Report writing is done! Thank you all for getting your reports in to me. For some of our chairmen, this was the first time they've ever written a report. Well done for working outside of your comfort zone. I'm including some notes here that we can include in next year's report writing workshop:

• Some reports that were submitted had projects written as Community Service

Programs – it's important that our club chairmen, who are often the ones writing the reports, understand that "Penny Pines" is a project and "Environment" is the program that it goes under. A good way to remember this is that there is an Environment Chair, however, there isn't a Penny Pines Chair. Since this occurred on several reports, it may be a good idea to go over it with your chairmen by making a game of it. List several "projects" that your club is involved with and have your chairmen match it with the Community Service Program. See the "Where to Report it" guide that is posted on the CFWC website and included the CFWC yearbook.

• I also received some reports that did not include a club description. Each club report has to include a club description so that the reader knows who you are. Although I am the one who receives the reports on the district-level, the reports do not stay with me. Outside judges read the reports and so do the State Chairs. They need the information that is included in the description to know more about your club.

• It's important that those who are writing these reports attend the report writing workshops. Many of us are visual learners, including myself. It's easier to grasp a concept fully when someone has watched a report being composed. Because of this, we may need to conduct some hands-on, instructional workshops with those who are actually completing the reports (not only a representative from the club).

• Some club reports were submitted in pen and ink. While it's important that the district receives the reports, volunteer hours, dollars donated, etc., please note that reports that are submitted in pen and ink are not judged. In the report writing materials, it specifies that the font used should be at 11-point or higher (although it was stated in the Leadership pamphlet that it could be 10-point font).

• Lastly, multiple projects from the same program are to be included in ONE report. Example: a club report for Civic Engagement may include military coupons as a project. You do not need to write a separate Civic Engagement report from the same club that includes a project for Veteran donations. Only one club report should be submitted under the Civic Engagement program; this report would include both military coupons and Veteran donation projects. Club reports are limited to 3 pages each.

I hope that this information is helpful. If there was something that you struggled with during this report writing period, please feel free to share it with me. We can address it in the next report writing workshop. Sending you a big round of applause for all of the work that you do all year long!

LAKEWOOD CLUB BULLETIN ARTICLE

Lakewood's Women's was organized in 1953. Our Club is made up of 42 women and 1 man. Our club includes three smaller sections: Hearth & Horizons, Garden Groomers and an evening group. Last year was challenging due to the Covid-19 pandemic.

During the first three months of 2020, our members donated, prepared and served dinner to residents of Fisher House. Fisher House is a home where military and veteran's families can stay free of charge while a loved one is in the Long Beach VA hospital. In February we held our club's Annual Silver Tea. Also in February, our club was chosen by the city of Lakewood as one of twenty service clubs to be given a "Legends of Lakewood Award". This award is given to organizations that have contributed to Lakewood's development and success. In early March 2020, our club held a successful Quartermania, enabling us to continue our support of the Lakewood Senior Center and two local libraries. We also awarded scholarships to two local high school sophomores. In December we participated in Project Shepard by adopting two families. This program helps provide food for a holiday meal and other items families requested at Christmas time. Since several Club Chairs had little or no experience with writing our end of year reports, we met as a group to work on reports together. This enabled us to share information to include which might have otherwise been overlooked. This method of report writing was so successful we will continue to use this approach every year.

After the safer-at-home orders were issued in March, we were unable to meet in-person for our meetings and were very limited in our usual club activities. Our club rose to the challenge though, learning to hold meetings via Zoom and Web-Ex. During these on- line sessions, we revised and updated our club by-laws. Our club also created a Facebook page.

Last summer as everyone was growing weary of the safer-at-home lifestyle we were all following, one of our members decided to host a weekly lunch in her back yard. Several of our members live by themselves so these lunches provided a much needed opportunity to connect with each other. Masks were worn and we practice social distancing in our seating on her back patio as we enjoyed a sack lunch. These lunches did an amazing job of lifting everyone's spirit.

What an amazing experience it was to see our member's resilience and determination to continue to enhance the lives of others as we continue to stay true to our mission of making Lakewood a better place to live.

SUGGESTIONS TO HELP SPREAD THE WORD ABOUT YOUR CLUB AND ESO – Include a club flyer and ESO brochure in books you donate. Make sure there is a contact method – you may get members.

Establish a Free Little Library and keep it well stocked. Add 3x5 cards with your opinion in books. Add your contact information if you are comfortable with that.

Create bookmarks with club information to put in all donated books. Keep them simple and fun. Start a book group in your neighborhood. Share what you are reading.

Start a kid's story corner in your neighborhood. Blankets on the lawn help with social distancing.

ESO READING REQUIREMENTS

The first three ESO reding levels require the reader to write a brief report on what they learned from the book and their opinion. One or two sentences is sufficient.

The report form (newly revised) is located on the CFWC website (www.cfwc.org). Each form reports four books to complete a single category. A cover sheet verifies the level completion.

Reading may be from the suggested reading list or the reader's choice as long as the book fits to a category. Audio books and Kindle books are also acceptable for reporting. A book may fit into several categories but may only be reported in one, of the member's choice.

These reports are handed in to the club chairperson. If there is no club chairperson, the reports are given to the District Chairperson. The District chairperson notifies the State Chairperson of a member's completion of a level and the member's accomplishment is recognized.

DID YOU KNOW?

Hours spent reading and submitting required paperwork is reportable under Education on your club hours sheets.

Benefits multiply when you read!

ESO LEVELS

PLEDGE: A member completes an ESO Pledge application, returning it to the club or District Chairperson to verify participation in the program.

MEMBERSHIP: Read and report on a total of 16 books (4 books from 4 different categories). On completion of this level, the member is eligible to purchase and wear the ESO pin and will be awarded a certificate and ID for the level.

STAR: Read and report on a total of 40 books (4 books from 10 different categories). The achievement will be recognized with a certificate and ID for the level.

TORCH: Read and report on 64 books (4 books from 16 different categories). Recognition will be awarded, and the member will be eligible to purchase and wear the torch guard on their ESO pin.

CENTURY LEVEL: Read 100 books. This level does not require reports. An Excel spreadsheet with author and title is sufficient. Members may include any other information deemed important.

With each 100 books read and submitted, an additional century level is reached, up to nine. Certificates are awarded for each century completed.

DIAMOND: A Diamond Award is given when a member has completed 1,000 books. Recognition will be given for this accomplishment.
