*And . . . Speaking of Music***MUSIC THAT MOVES ME: Jesus Loves Me**

“The Lord appeared to us in the past, saying:

*“I have loved you with an everlasting love;
I have drawn you with unfailing kindness.” – Jeremiah 31:3*

Hello, friends!

It's summer - the season of patriotism, outdoor barbeques and vacation bible schools. All across our beautiful country, kids will be learning about Jesus, while playing outdoor games, creating arts and crafts, and singing childrens' praise songs.

One favorite song often associated with VBS is the time-honored *“Jesus Loves Me.”* Arguably the best-loved children's song of all time, its origins are surprisingly adult-oriented - and patriotic! Here's the story.

In 1849, two sisters became authors out of necessity.

Susan and Anna Warner were the daughters of Henry and Anna Bartlett Warner. Henry was a well known New York City lawyer, and Anna hailed from a fashionable, wealthy New York family. Their young daughters enjoyed relatively privileged lives, becoming devout Christians in the late 1830s. Both became confirmed members of the Mercer Street Presbyterian Church.

Then, tragedy struck. The girls' mother passed away, and their Aunt Fanny Warner came to live with the family. Not long after that, the United States suffered the Panic of 1837, a financial crisis that triggered a major, long-lasting depression. Their father lost the majority of the family fortune through poor investments and the resulting lawsuits. The Warners were forced to leave their New York City mansion and move to a run-down farmhouse on Constitution Island, near West Point, New York.

To help the family's dire financial situation, the sisters started writing to earn extra money.

Writing under the pen name Elizabeth Wetherell, Susan quickly achieved literary success. She wrote over 30 novels, with her first, *“The Wide, Wide World”* becoming a massive best-seller in 1850. Anna, the younger of the two, was also successful, publishing 31 novels and a large body of work in collaboration with Susan. Anna sometimes wrote under the pseudonym Amy Lothrop.

As a sideline to their careers as authors, the unmarried sisters held regular Bible studies for the cadets at the nearby United States Military Academy. Encouraged by her uncle Rev. Thomas Warner, the West Point Chaplain, Anna composed a new, original hymn each month for her Sunday School class. The lyrics to *“Jesus Loves Me”* first appeared in Susan's 1860 novel *“Say and Seal,”* spoken by a fictional Sunday School teacher to comfort a terminally ill child. Later, it was published as a hymn in the hymnbook *“Original Hymns”*.

In 1862, William Bradbury, the well-known composer of *“He Leadeth Me”*, *“Just As I Am”* and *“Sweet Hour of Prayer,”* set Anna's words to the music we know and love today. With the hymn now complete, the cadets at West Point were often heard to sing *“Jesus Loves Me”* while on military duty.

Because of the song's profoundly positive effect on the spiritual health of countless cadets, both Susan and Anna were buried, with military honors, in the West Point Cemetery. They are the only civilians to be interred there. Their home was willed to the Academy and made into a National Shrine. It is currently a museum in honor of the Warner sisters.

The next time you are privileged to sing this beloved hymn, I hope that knowing its rich history will cause it to resonate as something more deep and insightful than a mere children's song. I hope you will remember the patriotism and devotion to the Lord that was the very essence of Anna Bartlett Warner and her sister, Susan Bogert Warner.

Jesus said, "Let the little children come to me, and do not hinder them, for the kingdom of heaven belongs to such as these." - Mt. 19:14

Our first letter from Penny (Peniel who is from Togo, West Africa) says: *"I am happy to thank you for being in my life. I ask God to grant you good health, everything your heart desires, to protect your family, and to be your guardian every day."*

Penny signed her letter by drawing a picture of her hand.

In her letter, it states that her caregivers' names are: Tsadi Kodjo and Bata Afi, and that she has one sister. Some of the things she does are walking, running, jumping, and climbing. Her favorite food is la pate, Foufou. In French, **"la pate"** literally translates to **dough, pastry, or batter** in English. It refers to any raw, workable mixture used in baking, such as bread dough (pâte à pain), pie crust (pâte feuilletée), or cake mix. Depending on the region (especially in parts of West and Central Africa), **"foufou"** (often spelled fufu) refers to a famous staple dish made of starchy dough. Wikipedia says the term **foufou** generally has two distinct meanings depending on the context: it is a playful French slang term for someone who is crazy, and it is a traditional West/Central African staple food.

One Vision - Three Firsts

We have been praying for years that God would open a door into Jordan to serve workers - supporting and strengthening couples, singles and teams. Last month's trip there was our third in a year. The conflict in Iran and the fear it brought to the region made the trip uncertain. But God made a way. And there was not one problem while we were there. In leading four events in three weeks, there were three highlights (firsts for us) that are fulfilling the vision we have for this ministry.

We led our first Deeper Friendships singles intensive in Amman. Six single workers participated in the 4-day event. Listen to their feedback.



You gave us a lens through which I can view all my relationships, especially my co-workers.

Incredibly practical, relevant, insightful content and tools for single workers... revolutionary!

The Word, Spirit, and the gracious witness of others ministered to my heart... because you came.

Thank you for choosing to serve single workers in the field, not just couples.

I love that you are doing this; it is deeply needed!!

Peace and Power Through Surrender (By Cheri)

Over the past few years, the resources from Deeper Walk International have helped me better support overseas workers who are stuck in spiritual / emotional bondage. Along the way, I have personally experienced greater freedom by understanding my own wounded heart. Here is one such example.

In the past five months, I have attended three conferences with people who triggered distress in me. I felt that each person owed me an apology for very hurtful things they had said and done in the past. One couple was from our Turkey days, and two others from our attempt to join a ministry in Budapest. Anticipating being in the same room with them challenged my "steadiness and peace." Maybe you are familiar with this type of stress!?

Every day I am utilizing skills learned from Deeper Walk. One such practice is called a "God Sight." This is not the "raising awareness of God's hand in your day" activity. But it is an exercise that asks several questions.

1. *What are you thankful for?*
2. *What does God want you to know about those positive things?*
3. *Who are you mildly, moderately, or "on fire" irritated by?*
4. *How does Satan want you to see that person?*
4. *How does God want you to see them?*

I wrestled with this God Sight exercise as I thought about the people mentioned above. It took some time for clarity to come. Here is what God showed me.

- ~ *Those challenging relationships all motivated me to attach to God in my distress for truth and stability.*
- ~ *I am to hold expectations of people lightly. They make me long for heaven where "all will be well."*
- ~ *All those people are under construction by You, God, just as I am. You love them and want good for them. I want good for them too. Your power is resting on my weakness.*
- ~ *I have grown in settledness in who You created me to be.*
- ~ *I have the Holy Spirit living in me and more skills than ever to quiet the overwhelm.*
- ~ *I surrender my life, desires, and needs to You, the Source of my life.*
- ~ *Those people were instruments in Your hand to close doors so I could walk through open doors to green pastures. You are my Lord!*

What peace and power come through surrender!

The Divided Heart – God Does Heal That

Fundraising is a very concrete way to help the kingdom of God come about.

Money is a reality of not only family relationships but also in our relationships with other people, institutions and causes beyond our family life. If money touches our relationships with family members as well as the world around us, it also reaches into our inner life. How we look, at the phrase “personal worth” can mean both the extent of our financial assets and our value as a human being. If any of these questions make you uncomfortable, it may be because talking about money is one of our greatest taboos.

The pressure of our culture to secure our own future and to control our lives as much as possible does not find support in the Bible. Jesus knows our need for security. Because security is such a deep human need, He has warned us to not place our trust in things or people that cannot offer us real security. We cannot find security if our heart is divided. Jesus says something very radical in Luke 16:13

“No servant can be the slave of two masters; he will either hate the first and love the second, or be attached to the first and despise the second. You cannot be the slave both of God and of money.”

Jesus would ask what our security base is grounded in. We cannot put our security in God and also in money. We have to make a choice. Jesus counsels: *“Put your security in God.”* If we truly want to experience and share the kingdom of heaven here on earth we need to make the choice if we belong to God or to the world.

When we talk about stewardship in our church we are giving all our members the opportunity to put their resources at the disposal of the kingdom. Whether the gift is much or little is not as important as the possibility of making their money available in showing us how God’s love can multiply the effects of our generosity and becomes part of the unbounded grace of God at work in the world. As well as our traditional ways of contributing to the church we are looking into online giving for our future. (Stay tuned).

- ~ Preparing for the Sons of the American Revolution (SAR) event on June 27. The new SAR bench and plaque are set up. A potluck luncheon is set for Fellowship Hall.
- ~ Construction for the modifications at the back of the Education Building for the Day Care is ongoing. The Day Care will be operated by the Adams Rescue Mission and called *Little Ones Childcare LLC*. No date has yet been set for when it will start.

News from the Spiritual Life Team – oversees the spiritual life of the church as well as fellowship, education and music in the church

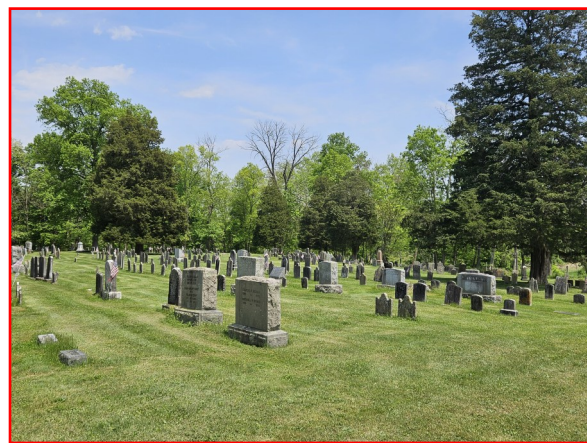
