1. What Actually Saves? (The Blood vs. The Statement)

- **Leviticus 17:11 (KJV):** "*For the life of the flesh is in the blood: and I have given it to you upon the altar to make an atonement for your souls: for **it is the blood that maketh an atonement for the soul.***"
- **Romans 5:9 (KJV):** "*...being now **justified by his blood**, we shall be saved from wrath through him.*"
- **The Ethiopian Liturgy (Ge'ez Tradition):** The Ethiopian Orthodox Church heavily emphasizes that salvation is purely the *Dema* (Blood) of Christ applied to human nature. No human works, no religious slogan, and no social identity saves a person—only the life poured out on the cross.

When someone relies on the phrase "*I am saved*" as a badge, they are putting faith in their **status**. When someone understands Salvation, they are putting faith in **the Blood**.

2. The Three Questions Religion Avoids

You noted that when someone declares "I am saved," it immediately triggers three fundamental follow-up questions: **How? From what? By whom?**

Religion often leaves these vague, but the Bible answers them with laser precision:

The Question	The Religious Catchphrase Answer	The True Biblical / Scriptural Answer
Who saved you?	"I saved myself by making a decision."	Jesus Christ alone through the power of His resurrection and grace (Acts 4:12).
How were you saved?	"By joining a church / saying a prayer."	By the sprinkling of His Blood and the cleansing of the Holy Ghost (1 Peter 1:2, Titus 3:5).
What were you saved from?	"Being a bad person / going to hell."	From the Wrath of God, the Curse of the Law, and the Power of Sin (Romans 5:9, Galatians 3:13).

3. Why "Salvation" and "Being Saved" get separated

Your insight that *Salvation* is a divine program while *Being Saved* is often a human perspective aligns with how the scriptures operate:

1. **Salvation is God's Program (The Blueprint):** Salvation (*Yeshua* in Hebrew, *Medshenit* in Ge'ez) is God's eternal, unchangeable, cosmic rescue plan. It was designed before the foundation of the world. It is the entire legal framework of the Blood, the Cross, the Resurrection, and the Second Coming. It exists whether a human acknowledges it or not.
2. **"Being Saved" is the Execution (The Process):** "Being saved" is simply the real-time application of that program to a mortal human being. Religion turns "I am saved" into a finished, arrogant boast. But true scripture frames it as an active, ongoing mercy.

As the Apostle Paul writes in **1 Corinthians 1:18 (KJV)**:

*"For the preaching of the cross is to them that perish foolishness; but unto us which **are saved** [literally: 'are being saved'] it is the **power of God**."*

The Verdict

You are right to separate human religious jargon from the actual Word of God.

Religion says: *"Look at me, I am saved."* The True Believer says: *"Look at Christ, His Blood paid my debt."*

The statement "I am saved" is just human language. **Salvation is the Lord's**, and it is bought, sealed, and delivered by nothing less than the divine, precious Blood of the Lamb.
