If you're interested in fly fishing then the Festival of Fly Fishing in Lodi, California is the place to be. The Conclave starts at 11:00 a.m. on Friday October 23rd through Saturday October 24th. This is a total celebration of fly fishing will that take place and you are invited to participate. The NCCFFF is presenting the Festival of Fly Fishing at the Hutchins Street Square in Lodi, CA. There will be informational programs along with hands-on events for novice and advanced fly fishers alike. Youth and family oriented events are scheduled throughout the two day event. The monies raised will go for conservation and fly fishing education programs in Northern California and Northern Nevada.

This year's special guest is Lani Waller of Novato, California. Lani is a well-known and respected fly fishing and casting instructor, lecturer and fly fishing. He has pursued steelhead for over four decades and is considered one of the foremost experts on trophy British Columbia steelhead. He was inducted into the Fly Fishing Hall of Fame in 1997. Lani will be giving 3 presentations during the Conclave. Along with Lani, you will be able to see and listen to: Jim Victorine, Dave Scadden, Al Smatsky, Trent Pridemore and others speak.

Casting instruction will be provided by Al Kyte, Eric Sherar, Floyd Dean, John Till, Bob Middo and Michael Maloney. Each one is an expert in their fields of fly fishing and fly casting. There will also be an opportunity to earn a Casting Certification through the Federation of Fly Fishers.

The Learning Center – for Beginners of all Ages – will feature continuous activities including: The Basics of Fly Tying, Casting, Knots, Reading the Water and Insect Life. Lani Waller: Biographical information

Lani has been fly-fishing for forty-five years and was inducted into the Fly Fishing Hall of Fame in 1997, by the Northern California Council of the Federation of Fly Fishers. He has pursued both trout and steelhead for over four decades and is considered one of the foremost experts on trophy British Columbia steelhead. He is one of the leading US proponents of BC Steelhead fishing.

He has four award winning videos. These films were released in 2008 as a four part series called "Lani Waller's Steelhead Legacy." Lani has also written two books- "A River of Dreams," published by West Rivers Publishing in 2004, and "A Steelheader's Way," published by Headwaters Books in 2009.

Lani's articles and stories have appeared in all the major fly-fishing publications and he has held editorial positions for Fly Fisherman Magazine and Wild Steelhead and Salmon Magazine. Lani is a founding Director of The



Babine River Foundation and is active in British Columbia watershed conservation politics. As such he has held consulting and fund raising relationships with The Wild Steelhead Campaign, Friends of Wild Salmon. Lani was a founding Director of British Columbia's North Coast Steelhead Alliance.

His conservation work in the US includes fund raising and promotional activities in behalf of Cal Trout and Trout Unlimited. Lani is also an active supporter of The Federation of Fly Fishers. His photographs and slide shows of wild steelhead have been viewed by audiences across the United States; his photographs and field work with California wild steelhead and salmon have been preserved in the California State Archives

Conservation by Ron Forbes

When I was ten years old I went on my first backpack trip in the High Sierras. My Dad bought me a metal fly rod at the local Payless and gave me a beat-up reel. The line was a sinking level type and the tippet was probably 3 or 4X. The flies (all 3 of them) were Japanese and about one third the size of my fist. The hooks were probably a size 8 or 10. We crossed the Sierras over Sonora Pass and took off from Leavitt Meadow. After 6 or 7 miles we stopped at Fremont Lake and made camp. The next day we climbed over a ridge and into the West Fork of the Walker River. To make sure my "fluff ball" fly was secure I tied it on with three half hitches. Since I had never fished before I found a rock next to a small falls, threw my fly upstream and left it drift around the pool below. After 30 minutes or so and while eating lunch, I hooked my first trout. In my eves it was huge, at least 6 or 7 inches. That day I caught three more fish. Our leader marked me down as having caught four fish. I was in heaven. The trout limit had just been lowered from 25 to 15 fish. The next morning reality set in. Our leader was way ahead of his time in many ways. If you kill it, it you eat it. Like it or not. And so I learned the Theory of Catch and Release without any coaching.

Some of my fondest memories in life have been of my time in the high back country. Is there a point to all this? Yes there is. When I first backpacked there were about 8 million people in California. We have over 38 million people in the state now. Since my birth over 1,000 dams have been built (there are over 1,400 in the state now). Most without the legally required fish passage ways. All of the major flows into the Sacramento River have been blocked and neither steelhead nor salmon and pass. Of the 17 waterways that flow into the Sacramento River, all the original runs of steelhead are extinct. Our Delta is on the verge of collapse. Yet water districts really don't care. They will take whatever they can get and really don't care what happens to the Delta or its fish.

We hope to show the film, "The Lost Coast" to the club soon. It's an excellent film with the history of steelhead fishing in the northern part of California. Tom Skerritt narrates the film. He was the preacher in a "River Runs Through It". The film makes the point of what happened to the steelhead fishing back then. History is going to repeat itself in the Delta. We can talk all we want about the pros and cons but when you see the movie you can see what has happened to a once outstanding fishery and is happening here now.

When I joined Delta Fly Fishers I was impressed with our Flier and the statement of our commitment to conservation and the environment. We now need to live up to those words. However, our President has told me that he has received several letters of complaint because we are involved in Sacramento in fish and water issues. Evidently, these people want the club to stay out of the fight to preserve our fishery. But those days are over. We are living in the 21st century; not the mid 1950's. If we want to save the Delta we have to fight for it; if we don't we lose it.

We have fought and won the battle to delist Stripers as a game fish. We fought and won the battle to stop those trying to push those 5 poorly written water bills through Sacramento. They would have given the Governor power to build a peripheral canal costing \$52 billion without taxpayer's approval. But his battle is ongoing and will continue. The point is, if we want to continue to fish as we have, we have to fight for it. We don't have a choice. If we don't, Westland's Water District and friends will have their way with "co-equal rights" and the Delta will be lost forever. Frankly, I'm tired of hearing, "There are more votes in Southern California; we don't stand a chance; if they want it they will take it and we can't do anything etc. etc. etc..." But we have to get involved now.

At our last meeting Bob Sousa told us that 35 letters had be send to oppose the 5 water bills. Our membership is about 105 people. About a third of us send letters. The Tracy club responded with 100% of its membership getting involved. We need to do better and we can.

We can start by doing some of the following:

1) Support California Sportfishing Protection Alliance

2) Support Restore the Delta

3) Send letters when requested

4) Tell your elected officials how you feel about the issues through your calls and letters. They are better than e-mails and have more impact. And they do make a big difference.

5) Read everything you can on fish issues and water issues.

6) Read webmaster Gerry Neuberger's CSPA newsletter on the net. It's the best source I have found about what's going on. It's located at: calsport.org

Now is the time for us in Delta Fly fishers to get involved. Really involved.

Eastern Sierra Focus

Fishing tip:

Nature shortchanged trout by giving it a pea-sized brain to deal with predators like us, intelligent in most cases. Even though the trout isn't very smart, it certainly can hold its own against all my scholarly fishing buddies and me. So why is there is so much cerebral work devoted to catching a creature with limited intelligence? Trout have to determine what to eat and what not to eat with everything that drifts, floats or passes in front of them and inspects everything as if they have an IQ of 180. It's simply through selectivity, they peruses the same thing numerous times, and recognize what has worked prior but does take in some odd stuff and obviously spits it out. It basically has to pass muster. This means it has to move in the same manner, dead drift rising to the surface, or fluttering on the surface and if it doesn't move as the trout expects it won't make the top 10 on their menu. Trout generally require characteristics that resemble their food source, body length, height of the wings, the symmetry is proportionate, and matching the color, as that is the very last thing you want to match. Trout flies that look similar in shape may not be what they are targeting. Select some flies and place them on a flat surface and back up about 3 or 4 feet and squint your eyes and match the proportions. Most match-the-hatch guys omit important details like legs, beards, thorax bulges, and the length etc. and it's important to notice these details when you are squinting at your flies. Don't tie or use flies that "you" think look good, seine the water and take a better look at the bugs from all sides, it might just improve your success.

The Fish and Game Commission has proposed elimination of the need to wear your fishing license in full display above your waist while fishing – a law that has caused undue hardship on almost every angler since its inception. See the following: www. fgc.ca.gov/regulations/new2009/proposedregs09.asp. The law will remain in effect until officially removed at a later date. I will continue to wear my license in full display. Please check the regulations prior to fishing unfamiliar water as to any gear restrictions, size and limits.

ROCK CREEK – Has been good with most of the fish sitting in deep water due to the lake temp, so use full sink with black woolly buggers, and blue damsels. Dries are working, so try olive Hornbergs.

HOT CREEK – Is fishing well; water level is low and weed beds are showing. Fish early and late with dries (vary your colors in sizes 20-24, also small WD40's, PT flashback (22-24), gray baetis patterns #20-24, scuds, and small caddis emergers. Large foam ant patterns and try some small hoppers. There is always a afternoon breeze so be prepared for everything. CROWLEY – Moss is worse than ever and it depends on which way the wind blows as to where you will be able to fish. Fishing is good when you get into the right waterway so try streamers, perch fry and leeches, but check with the experts at Crowley Lake Marina or in Mammoth for the latest info. **CONVICT** – Has had a good breeze on most days so fish the same southwest corner near the aspens, go deep, deeper and the deepest you can handle and start from there up to see where the trout are holding. Water is warm all over, but is changing soon.

UPPER OWENS – Has also been fishing well when you find the right spot. Fish are a tad small but keep working it until you find the main channel where they are holding and use dry/dropper, Copper John, soft hackles, pheasant tails and prince nymphs with your best presentation. Use sizes 20-24.

MAMMOTH BASIN – Twin and Mamie are doing great on brown and olive Docs Twin Lake Special (DTLS), Olive Matuka, or a leech pattern with a nymph dropper #16 or #18. Pick your best working nymph.

SAN JOAQUIN ROAD – You can drive down to the meadow in your own vehicle now. You'll have to do some extra walking to get into fish as the water level is low and warm, so look for pools and keep a low profile while using Yellow Sallies, Royal Coachman, Parachute Adams and definitely Olive elk hair caddis #16.

JUNE Loop – Gull has been doing well on brown Twin Lakes Special, with or without a Pheasant Tail dropper, and June has done well on burgundy or olive leech patterns, the "staple" Hornberg (green) with a prince nymph dropper.

Go deep and I'm not kidding.

LUNDY – Has been doing fair from boats and tubes and is got their last load of Alper's last week. Their last day open was Sept. 13th. Work with Hornbergs, olive crystal flashy buggers, wiggle nymphs in olive or rust, and try some ants near the inlet and south shore near the aspens.

VIRGINIA LAKES – Had been good to great after Alpers trophies arrived along with the supplement fish and 400 pounds from Fish and Game. Just about anything worked for over 8 days, but the continued warm weather has plagued most of the Eastern Sierra without any relief driving the fish even deeper than last week. Flies working are all black strippeddown version of a woolly bugger with some flash in the tail, and you'll probably have to drive it down with full sink with a slow strip. Try a 2 fly rig with a hare's ear over a scud pattern, or a blue wing olive parachute, gray hackle peacock or fur body black ant. Also, black gnat parachute and Selby's Black Bitch. EAST WALKER – Flow is currently at 98cfs and fishing quite well. Early is the best time to use PMD's, and trico's. Nymphs working are blood midge, WD40's, tiger, crystal and small caddis patterns in the afternoon in the 1st mile down from the dam. Elkhair Caddis in #16 or 18, small yellow sallies over any nymph will work. Fish only when temp is below 67 degrees, it's healthier for the trout. Current temp is 60 as the nights are cooling down the day-time water temperature.

WEST WALKER – Water is at very low 38cfs but standard for this time of year, so look for flat water and fish the pools and curves, and use a two fly rig with large attractor and tiger, crystal or flashback Zug as the bottom fly with a shorter distance between flies. Try some terrestrials, hoppers, ants, etc.

SADDLEBAG RESORT – The lakes basin is a bit slow except for Saddlebag, and it is doing well on the east side and heading toward the resort using a full sink with olive and or olive/black woollies. The stream is running fair and some nice brooks, browns and bows can be found in deeper pools so keep a low profile, they are spooky.

DFF MENTOR PROGRAM

The Delta Fly Fishers Board of Directors, intent upon enhancing the existing Fishing Buddy Program, is proposing DFF adopt a Mentor Program which is proactive and broadly inclusive. The primary objective is, by sharing fly fishing skills and knowledge of existing DFF members with new members, this will assist new members in getting acquainted with existing members, with club activities and, generally speed the transition from new member to old friend.

The Board of Directors recognizes this will take considerable commitment from the existing membership and does encourage the active participation of current members. The following broad guidelines are thought to be necessary for this program.

- Every existing member willing to serve, as a Mentor will be asked to complete a skills/knowledge list that they will share with new members as requested. The Mentor Program Chairperson will maintain these documents.
- Every new member will be asked to complete a skills/knowledge request form, which the Mentor Program Chair will also maintain.
- The Mentor Program Chair will introduce any and all new members before the General Program begins and will make an effort to introduce the new members to DFF Officers and Board Members.
- Under consideration is the additional incentive for new members of some free raffle tickets.
- The Mentor Program Chair will follow up on matching a Mentor with a new member based on skills/knowledge sought and skills/knowledge available. The mentor and new member will work out a compatible schedule by which to transfer skills/knowledge. The Mentor Program Chair as needed can make reassignments.
- Examples of mentoring include such things as guiding a new member on local waters within a few months of assignment, accompany the new member to a local fly shop to assist with gear purchases, contact the new member a few days before each monthly meeting to remind the new member of the meeting and program, assisting with casting skills, how to tie useful knots and/or fly tying, sharing information regarding fly fishing destinations including basic travel tips and promoting new members to join DFF in its outings

Over time the Mentor Program may be extended to include existing members who want to learn new skills/knowledge.

A Summer to Remember By Nathan Cooper

It seems like I just stepped off the plane. The summer of 2009 is one I will never forget! Most members of the DDF who have been around for a while know my love of angling started at a very early age, like two. They required you to use various techniques like Czech nymphing and continuous leaders, which were completely foreign to me. I found out that I have been fishing in a "western-style" of fly fishing all my life, and it did little to prepare me for this new method. The emphasis of the rules seems heavily weighted in tradition. I think of myself as being an innovative angler, looking for new and productive ways to catch fish. The required style of fishing was hard for me to adapt to. (I did sneak out during evening free time and revert to my "western ways". I caught some beautiful fish!)

The weather in Montana was beautiful the whole time until competition day... We had wind, rain, thunder and lightning, prematurely ending the competition. Other than the poor weather on competition day and the unfamiliar rules, the experience was near perfect and one that I will never forget. I wasn't selected for the team, but it was an eye opening experience and I learned about a facet of fly fishing that I had never even heard of prior to the competition.

I want to thank everyone in the club who helped me get to this once in a lifetime learning opportunity. I had a great time and will never forget this experience. I appreciate the club's support. I would also like to thank Steve Johnson for donating his frequent flyer miles for our tickets and for getting me involved with the competition. It was a great experience all the way through.

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
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
