Perfect Conditions Yield Big Numbers

The Club members happened to catch one of those perfect spring days, no wind and warm weather. When we arrived early Saturday morning, lake surface

was like a mirror, reflecting the morning sunrise and you could see the bass actively on the surface. As everyone in the group was getting ready, Roger Bitz



(a guest of mine) made his way over to the dock and proceeded to catch the first bass of the day on a popper. A few minutes later, Dan McDaniel caught a small bass using a damsel nymph. With the pontoon boat armada on the lake and if you were tuned into channel 10 you could have heard all of the chatter on who was and wasn't catching fish. By lunch time, Don Gillett had landed 13 bass; he left early and finished the day with 19 bass, all on the red rider. Larry Schmidt, from the Tecate Pro Fishing Team, described his morning action this way, "on every cast, then they took it (popper)".

After lunch, four of us made our way over to the small pond. As we drove up to the pond, you could

see active bass working next to the shoreline. It didn't take long before we were all hooked up. At one point Dan McDaniel landed 15 bass all from the same spot on the shoreline. Each of us

landed over 20 small bass on this small pond.

The evening was just as good as the morning, bass all over the lake actively attacking adult damsel and dragon flies. Most anglers that ended up staying until dark, had double digit numbers for the day. Bob Sousa finished the day with over 20 fish. The big fish of the day was caught by Mike Sousa Jr., topping the scale at 6 lbs. I'm sure that this proud

father will have wallet sized photos at the next meeting.

June Outing at Manzanita Lake

By popular demand, Manzanita Lake in the Lassen Volcanic National Park has been selected for the June 12 & 13, 2004 outing. Club members indicated they wanted to return to Lassen Park as it has always been a very good fishery and terrific outing for the entire family.

Located just inside the West entrance of the park, the lake at 6000 feet sits in an idyllic setting and is one of the parks major attractions. Tom Stienstra writes in his book California Fishing "On a good day, Manzanita Lake provides the kind of fishing that makes you forget about the park's other attractions." Many Delta Fly Fishers will attest to that! The club has held several

outings at Manzanita Lake, all of which produced a large turnout of members, their families and guests. The lake is an ideal vacation destination for the whole family. Often, members arrive a few days early and stay a few days after the outing. Saturday evening we will hold the traditional "Club Potluck" so be prepared to bring something to put on the BBO and a dish to share with others.

Manzanita Lake is small but quite beautiful and the conversion to a natural trout fishery has been a huge success. It is an exceptional lake for float tubing or fishing from a pram or canoe. Wading the shoreline is extremely productive for trout holding in the weed beds. Rules mandate using a fly only with a single barbless hook, and a limit of two fish no greater than 10 inches. As Stienstra writes, "Having a maximum size limit instead of a minimum means that the big trout prized by anglers - the 15 to 20 inchers - remain in the lake instead of a frying pan." Most anglers at the lake practice "Catch & Release".

The best fishing technique here, is to offer the trout what they feed on - insects. Fly patterns that seem to work best are #14 Callibates, #14 or #16 Hares Ear Nymph, leaches, Woolly Buggers and I'm sure the famous Red Rider will do its job. Most fishing is subsurface so be sure to bring a slow sink stillwater line or sink tip. There is also a fishing opportunity at nearby Reflection Lake across the road to the North. This is a great place to take youngsters or novice anglers as it is heavily stocked with a five trout limit and no fish size or gear restrictions.

If you are going to join us June 12 & 13, Manzanita Lake is easy to get to. Drive north on I-5, exit in Anderson on

> Deschutes Road (The Factory Stores exit), turn East at the signal on Deschutes Road and follow it a short distance to Dersch Road (A-17). Turn right on Dersch and follow it to Hwy. 44. Turn right and follow Hwy. 44 to the West Entrance

of the Park. Campground fees are minimal and Golden Access.

Golden Age and Golden Eagle passes are accepted for a reduced rate. Once in the campground look for the Delta Fly Fishers banner for our headquarters.

All campground sites are first come, first served and reservations are not accepted. There are 179 sites and a store which carries most supplies you may need. There always seems to be sites available, but arriving early is a plus. If you need more information, check out the outing flyer distributed at the meeting or call me at 209-931-2997. - Ron Petitt

Conservation



The New Zealand Mud Snail has invaded both the Mokelumne and the Calaveras Rivers as well as Putah Creek and the Owens River. The Department of Fish and Game is testing methods to clean waders and equipmentand has received donations from equipment manufacturers and fly fishing clubs and organizations including: the Northern California Council - Federation of Fly Fishers, Cal Trout, the Granite Bay Fly Fishing Club and the Delta Fly Fishers. DFG currently recommends spraying gear with Clorox Formula 409, then scrub with a stiff brush to remove all visible snails. Then rinse with tap water. snails can collect under laces and in the felt soles of wading boots. Placing gear in water maintained at 130 degrees for 5 minutes is an alternate method of removal. Shad Fishing

American River: fish are at the college and log hole with a few at Howe Ave. Feather River:Boyd's pump and Shanghai Bend are doing well Sacramento River: Butte City, Princeton and Road 48 all have fish. Verona has a few fish if you want to anchor.

Trout Fishing

Lower Sac Redding to Red Bluff: Great Caddis fishing dry or nymph Yuba River: 20 Bridge down to Daquirre Dam - hot trout fishing with E C Caddis, Pheasant Tails, Rubber Leg Princes. Ryan and David Scott Merin of Stockton belted the fish from 4 - 7 pm.

Striper Fishing

South fork of the Mokelumne, the shoals, B W, I-5 Bridge in Stockton: Stripers to 10 pounds, some days up to 30 fish in a day. G. Mettler of Lodi hit 21 fish in 2 hours. It is hot!

White Pines

Good dry action on trout to 14 inches. Parachute Adams and Cripples do it.

Silver Lake

Doing great on Browns using Streamers & Clousers. Bruno Huff (guide) has been getting some nice fish trailing flies.

West Carson

Use Nymphs & Eggs to pound up the Rainbows. Swensen's and the Meadow have been hot.

Beaver Creek

Good fishing with a dry fly and dropper. A Red Humpy and a black AP pick up the nice 'bows.
