Local churches in more than 100 nations hand out these Operation Christmas Child shoebox gifts at festive outreach events where the Gospel is presented in a child-friendly way. Each box bursting with items becomes a tangible expression of God's love to the child, their family, and their community.

Local ministry partners distribute your gifts to children in their communities. After receiving shoebox gifts, many boys and girls are invited to enroll in *The Greatest Journey*, a 12-lesson discipleship program. Through the program, ministry partners are able to establish long-term, caring relationships with children and families, sharing the love of Jesus Christ

MUSIC THAT MOVES ME

The nations will fear the name of the Lord, all the kings of the earth will revere your glory— Psalm 102: 15

Although European settlers in North America had held thanksgiving feasts for many years, the feast enjoyed by the Pilgrims at Plymouth Plantation in Massachusetts is the event that lives in our imaginations. In 1623, reeling from a drought that threatened to destroy their crops, the colonists fasted and prayed for relief. Winter was coming, and, if the crops failed, starvation was a very real possibility. Finally, it rained. Then, a few days later, Captain Miles Standish arrived with staples and news that a Dutch supply ship was on its way. This prompted the colonists to hold a day of Thanksgiving and prayer on June 30, 1623.

For the next 150 years, festivals of Thanksgiving were held irregularly in North America. It wasn't until 1789 that President George Washington proclaimed "a day of public thanksgiving and prayer" to be held on Thursday, November 26. However, the proclamation was not law, so it was only observed by the American people whenever subsequent presidents renewed the proclamation. (President Thomas Jefferson, believing that this violated the separation of church and state, was a notable exception.)

But, in 1863, elated by the Union victory at Gettysburg, President Abraham Lincoln finally declared Thanksgiving to be a national holiday.

I think this connection between a battlefield victory and a National Day of Thanksgiving is interesting. When I think of the quintessential Thanksgiving hymn, my mind goes immediately to "We Gather Together." I wonder if yours does, too?

I was surprised to discover that this seemingly American hymn actually originated in the Netherlands, and its composition was also prompted by a battlefield victory. The war in this case was the Eighty Years War (1568-1648), which the Dutch people fought to gain their independence from Spain. Excessive taxation and persecution of Protestants by King Philip II of Spain were the chief causes of this conflict.

The hymn claims its melody from a very old Dutch folk song whose original, secular lyrics began, "Wilder than wild, who will tame me?" The hymn we know, though, which extols God's help in deliverance from religious oppression, dates to January 24, 1597. On that date, Maurice of Orange defeated the Spanish occupiers of the town of Turnhout. Because Turnhout was considered to be an impregnable stronghold, this significant triumph was part of a series of victories that marked the turning of the tide of the Eighty Years War. The Protestants who lived there had been forbidden to practice their religion. So, it makes sense that, upon winning this battle, they celebrated by writing new words to a familiar tune. They called it "Wilt heden nu treden," which means, roughly, "We gather together." This is significant, because joining together to worship was a heretofore forbidden act.

And, so, this song of military triumph and freedom of oppression (with God's help) became a standard in the Netherlands, appearing in many songbooks. From there, it was a natural progression for the hymn to be transferred to the New World (America), as it was brought along by Dutch settlers who emigrated in the 1620s.

Throughout the centuries, the hymn continued, alive and well, in Dutch-American communities, but it remained largely unknown outside of those circles. Then, in 1937, a pivotal event occurred: the Christian Reformed Church in North America decided to publish its first hymnal.

It's important to note that the Christian Reformed Church in North America began with Dutch immigrants. For many years, the only singing allowed in worship for these churchgoers was the singing of the Psalms. In 1937, however, a thencontroversial decision was made to permit other hymns to be sung in church. And "We Gather Together" was chosen as the opening hymn in their first hymnal.

From there, it was inevitable that inclusion in other hymnals would follow, and "We Gather Together" became a staple of congregational singing. And that's how a Dutch folk song that celebrated Holland's freedom from Spain became one of our best-loved American songs of Thanksgiving.

Happy Thanksgiving, friends! Let us celebrate God's presence in our lives with humble hearts, grateful minds, brotherly love and SINGING!

To be honest, we had pretty low expectations for this fall. "How many students are going to come to a campus [PSU York] that will close in two years?" we wondered. We braced ourselves for the campus to feel like a ghost town. But we prayed in faith that God would connect us with spiritually hungry students. As we prayed, we gave out donuts, ran outreach tables, conducted spiritual surveys, and handed out flyers - all to connect with as many people as possible with the hope of sharing the gospel with them. We invited everyone we met to join us for our weekly large group Bible study.



The morning before the Bible study, Maria and I prayed for at least 30 students to join us for Bible study. It seemed like a big, bold ask. We'd never had that many students join us before. Then we got to the room. Young men and women flocked into the room. We passed out Bibles and greeted new students, amazed as more and more kept coming. Suddenly we realized, we didn't have nearly enough chairs! Maria ducked out of the room to ask for help. By God's grace, an excited faculty member showed us a hidden stash of chairs under a stairwell and helped us grab them. He shared our surprise and delight that so many people were hungry for God's word!

As students grabbed seats and shared their names, we marveled. We prayed for 30 students. God brought 35! This was our largest Bible study we have EVER had since we planted the fellowship at PSU York.

What we thought would be a harder year of ministry is turning out to be our most fruitful year so far at PSU York. Please join us in praising God, and pray for the Lord to keep giving these young men and women eagerness to spend time in the Word!

SAT-7

October 6, 2025: Bringing Hope to Young People in Iran

"People are hopeless; they don't know what to do. They finish school but they can't get jobs; they can't live their lives – many people try to commit suicide. Some try to get out of Iran but that can be even harder, having to start a new life somewhere else. We try to encourage people to hold onto faith, and to the hope that God will help Iran."

Ilya, one of the young presenters of *Generation of Hope*, describes the purpose of the SAT-7 PARS youth program as it returns this fall for a second season. The 16-year-old, who is from Iran but now lives in the UK, joined the show not long before the 12-day war between Israel and Iran in June.

It was an extremely anxious time for all Iranians, including those living outside the country. During the conflict, the live weekly program shifted its tone from the usual upbeat style to a more somber prayerful mood, giving people space to express how they were feeling.

Now, *Generation of Hope* is back on screen after the summer break, and it is aiming to bring hope and comfort to young viewers after the recent turmoil.

Generation of Hope is created for teenagers and young adults in Iran, and also those in Afghanistan and Tajikistan, covering relevant topics to young viewers such as mental health, self-harm, friendship, and com - parison. The program offers a mixture of serious discussion with light-hearted segments and games. It is filmed between SAT-7 PARS' London studio and a small studio space in Türkiye, where two other Iranian hosts, Hanieh and Nina, are based.

Finding Faith



Ilya was invited to audition as a presenter by a SAT-7 PARS' producer, who spotted his potential during a church Christmas production.

Hosting *Generation of Hope* is giving Ilya the opportunity to share the faith in Christ he has found since leaving Iran ten years ago. Ilya's mother had become a believer in Iran, resulting in persecution from her family. After they left, she was able to pursue her faith more freely and Ilya was struck by the transformation.

"I began to see incredible changes in my mother's life through her relationship with God," he said. "She no longer shouted, wasn't angry or frustrated, and showed me much more love. Seeing her transformation inspired me and helped me realize that I had a Heavenly Father who was always with me."

Life Outside Iran

Leaving Iran has meant big change for Ilya. While grateful for the freedom and opportunities of life in the UK, it is painful being away from his homeland and loved ones who are still there.

"It's a hard feeling," he said. "We pray for Iran all the time and would love to go back, but that's not possible for us because of our Christian beliefs and the persecution we would face."

Hearing regularly about the struggles of his counterparts in Iran motivates Ilya in his ministry with SAT-7.

"People are very depressed because of the situation in Iran," he said. "Through Generation of Hope, we are trying to make them smile, have fun, and know God more. We try to inspire people to hear about Christ; to show people that Christianity is completely different to what they know."

Excerpts from a September 24, 2025 email:

Dear Sandy and Members of Lower Marsh Creek Presbyterian Church,



Greetings to you in the name of our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ. Thank you for your patience and prayers for us in this time of discernment. On that note, we have big news to share with you!

We have accepted an invitation to serve in Ghana. Bob will be teaching and serving on the faculty of the <u>Akrofi-Christaller Institute of Theology</u>, <u>Mission and Culture</u>. Last year Bob spent a month at this institution and was inspired by their vision and ethos for equipping students to effectively connect the gospel with their cultures and to grow

into faithful disciples of Jesus Christ. Kristi will continue serving with the <u>Healing Hearts, Transforming Nations</u> ministry. She has been invited to join their international planning team, supporting teams doing healing *Continued on the next page* . . .

and reconciliation ministry and training facilitators in different countries. She also hopes to support local teams in Ghana and West Africa who are beginning this work of healing and reconciliation, helping churches to bring God's healing power and love to people who have been traumatized.

Our sending organization for serving in Ghana is <u>The Antioch Partners (TAP)</u>. We are grateful for TAP's vision to equip people to serve and make the gospel known around the world. TAP will handle all donations towards our ministry and support. We are now beginning the process of raising funds for our transition to Ghana and for ongoing support as we move there. We would appreciate your prayers and consideration of supporting us in this ministry. If you are able to support us this year and/or moving forward, please let us know. ...

Over the next several months, Bob will be finishing the writing for his PhD dissertation focused on the contextualization of the gospel in South Sudan. Kristi is also doing a graduate certificate program on trauma. We also hope to have a short sabbatical early next year. We appreciate your prayers for God's guidance and help to complete these aspects of equipping before we transition to Ghana. We are trusting God's provision of the support needed, and hoping that we could be in Ghana by May/June of next year.

Thank you so much for your partnership in ministry – it has been a privilege to be connected to you. We look forward to hearing from you, and please do let us know if you want to continue to join us in ministry going forward. We pray that God's Spirit continues to fill and empower the people in your congregation as you make the love and grace of Christ known among you.

Hello, friends and family!

We've found it difficult to express in one letter all that September encompassed, but we are now well into our second school year here in Dakar! There have been many exciting moments as well as some challenges along the way as we have continued navigating the life here that the Lord has blessed us with. Among many things, since the start of the year, our school has had to make some unexpected adjustments to accommodate the current political situation involving the UN's relationship with the Senegalese government, the USAID cuts

sending many of our families into unemployment, and the French military presence leaving the country. All of this has led to some financial strain for the school due to many of our students' families having to leave the city, but thankfully through prayer and the Lord's provision, He continues to be at work here at Dakar Academy. We are just simply learning new ways to trust our Savior each day, and it's all served as a good reminder than none of what we do here is possible without His guidance in the first place.

... On a positive note, since the start of the year, many memories have already been made! From our class dodgeball tournament and announcing the fall play, to almost getting trampled at a Senegalese World Cup qualifier soccer match — yes, you heard that right — it has all been quite the adventure. If you'd like to hear the full story, let us know because it was scary in the moment, but thankfully we are able to laugh about it now. We've gotten lots of rain, had some busy days, and spent many weekends laughing with friends in the form of birthday celebra-

tions, movie nights, and picnics on the beach. We've said this before, but the difference in our confidence from last year to this year is astounding. We feel much more present, and it's so fun to dive deeper in the relationships we formed last year with staff, students, and locals.

While we still have much to learn, it's so comforting to come back to a familiar place with friends we recognize and a school that we love and that loves us back! We have found a new shared athletic passion – pickleball! The energy of the soccer fans in the stadium is unmatched. Rainy season reality – sometimes you have to teach sopping wet and barefoot after getting poured on.



We now have 7 weeks of classes under our belts, and most days you can find us playing some kind of sport with the students, leading extra-curriculars, and finding ways to cool off. Rainy season is our warmest months of the year, which also means it is hot and muggy, even long after the sun sets each day. It will be this way with the temperature consistently rising until the beginning of November, so we envy you all a little as we watch you enjoy your warm fall drinks and get cozy as the temperature starts to drop for Fall back in the States.

News from the Interpretation and Stewardship Team - manages church finances and missions


