Community Dinner was not held. The total cost to the church of all community dinners since September 2021 remains at \$693.02.
- 6. The July Men's breakfast was not held because it is suspended in the summer.

The 2025 Per Capita is \$43.50 for each of the 205 members of our Church. (The number is the membership of FPCH on December 31, 2023.) The total amount due in 2025 is \$8,917.50 or \$743.13 monthly. In July, \$50.00 was received for Per Capita bringing the total received in 2025 to \$2,849.12 or 32.0% of the amount due. A payment of \$50.00 was sent to the Presbytery of the Highlands of NJ in July bring the total sent in 2025 to \$2,849.62 or 32.0% of the total amount due.

## **BUILDING ON GENEROSITY (BOG) CAPITAL CAMPAIGN**

- Donations received during July, \$300.00.
- Total donations received from church members, non-members and anonymous from September 2019 (the BOG Kickoff dinner) through the last day of July 2025, **\$651,901.02.**
- Expenses paid using the BOG funds in July, \$700.00. This expense was paid to Crestview Tree Service to remove the stump in front of the Church.
- The total available BOG funds are \$6,194.28. The breakdown is \$1,944.28 for the next BOG project with an additional \$1,500.00 designated for repairs to the two center front doors of the Church and \$2,750.00 designated for the Chapel range hood replacement.
- Donations breakdown by source:
  - 5.4% \$35,048.76 from nonmembers
  - 86.0% \$560,527.05 from members
  - <u>8.6%</u> <u>\$56,325.21</u> from anonymous & dinners
  - o 100.0% \$651,901.02 Total

Johnsonburg is an overnight camp, open to almost anyone. Kids as young as first grade can attend. It is a religious based camp but you can do so much more than church each day. The camp provides many food options with three meals a day. Workers are aware of allergies and dietary restrictions, so they make food for those with restrictions. Because of how many people are allergic to nuts, camp is a nut-free facility. They also have a few sandwich options, like Sun butter and Jelly, and cheese sandwiches for kids if they don't like the meal provided.

My first week was called "Rides and Slides." During this week we experienced camp, and at the end of the week we went to Dorney Park and Wild Water Kingdom. I made a good friend that week who had never gone on a big roller

coaster. In the end he and I went on almost every ride. During that day I challenged myself to go on rides that I never thought I would go on. I had so much fun that I went home and begged to go to other amusement parks.

My second week of camp was called "Middle School Mayhem." This is a hard core week of camp. I was very lucky to have two amazing counselors that week. I learned a lot from them, especially one who is from the UK. We would hear stories every night about her home town. I was very lucky to room with 3 other kids in my cabin. # Sharing God's Bounty

# **Money and the Great Commission**

Jesus' parting command was: "Therefore go and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, and teaching them to obey everything I have commanded you." (Matthew 28:19-20). Jesus was very direct and explicit with his mandate. There is no question as to where or with whom we are to share the Gospel. The love that God gives to us is to be shared by us with all people everywhere. He has given us our marching orders, and, in his strength, we can give ourselves fully to his work.

Because God has chosen to use us as his tools to bring salvation to all people, we must use our lives and gifts to spread the Good News. Paul wrote, "We are therefore Christ's ambassadors, as though God were making his appeal through us" (2 Corinthians 5:20). One of the tools that God gives us to use in our mission of reaching out to others with the Gospel is our money. According to an old stewardship phrase, "Stewardship without mission is unnecessary and mission without stewardship is impossible." Stewardship and mission are inseparable. The funding of the Great Commission needs to come from believers. The money which God entrusts to us has many purposes, and the funding of mission work is of first importance. Through the giving of our money, we demonstrate our obedience to Jesus' command to reach out to all people. Paul wrote that, through our giving, we "test the sincerity of [our] love by comparing it with the earnestness of others" (2 Corinthians 8:8).

For nonbelievers and those who lack spiritual maturity, the giving of money is done begrudgingly out of a sense of obligation. By the grace of God, our attitude toward giving is a "want to" rather than a "got to" give. We view giving as a privilege and an opportunity to spread the Gospel through our money. Our giving expresses our gratitude for who God is and all that he has done for through his Son. Through faith, we hold onto our money loosely and then are privileged to experience the joy of giving as we give God our first and best. As Christians we understand that God has a claim on all that we have, so we willingly and cheerfully give our money to help all people hear of God's love. Money is an important tool for God's mission. Through our faithful giving, we are able to leverage our witnessing to all people.

## TEACH YOUR CHILDREN HOW TO PRAY

First Day of School: New Beginnings

Heading off to school on the first day can be daunting for parent and child alike, as there are so many questions in one's mind. What will the new year be like? Will I like my teacher? Will my child be happy? This is a yearly tradition involving making a copy of your child's footprints on the first day of school and saying a simple prayer for the year to come.

### **Designed for Ages Preschool to Senior in High School**

Materials: Construction paper, washable tempera paint, wide paintbrush,

shallow pan of soapy water, washcloths and towels.

Time Investment: 15-30 minutes

### How To:

- 1. On the night before or the morning of the first day of school, paint the bottom of your child's feet with a wide paintbrush and ask him or her to step on a piece of construction paper. As the child does, say, "Your feet remind us of the journey you will take this year at school. I know that you will learn so many new things and go so many new places. I hope that you will go with courage and strength and know that God goes with you too."
- 2. Before the child steps off the construction paper, say this short prayer: "God, please be with [child's name] as [he/she] heads off on [his/her] first day of school. May the year be full of new experiences and knowledge, and may [he/she] was I night and truth every day. Amen."
- 3. Wash paint off from the child's feet and head off to a new year!

### NOTE:

• Those who are coming to this tradition with older children might be tempted to skip it, thinking, "Well, we haven't done this in the past so we should skip it." It is never too late to start a new tradition, and this is an easy one to start at any time. Go ahead and start it, no matter how old your children are.

#### **VARIATIONS:**

- Use handprints instead of footprints.
- Show the footprints from previous years and notice the growth in the child.
- Trace around the hand or foot and make handprints or footprints that way.
- Do this every year on the LAST DAY of school instead of the first, and talk about the places the child has gone in the past year.
