Wading Tips 101

For anyone who spends any time wading in and across rivers and streams in search of fish, wading tips are never a bad idea. Tips always help, if for no other reason than a quick refresher. What we're all trying to avoid is taking that wet and wild ride down a river, because of a stupid wading mistake. I've had this happen, and few things ruin a fishing trip like soaking yourself to the bone.

Springtime is upon us and in many parts of the country this means that rivers and streams are running much higher than they normally would. And when the water is running higher and faster than normal, this is the time mistakes are made.

The first tip to remember is if the water looks too high and fast to cross, don't try it. Listen to your instincts. If you feel crossing the river will be a stretch, just sit it out. Better safe than sorry. I'm sure you've heard that piece of advice before. Another great tip in high and fast water (if you feel you must cross) is to use a wading pole. You can buy a wading pole and carry it with you while fishing or you can do what I do and find a nice stick along the bank when I need a wading pole. As long as the stick is sturdy and comes up to your chest, you'll be in good shape. Having a pole to put weight on in high and fast water can literally save you from falling.

Another great wading tip is to always keep your feet in contact with the bottom. This may sound obvious, but it's none the less true. You always want to make a conscious effort to keep your feet in contact with the bottom, especially in high, fast water. The best way to accomplish this is to "slide", rather than step. By sliding your feet, they are always in contact with the bottom. The big problems arise when flowing water gets under your feet. This is obviously when waders get swept off of their feet, and when waders get swept off of their feet and that's when they get wet.

The final wading tip that I have for this article is to keep your eyes on where you want to go, rather than the water. You should be taking your time enough to be able to feel the bottom with your feet, rather than having to look. Keeping your eyes on the place you want to end up eliminates the distortion that a flowing river can cause to persons' eyes. These tips should help you avoid taking that wet and wild ride alluded to earlier. The most important tip is to trust your instincts when it comes to wading across high fast water. If it doesn't feel right, don't try it.

Salt Springs Valley Reservoir

Saturday, March 22



Saturday, March 22 will be DFF's outing to Salt Springs Valley Reservoir. The Reservoir is approximately 40 miles from Stockton. Take highway 4 approximately 35 miles to the Copperopolis junction. Don't turn left at the NEW Copperopolis sign on the south side of the Highway, which is for a new shopping center. Instead go about a mile past that to the next junction, just past a Highway sign for Salt Springs Valley Res. Just past the sign turn left on Rock Creek Road go 6.5 miles and turn left again on Rock Creek Road. Turn left on Rock Creek Road for about 2.5 miles to the lake.

Grady Lee will be there at 8am if you want directions to the best fishing spots on the reservoir. Fishing for bass is strictly catch and release; there are Florida strain Largemouth Black Bass and Sacramento Spotted Bass. There are also southern Redear Perch, Blue Gill, Crappie, and Catfish in the lake. The perch and crappie can be large and scrappy. I fished the reservoir last April and caught all of the above.

Be prepared to do some rowing to get to the better fishing spots. The wind can be brisk in the afternoons. Target rock structure and weed beds, last April there were dozens of nice weed beds, each of which had several aggressive bass hanging out plus a nice large perch or two. Salt Springs is a shallow reservoir, shoreline in most places slopes gradually. I did most of my fishing in one to five feet of water. Floating or intermediate lines work well; it is much like fishing Kelsey. All I used last spring was a black Red Ryder size 10 or 8, all species loved it. I even caught my first catfish on a fly there. Debbie Nunes who runs the place with husband Mark will do a barbecue lunch consisting of hotdogs, hamburgers, chips and soda for five bucks, but we need at least 10 anglers to make it worth her while. Walt Kotecki will get a head count at the next meeting. Lunch will be served at 1:30. It costs \$15 per VEHICLE to fish Salt Springs. Walt will have maps of the reservoir at the meeting. Grady plans to fish the lake at least once a week until the outing so he will let you know how he does. He really likes this reservoir, has been kicking himself for not having fished it all these years.

CONSERVATION

Saturday morning on the 16th of February, eight members of Delta Fly Fishers met at Van Assen Park on the Mokelumne River for a conservation project. The organizer of the project was Dr. Joe Merz of Cramer Fish Science, a project consulting firm. I had talked to Joe when he was with East Bay MUD about what he felt would be of use to the Mokelumne that we, as a group, might be of help. Shortly afterwards Joe has started working for Cramer.

We arrived Saturday morning to a cold, crisp but sunny day. A flock of wild turkeys greeted us on the ridge along with buzzards in the trees stretching their wings to gather warmth from the sun. Several people saw a red fox cross the road. A few minutes after 8:00, Joe arrived and explained the purpose of our project.

He has been working with some land owners on Murphy Creek, which flows into the Mokelumne just below the dam on the north side of the river. The purpose of the project is to re-establish native plants along the creek and remove invasive plants such as blackberry etc. Murphy Creek flows year round. Which given its small size, surprised several of us. Joe explained that the dam leaks year round from an underground source. This leakage provides enough water, flowing over the gravel, for the spawning steelhead and salmon that migrate up to the source. Also the trout are less inclined to travel Murphy Creek given its low volume and would rather stay in the Mokelumne. It's a great semi-protected area for the fish to mature before their trip down river.

The land owners have done a great job cleaning out the blackberry and other non-natives. It was our job to gather and plant the native cottonwood cuttings so that they will grow into trees protecting the stream bank and help re-establish natives. We had a permit to gather about 100 cuttings of the cottonwoods from EBMUD. The sight of 8 of our members with sharp instruments in their hands failing away at the brush is a sight I shall not soon forget. Nor the sight of one of our members bleeding from the legs (because he refuses to wear long pants-but shall be nameless) and insisted on walking through blackberry bushes. Bloody legs and all, it was not a pretty sight! We also managed to break two tools, but did gather three pick-up loads of cottonwood for transport to Liberty Road. Three pick-ups with loads of cottonwood bouncing up and down driving at 35 mph on highways 12 and 88 is an interesting sight. Luck was again with us and there was no evidence of CHP anywhere near.

We broke into three groups on the creek about a mile from the Mokelumne River. Joe gave us brief talk on the geology and biology of the Murphy Creek area before we started the plant and explained why what we were doing will make a difference in the success of the Murphy Creek project. The cottonwood was pruned and planted in good locations and should do well. I'd estimate that probably 150-175 trees were planted. The following members gave up the best part of the day to give their time and much effort on the project: Pat Fitzpatrick, Earl Summers, Larry Schmidt, Dean Watson, Joe Balderston, Herman Spalinger, Bill Laughlin, and I.

Thanks guys for a job very well done. It will be fun to see the trees as they mature.

A Few Notes on an "Open Forum"

In the last several weeks the San Francisco Chronicle has published several good articles on the problems we are having with the decline of our salmon population. Last Tuesday (Feb 19th) however, the paper published an article in their OPEN FORUM section. In this section people or groups can express their thoughts or opinions on an issue. The Feb. 19th article was entitled "What is behind the salmon decline?" Before you read the OPEN FORUM, I would suggest you might read who the author is so you can get an idea what their point of view is going to be. Case in point: this article's author is Laura King Moon. She is the assistant general manager of the State Water Contractors. It's a group of 27 water contractors from Central and Southern California. That should give one an insight to their point of view right off the bat and Ms Moon's article follows what you would expect.

She is claiming that the salmon run is off because "government scientists believe that changes in the ocean" has occurred, but offers no proof to back this up this claim. Next she blames the recreational and commercial fishing. Another "theory" of hers is the predation of the stripers has caused the problem since they are a non-native fish. Of course stripers are a predator fish but, are no means the cause of the decline of the salmon.

She assures us that the pumps in the Delta are very carefully watched to avoid any problems that they might cause. One wonders just where she has been in the last 50 years. She seems to leave out the pumping has also changed the normal water flow through the delta to a flow that has never existed in the Delta before she also leaves out and mention of judicial intervention recent years.

The fact is that DFG says that there were somewhere between 2 or 3 million steelhead in the early 1900's on 19 streams and rivers in Northern California before water district intervention. Now, according to NMFS all of those fish are extinct due to dams built and total disregard for the environment by the water districts.

Ms. Moon bemoans the fact that attention to "science" isn't being followed. What has happened however is that she and people like her change the results of good science to suit their needs and don't report the actual results honestly. She also claims that there is too much "wasteful litigation" on water issues. Frankly, if it were not for environmental groups like FFF, Cal Trout, Trout Unlimited and others, the water districts would have our fisheries in worse condition that they are in now.

If there is a point to this note it is that when you read anything in the paper on environment issues, ask yourself what axe the author has to grind. The results might surprise you.

Murphy's Creek Conservation Project



On Sat. Feb 16th at Van Assen Park where we met Joe Merz of S.P. Cramer Fish Sciences to do a tree planting outing along Murphy's Creek that feeds into the Mokelumne River at the west end of the park. Joe had obtained permission from EBMUD to plant these trees and enlisted 8 of us to help with his project. We first cut the saplings down in the overflow channel of Comanche Dam, placed them in a couple of trucks and drove them around to Murphy's Creek on the north side of the Mokelumne River. Joe has been doing some studies along the stream and has found small salmon smolt in the stream. He had previously persuaded a local farmer who had dammed up the stream to take out his dam so the water would flow back into the river. He suspects the water is actually coming from seepage from the reservoir. His tree project is to put enough trees along the stream that the shade they afford after they grow will cool down the stream so the fish can remain in the stream longer. He's done studies on another part of the stream where he's planted trees and found the water temperature in those areas has dropped as much as five degrees. It was a tremendous learning process for all of us and we are looking forward to helping Joe again perhaps in helping catch the smolt so he can implant small metal tracking devices that record on other tracking devices he's planted in the river to record the route and time these smolts move downstream and into the ocean.
