

A NOTE FROM OUR PASTOR

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ.

How did you get here? It is a question that little ones ask us when they want to know our human origins. Often this question can be used not as a moment of curiosity but as a tool to measure whether you belong. On Saturday, May 10 we used that question as a tool to become more curious about our neighbors. Trinity United Methodist hosted an Interfaith Vigil to pray for and raise awareness about our immigrant neighbors. Several people from our Hackettstown community shared their immigrant stories about grandmothers who came from Eastern Europe, settling in the United States from Central America, and even an experience of an American living in another country in Europe. Each of the stories were heartfelt and showed our connection.

We prayed for and with our neighbors in those holy moments. It was a blessing to be connected by the scripture, "The foreigner residing among you must be treated as your native-born. Love them as yourself, for you were foreigners in Egypt. I am the Lord your God" (Leviticus 19:34). I wonder, if you could write down the origin story of you and your family, what would you learn? How has that shaped the character and values that are important to you? More importantly, how has God showed up in that story, too?

It's amazing what you might find out about yourself and each other in the process. I pray that we could find the threads of our stories woven into each other. May it be so.





- •1.) **\$8,167.62** Pastoral expenses (payroll, Board of Pensions, etc.).
- •2.) \$4,329.64 Staff payroll & payroll processing expenses.
- •3.) \$1,786.51 Gas (3 buildings).
- •5.) **\$870.00** Fire alarm monitoring (quarterly bill).
- •4.) \$535.47 Electricity (3 buildings).
- 2. The operating net income / (deficits) were \$73.90 in April and (\$21,967.36) Year To Date.
- •The actual April operating expenses were \$2,434.28 below the average monthly budgeted expenses.
- •The actual April operating incomes were \$1,306.28 above the average monthly budgeted incomes.
- The Year-To-Date operating expenses were **\$12,030.60** above the average YTD budgeted amounts.
- The Year-To-Date operating incomes were **\$4,729.90** above the average YTD budgeted amount.

- 3. In April, the value of the MassMutual Investment accounts increased \$200.45 to \$328,742.17.
- 4. In April, the value of the total Endowment Fund increased \$129.78 to \$343,387.25. This includes the \$3,000.00 used to pay operating expenses.
- 5. The April Second Saturday Free Community Dinner was not held. The total cost to the church of all community dinners since September 2021 remains at \$693.02.
- 6. The April Men's breakfast was held at River Star Diner.

The 2025 Per Capita is \$43.50 for each of the 205 members of our Church. (The number is the membership of FPCH on December 31, 2023.) The total amount due in 2025 is \$8,917.50 or \$743.13 monthly. In April, \$50.50 was received for Per Capita bringing the total received in 2025 to \$2,667.62 or 29.9% of the amount due. A payment of \$438.23 was sent to the Presbytery of the Highlands of NJ in April bringing the total sent in 2025 to \$2,667.62 or 29.9% of the total amount due.

BUILDING ON GENEROSITY (BOG) CAPITAL CAMPAIGN

- Donations received during April, \$210.00.
- Total donations received from church members, non-members and anonymous from September 2019 (the BOG Kickoff dinner) through the last day of April 2025, \$650,391.02.
- Expenses paid using the BOG funds in April, \$460.00. The payment was to Jensen Tree Experts for costs above estimate to remove the tree in front of the Church.
- The total available BOG funds are \$8,164.28. The breakdown is \$2,914.28 for the next BOG project with an additional \$2,500.00 designated for parking lot pavement and \$2,750.00 designated for the Chapel range hood replacement.
- Donations breakdown by source:
 - 5.3% \$34,288.76 from nonmembers
 - 86.0% \$559,777.05 from members
 - <u>8.7%</u> <u>\$56,325.21</u> from anonymous & dinners
 - o 100.0% \$650,391.02 Total

Sharing God's Bounty

Therefore My Brothers

Several weeks ago, the Christian Church began the season of Lent by observing Ash Wednesday. Perhaps you knelt at the altar as your forehead was marked with ashes. You heard the words, "You are dust and to dust you shall return." This rite serves to remind us of our beginning: that God created man from the dust of the earth. It also foretells our ending: that our mortal bodies will die and decay. It is a solemn moment; in truth, all of Lent is solemn. Yet, every Christian holds in his heart a secret the world needs to know: "The sting of death is sin, and the power of sin is the law. But thanks be to God, who gives us the victory through our Lord Jesus Christ" (1 Corinthians 15:56-57). That is the message of Easter: through Christ we have won the victory! We wept through the night of sorrow, but morning has come and with it the joy of the morning of eternal life (Psalm 30:5b).

We remain on earth, waiting for the fullness of that joy that will be ours when we are in Heaven with the Savior. We are not idle while we wait, however. After his glorious pronouncement of this victory over death, the Apostle Paul continues, "Therefore my beloved brothers, be steadfast, immovable, always abounding in the work of the Lord, knowing that in the Lord your labor is not in vain" (1 Corinthians 15:58). These are orders for all God's servants, the "beloved brothers." First, "Be steadfast." Day in and day out, not just on Sunday, but every day, all day, we are steadfast, putting the work of the Lord first, keeping uppermost in our minds that all we do is done in his strength and for his glory. At our work and in our homes, we remember that we "are serving the Lord" (Colossians 3:24).

We are "immovable." We don't get sidetracked. In his Gospel, Luke takes his readers along on Jesus' journey to Jerusalem. Like the Israelites traveling through the desert, Jesus' trip was not a straight line and it included many stops (although not for the same reasons), but as faithful as God was to deliver his chosen people, so "immovable" was Jesus on his way. We, too, have a goal: to travel to eternal life doing the Lord's work on our way. We are "immovable" in our desire to practice faithful stewardship on our journey, and God is faithful to go with us on that journey.

By God's grace through which he enables and equips us, we can "always [abound] in the work of the Lord." By God's grace, we overflow with good works. We are eager and willing to give of ourselves and our resources that his work might be done. Even when we get discouraged, we don't quit, because we know "that in the Lord [our] labor is not in vain."

Because God has done this, I respond gladly and freely by doing that. Because God has given himself for me, I respond by giving myself to him in every way that I can. It is not that I owe him anything, or that he needs in a particular way anything that I have. It is simply that I, in sheer gratitude for his many gifts, want to return these gifts, in some small way, by giving of myself.

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WORLD HUNGER IMPACTED BY FEDERAL CUTS TO HUMANI-TARIAN AID PROGRAMS

When we witness the nearly constant stream of people taking food from our Little Pantry we see only a glimpse of the problem of hunger in our world and in our nation.

According to UNICEF, today over 300 million people in 59 countries do not have adequate food. Within the United States nearly 44 million people experience food insecurity, including 1-5 children.

In addition, cuts made earlier this year to vital US government foreign humanitarian aid programs have put even more people in jeopardy. Without United States assistance

many humanitarian organizations around the world have had to cut back or even eliminate food assistance efforts.

The Presbyterian Church USA is attempting to alleviate this dire situation by launching the "2025 Hunger Action Campaign." This fund-raising undertaking will at-



tempt to target areas with the greatest need in providing not only food but assisting with the teaching of employable life skills in an effort to break the cycle of poverty affecting nations around the world. In places like Mali, South Sudan, and Gaza the Hunger Action Campaign is a critical lifeline of survival.

TEACH YOUR CHILDREN HOW TO PRAY

Pentecost: Harness the Power of the Wind

Pentecost is the day when Christians remember the Holy Spirit coming into the world. Start a tradition with your family of flying a kite on or near the day of Pentecost, which creates a memorable connection between the Spirit and wind. Imagine the effect it can have on your children if they thought of the power of the Holy Spirit each time they saw a colorful kite flying in the sky! Designed for All Ages.

Materials:

- 1. A red kite with string (the color is optional)
- 2. A windy day

Time Investment: 30 minutes to 2 hours

How to:

- 1. The first year, present the family with a kite on the day of Pentecost. Since red is the traditional liturgical color for Pentecost, selecting a red kite further connects the idea of liturgical colors.
- 2. Travel to an open space and fly the kite. As the kite flies, talk about the connection between the Spirit and the Wind. Though we cannot see the wind, we see the effect of the wind as it props the kite and helps it to fly. The same is true with the Spirit: we cannot see it, yet we see evidence of the Spirit's work and movement among us as we help others in need, as others help us, as we pray, and as we worship.
- 3. Take turns flying the kite and watching it fly higher and higher.

NOTES:

- If your family flies a kite often, consider using a separate Pentecost kite just for this occasion.
- While younger toddlers and babies are too little to fly the kite themselves, they can still benefit from the joy of being outside in the breeze and watching the kite fly.
- Because weather does not always cooperate, the family tradition might need to be adjusted, rather than on the actual day of Pentecost.

VARIATIONS:

- Make your own kite and draw or paint a symbol of the Holy Spirit on it.
- Maintain a similar tradition with a windsock that is hung outside each year around Pentecost time.

GET READY FOR THE BACKPACK PROGRAM IN JULY AND AUGUST

Even though school is about to end, school never leaves our minds.

We will be collecting school items for our students in need from July 20th through August 10th.
