Praying in Lent: the Psalms

This year Ash Wednesday is on February 17; this marks the start of the season of Lent. The season of Lent includes the six Sundays leading up to Easter. It is interesting to me that Lent is both ancient and modern. The seasons of the Church year are an ancient tradition which were created as a devotional and teaching tool to connect the Bible stories about Jesus with weekly worship services. But today many contemporary churches and modern church leaders are claiming the season of Lent, often without mentioning the long history behind this practice, as a time for personal prayer and spiritual discipline. We need to claim special times and seasons for focused attention on prayer and personal devotion. Lent is such a time.

This is especially true this year when it seems like time has slowed down. Generally, because of the coronavirus pandemic, we are not going to restaurants, movies, stores and public places as much; we are home more. This year for Lent, claim this time at home for personal spiritual renewal. I suggest reading the Psalms: slowly . . .daily. . . prayerfully. . . verse by verse. . .repeatedly. Read a Psalm-a-day. Find, write down and memorize your favorite verses from the Psalms. Search the Psalms for verses that match your feelings and emotions. Do a Bible study on the Psalms that are quoted in the New Testament.

The influential Protestant reformer and fore-father of the Presbyterian Church, John Calvin, described the Psalms as "an anatomy of all parts of the soul, for there is not an emotion of which anyone can be conscious that is not here represented as in a mirror." The Psalms include every dimension of the spiritual life from soaring praise - "Praise the Lord, all you nations; extol him, all you peoples" (Psalm 117: 1) to shaking anger and disappointment - "Out of the depths I cry to you, Lord" (Psalm 130: 1).

In the tradition of Lent, Psalm 51 is always prayed on Ash Wednesday. This is a good place to begin a season of devotion and prayer: "Have mercy on me, O God, according to your unfailing love; according to your great compassion blot out my transgressions. Wash away all my iniquity and cleanse me from my sin" (Psalm 51: 1, 2).

Now that we are in COVID lockdown except for Sunday worship services and many of our LMCPC family are worshipping virtually, the opportunity to fill the Food Pantry boxes inside the church is limited. But the need for these food donations is ongoing and increasing. Therefore, we have put containers outside the door to the Church office so you can drop off your donations anytime during our regular office hours, 9 a.m. to 2 p.m. Monday through Friday. Of course, the donation box in the Narthex will continue to be available if you attend on Sunday mornings.

Per Capita – The amount we pay the Presbytery of Carlisle for each member of LMC for 2021 is \$27.23. If you are a member, please consider paying your Per Capita this year. Thank you!

The Home Ministry Team and leaders of LMC's Garden Club are planning outside clean-up days and weeks. We are asking for help from members and friends of LMC. We have identified several weeks to begin the beautification of our church property. Sometime the week of March 22, we would like to begin weeding, edging and shrub trimming where needed. Week 3 - Bells of Faith



The Blue Envelope - Per Capita Offering

The annual giving of all Presbyterians, in the form of our Per Capita offerings, is a "tie that binds" the entire church and benefits every congregation. Per Capita provides the means to strengthen the connections of our work and build lasting relationships to help all Presbyterians share God's love through mission and ministry. Per Capita is the primary source of funding for the Office of the General Assembly and is how Presbyterians mutually and equitably share the costs of coming together to discern the Spirit's leading for the future.

Per Capita amounts are determined by General Assembly nationally, regionally by the Synod and locally by the Presbytery. These monies are used to administer the responsibilities, functions, and mission of each governing body. This year that assessment in our presbytery is \$27.23 per member. Our Session is committed to paying the full assessment for all members on our roll because we treasure our relationship with the wider church, and the congregation benefits when members contribute their share to the whole.

This year the split is as follows:

General Assembly: \$ 8.98 (an increase of \$.03 from 2020)

Synod of the Trinity: \$ 2.40
Presbytery of Carlisle: \$15.85

Total: \$27.23

This assessment per member maintains a physical office and staff at all three levels of governance; it provides training and leadership development for our church officers; it provides learning opportunities for pastors and members of congregations and faith formation initiatives for youth through Camp Krislund; it also provides oversight and preparation for those discerning God's call to ministry. These are just a few examples of what the per capita funds do.

But it is not these benefits alone that make us so deeply committed to the per capita offering. It is our shared sense of our Reformed heritage and our Presbyterian identity that compels us to take our relationship with the whole Presbyterian family so seriously.

Thank you to all who have paid and plan to pay your share of the \$27.23 per member. By contributing your portion of per capita, you will free up dollars in our regular budget for the work of our congregation in this community. If you have not contributed to this in the past, we hope you will consider doing so this year. You may remit your per capita contribution by using the special envelope designated "per capita" that came with your offering envelopes, or simply by writing "per capita" on the memo line of your check.

We look forward to your participation in per capita giving, an expression of your commitment to ministry both within our congregation and beyond.

Students are returning for classes. For some, this means hopping online for lectures delivered over Zoom (a video conferencing service). For others, this means heading back to campus for a semester spent in a dorm-room without roommates.

As we begin the spring semester, it appears that much of our work with students will again take place online. This creates both great challenges and great opportunities.

The challenge is that so much of our ministry work is interpersonal. In a typical week, we would connect with dozens of students face to face. Those interactions would build trust and give us opportunities to talk deeply about questions of faith and life. Creating these interactions online is functional, but far less effective than speaking in person.

However, at the same time students are far more available than ever before. Sports, Greek life, student clubs and many campus events are on hold for the semester. Even meeting together with a group of friends to study or grab a meal is challenging with the COVID restrictions. Students are hungry for community and genuine relationships which creates an opportunity for us to share the love of Christ.

Please pray for us, that we would persevere in ministering to students online. Please also pray that God would bless our efforts to proclaim the gospel through this new medium, and that men and women would come to faith in Christ this semester!

How Our Budget Works

LMCPC's budget is divided into two categories: the "COF" budget, or "Church Operating Fund," and the "MOM" budget, or "Mission Opportunities and Missionaries." COF funds are spent on the church itself and its activities, including but not limited to music and deacons, worship and other ministry supplies, Sunday School, property expenses and maintenance, office supplies, and salaries. The MOM funds go to other organizations for their work. This is where we strive to be Christ-like in serving others.

MOM funds go to local organizations like the Gettysburg Soup Kitchen and Child Evangelism Fellowship, and they go nationally and worldwide. The largest portion helps to support actual missionaries. We also support additional organizations through the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.).

In a year (2020) in which many of the organizations we support faced difficulties and sometimes unique challenges because of COVID, your giving remained strong and enabled us to meet those challenges. Your estimate of giving cards for 2021 indicate that trend continuing. Early indications are that the organizations will continue to face difficulties, and we are thankful for our generous congregation!

Most organizations are working with individuals and populations not blessed with the resources we enjoy, and we endeavor to spread the Gospel through this work. Some of our support goes strictly to evangelism. All should reflect the guidance Jesus Christ has given us and our response for God's love in our lives.

2021 Mission Organization\Missionary (MOM) Budget

Through your Christian generosity, this year's MOM budget will help to support 24 mission organizations locally and around the world. Beginning this month and continuing in the coming months, I will highlight all the mission organizations and missionaries supported by LMC.



This year the MOM Budget will provide \$3,000 for **Child Evangelism Fellowship (CEF) of Adams County**. Before COVID, Good News Club meetings were held each week at all the elementary schools in Adams County (except Franklin), plus some home programs. Unfortunately, last fall only one club was able to meet in a school. If you

This year the MOM Budget will provide \$1,200 (increase of \$200) for the Gettysburg Community Soup

Kitchen (GCSK). Located at 22 West High Street in Gettysburg, GCSK has provided nourishing meals, at no cost, to the hungry in our community for over 25 years. Because of COVID, the Soup Kitchen has been forced to adopt new procedures. All food items are prepared in-house. A hot take-out meal is provided Monday-Friday (11:30am - 12:30pm). A cold bagged "double lunch" and some extra grocery items on Saturdays has successfully covered the weekend so the kitchen can close on Sunday. The average meals served each day is 40, some days more than 50. Food donations should be coordinated with Sandy Lutz, Soup Kitchen

The MOM Budget includes \$6,200 for SAT-7, which is a Christian non-profit providing inspirational, infor-



mative and educational satellite television services to the churches and Christians of the Middle East and North Africa. The November 24, 2020 newsletter from SAT-7 begins with a thank you for our part in their "historic ministry." More than 30 million people in the Middle East, North Africa and parts of Central Asia watch SAT-7 on a regular basis. Most of the audience are not Christian, but they welcome Christian

television into their homes, even in closed locations. Prior to the November newsletter, SAT-7 experienced a 4,000 percent increase in view response to some live programs. They report a total of 160 million views on YouTube as seekers and isolated Christians followed the many programs on their phones, computers, and smart TVs. Of course, the lockdowns and fears over the virus were a factor, but it was also because millions in the Middle East and North Africa are fed up with institutional religion, with their governments, their religious leaders, and rampant corruption.

The MOM budget includes \$500 for the **Gettysburg Ministerium**, a networking group of area religious leaders. The Ministerium is perhaps best known for organizing community worship services at Thanksgiving and on Good Friday, and for the outdoor summer services at the Gettysburg Battlefield. Prayers are that 2021 will bring back a sense of normalcy to their programs. The group supports the C.A.R.E.S. program for the area's homeless, and it provides vouchers for emergency food and transportation aid.

The MOM Budget includes \$500 to support **The Gideons International.** The Gideons' primary activity is



distributing copies of the Bible free of charge. Gideons is most often recognized for placing bibles in hotel rooms; however, they also distribute Bibles to members of the U.S. Armed Forces as well as to patients at U.S. Veterans Admini-

stration hospitals. www.gideons.org/about

The 2020/2021 season was a challenging one for C.A.R.E.S. The guests could not shelter in any of the fourteen churches. The decision was made to rent motel rooms for the guests. This meant that individual breakfast meals needed to be provided and delivered daily to motel guests and placed outside their doors.

From January 10, 2021 to January 23, 2021 LMCPC provided about 390 breakfast meals for an average of 29 guests. This was a challenging and rewarding mission. As I write these notes from the Clerk's Desk the plan is for the Session to meet on Wednesday, January 27, 2021, a bit too late to meet the publishing deadline for this edition of Li'l Ripples. Our meeting was first postponed due to COVID restrictions and then due to an impending winter weather event. Since I am not able to give you all the news I normally would I want you to know that despite the slow start to 2021 Session has been at work via e-mail votes and preparations for the annual report. Here are a few updates and actions taken:

- Membership as of 1/22/2021: Active Members (AM = CA): 171, Baptized Members (BM = FP): 68 and Family Members: 57.
- The Interpretation and Stewardship Team continues to monitor all church finances. Please see the usual monthly report and the quarterly report of special accounts in this issue.
