Extending honor can be a simple "congratulations" of some sort and overall this leads to that bond or connection getting stronger and gaining each other's trust.

The third essential step is a **covenant transition**. This transition happens when two or more men help each other in some critical area of their lives, and each find purpose in that relationship. This step makes it clear that the brothers involved care for each others growth and development as a man.

The fourth essential step is the **free fire zone**. This is an extremely important step because each man involved is willing to give and take constructive criticism. And when taken, they are able to learn from their mistakes. If done right this builds relationships to its strongest point.

The last and final essential step is a **contagious culture**. When these four features of a band of brothers exist: the indirect connection, the extension of honor, the covenant transition and the free fire zone, a culture grows. This is the culture in which manhood thrives, boys turn into men, and victories are won!


NATIONAL HISPANIC


