


Prayer For Spiritual Renewal

Slang of the Week: "Huzz"

The word "huzz" is a play on the word "h*es." (You might be asking, dear reader, "Didn't we just talk about 'bop,' another pejorative term about women?" You would be correct. Apparently, one such term is not enough for the modern slangscape.) Like the term "h*es," huzz can be used for derision, but it also is often used in a familiar way between friends (see also: "bruzz," a mash-up of bros and huzz). Does that mean the word is entirely wholesome and edifying? Not necessarily, but context matters a lot for the intention and impact of the word.

the case for lowercase

what it is: many young people prefer lowercase text to sentences with capital letters.


why it matters: for many teens, lowercase letters feel more informal, relaxed, and conversational. even though most smartphones start with auto-capitalization turned on, teens often disable this feature in order to avoid seeming too formal in their texts to friends and family. as gen-zer maelle kouman puts it, "lowercase feels like an ongoing conversational tone without a start or end. it removes the serious tone certain texts can exude, without even trying." gen z artists like olivia rodrigo reinforce this trend with lowercase song titles like "drivers license" (although others, like billie eilish, have resorted to all-caps titles like "BIRDS OF A FEATHER"). in professional relationships and environments, many teens still opt for standard capitalization, and this is sometimes equated on tiktok with growing up.

continue the conversation: what do you think about sentences that use capital letters as opposed to being all-lowercase?

Angling Toward the Light

What it is: A doomed anglerfish swimming from the dark depths to the sunlit surface of the ocean has captured the internet's heart this week.

Why it's connecting with people: The tale almost writes itself: an anglerfish, knowing her end is near, chooses to reject the darkness of her home and, as her final act, swims to the surface to see the sun for the first and final time. The light hitting her face—a face some might consider horrifying—is maybe the only "true" light she has ever seen. The internet's telling of the tale has been poignant, beautiful, and with a hint of tragedy. Of course, a variety of things could've motivated the fish's final exodus, but that doesn't change the empathy of the doomed anglerfish is inspiring in others.



Let's translate this one further...



Human beings use stories to make sense of the world—and some of the most enduring stories are tragedies. Orpheus goes to hell and back to rescue Eurydice, only to lose her at the last moment. Romeo and Juliet love each other but can never truly be together. An anglerfish quietly swims to see the sun as its final act. Tragedies remind us that our time on earth will, eventually, come to an end—but despite being a stark reminder that our lives are a "mist" as James describes, tragedies also remind us that what we do with that limited time has deep significance. In the Fellowship of the Ring, Frodo begins to realize that his story may end in tragedy, and in a moment of honesty, he laments to Gandalf: "I wish it need not have happened in my time,' said Frodo. 'So do I,' said Gandalf, 'and so do all who live to see such times. But that is not for them

to decide. All we have to decide is what to do with the time that is given us."

You may be thinking that this is an overly dramatic way to talk about a tiny, dying anglerfish—an anglerfish who, whether because of a malfunctioning swim bladder, misfiring instinct, or some other reason, left her perpetual darkness to spend her final moments in the light. But even a tiny, seemingly insignificant anglerfish can remind us of our hope. That even when the "nations rage" and tragedy strikes—even when life seems dark, we can still choose to follow after "the light of the world." And the difference is that instead of tragedy, the Christian's story ends with everything sad coming untrue.



Hidden in Plain Sight

What it is: Netflix's new docuseries *American Murder: Gabby Petito* sparked controversy this week for its use of AI to recreate Petito's voice.

Why it's important: The Petito family initially signed off on the use of AI in the docuseries, but later admitted it felt "weird" and "off," echoing the discomfort many viewers expressed. Some viewers felt an immediate "ick" from the AI-generated voice, not only because it sounded strange, but because it blurred ethical boundaries. This controversy hasn't kept the series from climbing the charts—currently it ranks #2 on Netflix. Still, the unsettling choice highlights how technology can shift from innovative to invasive, especially



when dealing with real-life tragedy. It also raises bigger questions about consent, respect for the deceased, and whether there are some lines technology simply shouldn't cross.

Let's translate this one further...

The use of AI to recreate Gabby Petito's voice is ironic, given the way her entire story is about the difference between perception and reality.

While Gabby's social media portrayed a sunny, carefree, #vanlife journey, the reality behind her posts was marked by manipulation, control, and domestic violence. The Netflix series reveals how sometimes, underneath a carefully orchestrated public persona, there is a person who needs help. In some cases, an innocent life may even depend on our ability to see beneath the surface. As



Jesus himself said in John 7:24: "Stop judging by mere appearances, but instead judge correctly." Social media often offers only a curated glimpse into someone's life, but Jesus urges us to see deeper—to discern truth with wisdom and compassion. Petito's story challenges us not to settle for shallow perceptions but to approach the lives of others with a heart that seeks understanding.

- How often do you wonder what might be happening behind the scenes of picture-perfect social media posts?
- How do you feel about AI being used to recreate a dead person's voice?
- What might be some warning signs that a person your age needs help?



Greetings to you in the "springtime" of our church year seasons!

We can call it "springtime" because that is what the word "Lent" means in Old English. The early church used the Greek and Latin languages. Their names for Lent (Tessarakosti—Greek & Quadragesima—Latin) simply mean "fortieth." These names recognize the forty days of Lent between Ash Wednesday and Easter Sunday. Sundays during this time are not counted within the days of Lent. The forty days end at the beginning of the Maundy Thursday worship service. Maundy Thursday, Good Friday, and Holy Saturday constitute a liturgical season, the Holy Triduum, the shortest of the church year. The forty days hearkens back to Jesus' time in the wilderness being tempted by Satan.

Lent is generally considered a time of preparation for Easter Sunday, the Day of the Resurrection of Our Lord. Christians are to focus on their fallen, sinful state and repent of that sinfulness. This focus usually involves increasing their pious practices such as prayer, fasting, and acts of charity. Often, this is referred to as joining Jesus on his way to the cross.

While typical pious practices during Lent focus Christians' attention on themselves and their sinfulness, celebrating the Transfiguration just before Ash Wednesday gives Christians a clue about where their focus should be. In all three Synoptic Gospels' accounts of the Transfiguration (Luke 9:36, Mark 9:8, & Matthew 17:8), the texts inform us that, after the cloud... after the voice... after the dazzling appearance of Jesus... and after the manifestation of Moses and Elijah... after all of that, the three disciples saw Jesus only.

When Christians focus on themselves and their sinfulness, they engage in self-centered introspection. In other words, they are curved in upon themselves; they "in curvatus in se," one of the phrases used to describe sinfulness.

The clue provided by the conclusion of the Transfiguration accounts' singular focus, "they saw Jesus only" turns Christians' Lenten focus away from themselves and their pious practices and toward Jesus Christ. Or, as indicated by the Apostle Paul, "I decided to know nothing among you except Christ and him crucified." (1 Cor. 2:2). Only in knowing Jesus Christ crucified for them do Christians come to know the depths of their sin.

May the preaching of Jesus Christ who has come to be your life, fix your focus on him, draw you through this Lenten season, and into your celebration of the Day of Resurrection for our Lord!

Recipes "Pittsburgh Pretzel"

Cook Time; 25–30 min,

Makes 2 Large Pretzels

PROVIDED BY: GAIL STOVER



Ingredients

2 cups milk

2 large eggs

½ cup butter

1 cup confectioner's sugar

2 (¼ oz.) packages active dry yeast

2 tsp. salt

1 tsp. vanilla

½ cup sugar

5 cups bleached flour

(optional) ¼ cup chopped almonds/sprinkles

Directions

- 1. Heat milk and butter till very warm 120-130 degrees.
- 2. Mix yeast, salt, sugar and 1 cup of flour 3 slowly beat into warm milk
- 3. Beat for 2 minutes.
- 4. Add eggs and 1 cup flour.
- 5. Beat another 2 minutes.
- 6. Add enough flour to form a soft dough you may not need all the 5 additional cups flour.
- 7. Knead until smooth and elastic
- 8. Place dough in a greased bowl. Let rise until doubled in bulk.
- 9. Punch down and let rise again till doubled about an hour
- 10. Divide dough in half.
- 11. Shape pretzel: Roll dough into a rope about 30 inches long and 1 1/2 inches in diameter. Cross the ends leaving a large loop in the center. Flip loop onto crossed ends to form a Pretzel.
- 12. Repeat with remaining dough.
- 13. Place dough onto teased baking sheets and let rise 15 minutes more.
- 14. Bake at 375 for 25 -30 until golden brown. Cool on wire racks.
- 15. Mix confectioner's sugar, water and vanilla to for a thin icing. Drizzle icing on pretzels and Sprinkle with chopped almonds/sprinkles.

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
