Interesting Facts about the month of October

October 11 Columbus Day is a U.S. holiday that commemorates the landing of Christopher Columbus in the Americas in 1492. For many, the holiday is a way of both honoring Columbus' achievements and celebrating Italian-American heritage.

I recently learned about The Tunnel to Towers Foundation during the Woman's Club of Artesia-Cerritos September General Board meeting. This is one of their club's charities. If your club has any charities that you'd like to share with the district, please be sure to send us the information. We'd love to hear about them.

The **Tunnel to Towers Foundation** was started in memory of Firefighter Stephen Siller, who sacrificed his life on September 11, 2001 to save others by strapping 60 pounds of gear on his back and running through the Brooklyn Battery Tunnel to the Twin Towers. The Tunnel to Towers Foundation builds specially-adapted custom designed *smart homes* for catastrophically injured veterans and provides mortgage-free homes to Gold Star and fallen first responder families with young children. Each home is designed to address the unique needs of each individual. *Smart homes* host a myriad of features such as automated doors and lighting, wider halls and doorways, special showers to accommodate wheelchairs, automatic door openers, cabinets, counters, and stove tops that can be raised and low-ered, back-up generators, and central heating and air conditioning systems that can be controlled by tablets. These homes help our most severely injured veterans and first responders to reclaim their day-to-day independence. For more information about this program, visit https://t2t.org/

OCTOBER IS DOMESTIC VIOLENCE AWARENESS MONTH

Message from Katherine George Chu

First, in regards to the article that is posted by the CFWC Domestic & Sexual Violence Awareness Chair, please be aware that the time for the Tillie Black Bear Women Are Sacred Day Webinar in our time zone is from **12:00-1:30 PDT**.

Violence Against Native American Women - In addition to signing up for the workshop listed, I have also registered for the Peer to Peer Training: A Virtual Peer Led Primer on Responding to Missing and Murdered Indigenous Relatives through the National Indigenous Women's Resource Center. This is a three-day workshop and I will report on it after its completion.

Military Sexual Abuse – Senate Bill 352 was just signed by Governor Newsom. This California bill addresses sexual harassment and assault in the military. Following the tragic death of U.S. Army Specialist Vanessa Guillen, there was a major push for change in how the military handles reports of sexual harassment and assault. SB 352 makes sexual harassment a stand-alone offense in California's incorporation of the Uniform Code of Military Justice, thus removing any question that sexual harassment is punishable in California's military ranks. This was a California Legislative Women's Caucus priority bill in partnership with Lieutenant Governor Eleni Kounalakis.

Teen Dating Violence Awareness - What is Dating Violence?

Dating abuse is when one partner tries to exert power or control over his or her dating partner. It can be a pattern of abusive behaviors that develop over time. Unfortunately, violence in dating relationships is not uncommon: statistics show that 1 in 3 teenagers has experienced dating violence. Dating violence can affect <u>anyone</u>. Although most victims are women, who are also at greater risk for serious injury, it affects men as well. Every relationship is different, and sometimes it can be hard to tell when it has crossed the line from healthy to unhealthy. But, there are warning signs of abuse. The following are signs that your relationship may be going in the wrong direction:

Checking your cell phone or email without permission Constantly putting you down Extreme jealousy or insecurity Explosive temper Isolating you from family or friends Making false accusations Mood swings Physically hurting you in any way Possessiveness Telling you what to do

The Committee has been given the numbers of members and clubs who have joined the Legislation Action Center (LAC). Totally, nationwide, there are 7,458 member registrations. We want to increase that number to 10,000 by May 2022.

California has 911 members in the LAC. That is only 8% of our membership.

Heifer International has long recognized the benefits of bees to the welfare of impoverished people worldwide. By providing them with the hives and guidance to become beekeepers they have an opportunity to lift themselves from poverty and live more stable lives. A healthy hive can double the fruit and vegetable yields on small farms allowing them to earn enough income to support their families. Honey, wax and pollen from the hives, provide steady, reliable profits even in non-producing months. Most importantly, with the continuous supply of nutritious honey, children will not know hunger.

A gift to the Heifer Fill the Hive program supports the environment and increases the global population of honey bees. The training and support provided to women empowers them to become agents for the life sustaining improvements their families will realize.

Save the Honey Bees is President Pam Ament's Special Project. Any donations to purchase honey bee hives from Heifer International will lead to a future free from hunger and poverty.

Parliamentary Instruction for Nominations for District Office:

As you consider candidates for District office, please be mindful of the following requirements from Articles XI and XII of our District bylaws:

ARTICLE XI NOMINATIONS Section 1. A Nominating Committee of five (5) and five (5) alternates shall be elected from the floor of the District Convention in the non-election year. Three (3) members shall be from the Executive Board. No member may serve more than one consecutive term. Section 2. The Parliamentarian shall convene and instruct the nominating committee, at which time a chairman shall be elected. Section 3. Clubs nominating members shall send a list of the nominee's qualifications to the Chairman of the Nominating Committee before the January Executive Board meeting. Nominations from Clubs will close February 1st. Section 4. The names of the nominees shall be read at the February Board meeting. Nominations from the floor shall be in order. Consent of the nominee must accompany the nomination. The committee shall complete the slate by March 1st.

ARTICLE XII ELIGIBILITY Section 1. To be elected for office in the District, candidates shall be nominated by the Club in which they hold membership. Section 2. Eligibility for the office of President: a. Shall have served one term of two years as District First Vice-President or District Second Vice-President. b. Shall have served one term as a District Federated Chairman. c. Shall have served one year as President of a Federated Club. Section 3. Eligibility for the office of First Vice-President: a. Shall have served one term of two years (or major portion thereof) as an elected officer on the Executive Committee. b. Shall have served one term as a District Chairman. c. Shall have served one year as a President of a Federated Club. d. She shall fill the vacancy of the President if such a vacancy occurs. e. Shall not be a member of the same Club as the President. Section 4. All candidates must be members of Federated Clubs in the District and shall have served one year on the District Board. Section 5. Officers shall not hold the same office in more than one District at the same time. Section 6. No officer may hold the same office for two consecutive terms except for the Treasurer who may serve one additional term.

WOMEN'S HISTORY AND RESOURCE CENTER

In 1892, the Committee on the Federation Badge Pin was created to design an image that would reflect the aim of GFWC. Appointees included GFWC's founder, Jane Cunningham Croly, and its first president, Charlotte Emerson Brown. The Committee chose the sun's rays and the color blue as elements to symbolize the Federation. The resulting pin, GFWC's original emblem, featured an image of the rising sun in a blue sky above snow-capped mountains with its rays illuminating "GFWC" in block lettering. An upturned, russet-colored banner displayed the motto, "Unity in Diversity."



The WHRC Heritage Pin offers a faithful facsimile of the original emblem on an updated lapel pin with a magnetic back. Proceeds from the sale of the WHRC Heritage Pin will be used to repair or replace portrait frames in GFWC's historic collection of GFWC International Past Presidents' portraits. The pin is available for purchase through the GFWC Marketplace.
