# Eastern Sierra Report By CJ Webb

Bridgeport Rez is starting to thaw, and the water that flows into the East Walker River (225cfs) is grass level and flooding in sections of the meadow, and around the bridge as you go into Bridgeport. The river is high right now. It's been fairly nice during the day, and the evenings are not bitterly cold. Higher elevations (8138') where I live it's still winter, but it's beautiful and windy.

The West Walker is (165cfs) up slightly and the banks are almost clear of snow and ice, and as the temp increases the runoff will start mid afternoon and continue for a few hours until the evening cools it all down again.

DFG gave the Mono County Board of Supervisors a prospectus as what to expect for 2008, it's not bleak, and it could prove better than 2007. Final word should be out in a few weeks after the Department looks over their suspected budget.

Tim Alpers sold his ranch near Upper O to the owners of the old Arcularius Ranch. He has moved his operation onto the Conway Ranch and has some great looking fish out there now. They did manage to keep them all alive with the two 4 foot snow falls we had this winter. The work will resume on the ranch when the night temperatures stabilize.

### **CONSERVATION**

#### CONSERVATION

On March 14th of this year the Federal Fishery Management Council (PFMC) has declared an emergency closure of the salmon season. The closure will include both sport and commercial fishing. At this point the entire 2008 season, with the possible exception of the Klamath Management waters will be closed. The 2007 returning fall-run was estimated to be about 88,000 fish. This is down from 800,000 fish returning in 2002.

According to PFMC, the latest modeling shows only 59,000 salmon can be expected to return to the Central Valley Rivers this year. This will be less than half of the spawning escapement flood which numbers between 122,000 to 180,000 fish. The spawning escapement flood numbers has been used by PFMC for several decades.

Peter Dygert, who is a fisheries biologist for the National Marine Fisheries, claims to hold out some hope for the in-river fishery this summer and fall but at this point things look grim. To put things on a historical note, this will be the first time we have had a total salmon closer since commercial salmon fishing began in San Francisco Bay and our Delta in 1848.

The president of Pro-Troll Fishing Products, Dick Pool, says the economic devastation caused by the salmon collapse will be huge and as president of the American Sport Fishing Association, has asked both the State and Federal governments to take short and long term actions to restore the Sacramento River fall Chinook salmon run.

The collapse of the salmon run also will also bring California more economic hardship. There are 2.4 million sport fishermen in the State of California. Those fishermen bring 2.4 billion in retail sales to the state every year. This generates an economic impact of 4.9 billion on an yearly basis. It also generates 1.3 billion in salaries and wages. It

is estimated that about 43,000 jobs will be lost in California. As you may have seen, sport retailers are declining. Guides and those who operate charters will have no business. There will also be a huge drop-off in restaurant trade in areas that are known for their fishing, marine services and the less need for lodges. It has also been thought that boat sales will be off.

There are two reasons given for the decline of the salmon. The first is the abnormal water conditions seen in the ocean. Some relate this to global warming. The normal seasonal upwellings of cold nutrient rich waters have become less than predictable. So the food chain is not as it has been. Less food -less fish

However, the water users in the state want to blame the whole problem on the ocean and not look at the fact that they have increased the flow of water south by at least 20%. And they are so inclined as not to change their water flow practices which have lead to the destruction of the Delta. However they now want a new canal that will provide them with an increase at least 40% more water from the Sacramento River to the Southern California. It never ends with them. They want more water for the South without any concern on the effect this will imposed on the environment.

### **Davis Lake**

This afternoon I called Randy Kelly, DFG and Project Manager for Davis Lake (3/24/08). I ask him if there was any news on the treatment of Davis Lake to kill the Northern Pike. At this point, Davis is still frozen over. However, he told me ice fishermen are taking trout in the lake in the 3 lbs. range. At this point no pike have been found. Mr. Kelly also told me that when the thaw occurs that 2000 lbs of 5-6 lbs. trout will be planted. This will be in addition to 1000 lbs of 10 lbs plus fish. Sounds good!

Every year tons of monofilament line ends up as trash in our oceans, rivers and lakes. Monofilament can tangle on plants and animals harming wildlife and causing an unsightly mess. J.N. Ding Darling National Wildlife Refuge received a conservation grant from the FFF to help prevent damage to fish and wildlife from monofilament. The Refuge and the FFF created signs to inform anglers and the public about monofilament. In February, the signs were displayed at highly visible fishing access points at the Refuge. Many states have monofilament recycling programs that use discarded line to make new fishing tackle products. # Salmon in the Classroom Or How to Catch and Release 35 Salmon in One Day Without Leaving California!

Hazelton Elementary students and families met at the Mokelumne River Saturday, March 8 to release 35 salmon fry. The eggs were delivered to their classroom in January, hatched into alevin in February and then were released at Van Assen park near the hatchery.

It was a beautiful, sunny day as 30 students met with club members Sallye and Bruce Rollins and our fearless president Herman Spalinger. The students took turns releasing individual salmon and trying to see where they went. Many were amazed at their camouflage in the clear water: "He's hiding right there!" said 5th grader Miranda Abrescy, pointing to the fish in 4" of clear water on the sand bottom.

Some super-sleuth students scooped a serious selection of insect samples from the stream. One probable member of the limnophilidae family was the biggest this author has ever seen on this side of the Oregon border. This caddis would best be imitated with a cased caddis pattern tied on a size 8 hook! Another species of intrigue was what looked like a March Brown adult (about a 10 or 12). At least 2 different mayfly nymphs were collected, observed with microscopes and released. Also collected were large damsel nymphs, big aquatic snails, nematodes and planaria.

Herman the almighty seemed to enjoy helping many of the children learn to cast a fly rod set up with a pointless fly. He also noticed peculiar surface activity 30 minutes after the fry were released...

After lunch the group visited the hatchery which turned out to be a highlight for most students. Holding tanks had salmon fry, juvenile steelhead (up to about 12 inches) and approximately 20 "adult" Steelhead trout waiting to be processed. Some may have been up to 5 pounds and several looked very beat up. The most exciting part of the hatchery was feeding the steelhead and observing salmon fry with birth defects. "There's a two-headed fish! There's a two-headed fish!" students were shouting as others came running. "Walk, Please!" called their teacher while demonstrating Olympic-style speed walking.

This program has been around for many years and was made possible through the efforts of the Delta Fly Fishers, the Department of Fish and Game, the Hall family, the California Aquarium Program, the Salmon in the Classroom Program, Discount Pet Foods on the corner of Country Club Blvd. and Pershing Avenue and the extremely bright students of Hazelton's Academic Center for the Talented magnet program, grades 4, 5, and 6 and their parents.




