## A little about Dave in his own words:

I was raised in a Christian home and accepted Jesus as my Lord and Savior at an early age. As a teenager I first considered a call to Christian service as a vocation while at a Christian camp. To pursue that vocation, I attended Wheaton College and graduated with a B.A. in Biblical Studies and Christian Education. After a couple years as a Christian Educator, in1981, I was called as the Youth Director of the Vienna Presbyterian Church in Virginia outside Washington, D.C. Ministry with youth flourished there with several hundred young people participating and growing as disciples.

After a several years at Vienna, the Session approached me about pursuing ordained ministry. Having already done some graduate work in Marriage and Family Therapy at the University of Maryland, I began taking courses at Virginia Episcopal Seminary. Eventually I enrolled full-time at Wesley Theological Seminary in Washington, D.C. I completed my M. Div. there in 1992 and was called to the Vienna church as an Associate Pastor where I remained until 1999 when I was called as the Pastor of Fairfield Presbyterian Church in Mechanicsville, VA. I began a D. Min. program at Union Seminary in Richmond, VA in 2004 and received my degree in the spring of 2008.

In 2009 I was called as pastor to the Gettysburg Presbyterian Church where I served until my retirement in 2022. In retirement I have done pulpit supply and led mission trips to Mexico's Yucatan peninsula. I am a small group leader, serve on the missions committee, and play keyboard with the praise band at GPC.

I was happily married to Bonnie Wright for 48 years until her death in October of 2024 from ovarian cancer. I am still grieving that loss. I have two adult children. I enjoy traveling, jogging, radio-control airplanes, and reading.

## RUTH'S HARVEST - FAIRFIELD MISSION PROJECT

Ruth's Harvest – Fairfield is a volunteer program that will provide hungry children in the Fairfield area with a backpack of food for them to eat over the weekend when they are not getting school lunches or school breakfasts. They receive individually packed servings of food to cover seven meals and two snacks for Friday evening, Saturday, and Sunday. Our congregation is supporting this ministry in the following ways listed below.

## What is needed?

- 1. Donations of food: Single-sized servings/packages of food items that need NO refrigeration (see list of food items below). Items can be dropped off at our church which are then delivered to Ruth's Harvest.

## And, ... Speaking of music ....

## MUSIC THAT MOVES ME

Jesus answered, "Everyone who drinks this water will be thirsty again, but whoever drinks the water I give them will never thirst. Indeed, the water I give them will become in them a spring of water welling up to eternal life."

John 4:13-14

You may (or may not) recognize Fanny Crosby's name. In any case, it's almost certain that you've heard (and probably sung) at least one of her hymns. That's because, during her 95 years of life, she authored over 8,500 gospel songs. The best known of these include *Blessed Assurance, To God Be the Glory, Pass Me Not, O Gentle Savior,* and this month's featured hymn *Near the Cross.* 

Born in 1820 in Putnam, New York, Fanny Crosby was blinded at six weeks of age, possibly due to a medical treatment that damaged her optic nerves. She wrote her first poem at age eight, which was a personal declaration of gratitude for her blindness:

"Oh, what a happy soul I am, although I cannot see! I am resolved that in this world contented I will be."

Fanny Crosby's childhood was filled with the Christian faith. Starting at age ten, with the encouragement of her grandmother, she began memorizing the Bible. By age 15, she had committed to memory all four gospels, the Pentateuch, the Book of Proverbs, the Song of Solomon and many of the Psalms.

Fanny attended the New York School for the Blind, where she learned to play piano, organ, harp and guitar. She also became a very good soprano singer during this time. Later, Fanny would become a teacher at the same school.

On November 30, 1850, at 30 years of age, Fanny attended a worship service at the Thirtieth Street Methodist Church in New York City. She had been struggling with troubling dreams and a nagging sense that something was missing in her life. This proved to be a pivotal day in her life, because, as the congregation sang Isaac Watts' great hymn *At the Cross*, Fanny felt "flooded with celestial light" (her words). Deeply moved, she went forward and accepted Jesus Christ as her savior.

At the cross, at the cross where I first saw the light,
And the burden of my heart rolled away,
It was there by faith I received my sight,
And now I am happy all the day.

After that, she resolved to focus her poetic skills on hymn writing. Her works were often set to the musical compositions of William Bradbury and Ira Sankey, two of the best-known songwriters of the day.

One day in 1869, Cincinnati industrialist William Doane gave Fanny a melody he had written. Hearing it for the first time, Fanny felt the melody speak to her. It said, "Jesus, keep me near the cross," and she wrote down the lyrics to *Near the Cross* immediately. Doane would go on to become Crosby's chief collaborator, composing melodies for over 1,500 of her poems.

When asked to describe her hymn writing process, Fanny said, "It may seem a little old-fashioned, always to begin one's work with prayer, but I never undertake a hymn without first asking the good Lord to be my inspiration."

Fanny was so prolific, in fact, that publishers were hesitant to include so many works by a single author in their hymnals. Because of this, Crosby began writing under various pseudonyms, including Mrs. C.M. Wilson, Lizzie Edwards, Ella Dale, Grace J. Frances, Rose Atherton, Maud Marion, Leah Carlton, Henrietta E. Blair, and nearly two hundred others.

Though blind, Fanny Crosby had a gift for describing vivid imagery in her poetry. Combined with a deep love of Jesus Christ and a profound knowledge of God's Word, she provided the world with a rich legacy of enduring hymns. It was her stated goal to bring one million people to Christ through her hymns. Because of the enormous staying power of her work, and the sheer volume of her catalog, I'm guessing the final total will exceed Fanny's personal goal exponentially.

The next time you hear or sing a Fanny Crosby hymn, please thank God for providing - for us - the marvelous gift of praise music, channeled through his faithful servant Fanny Crosby!

## 3rd Annual Diaper Give Away

The World

We collected 7,969 diapers, either through direct donations or purchased with money we received. On Saturday, September 6, we gave away 4,726 diapers along with 36 packets of wipes. Everyone who received diapers also received an invitation to the ice cream social on September 16 (there were 61 cars that came through the line). Of the remaining diapers, 3,095 were donated to SCAAP and 148 to the Hillside Personal Care facility.





A survey asking "How did you hear?" was taken during the event and the road signs were mentioned most. The newspaper articles and flyers were also effective. Other things mentioned were Facebook, Back to School Night at Walmart, "drove by", and "came last year".

Again, many thanks to all who made this event a success!

Which is why we serve among God's servants in challenging places. Because we also care. We so want every people group to be reached. Every bit of hardship for us is worth the joy of knowing we are serving Him by helping others, even though we are but one small stop on their long journey of faith.

WAITING......WAITING......WAITING

As this is written, probably 5 out of 10 people in our congregation are in a waiting pattern. Waiting for test results; waiting for surgery; waiting to recover from surgery; waiting for our new pastor choice; waiting for the check that is in the mail or simply waiting to see what this new day brings.

This beautiful verse from Isiah 40:31 talks about this very time of waiting.

But those who wait on the Lord shall renew their strength;

They shall mount up with wings like eagles,

They shall run and not be weary, They shall walk and not faint.

Isaiah describes people who actively trust, hope in, and actively seek God, rather than passively wait in idleness. We actively seek God by praying for direction and protection, and expressing faith through worship. Joining with fellow believers in worship and prayer gives us a sense of calm that all is well and will be well in the future.

The promise of Isaiah 40:31 is that by actively waiting we will have not only our physical strength renewed, but also our spiritual and emotional strength. We will be able to rise above the challenges and gain a higher perspective. While our ability to run and not be weary may be gone we can certainly walk and not faint, demonstrating unwavering stamina and resilience.
