We're looking for a big turnout and a good time to be had by all.

We are now down to one Sportsman's Exposition Show left for the start of this year, The Fly Fishing Show in Pleasanton, February 22–24. Rumor has it some of these shows have been downsized due to the cost of setting up a booth which is being attributed to the slowdown of fishermen passing through the doors of their local fly shops. Whatever the case may be, the Fly Fishing Show is the one aimed specifically to the fly fisherman. Talk it up with your fellow members and pool together to attend the show in one car. After all, going green is the thing this year.

Speaking of green, as fly fisher persons, we I'm sure all take an interest in conservation and preservation of our fisheries. In case you haven't read it, it's on our web site under our mission statement. Some of you may or may not be aware there is, among the many conservation organizations out there, a group called Friends of the River abbreviated FOR. They, along with Trout Unlimited, Cal Trout and the Fly Fishing Federation to name a few, are a very concerned and active organization that keeps a watchful eye on governmental agencies and legislators regarding issues pertaining to preservation of rivers, streams, lakes, deltas, etc, regarding issues that may impact those areas. FOR specifically is California's statewide river conservation organization headquartered in Sacramento and found on the Internet under friends of the river.org. They publish a newsletter called Headwaters three times a year summarizing their activities and actions taken by their legal departments. The reason I mention this is there is an interesting article in their Winter 2007 issue regarding our Delta that sits in our own backyard. Since we are going to be bombarded between now and November regarding two competing bond issues to be placed on the ballot, they have some interesting comments in their article Dam Facts, Dam Lies, and Statistics: Reality Takes a Back Seat to Hyperbole in Water Debate written by Steve Evans, Conservation Director.

The article sets out various comments by different politicians, including the governor, regarding the water transportation system passing through the Delta. I urge you to read the whole article to get the full gist of its premise. First of all, let me state I am not suggesting a position to be taken by this club on either side of this issue, but I'm attempting to report on articles I consider of interest to what the newspapers are calling the Delta in crisis. I feel we should be aware of what's happening in the Delta since it is located just west of Stockton. This club as a group cannot take a position politically one way or the other on any issue due to the fact we could lose our 501c(3) status faster than our heads can swim. We as individuals, however, can write our congressmen and women stating our ideas and suggestions thereon.

Here is a sample of what the article is commenting about: The Governor has been reported in the press as saying we haven't built a dam since the '70's and that our population is growing rapidly but our statewide water storage system has not been improved in 30 years. FOR's research has shown that 6.2 million acre feet of water storage has been developed since 1990, including 5.3 million acre feet of groundwater storage in the San Joaquin Valley plus three dams all completed in the last 10 years paid for by the ratepayers who directly benefit from the increased surface storage, not the state or federal taxpayers.

As to the comment by Dianne Feinstein in August last year, 25 million people do live south of the Delta but few depend exclusively on the water from the Delta. Of the people downstream of the Delta only about 16% of the water used in the Bay Area, San Joaquin Valley, Tulare Basin, Central Coast, including LA and San Diego comes from the Delta. Nearly 80% of the water exported goes to agriculture or about 500 farmers who receive more water every year from the Delta than does the LA basin and Bay Area combined. Conserving water is one possible less costly solution; however it is the farmers who by adopting high-tech water conservation pay the most. The question is who will foot the bill.

In an editorial from the Executive Director's desk from the same newsletter, Peter Ferenbach suggests perhaps tax breaks for the farmers who invest in water conservation or state programs to make those technologies more widely available and affordable, but there should be more options on the table.

There is certainly so much more information available that we as conservation-minded fishermen and women need to keep our eyes and ears open so we can make an informed decision on issues to be put before us in the November election. It would sure be nice to tell our godchildren look at our legacy we left you, go forth and catch those fish that we helped in our own way to continue to live and prosper.

CONSERVATION

The Delta Fly Fishers has been asked to help with a conservation project on Murphy Creek which flows into the Mokelumne River just below Comanche Dam. Those who have fished the area realize it has been overgrown with non-native plants. These non-natives have been to the detriment of native plants and aquatic species and to the environment in general. This includes all the animals in the river from the phytoplankton to the trout, steelhead, and salmon. One of the major problems along the Mokelumne has been the invasion of Himalayan Blackberry. A local group has tackled the black berry issue and I have been told they have it under control.

Joe Merz has ask for Delta Fly Fishers help in planting native trees along the creek These trees will help establish a more natural environment for all the species, especially the fish.

Saturday, the 16th of February is the date chosen. At this point all of the details have yet to be filled in, but will be provided in the next two weeks.

We will need to bring warm clothes and boots to keep our feet warn and dry. A change of clothes and towel might be a good idea also. Please bring your own digging tools. Also you will need to provide your own lunch and plenty to drink. These trees will be saplings, so deep digging won't be required. The trees will be provided.

At our board meeting in Jan. 10 of our members signed up! After talking with Dr. Merz, he has expressed interest in involving us in a project that would last several years and be of benefit to our area in a very positive way.... more on this later when more details come out.

One of the stated goals of Delta Fly Fishers is an active involvement in conservation. This project is a chance to "get the ball rolling" in the right direction.

And the beat goes on.....

In the middle of January, several major newspapers have published articles showing that many of those who purpose building the Peripheral Canal and would benefit the most from the canal have still not paid for their previous water projects.

Those who oppose the canal are angered by the history of money spent, the huge debt which is still not paid, and the continuing financial recklessness of taking on additional projects. All of this at taxpayers' expense for the enrichment of groups like the Westland Water District. Westland is the nation's largest and wealthiest water district.

In the 1960's Westland and other smaller groups borrowed in excess of \$449 million. To date they have yet to repay \$372 million......just 15% of the debt and the debt is interest free. George Miller, D-Martinez was quoted in saying that if they were home owners, they would have been foreclosed on.

In 1986, Congress passed a law requiring Westland totally repay the debt by 2030 and with no interest. However, in 2008-22years later-they have just repaid 15%. And now they are asking for total forgiveness of the loan.

One wonders when Congress or the State of California will ever learn or if they will ever protect taxpayer interest.


