Teachers' Training Report – 6th February

On February 6, a special training session was conducted for teachers, focusing on interactive approaches to improve classroom effectiveness. The program introduced a variety of games and activities designed to make teaching more engaging and impactful in the field. Discussions also highlighted effective communication techniques to help children better understand their Right to Education. Teachers were introduced to the Children's Parliament, exploring its

potential to drive positive change and empower students to address issues within their villages.

To ensure practical learning, the session featured demonstrations of games, role plays, and drawing activities. These interactive methods not only clarified key concepts but also encouraged enthusiastic participation. Teachers responded with energy and joy, making the training a lively and memorable experience.



Students' Field Work and Survey by Ph.D. Scholar



Mr. Vittal, a Ph.D. scholar and teacher from ZP School, recently conducted a field survey in Killa village to assess how Self-Help Group (SHG) women are benefiting from government schemes and the support provided by the local centre.

During his visit, he expressed satisfaction at the significant progress achieved by women through various

livelihood initiatives. Their efforts have not only improved living conditions but also contributed to reducing migration from the village.

Notably, this year two families have chosen to remain in the village, supported by the opportunities and stability created through SHG-led livelihood programs.

Ration and Nutrition Kits Distributed to Support Families



Sehavardhini extended vital support this month by distributing ration kits to 30 women and elderly residents who had been deprived of regular ration supplies. The initiative aimed to ease their daily struggles and provide much-needed relief.



In addition, 25 nutrition kits were provided to mothers and children, ensuring better health and nourishment for vulnerable families. This compassionate effort was carried out with care, reflecting the organization's commitment to community well-being and comfort.

CSA Hosts Two-Day Group Building Training for Animators



CSA successfully organized a two-day Group Building Training programme for animators, facilitated by resource person Miss Pratiksha. The sessions were highly interactive, activity-based, and designed to strengthen the animators' understanding of their roles and responsibilities.

The programme emphasized trust, teamwork, leadership, and effective communication, with special focus on the importance of networking and collaboration in community work. Ice-breaking activities set a friendly tone, followed by team-building games, role plays, and drawing exercises that encouraged unity and practical learning.

Through discussions and presentations, participants explored how to work collectively and fulfill their responsibilities with dedication. Miss Pratiksha highlighted the significance of core values and teamwork in becoming successful animators. Reflection sessions at the end of each day allowed participants to share experiences and consolidate their learning.

The training concluded on a positive note, with animators expressing greater confidence, improved communication skills, and a stronger sense of teamwork. The programme proved to be a meaningful and enriching experience for all involved.

Seed Distribution Drive Inspires Farming Awareness Among Children

On February 18–19, 2026, CSA conducted a Seed Distribution Drive across five villages, creating a memorable and meaningful experience for families. The initiative was supported by a dedicated donor whose encouragement continues to strengthen community efforts.

The drive aimed to give children firsthand exposure to farming, helping them appreciate the hard work their parents invest daily to build better lives. Families came together to prepare land, plant seeds, and embrace the journey of nurturing crops. This effort symbolized more than just distributing seeds—it fostered hope, values, and a deeper connection to the earth, leaving a lasting impact on both children and parents.



CSA Launches Mobile Repairing Training for Youth

CSA has introduced a 40-hour Mobile Repairing Training Program aimed at equipping young participants with practical technical skills and self-employment opportunities. The program began with an introductory session covering the basics of mobile technology, including phone components and repair fundamentals.

The training is being facilitated by Mr. Pratik Wakde, whose expertise and enthusiasm inspired the participants from day one. A total of six youth attended the opening session, demonstrating strong eagerness to learn and grow.

Beyond technical knowledge, the initiative seeks to build confidence, create opportunities, and open pathways to a better future for the community's younger generation.



Centre-Level Bal Panchayat Formed to Strengthen Children's Leadership

On February 21, Snehavardhini selected two confident students from each village, bringing together 33 representatives from 16 villages at the centre level. The gathering featured activities that allowed students to showcase their talents and abilities, culminating in the formation of a Centre-Level Bal Panchayat Committee.

This committee will address issues across 25 villages, with members visiting Panchayats to submit concerns, identify local problems, and discuss solutions. The initiative aims to promote children's participation, leadership, and community involvement, fostering a culture of responsibility and problem-solving among the younger generation.



Killa Gavki Secures Solar Street Lights Through Community Effort

On February 1, residents of Killa Gavki submitted a formal request to Excel VRIT Company for the installation of street lights, highlighting the need for improved safety and convenience in the village. The process required Panchayat approval and Gavki signatures, which were diligently coordinated by the village youth along with their teacher.

Following these efforts, on February 22, the village successfully received two solar street light poles, marking a significant step toward strengthening local infrastructure and lighting facilities. The development was warmly welcomed, with villagers expressing gratitude and happiness for this positive change.



Future Plans Set for Play School Children

On February 1, teachers at the play school prepared special plans to guide children toward higher education. The initiative focuses on building confidence and readiness as they transition to the next stage of learning. Several children have already secured admission in other schools, marking an important milestone in their academic journey. The centre extends its best wishes for their continued success as they move forward.
