

It seemed a game that Norvan was rarely in jeopardy of losing. Coach John Dailly and his staff seemed well prepared for this confrontation.

During the opening forty-five minute frame Club Ireland were pushed back into a defending mode. Their early long ball tactics were no match for the relentless short passing attacks of Norvan. Twenty minutes into the match Barry Deardon (#11) gathered in a pass at the top of the box, shook off a defender and rocketed a shot into the roof of the goal.

The second half opened with a more spirited performance from Club Ireland. At the sixty minute mark Dan Toth's corner kick rattled around the goal area before being slammed home by Mike Lehnert (#8), who found the ball waiting at the far post.

The equalizer stood up for no more than a minute. Only seconds after Norvan put the ball into play, Barry Deardon was again found lurking deep in the Club Ireland zone. He picked up a pass 25 yards out on the right side and bolted for the by - line. Splitting two defenders on his way, he sent a diagonal ball back across the top of the box. Des Webster (#10) had timed his run perfectly and unleashed a one touch blast into the bottom corner of the net, restoring the Norvan lead.

Despite several more opportunities at both ends including Mike Geary's clearance of a goal bound Club Ireland shot, the 2 - 1 score stood up. The result marked Norvan's second straight appearance in the Provincial Cup Final.



Norvan ANAF defeated defending champion New Westminster Queens Park Rangers 3-2 yesterday to win The Province Cup, emblematic of B.C. senior soccer supremacy, at Kinsmen Stadium.

The victory marked the first time a North Shore team has won the senior men's Provincial championship since 1966, when North Shore United won The Province Cup.

Norvan ANAF will now represent B.C. in the Canadian championships Oct. 7-10 in Saskatoon.

Des Webster, Barry Dearden and Graeme Slee scored for Norvan, which led 2-1 at halftime. Dave Harkison scored twice for Queens Park, his second goal coming on a

penalty kick in the 84th minute.

Slee's goal in the 67th minute gave Norvan a 3-1 lead and after Harkison's second goal, Queens Park pressed for the tying goal, but goalie Denny Crouch made several key stops and the New Westminster team also hit the goalpost and crossbar.

Queens Park beat ANAF 2-0 in last year's final. It was the first B.C. championship in the 23-year history of the Norvan club.

CORNER KICKS — Queens Park and Norvan play in the Metro League Premier division... Winnipeg beat Queens Park in last year's Canadian final in Winnipeg... The Province Cup was first presented by the newspaper for provincial competition in 1921-22.

Norvan ANAF wins Provincial Cup

Des Webster scored a goal and assisted on another tally by Barry Dearden, leading Norvan ANAF No. 45 to its first Provincial Cup championship soccer victory Sunday — a 3-2 triumph over New Westminster Queens Park Rangers at Kinsmen Stadium in North Vancouver.

In one of the best played Cup finals in recent years, Webster opened scoring in the 35th minute and, after Dave Harkison equalized for QPR in the 38th minute, set up Dearden for Norvan's second goal with a clever chip pass one minute before halftime.

With a standing-room-only crowd of more than 2,300 watching, Graeme Slee gave Norvan a 3-1 lead in the 67th minute before Harkison brought QPR back within a goal on a penalty kick in the 84th minute. The penalty was awarded when Norvan defender Greg Haywood handled the ball in his penalty area.


QPR, defending Cup champions, dominated most of the second half, hitting Norvan goalposts twice and the crossbar once.





The game began with flare and promise as North Delta United pushed from the opening whistle, anxious to spot light the talents of their young forward, Niall Thompson. It appeared this match was destined for the dreaded shoot-out until an unfortunate stumble by one of the game's dominant players. United's Keith Izait went to clear a routine ball from the top of his penalty box. He lost his footing and the ball struck his arm.

Graeme Slee made no mistake from the penalty spot and although Martin Best rounded out the scoring just before full time, it was all Norvan needed to advance to this year's Cup Final.


The final of the Province Cup was decided in a penalty kicks shootout which NorVan won 3-1.

Stacy Gowanlock knows how Mario Lemieux feels when he bends over to lace up his skates and feels a sharp pain in his back.

Gowanlock suffers from a similar back ailment to that of the Pittsburgh Penguins' superstar. But the 6-foot-4, 225-pound goalkeeper for NorVan ANAF ignored the pain yesterday to play in the biggest game in B.C. amateur soccer.

The 21-year-old "keeper from North Delta backstopped NorVan to a 1-0 victory over defending B.C. and Canadian champion Vancouver Firefighters in a game decided on penalty kicks before about 2,000 fans at Kinsmen Stadium.

Gowanlock allowed just one goal in the penalty-kicks shootout, won 3-1 by NorVan, to win the historic Province Cup and advance to the Canadian championships in Saskatoon Oct. 11-14.

"My legs get really numb but it's not serious enough to keep me from the game," said a champagne-drenched Gowanlock. "The doctor told me it's basically up to me whether to play or not."

Gowanlock was injured in an Imperial Cup game several months ago.

"I was taken off the field on a stretcher at Ambleside Park with no feeling in my legs," he said. "I was in the hospital overnight and the doctors think I have the same thing as Lemieux. It's a disc rubbing against a nerve. But they're going to do more and more tests over the summer."

Firefighters blamed their lack of finish for the defeat, but the "intimidating" presence of Gowanlock was mentioned as a key factor.

"We weren't burying our chances," said Marty Etheridge, a Firefighters co-captain. "We had them 4-1 in good chances and we didn't put them in. He's intimidating because he takes up a lot of the net."

Midfielder Bob Rosenlund agrees. "Their goalie covered most of that net," said Rosenlund, chosen the Firefighters' player-of-the-game. "Even on the penalty spot we were looking at the size of him rather than the size of the goal."

"We had trouble all year long scoring goals. The chances were there. We just didn't finish. It's an awful way to lose."

Rosenlund, shooting first in the penalty shootout, fired a shot over the net, Gowanlock made a sliding save on Brent Gant, John Zacharuk hit the post and Mark Etheridge finally scored on the fourth shot. "I tried not to think of anything else but putting the ball in the net," said McCallum of the deciding shot.





Norvan turn in B.C. colors

Province Cup champion Norvan ANAF will be out to retain the Canadian soccer championship for B.C. when the provincial champions compete in the national finals this weekend in Saskatoon.

Norvan qualified for the Canadian finals by beating defending B.C. and Canadian champion Vancouver Firefighters on penalty kicks in the provincial final for the Province Cup in May at Kinsmen Stadium.

Norvan has four players from the Canadian Soccer League on its roster, including two from Canada's

Olympic team.

Midfielders Scott Macey of the Vancouver 86ers and Mike Dodd of the Winnipeg Fury are the Olympic players who recently helped Canada defeat El Salvador 4-0 to advance to the third and final round of Olympic qualifying for the 1994 Olympics in Barcelona.

Centre back Steve Millar and midfielder Martin Best also play for the Fury. Striker Barry Dearden and Graeme Slee formerly played in the CSL with the Calgary Strikers. Goalkeeper Stacy Gowanlock, the

hero of the win over Firefighters, is also with the team.

Norvan, which is seeded No. 1 because B.C. is defending champion, plays its first game tonight at 8 p.m. against Saskatoon, the No. 8 seed, in the eight-team tournament. The national final has been held since 1913.

"I think we'll do well," said Norvan manager Gil McGarva. "We're seeded No. 1 and if we win our first two games we go to the final."

Meanwhile, B.C. champion Surrey Marlins represent the province at the Canadian women's championships, also this weekend in Saskatoon.

Norvan wins nat'l amateur soccer title

NV squad defeats Azzurri of Scarborough, Ont., in exciting overtime final

NORVAN ANAF #45 brought back the Canadian amateur soccer title to B.C. from the national championship held in Saskatoon over the Thanksgiving weekend.

The title marks the second consecutive year B.C. has won the national championship. Last May, Norvan won the Province Cup after defeating defending provincial champions, the Vancouver Firefighters, also the 1990 national champs.

Norvan is the first North Vancouver team to win the Canadian amateur soccer championship since 1949, according to team manager Gil McGarva, also president of the Vancouver Metro Senior Soccer League.

The path to the finals saw Norvan defeat the Saskatchewan Huskies from the University of Saskatchewan 5-1, and Manitoba's Winnipeg Lucania, the 1987 Canadian champions, 5-0. Goaltender Stacy Gowanlock was responsible for the shutout.

The final against Scarborough, Ont., Azzurri, the 1989 champions, saw Clark Brolly score for Norvan two minutes into the game followed by a Peter Wortman goal at the 11-minute mark for a 2-0 tally.

However, Scarborough found the net five minutes before half time and then tied up the game at 57 minutes.

According to McGarva, Graeme Slee was sent off the field following a red card, leaving the team one man short for the rest of the

match.

Two 15-minute periods of overtime saw no goals, resulting in a penalty kick shootout that still failed to decide the game.

Scoring on the first three and fifth kicks for Norvan was Greg Haywood, Steve Millar, Eamonn Ward, and Martin Best while Scott Macey missed.

Gowanlock then had one save against Azzurri, forcing straight knock-out penalty kicks.

Norvan team captain Mike Geary scored on the sixth and then Gowanlock made what McGarva describes as a "world class" save against Azzurri to win the championship.

Coached by Ian Farquhar, the Norvan squad includes several Canadian Soccer League (CSL) players: Macey plays for the Vancouver 86ers while Millar, Mike Dodd and Best play for Winnipeg Fury. Macey and Dodd are also on the under-23 Canadian National Olympic Team.

Norvan players at the national championship include Gordon Deas, Dave Ball, Barry Dearden, Eddie Cannon, and Neville Abreo. The team's trainer is Ken Birrell.



Norvan squad sets sights on third straight B.C. senior title

The most successful senior amateur men's soccer team in B.C. — Norvan ANAF No. 45 — aims for its third consecutive title Sunday when it takes on Vancouver Westside Rino in the annual Provincial Cup championship game.

The 2:15 p.m. kickoff at North Vancouver's Kinsmen Stadium pits a vaunted Norvan side against the flagship team of the Westside Soccer Society, which comprises five men's and two women's teams.

Norvan captured both the Provincial Cup and Canadian Challenge Cup championships the past two years. Established in 1978, Westside Rino was runner-up in the Vancouver Metro League Imperial Cup championship game in 1989 and '93.

Sunday's game will be preceded by a 12 noon kickoff between Delta United and Vancouver Firefighters in the B.C. over-30 championship final, also at Kinsmen Stadium.





TEAM PROFILE:

Norvan are the defending Challenge Cup champions after winning the national title in Saskatoon last year. The North Van team was also a 3rd-place finisher at the 1988 nationals. They have finished first in the Vancouver Metro Senior Soccer League twice in the last 3 years and have been Provincial Cup winners 3 times out of the last 7 years. The squad features several current and former Canadian Soccer League players including Scott Macey of the Vancouver 86ers and Steve Millar of the Winnipeg Fury – the two teams that met in this year's CSL Mita Cup Final.

The Challenge Cup: The Canadian Championship History

On May 24, 1912 at a meeting held in Toronto under the auspices of the then Amateur Athletic Union of Canada, the idea of staging a competition for the senior amateur soccer club championship of Canada was conceived.

At that meeting, which led to the formation of the Dominion of Canada Football Association, it was decided to ask the Governor General of Canada, His Royal Highness, the Duke of Connaught, to lend his name to the trophy that would be presented to the national champions.

On July 9, 1912 at the meeting in Winnipeg, the rules of the Challenge Cup were first drawn up and it was decided to hold the inaugural competition that same year, if it could be arranged. However, it turned out to be too late in the year to start a new national competition, with all of the problems travelling entailed in those far off days. So the first Challenge Cup competition for the Connaught Cup did not begin until a year later, in 1913. It was decided to hold the first tournament in Fort William, Ontario - now known as Thunder Bay.

Representatives of four sections of the country took part in the introductory tournament: Norwood Wanderers from Winnipeg, Lachine from Montreal, Fort William CPR from Northern Ontario and Toronto Old Country from Southern Ontario.

The original competition was organized on a round-robin basis. Norwood was the initial Connaught Cup champion on a record of one win and two ties. The Wanderers repeated as champions again the following year though their victory came by the narrowest of margins - on goal difference - after they had tied Fort William on points at the end of round-robin play.

Through the next 75 years the Challenge Cup survived two World Wars and numerous changes to its format. The round-robin concept was abolished in 1915 when it was decided to adopt a format that would match the winners of a western play-off against winners of the

east in a best-of-three series. Nanaimo Wanderers was the first team from British Columbia to bring the Connaught Cup to the west coast in 1923 when they beat Montreal C.P.R. in the first inter-region final. Since that time the men's championship has been won by teams from the west coast 35 times, making B.C. by far the most successful province.


In 1926 the Connaught Cup was replaced by a new trophy donated by the English Football Association and for a brief period during the 1950s the F.A. trophy was replaced by a cup donated by Carling Breweries.

Over the years there have been many exciting games, outstanding performances and many stories to relate. In the 1925 final, for example, Toronto Ulster and Nanaimo had played to a scoreless draw in the first game and through 89 minutes without a goal in the second. It was on the last kick of the second game that Bob Lavery popped up to score for Ulster to give the Ontario squad a one-game lead. In the deciding third match, the Toronto squad narrowly edged a Nanaimo team so badly hit by injuries that they had to use their first-string goalkeeper as a right winger.

In 1950 Vancouver City appeared in their first national final against one of the oldest soccer clubs in

the country: Winnipeg Scottish. The Vancouver squad had little difficulty winning the championship with 4-1 and 4-0 victories thanks, in part, to the netminding of goalkeeper Bill McAllister, who went on to become the technical director of the B.C. Soccer Association and coach of the Canadian national team in the 1970s. Other notable members of that Cup-winning side were Pat Philley, who captained Canada in their first World Cup games in 1957, Gogie Stewart and Buster Cairns, who were to play in many more finals and also gain international recognition for Canada's burgeoning soccer program.

In 1955 the format of the competition was changed

yet again. It was resolved that each province would send a representative to a national championship tournament.

It was a strong Vancouver Halecos team that captured the national title under the new format in 1956 defeating Winnipeg Germania, 5-1. Most of the players on the Vancouver squad formed the basis of the national team in 1957.

Over the past 75 years Canadian teams have vied for the Challenge Cup on 65 occasions. The competition took a sabbatical during the two World Wars (1916-1918 and 1940-1945) and wasn't held in 1963 and 1970.

Bob Bolitho, Jim Easton, Buzz Parsons, Scott Macey, George Pakos, and Sam Lenarduzzi are some of the more recent national team players who have taken part in the Challenge Cup during their careers. Bob Bolitho scored 2

of London Boxing Club's goals in their 3-1 win over St. Lawrence in the 1976 final. Lenarduzzi scored two for Vancouver Columbus in their 10-0 shellacking of Montreal Ukraina in the 1969 championship match.

The 1986 final, which was the only Challenge Cup championship game to be shown live on national television (TSN), was won by the Hamilton Steelers. The following year the team became members of the newly formed Canadian Soccer League and reached the final of the new professional circuit in its first year of operation.

New Westminster Royals have been involved in the most national finals - 10 - and have won the Championship eight times, the last coming in 1960.

Vancouver Columbus and Victoria West have won four national championships each and Vancouver Firefighters have three national titles to their credit. ■

Mr. October does it again

Move over Reggie Jackson, Canadian soccer has produced its own Mr. October.

His name is Steve Millar, the first player to score the winning goal in both the Canadian professional and national amateur soccer finals.

And not only that, the fairly 21-year-old centre back did it all in the span of eight days in early October at Swangard Stadium.

On Sunday in the pouring rain, Millar headed in the winning goal in the 101st minute as defending champion Norvan ANAF defeated Edmonton Scottish 1-0 in the 69th Canadian senior men's final for the Air Canada Challenge Cup. A week earlier at Swangard, Millar headed in the decisive goal as the Winnipeg Fury ended the Vancouver 86ers' four-year reign as CSL champions in the Mita Cup final.

So what's it like being a two-time hero?

"It's a great feeling," Millar said after his overtime goal. "I don't think everybody gets to win two Canadian championships in a week and score the winning goal in both of them. It's definitely something I'll remember."

Millar was particularly pleased for his dad, Tom Millar, who coached Norvan to the Province Cup (B.C. championship) in May and then to Sunday's national crown.

"It's great that my dad was there to be part of it. He was also a big part of the victory. He knows the game so well. And his coaching decisions were a big part of the victory."

Tom Millar put Eamonn Ward in

as a substitute for Oliver Heald in the 68th minute. And guess who took the corner kick on which Millar headed in the winner from five yards? You guessed it—Ward.

"That one was put right on my head," said Steve Millar. "I just flicked it into the far corner. If I had missed that one I'd probably have quit the game."

The coach was elated.

"You can't ask for anything better," said Tom Millar. "To win the Canadian championship as a coach and to have his son play and score the winning goal. It makes a guy proud."


Norvan became the first team to win back-to-back Canadian championships since Vancouver Columbus in 1977-78. Prior to that, Westminster Royals (1930-31) were the last B.C. team to win two in a row.

"We're only the second B.C. team in 61 years to win back-to-back Canadian championships," said Norvan manager Gil McGarvey.

It was B.C.'s third consecutive national championship and 15th in the last 22 years.

"This is the hotbed of soccer in Canada," said Tom Millar, who as a player won a Canadian championship with Vancouver Firefighters in 1965.

CORNER KICKS — Norvan finished the eight-team tournament with a 3-0 record. Mike Dodd of the Fury missed Norvan's last two games with a pulled hamstring, while Scott Macey left Sunday in the first half with a bruised leg. Sunday's game before about 800 fans was a rough, physical affair with Norvan having two players sent off and Edmonton one.








