Strategic Highlights

Due to pre-existing problems—decades of war, drought, COVID-19, and a stagnant economy with widespread poverty and joblessness—and developments in 2021 (1442-43)—sudden regime change, abrupt cutoff of foreign aid and international financial connections, and the fleeing of working professionals while others went unpaid or became unemployed—the Afghan economy went into free fall with GDP crashing by 30 percent, causing the bulk of the Afghan population to fall into poverty followed by widespread hunger.

- “An estimated 22.8 million people—more than half the country’s population—are expected to face potentially life-threatening food insecurity this winter ... Of those, 8.7 million people are nearing famine—the worst stage of a food crisis.” — NYTimes
- “About 14 million children are expected to suffer acute levels of malnutrition this winter.” — BBC
- “... Afghanistan is on the brink of a mass starvation that ... threatens to kill a million children this winter—a toll that would dwarf the total number of Afghan civilians estimated to have been killed as a direct result of the war over the past 20 years.” — NYTimes

In view of this dire situation, Afghanistan-Pakistan Women’s Economic Empowerment (“APWEE”) had no choice but to respond to the humanitarian crisis in Afghanistan by providing emergency food assistance, prioritizing humanitarian aid to disadvantaged women including but not limited to widows, orphaned girls, disabled women, and divorced women, who have low to no income.

In view of the severe food crisis in Afghanistan, APWEE focused on providing emergency food assistance to disadvantaged Afghan women.

Looking Ahead

With your support, APWEE will continue to respond to the humanitarian crisis in Afghanistan during the winter season by providing emergency food assistance to disadvantaged women. During the spring and summer months, we will launch our small business and STEM scholarship programs in Afghanistan and Pakistan.
