Don Gowan (1929 - 2024)

Walter Brueggmann (1933 to 2025)

Two giants in my life died within the past year. Both of them had long careers as Professors of Old Testament. Gowan was my teacher for many Bible classes when I was a student at Pittsburgh Theological Seminary in the 1980s. I never had Brueggmann as a classroom teacher but I read many of his books, and attended numerous continuing education events and lectures where he taught. Both of them were ordained pastors: Don Gowan in the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) and Walter Brueggmann in the United Church of Christ. Together they were part of a generation of Bible teachers, including Eugene Peterson, in American mainline Protestant churches who helped change the course of Bible study and bring the Scriptures back to the center of the Church's ministry.

Beginning in the 1920s there was a strong push in academic Bible study, led by some influential German scholars, that emphasized the history, context, and cultural background of the Bible as the only full way to understand biblical truth. The historical-critical study of the Bible defined a generation of Bible teaching. And slowly a renewal worked through the world of Bible study and preaching. We have these 66 books of Holy Scripture which have been claimed and proclaimed in the Church from the earliest days as blessed, sacred and authoritative. The words themselves have power, energy and inspiration. Let the words of Holy Scripture speak for themselves. All the history, cultural context and background is important, but more important is simply letting the Word speak.

In 2000 I attended a conference where Walter Brueggmann was teaching from his newly published, influential *Theology of the Old Testament*. He signed my book and wrote me a note that captures the whole transformation which he and his generation ushered in: "I'm glad we share these texts."

Simply, deeply, regularly and together read the Bible. In the first place, do not worry about background, context or history. Simply read the Bible, pray the Bible, enjoy the words, and allow them to touch you. Do not worry about not understanding, and do not get bogged down in a lack of understanding or insight. Do not be frustrated by differences of opinion and interpretation. Read the Bible with an open heart and a creative imagination. Allow the Bible to sing for you. Allow it to be beautiful. If this is all new for you, start with the Psalms and the four Gospels. I am glad we share these Words. I am grateful for all my teachers through the years.

Ginny graduated from Gettysburg College and taught junior high school English for over 30 years in the Gettysburg Area School District. Our scholarship recipients this year were Kylie Wampler, Jahanzaib Nasiri, and Farishta Nasiri.

A coffee hour to honor this year's scholarship recipients was held on June 1. One of the recipients, Kylie Wampler, was unable to attend due to a previously scheduled vacation. She sent a nice thank you note and says she is excited to continue her education at WVU.

Jahanzaib and Farishta Nasiri were there, spoke about their plans to further their education at Gettysburg College, and thanked us for the checks. I learned a few things about the Afghan culture during the coffee hour. Farishta explained that in their culture, they could not shake hands with someone of the opposite sex. Also, it is not acceptable for a female to have her picture posted on social media. Both have good English skills (when they arrived in this country in 2021, they hardly spoke any English). Farishta was so excited she was almost bouncing! Rayna Cooper, Coordinator of the Refugee Resettlement Partnership, was also in attendance. She drove for Jananzaib and Farishta.

Farishta, as well as Jahanzaib and Jamal, has a job with Open Minds in Gettysburg for the summer. Open Minds is an information source, executive education provider, and business solutions firm specializing in the sectors of the health and human service industry. One of the other things I learned is that the reason Farishta was able to accept this job is because her brothers also work there. As an Afghan woman, she could not work without a male family member also being there. There was a lot of food left at the end of the coffee hour, so we sent most of it home with Jahanzaib and Farishta. They were thrilled!

SUNDAY, AUGUST 31, 2025





. and, speaking of music . . .

MUSIC THAT MOVES ME

My heart is stirred by a noble theme as I recite my verses for the king:
my tongue is the pen of a skillful writer.

You are the most excellent of men and your lips have been anointed with grace,
since God has blessed you forever. Psalm 45:1-2

In this second installment of "Music that Moves Me," I am pleased to feature the hymn "Beautiful Savior" (more popularly known as "Fairest Lord Jesus"). This classic hymn is a favorite of Kathy Megyeri, who suggested it to me. In particular, Kathy recommends the most famous English version of the hymn, which was arranged by F. Melius Christiansen in 1919. It is the signature piece for the St. Olaf Choir, even today. You can enjoy it at this link: https://youtu.be/ wwL8HqYeig?si=1trOGL31aDnGKIP.

So, with thanks to Kathy, here is the very interesting story of "Beautiful Savior."

While the earliest existence of this hymn dates to its discovery in a manuscript in 1662, it was not actually published until 1667. In that year, "Schönster Herr Jesu" (Most Beautiful Lord Jesus) appeared in "Münster Gesangbuch," a Jesuit hymn book.

The origin of the lyrics is unknown. The origin of the English translation is also unknown - except for the fourth verse. This verse was translated by Joseph A. Seiss, an American theologian and Lutheran minister. Interestingly, in many hymnals, Seiss receives credit for translating the entire hymn. Also interesting (especially to me and other residents of Adams County, PA) is the fact that Joseph Seiss studied at Pennsylvania College in Gettysburg.

In his excellent book, "Then Sings My Soul," author Robert J. Morgan comments, "This hymn emphasizes the beauty and wonder of Christ, and it alludes to His dual nature, that He was both human and divine, God made flesh, the God-man: O Thou of God and man the Son...Son of God and Son of Man..."

I really like Morgan's take on this!

The tune likely originated in the eighteenth-century, in the Glaz area of Silesia (a region with parts in Poland, Czech Republic and Germany). In fact, our Lower Marsh Creek hymnal attributes the lyrics to "Schlesische Volkslieder, 1842" (Silesian Folk Songs, 1842). This tune, "Beautiful Savior," is also known as "Fairest Lord Jesus," "Crusader's Hymn" and "St. Elizabeth," but its original name was "Ascalon." (Ascalon is the location of the First Crusade's final battle.) It was in 1850 that Richard Storrs Willis renamed it "Crusader's Hymn," when it was included in his collection called "Church Chorals and Choir Studies." This change was likely due to the tune's original name, and it is reasonable for us to assume that Willis subscribed to a historically unfounded legend of his time, which asserted that crusading soldiers would have sung the hymn while marching to the Holy Land.



In 1862, the tune assumed yet another name, "St. Elizabeth," when composer Franz Liszt utilized it in the composition "March of the Crusaders" within his oratorio "The Legend of St. Elizabeth."

In recent years, many hymnal committees have declined to use the traditional "Crusader's Hymn" name, presumably to avoid association with the period of Christian history known as the Crusades, which were once viewed as missionary victories, but are now regarded in a negative light by many Christians. However, a few modern hymnals, like ours ("Worship and Rejoice") continue to call it "Crusader's Hymn," perhaps for continuity and historical consistency.

Robert J. Morgan, the author of "Then Sings My Soul," concludes his remarks on the hymn "Fairest Lord Jesus" with these words:

"('Beautiful Savior') brings to mind one of the greatest observations ever made about Christ, uttered by the "Golden-Mouthed Preacher" of Antioch, John Chrysostom, in a fourth-century sermon: 'I do not think of Christ as God alone, or man alone, but both together. For I know He was hungry, and I know that with five loaves He fed five thousand. I know He was thirsty, and I know that He turned the water into wine. I know He was carried in a ship, and I know that He walked on the sea. I know that He died, and I know that He raised the dead. I know that He was set before Pilate, and I know that He sits with the Father on His throne. I know that He was worshiped by angels, and I know that He was stoned by the Jews. And truly some of these I ascribe to the human, and others to the divine nature. For by reason of this He is said to have been both God and man."

"Beautiful Savior" - or, as I have always known it - "Fairest Lord Jesus" is a timeless, beautiful hymn that eloquently expresses the love and devotion that Christians have for our Savior. I hope you will reflect upon the history and meaning of this wonderful classic song of praise each time you have an opportunity to sing it.



Adams Rescue Mission

Banquet and Plans for the Future

Eleven folks from LMC attended the Adams Rescue Mission's banquet on June 2. Will Hudson, Executive Director, and other staff members served the food which was provided by Ragged Edge. Will, Paul Henderson, and Rachel Greathouse spoke about what ARM is working on – a single women's shelter in York Springs, attainable housing, and childcare centers for low-income parents.

ARM is partnering with Chapel Hill Church of God to repurpose a parsonage in York Springs into communal living space for up to ten women who will undergo a 10-12-month restoration program to restore hope and establish a foundation for their future. The opening is planned for mid-December and there will be an application process starting in October.

ARM plans to purchase buildings to provide low-income apartments for people who have no other options. They recently purchased one building thanks to funding from committed donors, and they hope to procure 10-15 additional units but need to secure donor commitments so that they can respond quickly when property becomes available.

ARM hopes to open six licensed childcare centers for low-income parents over the next two years to address the affordable childcare crisis in Adams County. They are seeking \$200,000 during the next six months to be able to license and refurbish the first center in York Springs. They expect to be able to open the York Springs daycare by the end of the summer. Rachel Greathouse, Director of Child Development, has been in discussion with LMC about the possibility of using space in the Fellowship Hall for another center.

From Kevin & Maria Noyes' June 9 Newsletter



I (Kevin) met Brett three years ago. I slowly learned that unlike most students, he was in his late twenties. Brett had served in the Marines and now ran his own business in addition to taking classes. He occasionally visited our Bible study. But something always seemed to hold him back... until this year. Suddenly, Brett grew more spiritually hungry. He began attending our Bible study more regularly. He asked good questions, started reading the Bible on his own, and even took notes. Then he signed up for Focus, our week-long end of year conference. At the conference we taught from the book of Revelation; and Brett soaked it in. As we talked

over meals and between sessions, I sensed the Lord was doing something in him. So I invited Brett to join me for a private chat on the porch. As we sat on the rocking chairs, Brett opened up. He shared that he was very interested in everything he was hearing from the Bible. He said he agreed with much of it and told me that he believed in God. But, he wasn't ready to call himself a Christian. Brett explained that he still had a lot of questions. He hadn't read the whole Bible and felt reluctant to trust in Jesus if he didn't even know everything the Bible said about Him. Brett wasn't against Jesus, but he wasn't quite for him either. "I quess I'm sort of in the middle," Brett said.



I encouraged Brett to consider the teaching from Revelation. Ultimately, there's no middle ground with Jesus. As we chatted, we opened our Bibles and moved from Revelation to Mark. We examined Jesus' words, "For whoever would save his life will lose it, but whoever loses his life for my sake and the gospel's will save it. For what does it profit a man to gain the whole world and forfeit his soul?" (Mark 8:35-36) Then Brett seemed to come to a realization. "I'm not sure I'm ready to surrender to Christ's control," Brett said. "I'm really stubborn. I don't like the idea of giving up my control of my life." He continued to share how he liked having autonomy and the ability to call all the shots. It was part of why he liked having his own business.

God was working. Brett's whole bearing changed as he came to that understanding. He knew enough. The guestion was whether he would trust enough. Would he put his life under Christ's authority?

I wanted Brett to process that question with the Lord. So I showed him one of my favorite places at the conference center - a quiet clearing in the woods facing a large wooden cross. I encouraged Brett to take some time to think, read his Bible and pray to God. I prayed with him and then left, giving him some time alone.

A few hours later, Brett approached me in the dinner line. "So uh, I wanted to say thank you," Brett said. He gave me a funny look. "Yeah..." I looked back at him, "Wait, are you saying what I think you're saying?!" Brett went on to confirm



that he had chosen to give up the control that he valued so highly. That afternoon, he had prayed to put his faith in Jesus. Later that night, he shared with all the students from Penn State York at the conference. To cheers, claps and a giant bear hug from a couple of the guys, he announced that he had chosen to follow Jesus. The following Sunday, he came with us to church.

Please join us in praising God for his work in Brett! Please also pray for God to establish Brett in the faith, and help him to keep growing in Christ this summer.

God used the teaching from Revelation to work in many students besides "Brett." Here are a few quotes from other students who attended the conference:

- ~ "Sometimes I forget I am walking past dead people. So many people in this world are dead to sin and ultimately damned to the lake of fire, and we must take care to accept Christ's command to go to the nations. I feel more of the weight and severity of evangelizing and also feel better prepared to do so."
- ~ "I had given up on trying to get through to my dad (he's an atheist), but the sessions convicted me to continue trying to share with him."
- ~ "I have been going down a bad path and decided that I would just attend FOCUS because I was invited and thought it might be fun. But after being there I have made goals for myself this summer to further my relationship with Christ and others."

SAT-7

From a SAT-7 USA June 16 newsletter:

The Middle East region is on high alert following a wave of air strikes last Friday. Many are distressed and unsure of their future as the conflict escalates. But SAT-7 is responding rapidly to the changing situation, providing much-needed biblical comfort and prayer to SAT-7 PARS viewers and others across the region.



A special episode of SAT-7 PARS' *Mirror* program gave viewers the chance to share their feelings and prayer requests. One woman from Iran shared, "Last night my child couldn't fall asleep out of fear... even inside our own home, we don't feel secure."

Program guest Mansour Borji explained, "This conflict is something that has worried everyone for a long time. Despite the preparations made by both the people and the governments, it still has consequences for everyone – not just in Iran, but throughout the region. The sound of sirens can be heard in Jordan and other neighboring countries. People there are also feeling the tension, just like many ordinary people in Iran."

Asked what the role of Christians is in responding to the escalating situation, Borji urged people to pray for wisdom for those in governments, and to be mindful of those suffering as a result of the conflict. He added: "We must pray for peace and calm. That peace and calm, I should mention, doesn't always mean the absence of conflict, but it still is something we should deeply desire."

Another caller to *Mirror*, from Tehran, shared how he couldn't sleep during the strikes and "sat there the whole night filled with fear and stress." He explained how the experience brought back feelings from the Iran-Iraq war when he was a young child. "I still clearly remember the first day of the war, when the Tehran Airport was bombed," he said. "At the time, my grandfather was holding me in his arms and trying to comfort me. But he himself was terrified – and that fear transferred to me. That fear grew up with me. And last night, my own children were deeply scared. Honestly, you just don't know what to do."

Members of SAT-7 PARS' Viewer Support Team joined the program to offer comfort and prayer. Pastor Farshid encouraged Christians in Iran – and everywhere – that "there is something deeply powerful and essential that we *can* do." He continued: "We can pray for Iran... [to] the God who is above all borders; the God who is beyond all the politics we see playing out in today's world; the God we believe hears us – because He is alive... To ask for His peace for them in these moments. Because God's Word says, 'My peace I give to you – not as the world gives.' What our people need today, more than anything, is peace."

Please pray for our Viewer Support Team as they minister to viewers living in areas being affected by the attacks.

To get us started this month here are a few fun facts about prayer in the Bible.

- 1. There are 650 prayers listed in the Bible.
- 2. The first time prayer is mentioned (where God talks to someone other than Adam and Eve) is in Genesis 4:6.
- 3. Jesus withdrew regularly to pray.
- 4. Paul in his writings mentions prayer 41 times.
- 5. Jesus' model for how we should pray The Lord's Prayer covers every area of our lives and needs Past Present Future.
- 6. "Amen" means 'let it be' or ' so be it' and appears the first time in Numbers 5:22 for a person yielding to God.
