

















# THE CENTER FOR AMATEUR RADIO LEARNING

## Hospital Ship Crew Members Get Amateur Radio Training at Sea

On February 21, US Army civilian contractor Tim Millea, AJ7UU, and MARS Volunteer Doug Smith, W7KF, embarked on the hospital ship USNS *Mercy* from San Diego to Hawaii to begin its deployment for "Pacific Partnership 2018" (PP18), a humanitarian assistance exercise that will include several Pacific stops. Their mission during the first leg of the voyage was to conduct Technician and General Amateur Radio

classes for more than a dozen military and civilian personnel crewing the Military Sealift Command hospital ship, and to provide training in military HF communication procedures. The pair provided two or three training classes a day for the crew, who took the classes following their work shifts. Classroom training was interspersed with on-air activities in the ship's Amateur Radio room. The *Mercy* is utilizing the Weak Signal Propagation Reporting (<u>WSPR</u>) tool under K6MRC. On March 3, the *Mercy* docked in

Hawaii, where a group of local Volunteer Examiners (VEs), headed by ARRL Pacific Section Manager Joe Speroni, AH0A, administered Technician and General licensing exams to the students.

"The ARRL VE Team in Honolulu was fantastic to work with," Smith told ARRL. "Due to spotty internet connectivity while at sea and strict base access and security issues in port, the VEs in Hawaii had to exhibit extraordinary patience and persistence to administer the exams aboard *Mercy*." Smith singled out ARRL VEC Manager Maria Somma, AB1FM, for being "super helpful throughout this endeavor."

More than 18 sailors and civilians assigned to the USNS *Mercy* passed their Amateur Radio exams, administered on March 3 in Pearl Harbor. The successful candidates had their new call signs or upgraded tickets by March 5.

Among those upgrading was Captain David Bretz, WH6FIR, the PP18 Mission Commander. "I am very excited to host the trainers on *Mercy*," Bretz said. "We will be researching the effectiveness of using Amateur Radio aboard the *Mercy* for the duration of PP18. Amateur Radio operators have played a huge role

throughout history assisting in humanitarian and disaster relief efforts. I am looking forward to gathering research on how this older technology can still be relevant in current humanitarian and disaster relief missions, such as PP18." The *Mercy* arrived in Guam this week.

Here is a little experiment for you: see how many different hot meals, you can make in your thermos.

Maybe purchase one for each course or family member!

Something that needs to cook a long time can be done by using a thermos botte.

You will have to experiment on how much rice and water to use. In my opinion, it is necessary to use a wide mouth thermos. I have a 20 oz stainless steel Stanley thermos that I use to cook rice and macaroni and oatmeal with. I have read that you could also use it to make hard boiled eggs.

I cook oatmeal overnight, making it just before I go to bed. I pour hot water in the thermos first to heat it. After the thermos is heated I put in the amount of food I want to cook. I then fll the thermos to the top with boiling water and close it up. With oatmeal I just leave it overnight. It is still plenty hot in the morning and ready to eat. I don't remember how long I cooked the rice, it was several hours. You have to watch the time with pasta as it will get soggy but still edible if you leave it in the hot water too long. You can cook meat, vegetables and all kinds of food.

I haven't experimented with cooking beans via thermos botte but I am sure with some experimentation, I could manage to cook a variety of beans. (Probably one overnight to soak, then drain and add more boiling water and then one overnight to cook.)

My original purpose was to see if I could cook food, (1) without generating a lot of food odors to advertise that I was cooking. The thermos method of cooking works quite well in that regard. (2) to see if I could cook food while on the move. The thermos cooking method is outstanding in that regard. A stainless steel thermos can also be used over an open fre to cook food, but why would you, unless you had to?


