George W. Emde, Jr. Obituary

I became acquainted with George, Jr., at one of our first Umpqua outings when he sat at our table during the club's dinner. He had a very easy-going nature about him and somehow you knew he would remember you in the future.

Again, he approached me later at a regular meeting and we spoke of fishing and a little about his ranch he had in the northeastern portion of California. I found out from Nick Felten that his death was rather sudden as his cancer was in remission for several years but started to flare up again recently. He told Nick the chemo-therapy treatments were really hard to take and he needed to stay in the hospital a day or two after the treatments to recover. His death came rather sudden, and I'm sure he will be missed by his friends he met at our club's outings and meetings.

The following obituary was printed in the Stockton Record on Thursday, Feb 23rd, 2006:

George W. Emde, Jr., 74, of Lodi, died Thursday, February 16th, 2006, after losing a courageous battle with cancer. He was born in Stockton to a third generation ranching family. He was raised on the Emde family homestead in Lodi. George graduated from Lodi High in 1949 and Cornell University, New York, in 1953. While in the US Marine Corps, he married Elizabeth Roller from Charleston, West Virginia on February 6th, 1954. George, Jr., owned and operated Happyholme Farms Feed Company in Lodi from 1956-1978. He then purchased a cattle ranch in Siskiyou County which sold in 1985. Since that time George, Jr., has resided on a 40-acre vineyard east of Lodi. He is survived by his wife of 52 years, Betty Emde of Lodi; brother and sister-in-law, John and Janice Emde of Wrangell, Alaska; sister and brother-in-law Mary and Jim Auble of Sacramento; children and their spouses, Blair and Ron Loftus of Yreka, Caroline and John Periera of Wilton, George and Sandy Emde of Lodi, eight grandchildren, three great-grandchildren and 11 nephews and nieces. The memorial service was held February 24th, 2006, at Grace Presbyterian Church, Lodi.

A Float On The Moke

Sallye and I had originally booked this float for the American River in mid January, but high flows caused us to reschedule for February 7. While the flow dropped briefly, they were ramped up once more, making our trip unlikely. Consequently, we moved to the Mokelumne River seemingly the only floatable river in our area. The water was somewhat high at 1400 cfs, still fishable from the boat.

Within minutes after launch we were into small and very small trout most not over five inches long. As we move further down river we got into larger trout. My two largest resident rainbows went to 19 and 20 inches (see photos 1 and 2). As the sun moved higher in the sky the fish changed from hitting the top fly, an egg pattern, to taking the #18 bead head PT nymph. We were playing them carefully to avoid breaking the 5X tippets.

Just before our lunch break Sallye hook an acrobatic 17/18-inch wild steelhead (or maybe they forgot to cut the fin behind the dorsal). It still had sea lice. After photos of her



catch (see photo 3) we had lunch then moved back up stream to cover the same water she had caught the steelhead in about 30 minutes earlier. Almost immediately she was hooked up again, but this fish was a dog compared to the first steelhead.



Landing it for a close look, we decided it was the same steelhead released before lunch. No missing fin and the sea lice were on the same fin. Obviously a very short memory.

Once we got below the Hwy. 88 bridge fishing slowed to almost nothing. Shortly after passing the bridge we saw what was the likely problem; an EBMUD crew had put in a power boat at the Mackville Road takeout and moved up stream to just downstream of the bridge then began slowly working their way down stream doing a fish survey using electric shock to stun the fish. We decided to call it a day at 2 p.m. As we passed the survey boat the held up a steelhead



from the live well. It was a spent hen 25 inches long.



Rod Building Corner What About Blanks: Rod

All blanks have an action associated with them. By knowing what kind of fishing you are going to do helps greatly in determining blank or rod requirements. For example, are you fishing lakes, large to small streams, the ocean or maybe an aquarium or your backyard pond? Also, what size of fish are you trying to capture, such as a nice size trout or a billed fish that runs over 100 pounds?

Let's first define blank actions. There are 4 basic blank actions: extra fast (top 25% bends), fast (top 33% bends), medium or moderate (top 50% bends), and slow (entire blank from cork handle bends).

Extra-fast and fast blanks or rods are chosen to handle a slightly larger range of fly lines with flies. These actions are also selected for those requiring longer casts of over 50 feet for larger streams or lakes. Slow and medium actions of blanks or rods handle a shorter range of fly lines with flies. They are typically used for shorter, softer, and delicate casts of less than 50 feet in smaller streams, beaver ponds, or large aquariums. Blanks or rods should not be chosen for maximum casting distance if that is not the primary use. Selection should be made on how effective the rod will be for the majority of the fishing done with it (make it easier on yourself and enjoy). Remember one rod is not going to be effective in all types of fly fishing.

Rods get their actions from blank taper, blank wall thickness and density of material (graphite, fiber glass, composite, and binding materials) manufacturers use in constructing the blanks. Fast action rods are typically made with complex tapers and high-density materials, while slow rods are made from simple tapers and less-density material.

Manufacturers often provide blank and rod specifications on websites or catalogs. This information is helpful in selection of the blank or rod you may want. Some manufacturers provide more information than others, but you can get a good gauge in examining the specifications and statistics of the blank or rod.

When you get a blank or rod in hand, you can judge

the action by a simple test. When doing this test on a blank only, DO NOT put the blank in serious flex. You can get breakage at the joints of multiple piece rods by flexing the blank too much. When flexing a blank, you will need to determine the effective spine of each segment and align properly. Without doing this, you will not get an accurate rod flex. A discussion of locating the effective spine will be coming soon.

To conduct the test, hold the rod or blank parallel to the floor with eyes down or rod blank spine up and the butt end against your abdomen. You will then need to rotate the rod 90% in either direction. Then start a side-to-side tip motion, progressively increasing the tip motion until the whole rod flex is shown. When you observe the curvature of the rod and compare with the definitions above, you can get good idea how the blank or rod reacts with increasing loads. When conducting this test on a built rod, the types of eyes (single foot, double foot, eye stiffness, eye sizes) and how they are tied on also changes the action somewhat.

There are many variables in trying to achieve that particular rod performance for the purpose you have in mind. By examining the blank or rod actions, the fly fisherman will have a better understanding of the rod characteristics, and why a rod responds in a particular way.


T.B.H.STEELHEAD STONE #2. with RUBBER LEGS

Fly type Attractor Originator Bob Souza Tied by Bob Souza

Hook: 2457 heavy wire size 6 – 10 Thread: Black or Fire orange size 6/0 Tail: Black or Brown round rubber leg Ribbing: Copper wire Body under wrap: lead wire .025 Body: Orange Lite-Brite Dubbing Wing Case: Flashabou Gold and Pearl mixed

Thorax: Brown chenille small Legs: Black or Brown round rubber leg material Bead Head: Tungsten Bead in Gold

Marking pen: Brown Misc: Zap a Gap Glue



- 2. Add 6 8 tight wraps of .025 wire behind bead head, cement in place.
- 3. Start thread behind wire and wrap to middle of bend in hook.
- 4. Tie in copper wire under hook shank. This will not cause bump at tail area.
- 5. Tie in rubber leg material as forked split type tail.
- 6. Make dubbing loop, add dubbing and twist to make taper body with Lite-Brite standouts. Wrap ribbing in 4 – 5 wraps to thorax area and tie off.
- 7. Mark top of body with Brown marking pen.
- Add Flashabou wingcase, tie in brown chenille for thorax, tie in one set of rubber legs at rear of thorax and one set of legs behind bead head, make large thorax and tie off.
- 9. Then bring wing case over top and tie off at bead head.
- 10. Tie off thread and coat thread with super glue to set whip finish.
- 11. Coat wing case top with 5-minute epoxy and let set.

Fish this fly as your lead fly under the strike indictor. Add a smaller fly about 12-16" on a trail leader setup. I tie on at the bend of the top hook. When fishing this set up use a dead drift in holding top of water 2-3' deep.
