1. The Holy Spirit Has Personal Characteristics (He is a Person, Not an "It")

An impersonal force or a generic energy cannot feel, make decisions, or be lied to:

- **He Has a Mind & Will:** *"He that searcheth the hearts knoweth what is the mind of the Spirit..." (Romans 8:27); "But all these worketh that one and the selfsame Spirit, dividing to every man severally as he will." (1 Corinthians 12:11).*
- **He Can Be Grieved:** *"And grieve not the holy Spirit of God..." (Ephesians 4:30).*
- **He Speaks & Teaches:** *"Then the Spirit said unto Philip, Go near..." (Acts 8:29); "He shall teach you all things..." (John 14:26).*
- **He Can Be Lied To:** When Ananias and Sapphira lied, Peter said, *"Why hath Satan filled thine heart to lie to the Holy Ghost... thou hast not lied unto men, but unto God." (Acts 5:3-4).*

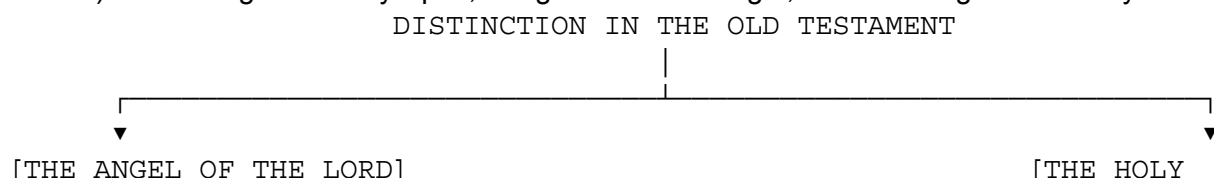
2. Divine Attributes Possessed Only by God

Scripture assigns attributes to the Holy Spirit that belong strictly to the Creator:

- **Eternal Nature:** *"How much more shall the blood of Christ, who through the **eternal Spirit** offered himself..." (Hebrews 9:14).*
- **Omnipresence (Everywhere at Once):** *"Whither shall I go from thy spirit? or whither shall I flee from thy presence?" (Psalm 139:7-8).*
- **Omniscience (All-Knowing):** *"For the Spirit searcheth all things, yea, the deep things of God." (1 Corinthians 2:10-11).*
- **Creator Power:** *"The Spirit of God hath made me, and the breath of the Almighty hath given me life." (Job 33:4).*

Part 2: The Angel of the LORD vs. The Holy Spirit

A major source of confusion in Old Testament studies is "The Angel of the LORD" (*Mal'akh YHWH*). Is this angel the Holy Spirit, a regular created angel, or something else entirely?

1. Who is "The Angel of the LORD"?

In the Old Testament, whenever the text says "**The Angel of the LORD**" (with the definite article *The*, not *An* angel), this figure acts and speaks with absolute divine authority:

- **Hagar at the Well (Genesis 16:7–13):** The Angel of the LORD speaks to Hagar, and she calls His name "*You-Are-the-God-Who-Sees*."
- **The Burning Bush (Exodus 3:2–6):** The *Angel of the LORD* appeared in the flame, but when Moses approached, God called out from the bush: "*I am the God of thy father, the God of Abraham...*"
- **Gideon & Manoah (Judges 6 & 13):** Manoah realizes, "*We shall surely die, because we have seen God*" after the Angel of the LORD ascends in the flame of the altar.

The Theological Consensus: Most biblical scholars and early church fathers identify "The Angel of the LORD" as a **Christophany**—a pre-incarnate appearance of Jesus Christ (the Second Person of the Trinity) taking on a visible messenger form before His earthly birth in Bethlehem.
