Larry Schmidt was equally surprised when immediate Past President Gil Parker called him to the podium to hand him the President's Club Service Award for his efforts in supporting the club throughout the year.

On the other hand, Ron Forbes had more than an inkling that he was going to be the recipient of the Incomplete Angler award. His multiple foe paws throughout the year, including a series at the Bridgeport outing, drew the attention of, "The Shadow" and moved him to the front of the pack. He culminated and cinched the selection by breaking his arm while inspecting Pinecrest Lake only days before the annual dinner.

In addition to the club's traditional awards, a plaque was given to Sandy Adams, an employee of SJ County Parks and Rec. for recognizing the 40 years of support the county has provided the club by furnishing the facilities at Oak Grove park and the work together on the two trout bouts and the catfish derby.

Another special award was given to Michelle Workman and Richard Sykes, representing EBMUD. The award recognized the outstanding work the utility company has done in managing the Mokelumne, our home water, and its fisheries. Since the early 1990's, the utility has worked to restore the Chinook salmon runs and was

able to maintain a run of over 12,000 fish throughout the last five drought years. In addition, the idea of introducing Chinook salmon above Pardee for upstream spawning is being explored with a hope that the first fish will be trucked upriver sometime before 2020.

The club also invited representatives from two advocacy organizations working very much in both the club's and the environment's interests. Tim Stroshane from Restore the Delta accepted a check for \$1,000 from the club, the money donated so that the organization can continue to advocate for greater flows for the delta and oppose the excessive water exports and the construction of the diversion tunnels on the Sacramento River.

Chris Shutes representing the California Sportfishing Protection Alliance was also given a check for \$1,000 from the club. Chris spoke to those attending, explaining that while CSPA is a very small organization, its impact on the state's and local water policies has been huge.

Incoming president Neuburger also mentioned that the club was providing Lodi Unified School District with an award of \$500 to assist them in their Salmon in the Classroom projects. While no one from the district was present, club director, Dena Mason, will make sure the funds are

The Delta Fly Fishers First Annual Kid's Fishing Day, March 5th

Sunday, March 5, is the Sunday following the Saturday Bob McMillan Trout Bout, an event that the club assists the county with every year. Usually enough fish remain in the pond at the park to make it worthwhile to fish the following day.

This is NOT a fly fishing event! It's time to dig in the closet and get out that old spinning rod, stop by the tackle shop and pick up some PowerBait, hooks, sinkers, and bobbers and a forked stick to prop up that rod while sitting in a lawn chair and watching for the line to straighten and the rod tip to move. Bring the lawn chairs and any other stuff you'd haul along for a lake-side picnic.

The early response to this event has been outstanding with over 31 people signing up at the January installation dinner. An additional opportunity to sign up will occur at the February annual meeting. If you can't make the meeting, instructions for signing up are later in this article.

Participating families are asked to bring side dishes of some kind for the day, either hot or cold, enough for themselves and a few other people. The dishes will be set out for all to share in. The club will still furnish the burgers, buns, condiments and hot dogs

The club will furnish some hot drinks in the morning, coffee for the big kids and hot chocolate for the smaller ones, along with some fluffy donuts starting about 8:30 and later, cook up a lunch of hot dogs, burgers, and potato salad and beans with some cookies for dessert.



On January 25th at 6:00 p.m. in Stockton, Restore the Delta policy analyst, Tim Stroshane will be reading from his new book "Drought, Water Law, and the Origins of California's Central Valley Project." Come join us at the Restore the Delta office for a college-level class in California Water History. Books will be available for purchase at our office. This book is an account of how water rights were designed as a key part of the state's largest public water system, the Central Valley Project. Along sixty miles of the San Joaquin River, from Gustine to Mendota, four corporate entities called "exchange contractors" retain paramount water rights to the river. Their rights descend from the days of the Miller & Lux Cattle Company, which amassed an empire of land and water from the 1850s through the 1920s and protected these assets through business deals and prolific litigation. Miller & Lux's dominance of the river relied on what many in the San Joaquin Valley regarded as wasteful irrigation practices and unreasonable water usage. Economic and political power in California's present water system was born of this monopoly on water control. Stroshane tells how drought and legal conflict shaped statewide economic development and how the grand bargain of a San Joaquin River water exchange was struck from this monopoly legacy, setting the stage for future water wars. His analysis will appeal to readers interested in environmental studies and public policy.

Our February speaker, Rick Desrosiers, owner of the Trout Spot in Arnold, will talk of his five favorite trout streams in Montana

Rick regularly hosts fly fishing trips to Montana with Ed Lawrence's Fly Fishing, and will present a slide pro-

gram focusing on five of the most productive trout streams.

He's the owner of The Trout Spot fly shop in Arnold California and the TheTroutSpot.com, a web - based flyfishing shop that specializes in gear and flytying materials.

Here's Rick's description of his fly fishing passion. "From the first time at the age of five, when my Dad took me fishing with a hand line at the percolation ponds in Campbell California, I have been fisherman. I

started fly fishing about 40 years ago, on the Apalachicola River in Florida for Bream and Bass. I have done a lot of fly fishing since then, (but never enough). I have fished all over California, Alaska, and British Columbia as well as Montana and Wyoming.

I had always wanted to own a bait shop, but after switching to fly fishing, a fly shop was the way I knew I would go. I have an IT background, so I started TheTroutSpot.com, back in 2002, to help support my hobby. As we all know, fly fishing can be an expensive sport. The primary focus of my company has been to provide lower cost, quality fly fishing gear, to help more people have access to the sport. I really love to help a person get into the sport. Knowing that I helped get someone on the water is almost, but not quite as good as being there myself.

In 2002, my wife and I purchased a home in Arnold, California, with plans to retire there. As I move toward retirement from the IT world, I

realized that I am not the type to completely stop working. I had all this inventory sitting in a warehouse and decided it was time to get it out there



in front of people, not just on the web. In February of 2015, we leased a building in Arnold and opened our shop doors in April. It is a small shop only 800 square feet. As the business, has grown in the last two years we decided to expand a bit and are in the process of adding an additional 700 feet. We are a full-service shop and we carry a wide range of fly fishing gear and tying materials as well as home décor and gift items related to fly fishing. We have over 850 different fly patterns in stock, anything from Midge patterns to Tarpon patterns and sell to people from all over the U.S. as well as many other coun-

We currently have two local guides working with our shop as well as a person, doing beginning fly fishing and casting instruction. We also work closely with Bent Rod Fly Fishing, providing guided trips on the Lower Stanislaus, Lower Mokelumne and the Lower Sac as well as the Klamath. We also do beginning fly tying

classes in our shop (if we can find a new instructor).

We are located at 1311 Highway 4 in

Arnold California, and our open Friday through Sunday in the winter and open Thursdays to Mondays during fishing season.

We have been a business member of Trout Unlimited and The Federation of Fly Fishers for 15 years and help support many local clubs around the country with their fund raising.

I started working with Ed Lawrence's Fly Fishing in 2011 and have been regularly taking groups to Mon-

tana each year for a shop trip. I am also, working with Ed, to expand our trip options to Mexico for Baby Tarpon as well as other fishing destinations

In the program, I will be discussing five of the rivers we have fished with Ed's guides, the Madison, Yellowstone, Missouri, Big Hole, and the Beaver Head. I will go over fly patterns as well as when and where to fish, fish counts and other information about Fly fishing in Montana."

As been the current practice, the doors will open at 6:30 with hot and-cold drinks and snacks available. Fly tiers are encouraged to bring their gear. After the speaker's presentation, a raffle will be held with the month's grand prize a complete eight weight striper outfit.

The February 8th meeting will take place at the John R. Williams School, 2450 Meadows Avenue, Stockton. The doors open at 6:30 and the meeting starts at 7:00. The public is welcome.
