

How play can help children grieve

Sarah Helton explains how Good Grief Toys can enable children to engage with death and bereavement

A child's natural way of learning is through play and exploration. Children learn about all aspects of life through play: shopping, cooking, going to the doctors and so on.

What about if we applied the concept of play to learning about the other aspect of life – death?

Can we provide children with a way to explore their experiences of death, bereavement and grief through play?

Good Grief Toys allows children to do this. This is a new toy set that provides



children with engaging toys to explore difficult scenarios through play. And it provides adults with the resources they need to help deliver difficult news, and to support the development of the child's understanding of the situation and their emotional reaction to it.

Good Grief Toys is a set of 45 handcrafted wooden toys. Each wooden piece can be used in a versatile manner to represent an infinite number of situations: visiting Granny in hospital; a parent dying; returning to school after a bereavement; a road traffic accident; attending a funeral and much more. The toys have been designed for children aged three to 12. They are also appropriate to be used with individuals with special educational needs/disabilities.
