ORDINATION

I am writing this a few days after we expressed in our Sunday worship the Service of Ordination and Installation. I want to take this opportunity in our Newsletter to celebrate again this remarkable gift of Ordination which we highlight as Presbyterians. This action does not happen often, and easily falls out of our attention and focus. For all of you serving in these important ministries, as Deacons and as Ruling Elders together on our Session, and, indeed, for the whole congregation, I want to pause and give thanks for this remarkable gift to the Church: Ordination. This is the beautiful language of our Book of Order G-2.0102: "Our Church's ordered ministries described in the New Testament and maintained by this church are Deacons and Ministers of the Word and Sacrament and Ruling Elders. Ordered ministries are gifts to the church to order its life so that the ministry of the whole people of God may flourish. The existence of these ordered ministries in no way diminishes the importance of the commitment of all members to the total ministry of the Church."

It seems mundane and ordinary; but in fact it is extraordinarily powerful and meaningful. We identify people within our Church family who have special gifts, time and commitment to serve. We, as a congregation, elect them to service within our "ordered ministries" as Deacons or Ruling Elders. And, importantly, these people are ordained. This is a divine action, a statement of our faith in the ongoing work and power of Christ in our midst. Ordination looks backward and connects us with all the people, for all the ages before us, who also were called out and set apart for particular service in the Church. Ordination looks forward with trust and hope that all things are in God's hands, and God through Christ will continue to call out people to serve in these special ways in the life of the congregation.

For our deacons and our ruling elders: please take a moment and pause to consider the calling you have received and the gift that has been given to you in your ordination.

For others in the congregation: take a moment and pause to give thanks for our Church and the continuing calling of God which provides leaders, and moves us forward into the future that God is already preparing. In Christ!

A MESSAGE FROM THE EDITOR: In the evening of January 5th, I caught up to two emails that had been sent at noon on that day. *Important News #1* announced the retirement of our long time office manager Barb Schwartz on May 31st after 12 years of service. *Important News #2* declared that our Pastor Mark was planning to retire the 8th of September after 40 years in ministry. Words are inadequate to describe my shock and sadness at the thought of losing this sister and brother in Christ. I felt as though I had been gut punched. Do I resent these faithful servants taking their rest. Absolutely not! Common sense had told me these relationships would come to an end . . . someday . . . but I was not prepared for it this soon. I thought - loss, upon loss, upon loss. Our church family has had to say goodbye to many saints. Whether it is through death or the natural change and progression that is an inevitable part of human life, nevertheless, it is a loss. This sad news brought to mind something I read more than 50 years ago after my father died suddenly before he reached his 59th birthday. In spite of the vast resources at my fingertips since the advent of the Internet, I have never been able to track down the exact quote. At the time, it brought to me a measure of peace. Following is my paraphrase, offered to my precious church family for the same reason:

Throughout our lives we suffer many losses. We lose loved ones and friends. It is like the lights going out one by one, as at the service of Tenebrae, until in the gathering gloom there is only one light left and that is the light of Christ . . .

As our church family travels the long road ahead may we not grow weary as we remember to follow the Light.

Looking Forward to Lent

This year the season of **Lent begins on Ash Wednesday, March 5**. I am writing a series of sermons and we will gather on Wednesday evenings during Lent for a light, soup dinner and Bible study. My sermons and our Wednesday Bible study for Lent will focus on the parables of Jesus, which may be the most important passages in our New Testament. Scholars believe that the parables of Jesus take back as close as is possible to the actual spoken words of Jesus. With his parables Jesus most vividly communicates his purpose, vision and hope. My Lenten sermons and our Wednesday Bible study will be guided by the excellent new book from New Testament scholar Thomas G. Long titled *Proclaiming the Parables: Preaching and Teaching the Kingdom of God.* This is a serious, scholarly book from a prominent New Testament professor which will soon become standard reading in our seminaries. Clearly, this is not light, before-you-go-to-sleep, reading. And the hardcover version is expensive. But if you want to journey deep along with me into the parables of Jesus for our season of Lent, Professor Long's new book will be a great companion.

On March 5th, 2025 at 11:30 a.m our own Dirk Grove will bless us with his musical gifts at the monthly Church Women United meeting. The meeting will be held at Gettysburg Church of the Brethren 1710 Biglerville Road in Gettysburg. Please bring a brown bag lunch. Desserts and beverages will be provided. A \$3 donation for charity will be collected.

Gettysburg C.A.R.E.S.

Gettysburg C.A.R.E.S. consists of a cold weather shelter and a Resource Center geared to provide support for up to 30 people when no other shelter can be found. This is accomplished through a partnership with local churches, including Lower Marsh Creek and other community service agencies.

LMCPC has volunteered to prepare breakfast for the C.A.R.E.S. program from March 24, 2025 through April 7, 2025, excluding Sundays. We will need 2 volunteers to prepare breakfast each morning at 6:00 am at the St. James church youth house, on 121/123 York Street, Gettysburg. Guests arrive at 7:00 am. We will also be responsible for clean-up. St. James church supplies all paper products, juices, tea, coffee and coffeemate, cereals, milk, and condiments. All we supply is the meal. Some suggestions are breakfast casseroles, French toast, breakfast sandwiches, scrambled eggs, sausage links, potato products (hash browns, tater tots, shredded potatoes), fruit, breads or baked goods, muffins, bagels, pancake mix, waffle mix, bread for toast, etc.

On Wednesdays, we can only serve bagels, cream cheese, and fruit, because we cannot cook on Wednesdays.

A training session for volunteers will be held at the youth house closer to our service week. At that time, we will learn how everything works in the kitchen and exactly what we will be asked to do. If you cannot attend the training session, we will pair you with a volunteer who has attended. We will not know how many guests to expect until the week before our service.

We will meet with volunteers after church on Sunday, **March 16, 2025**, to share our menu choices and coordinate the purchase of staples like eggs, sausage links, muffins, bagels, etc., which Joe and Elaine will purchase and store in the church kitchen. Joe and Elaine will check the supplies in the C.A.R.E.S. refrigerator ahead of this meeting to see what supplies are already stocked. The church will reimburse you for any food that you purchase.

Service of Ordination and Installation

January 12,

2025

Sunday's, January 12th, church service was particularly special to me for three reasons.

First, the statement on ordination and installation of the elders and deacons was given by the clerk of session. It was followed by the constitutional questions from the Book of Order W-4.0404 which were presented by Pastor Mark. It closed with the laying on of hands by the ruling elders who stood and reached out in prayer to the newly elected elders and deacons. This part of the service was most orderly, impressive and inclusive.

Secondly, members of the Lend-A-Hand Mission Team, who had just returned from their trip to South Carolina to help the storm victims, stood and told of the effect of that experience on them personally. Many of us parishioners were inspired by their testimony. I was humbled by how much they accomplished and how little I do, especially when I learned that the average age of participants was 75. It was impressive, how much these mission team members valued learning about one another as they worked side-by-side, ate together and travelled to their work sites. Presenting prayer shawls to the victims "lifted us up as much as they were lifted," one reported but all agreed that as one participant recounted, "The biggest lesson we learned is that we are one in Christ." What a powerful and inspirational message for the rest of us to hear, thanks to their commitment, dedication, and efforts.

<u>Thirdly</u>, upon exiting the service, both Pastor Mark and Barb presented us with their retirement announcements; Barb has served us for 12 years, retires in May, and regards us as "family." Pastor Mark was ordained as minister in the Presbyterian Church 40 years ago and will leave LMCPC after Sunday, September 7. As hard as it is to learn of his departure, he, in his letter, writes that his years here were "a wonderful blessing and a rich, spiritual journey" and calls us "kind, generous and deeply supportive." So what more can we ask?

The point I am trying to make is that during that one hour of church service, I sat with church elders and deacons whom I so admire, I was humbled and blessed to worship among true disciples who physically ministered to those so in need of aid and then I read two retirement notifications from people I so applaud for their lengthy service and for their acumen and skill at what they do so well. It left me driving home with a thankful heart that LMCPC came into my life, welcomed me, and more than anything made me want to give more of myself to others. I am humbled but motivated to sing the praises of this church and its members in every possible way that I can. And I am immensely thankful to the church's leadership, the Lend-A-Hand Mission Team, and to Barb and Pastor Mark for making that Sunday service so memorable. You all personify the love of Christ and are disciples that I can only hope to emulate during the rest of my days. Thank you!

<u>Editor's Note:</u> The following article by Kathy Megyeri was received on <u>April 4, 2024</u>. Space limitations and other considerations had prevented it's inclusion in the newsletter. In light of President Carter's death on December 29, 2024, I felt it appropriate and desirable to include it in this first issue of the newsletter since his passing.

The Virtues of Aging by Jimmy Carter - A book review by Kathy A. Megyeri

A few years ago, when I visited the Carter Museum and Visitor Center in Plains, Georgia, I was struck by the mock-up of his high school classroom. A large, life-sized portrait of his teacher, Ms. Julie Coleman, hung in honor of the reading list she prescribed to Carter that included the book "War and Peace" and in gratitude for the two pieces of advice she gave him so long ago. First, she told Carter to "Adjust to changing times but cling to unchanging principles," lines he quoted in his inaugural address. Secondly, she told him, "Any schoolboy, even one of ours, might grow up to be President of the United States."

As a former high school teacher myself, that experience endeared me to this former President who would repeatedly honor the teaching profession. Former President Carter, who recently turned 99 and is defying the odds by spending over a year in hospice care, survived metastatic brain cancer, liver cancer and brain surgery in 2019. He is America's oldest living President and wrote this reflection on aging by melding memoir, anecdotes, political opinion and practical advice. This book was written in 2011. His honesty and forthright attitude as he shared his experiences that come with age won me over and so I try to share copies of this book with as many others as I can.

About the Book

He wrote, "As we've grown older, the results have been surprisingly good." Carter basked in the affection he felt from others, the prestige he achieved, and the profound influence he attained on the world stage. He was happy with himself, his accomplishments, and with his long-time beloved spouse Rosalynn. In this book, he shared the knowledge and pleasure that age brought him.

But his journey to old age wasn't easy. At 56, he lost a Presidential election, was forced from a job he loved with no future ahead, faced a huge debt on his farm and warehouse business that had been mismanaged, and coped with his and Rosalynn's elderly mothers who needed care. But he wrote movingly of how he and Rosalynn overcame heartache, despair, and disappointment to face new challenges.

Like many of us, he started planning for retirement, began new diet and exercise programs, faced the age prejudice we all do, and confronted political upheaval. He admitted that becoming grandparents deepened his loving relationship with Rosalynn. He cited lessons on aging that he learned from other world leaders, Nobel laureates, sports figures and celebrities. The best part of the book is that Carter celebrated the blessings we receive as we age and the goodness that we can bestow on others. As the 39th President of the United States, the author of 13 books, a distinguished professorship at Emory University, a deacon in a Baptist church in Plains, Georgia who also taught a Sunday School class, and founder of the Atlanta Project to address poverty issues while building homes for Habitat for Humanity, he still enjoyed fly-fishing, tennis and woodworking. His writing style used humor and his gentle nature to share the commitment he and his wife made to explore new possibilities while still giving one another "some space." They established Atlanta's Carter Center to help negotiate peace agreements and to monitor elections in emerging democracies, to assist the elderly and mentally ill, to both continue as university professors, and to help build at least one house per year for needy families. He tried to run or walk three miles a day and took cross-country bike rides. He shared advice in this book to help us keep life challenging, interesting and rewarding, to strengthen interpersonal relations, and even admitted to trying to face his own death with grace, equanimity and acceptance which he is certainly showing the world today.

His counsel was not original or revolutionary, but he was so down-to-earth practical by giving anecdotal and personal examples of friends, relations and acquaintances who remained productive. His positivity was repeatedly on display as in his last interview with Barbara Walters, he was asked what were his best years, and he answered, "Now is the best time of all."

In this book, he spoke of his relationship with his father, the compromises he had to make to ensure the success of his marriage, and the new career he had to carve out for himself after 1980. He added facts and statistics about our aging population and made suggestions for improved and healthy living. Although probably repeated from his previous book, "Everything to Gain: Making the Most of the Rest of Your Life," his advice on the virtues of aging can't be repeated too often.

Admittedly, he wasn't a popular President, but his stature as ex-President has grown immensely. Here he publicly grappled with the question, "What are we going to do with the rest of our lives?" His quest was to seek meaning, meet challenges, stay healthy and engaged while making financial decisions, dealing with the social security system, and the balance that home and family demanded while public expectations continued. He personally wanted to explore intellectual and spiritual growth, and that goal speaks to us all.

This is a short book but a call to us seniors to reconsider living our best lives and feeling blessed and happy for the time we have left. After all, Carter stated, "Consider the alternative to aging." And as one reader said, "In this book, Carter continued to spread his amazing understanding from living life. The life cycle has a beginning and an ending, and one's attitude and faith make the journey better. This book will bring joy to your heart."

How God is Working in one of our Student Leaders at Penn State York

Karoul is a senior at Penn State York studying biology and plans to go to medical school after graduation. She was born in Egypt but came to the United States as an infant. She would tell you that she used to be shy and timid around people but now God has changed her into a peo-

ple person who enjoys investing deeply in relationships.

She often drives younger students to events, meets up with younger ladies to encourage them in their walk with the Lord, and talks to her non-Christian friends about Jesus. I (Maria) have the privilege of meeting weekly with Karoul for discipleship.



What is one thing you learned from Bible study this semester?

"One thing I learned from Bible study is that Jesus moves towards those who society neglects. Throughout Mark, Jesus moves towards the sick, towards the lonely, towards the troubled. He shows time and time again that He is always there and ready to heal and cleanse those who seek Him."

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What is one thing you learned from leadership team this semester?

"As we read Sent this year in LT, I learned that although we are sent to others to speak of the Gospel, we are not alone and must not attribute success to our own doing. This made me rely on the Lord more when I talk to others about Jesus."

What is one way God grew you this year?

This gives me a strong confidence that ironically allows me to do better academically as a result."

Southern California is facing multiple uncontrolled fires, exacerbated by strong winds and dry conditions. Tens of thousands of residents have been forced to evacuate and more than 57,000 homes are threatened.

PDA is in communication with the affected presbyteries to offer resources in the aftermath of the fires. So far, we are aware of one Presbyterian church destroyed (Pacific Palisades Presbyterian Church) and several more are threatened. We will know more once the fires are contained and evacuation orders have been lifted. We pray for all lives affected, for swift containment and the safety of first responders.

Presbyterian Disaster Assistance (PDA) urges your support in response to the devastating fires in California, which authorities are calling a historic and deadly wildfire event. PDA has already released emergency grants to meet the urgent needs of the communities and to provide immediate care. The magnitude of this event will require the development of long-term projects and assistance, both for the physical and emotional long-lasting effects. Years of recovery lie ahead, and your commitment will help PDA extend the hands of Christ.
