This is a Test!

What does it mean to be a Christian today? There are many interrelated answers to this question. To be a Christian requires viewing all of life as beneath the sovereignty of God. To be a Christian requires a commitment to acknowledge and claim for oneself the richness of our spiritual lives. In our materialistic world, living a spiritual life is challenging. A Christian spiritual life includes a commitment to prayer, worship, love of others, and mission. To be a Christian requires us to behave each day in ways that seek to express the great biblical values of peace, righteousness and compassion. More than anything else, being a Christian today means knowing Jesus. Knowing Jesus includes both knowing about Jesus, and knowing Jesus as part of a deeply personal relationship with him as our Lord and Savior.

Since we have moved through all the great high holidays of our Church year, let's test ourselves: Do we know about Jesus?

1. The Church year starts with Advent and flows through five Church seasons until Pentecost. (In the Church year, the many weeks from Pentecost to the start of Advent again are often called Ordinary Time.) What are the five traditional seasons of the Church year and how are they related to the life of Jesus?

2. In the Church, we mark with special days the most important events in the life of Jesus. What is the significance of each of these days and how is each of these days related to the life of Jesus?: Christmas Day, Epiphany, Baptism of the Lord Sunday, Ash Wednesday, Palm Sunday, Maundy Thursday, Good Friday, Easter Sunday, Ascension Day, Pentecost.

3. In the Church, we always seek insight and wisdom from the things that Jesus did in his life. Make a list of specific things that Jesus did in his life, and ponder how these influence the way you live your life.

4. In the Church, we celebrate two Sacraments: the Lord's Supper and Baptism. Do you know the stories from the life of Jesus that are the inspiration for our Sacraments?

TRAVEL TO SCOTLAND — October 8 - 17, 2021

Join Pastor Mark and Pastor Dale on the trip of a lifetime, discovering our spiritual roots in beautiful Scotland. The trip, of special interest to those with a Reformed or Presbyterian background, includes visits to a number of sites made famous by the great Scottish Reformer, John Knox. Arriving in Glasgow and a tour of the city, we travel to Edinburgh, where we will visit St. Giles Cathedral, Edinburgh Castle, Holyrood Palace, and walk the famous "Royal Mile." From there it's off to St. Andrews, Scotland's oldest university town, and the "Home of Golf." Leaving St. Andrews we will travel from Aberdeen to Inverness in the Scottish Highlands and have the opportunity to look for the Loch Ness Monster! In addition, we'll visit a sheep farm, where sheep herding dogs are trained, and enjoy a traditional "Celidh Experience," an evening of Scottish dancing and music. From there we travel to the coast and ferry to the Isles of Mull and Iona, where, in the 13th century, St. Columba established a monastery that became the cradle of Christianity in Scotland. From Iona we return to Glasgow by way of the Trossachs, including a scenic cruise on Loch Katrine, tour of Stirling Castle, and a visit to the Bannockburn Heritage Center. The tour concludes with a "special "farewell dinner" in Glasgow before returning to the United States. It is our hope that this tour will be a rewarding spiritual experience as well as an enjoyable one.

Pastor Mark will lead a study that will help us appreciate our Scottish spiritual heritage prior to our departure. Time is running out to sign up! <u>The deadline to sign up without any penalty is June 15</u>. Stone by Stone (The Church Song)

When the church was going to celebrate its 250 birthday on May 31st, 1998, Gary Bechtel, our then Clerk of Session, asked me if I would write a poem to commemorate the anniversary. I willingly did and read the poem in the cemetery on the day of the anniversary. Fast forward to 2021 and our church organist, Linda Clark, felt that with the passing of 6 of our beloved members, that we should have a church song to help honor them and all others who have departed during the church's lifetime. The poem became important once again since it was based on everything a church does for the people who attend it. Dirk Grove became a very essential part of this idea since he writes and sings music beautifully. So, one night Linda, Dirk and I went to choir practice early and began creating what we hoped would be a church song that honored the building of our structure and those who have served and loved "our little stone church." Linda suggested we begin each stanza with the opening notes of our beloved, "Closing Prayer", and emphasize how stones were brought by the congregation to add to the beauty of the building. We all rearranged words of the poem so they would fit the pattern of the song and with Linda and Dirk playing original music on guitar and piano and choir members adding harmony to the verses, we all felt our church song was ready. On May 2nd, the song was presented and was graciously received. I was honored that my poem was used again after 23 years and that I had the privilege to work with two wonderful people whose talent made it into a song which we hope will be used often. Roz Santay

It's the hymnbook of Scripture, a prayer book, and the longest book in the Bible. Psalms is quoted more in the New Testament than any other Old Testament book. The 150 psalms contain a wealth of literature that is both applicable and memorable. Below is a sampling of quotes from the Psalms. See how well you do at choosing the correct option to complete each thought. But a word of warning: the various psalmists were very honest about their feelings. As you check your answers at the bottom of page 10, you may be surprised at some of the things that are actually stated in the Bible.

- 1. Blessed is the man who does not walk
