MUSIC THAT MOVES ME

Therefore go and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit. - Matthew 28:19

This month's "Music that Moves Me" column features *Be Thou My Vision*, which, I have been told, is among Pastor Mark's top ten favorite hymns.

In the world of music, it has long been an accepted practice to attribute the name of a tune to its place of origin. The tune of *Be Thou My Vision* is called "Slane," because Slane is the village in Ireland to which the melody can be traced.

Interestingly, it was on Slane Hill, in County Meath, Ireland, that the famed St. Patrick defied King Logaire of Tara. The king's decree prohibited the lighting of any fires prior to the commencement of the pagan spring festival - which the king typically signaled by lighting a fire. Patrick's Christian devotion, expressed by his defiant lighting of candles, in a direct challenge to prevailing Druid culture, so impressed King Logaire that he permitted Patrick to continue his work as Ireland's first Christian missionary. (The king could just as easily have executed Patrick for his insolence, thereby preventing Christianity from gaining its initial foothold in Ireland.)

Be Thou My Vision is not the only hymn to utilize the tune called "Slane." Lord of All Hopefulness; Lord of Creation, to Thee be All Praise; God, In the Planning and Purpose of Life; and Wake Now My Senses have all been set to the same Irish folk tune, although none have achieved the immense popularity and ubiquitousness of Be Thou My Vision.

The lyrics come from a poem which dates to the eighth century, as evidenced by two manuscripts which are currently housed in the library of the Royal Irish Academy. The Irish text, which begins as "Rob tu mo bhoile, a Comdi cride," was first translated into literal prose by Mary Byrne, and published in *Eriú*, the journal of the School of Irish Learning, in 1905.

There are 16 couplets in the original poem, beginning with "Be thou my vision, O Lord of my heart. None other is aught but the King of the seven heavens," and ending with "O heart of my heart, whate'er befall me, O ruler of all, be thou my vision."

While most traditional Irish religious songs are not Christian in nature, there is a longstanding practice of editorial weddings - where a traditional tune is paired with more liturgical (relating to public Christian worship) lyrics. *Be Thou My Vision* is an excellent example of this practice.

It was in 1912 that Eleanor Hull, the president of the Irish Literary Society of London, organized the literal prose into verses, which she published in her *Poem Book of the Gael*. Shortly thereafter, her verses were "married" to the *Slane* tune, and, between 1912 and 1945, the hymn was included in multiple British hymnals. It wasn't until after World War II that American hymnal editors began including it in their compilations. Since then, *Be Thou My Vision* has become a standard in most modern hymnals.

According to Helen Phelan, an Irish liturgy and ritual scholar, one of "the essential characteristics of the text is the use of 'heroic' imagery to describe God. This was very typical of medieval Irish poetry, which cast God as the 'chieftain' or 'High King' (Ard Ri) who provided protection to his people or clan. The Iorica is one of the most popular forms of this kind of protection prayer and is very prevalent in texts of this period." A Iorica is a prayer for protection in the Irish monastic tradition, derived from the Latin word for armor. The original "High King of Continued on the bottom of the next page . . .

heaven" lyrics - which are evocative of pagan chieftains - are now expressed as "Great God" in the *United Methodist Hymnal*, to be more inclusive.

The connection of the tune "Slane" with St. Patrick may be coincidental. Or, perhaps it is divinely inspired. Consider that, when Patrick was about 16 years old, in 373 A.D., his hometown on the banks of the River Clyde in



Scotland was attacked by raiders. His home was set ablaze, and Patrick fled into the bushes, only to be caught by the pirates. He was taken prisoner, forced aboard the pirate ship, and shipped to Ireland to be a slave. It was there that Patrick gave his life to Jesus, saying, "The Lord opened my mind to an awareness of my unbelief in order that I might remember my transgressions and turn with all my heart to the Lord my God." Patrick eventually escaped and returned to Scotland. But, in an exhibition of pure obedience to God, he returned to the land of his captors when he was 30 years old, as a Christian evangelist, and the rest is history.

"Heart of my own heart, whatever befall, Still be my Vision, O Ruler of all."

One of the oldest, most enduring and moving great hymns of God's Church, *Be Thou My Vision* is a loving expression of our deep, personal relationship with our savior Jesus Christ.

THE PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH OF HONDURAS

I am grateful for the opportunity to travel again to visit my friends in Honduras the week of August 5. This was my 21st trip to Honduras since 2006. Given my pending retirement, I went to Honduras this time expecting to say "Goodbye" and "Thank you!" But during the week, God revealed some other plans. I have no intention of doing any preaching or temporary ministry in retirement, but I do expect now to stay involved and supportive of our Presbytery's long standing partnership with the Presbyterian Church in Honduras.

A short introduction: The Presbyterian Church in Honduras includes 31 congregations now. All of the congregations have church buildings, typically one room, concrete block with corrugated metal roofs. Most of the congregations also have Sunday school buildings, since there are many children. One rural pastor we met reported that their congregation now has 45 adult members and 75 children; two professional school teachers travel each week far out from their city school jobs to teach Sunday school. The congregations all have pastors who are elected from out of the membership of the congregation, approved and supported by the Presbytery.

We met with the leadership team of the Presbytery (nine people, Pastors and Elders, men and women). They emphasized again the power and the meaning they receive simply from us showing up. They discussed many dreams and visions, challenges and obstacles. Two projects popped in my mind as things we may easily and generously support: Continuing the housing ministry which we started in 2008 and is just now starting back up after COVID. Our Presbytery has built 24 houses Honduras; a typical, one room, concrete block family home cost about \$4,000. I am grateful that our mission team has already approved a \$2,500 gift to finish the funding for a new home for Pastor Elmer. Elmer is a bright, energetic, new pastor in a rural church who also farms a 12 acre, mountainside with corn, beans and watermelon.

Secondly, an amazing high-school scholarship program which has grown enormously. High school in Honduras requires tuition and expenses for books, supplies, uniforms and travel. Thus many young people finish school after 8th grade; not a good situation for finding a good job. I will be working with our leaders in our Presbytery to also raise support for the Honduran scholarship program. They now have the leadership, organization and capacity to provide as many scholarships as they have funding. The amount of each scholarship changes depending on the student's specific situation but is typically about \$100 for a school year. Our Mission Committee is considering this project for our 2026 Mission budget, and other churches in our Presbytery will also support this effort. Your support will, of course, be appreciated.

Warehouse Church meets the first Sunday of the month, 9:30 – 10:45 am., in the ARM warehouse at 2515 York Road, Gettysburg, and is open to the public. The purpose of Warehouse Church is not only to share the gospel, but to provide a safe place for families/supporters to spend time with our Resident Guests.

Affordable childcare for ages 12 months to enrollment in kindergarten is offered by Little Ones Childcare in York Springs. This is a stepping stone to help low-income mothers, fathers, and families overcome system dependency, cyclical poverty, inept education, and Battered Women Syndrome. Those who qualify must either enter the workforce or be enrolled in an educational program to include GED, trade school, or college within 60 days of childcare enrollment. The lack of a dedicated women's shelter in Adams County highlights a significant gap in resources for single women seeking refuge, as evidenced by the eight to ten inquiries received monthly by ARM. This situation underscores the urgent need for supportive services facilities tailored to the specific needs of women in crisis within the community. Adams Rescue Mission, partnering with Chapel Hill Church of God, will repurpose a parsonage in York Springs, into a communal living space for up to ten single women.

The deficit in affordable low-income housing, and especially rental units accepting housing vouchers, is growing, as fewer and fewer landlords are accepting the vouchers. Of all the concerns addressed by ARM, the need for affordable housing is the most acute. Our comprehensive approach to addressing low-income housing in Adams County demonstrates a proactive and innovative strategy, including securing funding to purchase properties, partnering with landlords for risk mitigation through subletting, and building collaborative relationships with other organizations to expand housing availability.

DiscipleMakers

Ten years ago, DiscipleMakers ministered on only 11 campuses. But over the last decade, God did something amazing. The Lord made us wonder, "What would it take to go from reaching hundreds with the gospel to thousands?" DiscipleMakers would need to reach more campuses. We would need to deploy staff to new areas. It would be uncomfortable. Often painful. At times it would seem impossible. But "what is impossible with man is possible with God" (Luke 18:27). So, in 2015, DiscipleMakers set a goal: to reach 14 more campuses, for a total of 25 by the year 2025. And by God's grace, DiscipleMakers did not just reach 25 campuses, but 26! Just last week, Brett joined us in our home for a Bible study in Daniel. He participated enthusiastically in the discussion and eagerly made applications to his own life. ing the gospels, started going to church (even when he had to go by himself,) and had joined two more Bible study groups. Praise God for His work, and for allowing us reach students like Brett!

And the tie breaker is....it's a boy!! We are so excited and thankful to add another son to our family! Thank you for continuing to pray with us for the baby's health. Simeon was very excited to find out that he is getting a baby brother. He was convinced the baby was a sister for Hope, but quickly got giddy when he heard the news. Mission of Mercy

Mission of Mercy is an adult primary care doctor's office on wheels. They provide quality, compassionate and comprehensive free medical care and medications for the uninsured and underinsured suffering from acute or chronic health issues.

Mission of Mercy operates a 3-chair state-of-the-art mobile dental clinic. They provide free dental care, typically in the form of fillings, extractions and cleanings, with medications as needed for infections.

Platoon 22 serves hundreds of veterans, many of whom lack access to dental care but regularly visit the Platoon 22 center for other essential services. It's a space where they feel safe, respected, and supported. On July 18, a program to provide access to dental care for veterans was launched. As part of its veteran's outreach program, Platoon 22 managed the clinic scheduling and patient registration. Mission of Mercy brought the mobile dental clinic to the site, along with a team of skilled, professional dental volunteers, ready to provide critical services. Fourteen veterans were served, each receiving a cleaning and three received fillings or extractions. While this is a successful collaboration, Mission of Mercy is looking for additional volunteer dentists to support this program. Cumulative as of June 30, in Gettysburg alone 4,296 medical patients have been seen for a total of 23,247 visits (316 in FY25); 1,681 dental patients for a total of 2,735 visits (84 in FY25). The top five diagnoses or treated conditions in 2024 were diabetes, hypertension, digestive system disorders, depression/mental health, and high cholesterol. Active volunteers total 175, including 12 physicians, 43 nurse/technicians, 6 dentists, and 32 interpreters.

SAT - 7



Among the millions of Afghans being deported back to their home country are Christians whose lives are now in grave danger. SAT-7 is highlighting the stories of threatened Afghan Christians, responding to their urgent prayer requests and broadcasting special episodes about the mass deportation.

SAT-7 has been in regular contact with an Afghan man called Alborz,* based in Tajikistan, whose brother was killed in Afghanistan for his faith. "When my brother was killed by the Taliban because of his faith in Jesus, for a long time I

struggled to forgive them," Alborz told our Viewer Support Team. After reflecting on the Sermon on the Mount, he felt able to forgive, but the thought of returning to Afghanistan is still extremely concerning for his family, especially for his teenage daughter, Armita.

"Our situation in Tajikistan is extremely bad," said Armita, who has followed SAT-7 PARS' children's programs for several years. "Many of our fellow [Afghan] believers have been deported from Tajikistan... And in Afghanistan, unmarried girls like me are being forced into marriage, which is very distressing. I don't even know how to express the terror we are experiencing. The conditions here are really tough."

Armita wants to hold onto her faith amid the dangers. "I don't want to go back to Afghanistan. I don't want to be deported, and I don't want to be killed. They will ask our family about our faith, and I know everyone will confess that we are Christians... It is not just members of our family who have been killed; many people have died, and we know that if we speak out [about our faith], we too will be killed. Please pray for us."

With huge numbers of Afghans being deported from Iran, many are wondering why this is happening, why now, and whether or not it is even legal. A recent episode of the SAT-7 PARS talk show *Insiders* hosted Dr. Saeed Peyvandi, a professor of sociology, answered these questions.

"After the fall of Kabul (Afghanistan's capital) to the Taliban and their rise to power, we witnessed a massive wave of Afghans entering Iran," Saeed explained. "This caused a very negative reaction within Iranian society. A kind of phobia of Afghans became widespread in Iran... Renting houses or giving them access to certain facilities were essentially banned, even though such restrictions are illegal."

Saeed believes that the Iranian government saw mass deportation as a way to win back some popularity and avert people's attention from their failures. "At least in this one area, where there was public consensus, it could take some decisive steps," he said.

An *Insiders* viewer named Mehtab was heartbroken to hear of the lack of respect for the Afghans. "My heart aches when I see all this hatred and pressure from Iran directed at Afghans," Mehtab said. "It's very saddening for me to see what our dear Afghan brothers and sisters are going through."

A Christian viewer, named Cyrus, shared his honest difficulties with living alongside Afghan immigrants: "I am from a different religious background, and I lived in Türkiye for six years. I was often confronted and harassed by Turks and Syrians for becoming a believer. But, honestly, the worst insults and mockery I ever experienced came from Afghan migrants."

Immigration is rarely simple or easy, for the host or the foreigner. But Saeed offered a wise and measured conclusion. "We need to have a serious internal dialogue," he said. "Even if some of these individuals are causing problems in our country... we must try to untangle this complex crisis with humanity, transparency, and legality."

In just over seven months, over 1.9 million Afghans have returned from Iran and Pakistan to Afghanistan. At least 485 Afghan nationals have also been deported from Tajikistan, among them 334 refugees or asylum-seekers.

To remember Senior Citizen's Day (8/21), Grandparent's Day (9/7) and the opening of another school year, <u>Kathy Megyeri</u> passed along these senior citizen's "life lessons" from the book, *Live, Learn and Pass it On* by H. Jackson Brown, Jr.:

- ~ I've learned that most of the things I worry about never happen. Age 64
- ~ I've learned that if you stay focused on yourself, you are guaranteed to be miserable. Age 71
- ~ I've learned that you don't look back except to learn. Age 70
- ~ I've learned that you should make money before you spend it. Age 69
- ~ I've learned that it is best to avoid negative people. Age 98

MISSIONARY CORRESPONDENCE

Thomas & Cheri Henry

Development & Care of International Workers

One Another Ministries (OAM) - Based in Staffordshire, England

This year God has increased ministry opportunities beyond what we imagined. Missionaries are healthier and more effective in ministry with the pastoral care we provide, and we are committed to serve international workers on the front lines as long as we are able.

Financial circumstances change, even for missionaries. More missionaries are hearing about OAM and us, increasing ministry opportunities. Missionaries cannot afford to displace their families to receive the support they need. Therefore, they are asking us to come to them, unexpectedly increasing our travel costs. Inflation in England and exchange rate fluctuations have adversely affected our budget. Changing demographics of our supporters – retirement, death, other hardships – have pinched us. Regular giving keeps us on the field to serve workers. One-time gifts help us train others and reproduce ourselves. God gave us a vision to train more facilitators in key locations around the globe, both to work with us now and to replace us when we one day slow down and return to the US. Four years?

Testimony from a single worker in the Middle East: "The 4-day Singles Intensive came at just the right time. I had recently returned from a very challenging ministry trip, and the intensive gave me a safe space to process that experience. Cheri was so kind and encouraging. From time spent with the Henrys and others in the group, God graciously brought to light issues from my childhood – hidden bitterness I have been carrying. It's been so liberating. I am thankful that life is a journey, and the work of Cheri and Thomas brought helpful skills for cross cultural workers to be healthier themselves. We can now pass along these important skills to local believers and other workers."

Germany in June: We started face-to-face marital counseling with a couple from different cultures preparing for missions. God was good to open their eyes to areas that need to be discussed. The next week we led a missionary couple through a 4-day marriage intensive. God turned this couple towards each other again, giving them compassion for each other and better communication skills to face their challenges in a healthier way. We were able to visit with six couples, coworkers from our years in Turkey who are now residing in Germany, providing pastoral care and support in challenging seasons of having to leave Turkey and realign themselves in new ministries.

<u>Return to Africa in August</u>: After training Every Child Ministries leaders in Uganda in March, they invited us to train their teams in Ghana. However, to fully train them and complete what we started, we want to help send three Ugandan leaders we trained to join us in Ghana in September. We are equipping them now virtually over the summer. Ask God to raise up funds to cover their travel costs.

Return to Jordan in September?: After serving couples in Amman in April there is demand for us to return. Unfortunately, it is still unclear whether we'll be able to enter the Middle East in September. And right now we don't have the funds. Ask God to raise up funds to make this trip possible, if it's His will. A couple's testimonial from the Middle East: "The marriage intensive gave my wife and me the space to process with Thomas & Cheri and the skills needed to help us grow in our understanding of and love for each other. No more shaming between us as a motivator to 'do better.' The Henry's counsel and unpacking of biblical truth have put us on a much better trajectory in our marriage and in ministry."


Brief time in U.S. in November/December: We want to connect with supporting churches and donors; cast ministry vision; raise project funds; attend Mental Health & Missions conference; visit ministry organization who licensed us; spend Thanksgiving and Christmas with family. And ... another reason to go to the U.S. is to lead four separate marriage intensives with missionary couples who are doing home ministry assignment this fall in the U.S. These are couple who potentially could join us in this work, which is part of the vision of reproducing ourselves.

Note: We are hopeful to see the Henrys at LMC in early January but plans are not confirmed so far.

Following our service we will gather for fellowship at our Coffee Hour.



- O Accepted Rob Heims and Deb Wastler into membership by reaffirmation of faith. A public reception will be scheduled for Sunday, August 31.


