
One more thing, please follow the "Chain of Inquiry" which you can find on page 58 of the District Yearbook.

In September, I attended the GFWC summer webinar series. These six recorded webinars consisted of workshops in Leadership, Legislation/Public Policy, Communications & Public Relations, Juniors' Special Program: Advocates for Children, Membership and the GFWC Signature Program: Domestic Violence Awareness and Prevention. Each workshop offered a useful handout and an

educational component. The workshop handouts will be disseminated to the corresponding District Chair and Club Deans. Because we are at home more than ever due to this pandemic, it is a good time to brush up on your knowledge in these Programs and Advancement Areas.

There are many resources available through CFWC and GFWC but not everyone is aware of or knows how to access these resources. It is my personal goal to help bridge that gap. For any member who has purchased anything through the GFWC Marketplace, you already have a member account. For any member who doesn't have an account set up, I urge you to do so. The **GFWC Member Portal** not only allows you to shop and sign up for events, it also gives you access to the members-only digital library. Here you can find helpful resources for recruiting and building club membership, as well as, download forms, certificates, club anniversary order forms, an in-kind donation guide, the 2020-2022 Club Manual and so much more!

My Digital Library can be found directly under your Profile icon on the upper right corner of the screen. Because I want to be sure all of our members have access to this resource, I am assigning a two-part homework assignment plus some extra credit if you want brownie points. For the first part of this assignment, I ask that you take some time to log-on to the GFWC Member Portal (some of you may need to set this up), locate "My Digital Library" and look through the index and files.

For the second part of the assignment, click on "My Profile" on the GFWC Member Portal and scroll down to **Communication Preferences**. Here you will see a toggle for email. If you slide the toggle to opt-in, four choices will appear: Events, General, News & Notes, and WHRC News. You can click on all of them or choose which ones you would like to receive. Most of you should already be receiving GFWC News & Notes. I, also, find the Women's History and Resource Center quarterly publication very informative. I understand that not all of our members use the internet and so having a Chairman assigned to receive this information via email and report on it, is perfectly acceptable.

Programs Forum on Facebook. Again, I realize not everyone uses social media, so please assign this to someone from your club. This members-only Facebook group is administered by the GFWC Communications and Public Relations, Leadership, and Membership Advancement Chairmen. They, along with the other Advancement Chairmen, the Community Service Program Chairmen, and Special Program Chairmen, will share various tips, strategies, and real-world tools for you to use to strengthen and grow your local clubs. Here you'll have access to monthly live mini workshops, live video streams, interviews, as well as live Q & A's and daily posts designed to help support, inspire, and empower our membership. In order to join, you will need to first answer and submit questions about your club membership. Again, the point in all of this is to make sure that each of the clubs in our district have access to as many resources that are available. Of course, if you need assistance in any step of this process, please feel free to contact me.

REPORT WRITING - With our district not physically meeting until the new year rolls around, the Report Writing Workshop will take place via video. I am currently working out the logistics of this endeavor and will have more information as it comes.

By the time this October newsletter goes out, I will have attended the CFWC Fall Board and will have received all of the report writing information from the state. My aim is to send the report writing paperwork to each club in the month of November and then have an informative video available that can be watched at your leisure. With Covid-19 these patients have been isolated from all outsiders since March, 2020. They are alone and except for Face time and phone this is all they have to communicate with the outside world. Not even family members can enter the hospital. What few know is that many have no immediate family members, so they are all alone.







Deborah Sampson-Soldier Continental Army



Deborah Sampson was born December 17, 1760 in Plympton, Massachusetts. Her father deserted the family while she was young. Her mother did not have the means to take care of her, so as was the custom Deborah was sent to live with relatives. She moved around and ended up as an indentured servant. She had no formal education as women were not expected to go to school. She learned to read and write from the children she cared for. When she was 18 her indentured servant time was over. Deborah taught school in the summer and worked as a weaver in the winter. She was very skilled and stayed with the families she worked for. She developed woodworking skills and mechanical skills.

Deborah was considered tall for a woman at 5'-9". Most women were 5' and men topped 5'-8". She had a strong build and was not considered pretty which would come to serve her. In 1872 Sampson enlisted in the army and was quickly discovered as a woman and sent home. Not to be deterred she enlisted a second time under the name Robert Shirtliff and served in an "elite" light infantry unit of the 4th Massachusetts Regiment. Because of her height and size no one suspected her as a woman. She bound her breast to complete the deception. Deborah (Robert) was involved in several battles and in one action outside Tarrytown, New York, her thigh was hit with 2 musket balls and her head was injured. She begged her fellow soldiers to let her die as she would be found out as a woman. She left the hospital before her thigh was examined and she removed one of the lead balls herself. She left the second one as she was unable to pull it out. The ball remained there for the rest of her life. Her leg did not heal right and Deborah was assigned new duties. After the Battle of Yorktown, the war was considered over and her unit was sent north to Philadelphia to quell a rebellion of American soldiers demanding their back pay and discharge papers. While there, she became very ill and at this time a doctor discovered her secret. He did not inform anyone that in fact she was a woman. When she was well the doctor sent her to the commanding general with a note. She figured this was the end of her time in the Army and she was right. No charges were presented and she was discharged quietly and given some money to go home with.

With the Army behind her she was married to Benjamin Gannett in 1785 and lived in Sharon, Mass. They had 3 children, a boy and 2 girls and adopted and orphan girl. They all lived on a small farm which did not do well during the post war depression. Sampson petitioned the state legislature for her back pay which was denied to her for being a woman. Eventually she received her pay. She gave lectures about gender roles and would go up on stage in her uniform. She was a good friend of Paul Revere and after some time and effort she was placed on the Invalid Pension Roll and was eventually given \$76.80 per year.

Deborah Sampson died of yellow fever on April 29, 1827 at age 66. Deborah was an extraordinary woman. She worked her way up and never gave up and was a true American. Life was hard on her but she never conceded defeat and constantly strove to better herself, her family and those around her. In a time when no woman in her right mind would go into the military, she did and performed her duties the same as any man and was severely wounded. What a great story of a female veteran for Memorial Day.
