
Review the basic etiquette for the electronic meeting on this issue under "Leadership."

This past month, I attended the Area C Conference where attendees received a presentation by the CFWC First Vice President Barbara Briley-Beard on report writing and a Keynote address by the CFWC State President Pam Ament. The Meet-the-Chairs online events have been jam-packed with information. The first meeting had 33 pages of supporting paperwork; the second week had 16 pages. Most of these pages can be found in the CFWC yearbook. The State Chairs

covered a lot of ground during these meetings. In the past couple of years, the input that I've heard from Club members in leadership roles, was that they felt "unprepared" for the tasks that they have been given. Going into this term, I have made it my goal to connect you to a wide range of resources so that you can confidently perform the duties that you have taken on. I hope that you are taking advantage of these available resources and sharing them with your Club members.

The second week of November, I emailed a Report Writing tutorial video to our Club Presidents, Deans and District Chairs. This tutorial serves as a guide on how to navigate the CFWC website and where to locate this year's report writing forms. The video analytics show that the tutorial has been watched nearly 100 times. This tells me that members are accessing it and hopefully finding it useful. By the time this newsletter goes to press, I should be able to retrieve the most current report writing forms and have the packets emailed to each club. Reports are due to the District by January 11, 2021.

In the November District newsletter, I suggested composing your club's description that will go at the beginning of each Club Award Entry Cover Sheet. Below is the paragraph that I have included for the District's reports:

Los Cerritos District is comprised of eleven (11) clubs ranging in membership from small (12 members) to large (75 members) for a total membership of 386 members. Our membership is diverse and includes five (5) male members. Our District is located southeast of the City of Los Angeles in the Gateway Cities Region, within the County of Los Angeles. Our District Executive Committee and District Board meetings meet ten (10) months out of the year with our Convention held in April. In August of this year, we began holding our meetings via video conferencing. To gain full access to the digital and audio platform, Los Cerritos District maximized our Civic Membership benefits with our local Chamber of Commerce. Los Cerritos District was organized in March 1956 and Incorporated in May 1957.

The information for the GFWC/CFWC Writing, Photography and Arts & Crafts Contests has been included in this issue. It is the District's intention to collect these submissions prior to the Fine Arts Festival that is scheduled for *January 25, 2021. The submissions will be collected, judged and then displayed during the Fine Arts Festival.

CFWC 2021 CONVENTION (CFWC QuickBytes November 9, 2020 Issue)

The dates for the convention are May 12–15, 2021 at the Sheraton Cerritos Hotel. CFWC President, Pam Ament and convention chairs, Priscilla Bolinder and Edie Seger would like input from members to help in making decisions about the convention. At this point we do not know what the virus situation will be at that time. Foremost in our minds is the safety of our members when we are able to meet in person.

It has been suggested that we consider a location other than a hotel. Please keep in mind that the hotel has a deposit from CFWC with no guarantee it will be refunded. Mentioned as possibilities are a casino or a Clubhouse large enough to accommodate over 100 people. The Clubhouse would have to have their own inhouse caterer. Social distancing could be an issue at either venue. In either case, members would have to make their own arrangements for where to stay overnight. It would also be possible to have a convention meeting on Zoom.

LEADERSHIP

Etiquette of Electronic Meetings – The basic practices below were pulled from a CFWC Executive Board Call posted by Jean Lash, CFWC Meeting Planner. It is applicable at all levels of Federation meetings. The only thing I would add is that

when you are participating on any video or web conferencing platform as a Los Cerritos District member, be it: Area C, Meet-the-Chairs, WSR or any other State or GFWC trainings or meetings, please remember that you are a representative from our District. Please be sure to put your best foot forward.

Before your meeting

- Try to hold meetings in a quiet, indoor location.
- Adjust your lighting. Don't sit directly in front or beside a bright light source.
- Think about your background. Try to provide a nice, plain background.
- Practice speaking to the camera and not the screen. Our tendency is to look at the person on the screen, but you should look at the camera when you speak.
- Be on Time!

During your meeting

Mute your microphone. Zoom has a "Mute Microphone" option that cuts down on ambient feedback for the audience. Use the "raise hand" feature (not your arm) to let the meeting organizer know you have input and you'd like to be acknowledged without interrupting the

- Do NOT speak until you are called upon!
- Use Zoom's chat function. You can send a question to everyone or privately to a participant.
- However, constant "chat" with others is like talking at the table, therefore, only questions will be posted in "chat" as are necessary for the continuation of Business. The questions will be
- moderated and may, or, may not be answered during the meeting.
- Think about your actions on camera. Always remember that everyone can see you so, stay seated and stay present, try not to eat, leave the keyboard alone, and speak up!



WRITING, PHOTOGRAPHY AND ARTS & CRAFTS

As 2020 comes to a close, it's time to complete your GFWC/CFWC Writing, Photography, and Arts & Crafts entries. The District-level submission date is January 11, 2021 as posted in the District yearbook. This date was chosen to allow enough time to collect, judge, exhibit and submit winning entries to the State. All entries that go on to State/National must be submitted by duespaying members of an active GFWC Club. All entries (Creative Writing and Photography) must include a signed GFWC Creative Arts Waiver form. Contest packets will be sent to each club containing the contest rules and forms. Student entries will only be accepted for judging at District-level.

Writing Contest:

(Entries due to CFWC by Monday, March 1, 2021)

Contest Rules: Authors must be amateurs. Entries may not have been published prior to competition and must be original works by the author. Short stories are limited to 2,000 words. Poetry entries can be any style with a minimum length of eight lines and a maximum of 50 lines. One entry per member per category. All entries must have been completed in the 2020 calendar year. Entries must be:

- Typed, double-spaced, printed on one side only;
- Have minimum margins of one inch on all four sides;
- On 8.5" x 11" paper.

Entries must have the following on the top right-hand corner of each page:

- Author's name, email address, mailing address, and phone number;
- Name of author's GFWC Club and State Federation;
- Category;
- Title of Work

Disclaimer: Manuscripts will not be returned. Authors should keep a copy for themselves.

Photography Contest:

(Entries due to CFWC by Monday, April 19, 2021)

There are two main categories for the photography contest:

- I. THE WORLD IN PICTURES: These photographs showcase the people, places and things at home and around the world that impact our lives in a meaningful way, as expressed in these 3 categories:
- a. OUR WORLD UP CLOSE Create a visual that offers a novel viewpoint or a macro image that takes the viewer into a whole new, tiny world.
- b. NATURAL WONDERS Use wide angles and panoramas, or moody landscape images, to showcase mountains, meadows, sand hills, rivers, waterfalls, oceans, deserts, or any other magnificent vista.
- c. REFLECTIONS Feature a setting, situation or landmark that brings back poignant memories, or capture a fleeting image reflected in glass, water, or another mirrored surface.
- 2. GFWC LIVING THE VOLUNTEER SPIRIT: These photographs capture the special moments in the lives of GFWC clubwomen as they meet, plan, advocate, volunteer, or celebrate, in groups or one-on-one.

All photographs must meet the following requirements: Photos must be the original work of the member submitting the photograph. Photos may be in portrait (vertical) of landscape (horizontal) mode. All entries must be 8" X 10" and mounted on a rigid board that does not exceed 3/8" in width. All entries must have a label affixed to the back noting the contest name, the photographer's name, email and mailing address, phone number, supporting Club name and State, title, a brief caption providing a few details about the photograph, and an arrow indicating the top of the photograph. All photography entries must have been completed in the 2020 calendar year *providing a special allowance for two years of photographs for the 2021 contest since the 2020 contest was not held.

ARTS & CRAFT SHOW:

(First Place District entries will be entered in the State Convention Art Show in May 2021)

CFWC CRAFT CATEGORIES: Quilting (Hand, Machine), Apparel Sewing, Knitting, Weaving, Crochet, Counted Cross Stitch, Other Needlework (Embroidery, etc.), General Crafts, Trashto-Treasure, Glass (Stained, Blown or Fused), Sculpture (Any media), Pottery, Jewelry, and Basketry. All entries must have been completed in the 2020 calendar year.

CFWC ART CATEGORIES:

Watercolor: Portrait/Scenic/Still Life: novice and advanced

Oil or Other Medium: Portrait/Scenic/Still Life: novice and advanced

China Painting: novice and advanced

Entries in this category should be created in the prior two years.

Novice = 3 or less / Advanced = 3 or more years

Guidelines: One entry per member in each category.

- Must be 24" x 30" or smaller.
- May not contain glass.
- Must be original in concept.
- Each submission must include entry form label affixed to the back.

Rubbermaid Food Storage Recycling Program

This program is a free, national recycling solution for typically hard-to-recycle waste streams. As part of a commitment to sustainability, **Rubbermaid®** is partnering with **TerraCycle®** to provide a recycling solution for well-used plastic food storage containers.

How does it work? Los Cerritos District signs up for the recycle program, we collect the well-used containers, download free shipping labels, and send the waste via UPS to be recycled.
 The recycling programs offered by TerraCyle are funded by brands, manufacturers, and retailers around the world.

How can I participate? As we head into the holiday season, sort through your piles of plastic food storage containers. If you have any Rubbermaid containers that have seen better days, put them aside. They will be collected and shipped once we meet again in 2021. If you need to get rid of the containers before then, send me a message and I can arrange for a pick-up. Please make sure the containers are clean and dry. Although the recycling program is specifically for Rubbermaid, the website shows that all BRANDS of plastic food containers will be accepted. NO plastic shoe boxes or glass containers will be collected.

What happens to your containers? Once collected, the containers are cleaned and melted into plastic that can be remolded to make new recycled products, like picnic tables and watering cans. This recycling is more important than you might imagine, as the U.S. uses more than 14 million tons of plastic each year, and 10 million of those end up in landfills.

• The goal of the program, explained by TerraCycle Founder and CEO Tom Szaky is, "offering consumers a unique opportunity to divert waste from landfills and responsibly dispose of food storage containers that may initially seem unrecyclable."

HEDY LAMARR

(Actress and Female Inventor)

Born Hedwig Eva Maria Kiesler in September 9, 1914. She was Austrian and was born in Vienna, Austria-Hungary. Her father was a bank manager and her mother was a pianist. She was raised as a Catholic but was not baptized. At an early age she had an interest in acting and really got into Theatre and film. When she was 12 years old, she won a beauty contest in Vienna. She helped get her mother out of Austria when the Germans marched in and took control. Her mother was Jewish and would have been in terrible

danger if she stayed. In the U.S. her mother became a U.S. citizen. Hedy became a U.S. citizen also later on.

Hedy went to work as a script girl when she was 16. She was able to secure some work as an extra on some films and the producer was so impressed with her acting that he took her with him to Berlin. She was an actress in several films and then the film that launched her to fame and stardom was Ecstasy (1933). The film was both well done and notorious for the sex it portrayed. Well liked in Europe it was banned in the United States. Because of her Jewish heritage the film was eventually banned in Germany. Not only was she well received in the films she acted in, she was very beautiful. She married Fredrich Mandi, an arms dealer with connections to Mussolini and Hitler. She was forced to stop acting by her controlling husband. She fled from her husband and went to Paris. Hedy was hired by Louis B. Mayer and, to distance herself from the Ecstasy movie, changed her last name to Lamarr.

She was shy off set and couldn't understand why anyone would want a picture of her. She was lonely and stayed away from crowds. She could be warm, and she possessed a magnetism which drove people crazy.

In her first film in the U.S., the audience gasp when they saw her beauty and she was off and running. Films like: Take this Woman, Lady of the Tropics, Boom Town, Ninotchka, which was a hit. She also starred in "Come Live with Me" where she portrayed a refugee from Vienna. Not too hard for her to relate to. Her stardom began to fade in the early 1950's. Her father spent a considerable amount of time explaining how things machines and devices worked. She started inventing things in her spare time. She put together a workshop and tinkered in it to all hours of the night.

She offered her services to the war effort and went on tour to sell War Bonds to the tune of \$25,000,000. She continued in films for several studios. She stared in the 1950 film Samson and Delilah which won 2 Academy Awards. It was said that only Hedy Lamarr could be Delilah, beautiful and treacherous.

She was an inventor who came up with a technology to stop the Germans from jamming radio-controlled torpedoes, which was called a frequency-hopping signal which could not be tracked or jammed. She took out a patent on it. This invention formed the basis for Wi-Fi, Bluetooth, GPS and cell phones operations we use today. She even considered leaving acting and going to Washington to join the National Inventers Council. She invented a fluorescent dog collar, a better stop light, modification to the Concorde airliner. She had many more inventions to her name such as a proximity for anti-aircraft shells. She even came up with a tablet you could put in a glass of water and have yourself a Coca Cola. She said this didn't work at all. Hedy married and divorced 6 times and had 3 children James, Denise and Anthony. She died in 2000 at the age of 85

She was beautiful, talented and extremely intelligent and an inventor extraordinaire. In the time period she grew up in she was a most remarkable individual. "Any girl can be glamorous. All you have to do is stand still and look stupid". (Hedy Lamarr)




