Parliamentarian: Barbee Heiny

GFWC Parliamentarian, Deen J. Meloro suggests that bylaws be amended by adding a new article to the bylaws just before "Dissolution". It could be titled "Emergencies" or whatever you feel is best. Suggested wording: "In the case of a national emergency, state emergency, or any type of event (man-made or natural) that could potentially put members in danger, the President, with the consent of the Board of Directors (or Executive Committee), may order elections be held by mail. See suggestions below for state, district or clubs.

STATE: A ballot will be sent to each voting member eligible to vote at State Convention. The voted ballots will be returned by US Postal Service mail by the designated deadline. Each club will be entitled to as many votes as the number of delegates it is allotted when a convention is held.

Districts: Similar wording, but make it fit your district.

Clubs: Each member will be sent a ballot. The voted ballots will be returned by US Postal Service mail by the designated deadline.

Since this proposal says that a ballot will be





sent to each club (or member), that would allow emailing the ballot if the bylaws allow communication electronically. Otherwise, the ballot must be sent by USPS mail.



If they are new to the Chairmanship, they can introduce themselves and gather information i.e., scheduled events, an in-kind donation items list, ask if the shelter can send you literature to share, etc. You can also reach out to your local law enforcement agency to find out if they accept items such as teddy bears for children in crisis. Contact your city council, county supervisor or other elected officials to find out what resources they provide when someone is in need of help. Keep a file of this information and share it during club's reports of chairmen or submit it in your club's newsletter.

Fannie Coralie Perkins

Few people know much about Frances Perkins. She arrived on the scene when the country was in the Great Depression. What she accomplished changed this country forever.

Frances became the Secretary of Labor for FDR and as such was the first woman in US history to become a cabinet member. She was tasked by FDR to find a way to bring the country out of the Great Depression. Frances put together the "New Deal" to get the country out of its economic crisis.

Fannie Coralie Perkins was born in 1880 in Boston but always felt her roots were in Maine. During her childhood years she heard stories of the family's history which included the French and Indian War, The Revolutionary War where her family fought for Independence. Frances was employed as a secretary at the age of 15 for a Civil War general Oliver Howard as he had lost



an arm, in the war, and needed help. She was deeply patriotic and took pride in her family past history. She attended Mount Holyoke College where she was called "Perk" by her classmates. She studied American Economic history and when visiting factories and work houses was appalled by the work women and children had to do in the factories. She saw dangerous working conditions, long hours, low pay, and no health insurance compensation. From this came. "I had to do something about unnecessary hazards of life, unnecessary poverty. It was sort of up to me. This feeling sprang out of a period of great philosophical confusion which overtakes all young people."

In 1910 Frances became Executive Secretary of the New York City Consumer League. Here she focused on sanitary regulations, fire protection for factories and laws to limit the number of hour's women and children had to work in the factories to 54 per week. She was appointed as a New York State Industrial Commissioner. In 1928 the new governor, Franklin D. Roosevelt, made her the state's Industrial Commissioner with oversight of the whole Labor Department. In 1930 things were looking bad for the US employment and as President Hoover was telling the American people things were getting better Frances challenged him and said things were getting worst. She was right as in 1933 the US went into an economic depression. She convinced FDR to incorporate a program of unemployment insurance which made him the first public official in the country to commit to this plan.

In 1933 FDR was elected president of the United States and he brought along Frances to be the head of the Department of Labor. But she told him she would only accept the position if he committed to a 40 hour work week, a minimum wage, unemployment compensation, workers compensation, abolition of child labor, Social Security and universal health insurance. Roosevelt endorsed all her priorities. Perkins pushed for a strong public work programs to get people back to work again. This would be known as the Civilian Conservation Corp. (CCC).

1935 FDR signed into law the Social Security Act which provided unemployment compensation, old age pensions, and money for the needy and disabled. 1938 saw FDR enact The Fair Labor Standards Act which had minimum wage and maximum hours to work and no more child labor. The only item she did not get through was health care for all.

While FDR got the credit and is remembered in history for these ground breaking social acts, it was a woman named Frances Perkins who was the architect of the New Deal. She served until Roosevelt's death in 1945 then President Truman appointed her to the United States Civil Service Commission which she stayed in until 1953. Perkins died in New York City May 14, 1965 and is buried

• in Maine. Today we still have her reforms in use. What a Lady!!
