Merry Christmas! It Is Not Over Yet!

Our culture has played some kind of fast, slight-of-hand, trick on the Bible's beautiful Christmas stories. First, the Church has always understood the season of Christmas to be twelve days long beginning on December 25 and ending on the day of Epiphany, January 6. These twelve days are the season of Christmas, intended in Christian spirituality to be a time of prayer, devotion and community celebrating the gift of Jesus. But our culture commonly acts as if Christmas is over on December 25, and we immediately move on to the next thing. And too often we have, with great ugliness, transformed the twelve days of Christmas into the twelve shopping days before Christmas. Ugh! There is wisdom and beauty in the Church's traditional celebration of the twelve days of Christmas; I suggest we mark these days with prayer, devotion, scripture and holy celebration. At the very least we should respect, appreciate and understand the meaning of the Church's Season of Christmas; it belongs to us!

Secondly, our culture has done a good job in completely misunderstanding the Bible stories about the birth of Jesus. We have too often simply conflated together what in the Bible are clearly two very different Christmas stories. The Shepherds and the Magi are both beautiful and profound Christmas stories, but they are very different and in no way do they belong together. The Gospels of Matthew and Luke are very different, with different purposes and different points of view. Matthew tells us the beautiful story of the Magi, and their story should be connected with the Day of Epiphany, January 6. Luke tells us the wonderful story of the Shepherds. Again, at the very least, we should respect and appreciate what the Gospels of Matthew and Luke tell about the birth of Jesus; they are very different stories.

As we turn the page on a new month and a new year, please mark the date of Epiphany in your mind and heart. It seems to be the forgotten holy-day in the Church. Our extravagance around Christmas day seems to have swallowed up the beauty of Epiphany. It is not over yet! Christmas continues all the way to the great day of light, the holy day of Epiphany. Affirm it in your hearts and homes.

Ruth's Harvest – Fairfield is a volunteer program that will provide hungry children in the Fairfield area with a backpack of food for them to eat over the weekend when they are not getting school lunches or school breakfasts. They receive individually packed servings of food to cover seven meals and two snacks for Friday evening, Saturday, and Sunday. Our congregation is supporting this ministry in the following ways listed below.

What is needed?

1. Donations of food: Single-sized servings/packages of food items that need NO refrigeration (see list of food items below). Items can be dropped off at our church which are then delivered to Ruth's Harvest.

We will once again be going to New Bern, North Carolina for a week of repair and construction to help folks recover from a hurricane that affected the area over 6 years ago. Can you imagine living in that state of disrepair for that period of time? Here is an opportunity to help people get their lives back on a normal tract, living in their reconstructed homes. We are blessed to have lovely facilities to stay, sleep and regenerate in each night after a full day of physical work. on a variety of sites. All meals, transportation and fees to participate will be paid by our church Mission Endowment Fund.

The sense of fellowship and friendship to so fulfilling both emotionally and spiritually even if the work is a little tiring. Try it - you may like it!

GETTYSBURG C.A.R.E.S.

Gettysburg C.A.R.E.S. consists of a cold weather shelter and a Resource Center geared to provide support for up to 30 people when no other shelter can be found. This is accomplished through a partnership with local churches, including Lower Marsh Creek and other community service agencies.

LMCPC has volunteered to prepare breakfast for the C.A.R.E.S. program from March 24, 2025 through April 7, 2025, excluding Sundays. We will need 2 volunteers to prepare breakfast each morning at 6:00 am at the St. James church youth house, on 121/123 York Street, Gettysburg. Guests arrive at 7:00 am. We will also be responsible for clean-up. St. James church supplies all paper products, juices, tea, coffee and coffee mate, cereals, milk, and condiments. All we supply is the meal. Some suggestions are breakfast casseroles, French toast, breakfast sandwiches, scrambled eggs, sausage links, potato products (hash browns, tater tots, shredded potatoes), fruit, breads or baked goods, muffins, bagels, pancake mix, waffle mix, bread for toast, etc.

On Wednesdays, we can only serve bagels, cream cheese, and fruit, because we cannot cook on Wednesdays.

A training session for volunteers will be held at the youth house closer to our service week. At that time, we will learn how everything works in the kitchen and exactly what we will be asked to do. If you cannot attend the training session, we will pair you with a volunteer who has attended. We will not know how many guests to expect until the week before our service.

We will meet with volunteers after church on Sunday, March 16, 2025, to share our menu choices and coordinate the purchase of staples like eggs, sausage links, muffins, bagels, etc., which Joe and Elaine will purchase and store in the church kitchen. Joe and Elaine will check the supplies in the CARES refrigerator ahead of this meeting to see what supplies are already stocked. The church will reimburse you for any food that you purchase.

From their December 2024 Newsletter:

Adams County Community Foundation Giving Spree: ACPM thanks everyone who donated to the ministry through the Giving Spree. Your support allows ACPM to have a full-time director of Christian Ministries, who also functions as the prison chaplain within the Adams County Adult Correctional Complex. The director coordinates ministry both inside and outside the facility. Your donations also help to purchase Bibles, Christian literature, and other religious items that help to build the Christian faith of inmates and their families.

<u>ACPM Prayer Gathering</u>: ACPM is looking ahead to the new year and will be integrating a monthly community prayer gathering at one of the local churches in the greater Gettysburg area to pray for the prison ministries, volunteers, prison staff, and those incarcerated. For the month of January, the prayer gathering will be held on Tuesday, January 14, 6-7 p.m. at First Baptist Church, 1015 Chambersburg Road, Gettysburg. A schedule for the year will be provided in the January 2025 newsletter. Come join in faith and prayer.

<u>Alpha Program</u>: Last month it was reported that ACPM would introduce the Alpha Program to the Adams County Adult Correctional Complex (ACACC) on the weekend of November 22. Adams Rescue Mission/Agape

ARM is so grateful for your support this year! In 2024: we were able to provide 73 men, 16 women, and 15 children a safe place for them to sleep, eat, and start their restoration process; we were able to serve over 27,000 meals to our resident guests; over 150 families from the community received clothing, household goods, and furniture through our voucher program; over 250 children will receive gifts for Christmas through our Adopt a Family Program.

A huge thank you to the individuals who show up to support what we do for our community. Each week we have those who drive our trucks, help in our sorting room, lending a helping hand with pick-ups, cleaning, leading Bible studies, and much more.

From their November 17 Newsletter: Right after the main session on Saturday evening at Fall Conference, I noticed "Ashley" on the verge of tears. I sat down next to her and asked what was on her mind. "I've been struggling with really low

thoughts this week. Terrible thoughts about myself. And then the speaker said tonight 'You've been formed by the hands of God' and it was like God was speaking right to me. 'I'm not an accident!' she declared triumphantly to me. I need to learn to see myself the way God sees me."

As we talked more, she shared two things that really stood out: 1) This Fall Conference was the first time she had heard the true purpose of marriage. Coming from a divorced home, Ashley both desires the stability of a romantic relationship and fears it. This weekend she realized that marriage is all about picturing the gospel, not primarily about romantic feelings of staying in love. 2) She shared that she didn't fully understand the gospel until college. She thought it was works based until she learned about God's grace as she started coming to the DiscipleMakers Bible study at PSU York! A letter from Phil Gardner, Camp Director

Krislund has been bringing the Word of God to campers for over 60 years now. In addition to the summer camper season, Krislund is the location that many churches, college groups, and organizations use for their gatherings and retreats. However, it takes a lot to make all of this come together each year. Not just human power, but the financial means as well.

So while it is the time of year to ask for your assistance in supporting us financially, I want to focus more on building our community together. We are gaining momentum and drawing in interest and serving new groups. This is excellent as we strive for another 60+ years here at Krislund. But I want to be sure that we keep our roots in what is important, our relationships with all who support us.

So here are some highlights and information about camp to keep you informed and perhaps encouraged to get involved actively, if you aren't already:

115 Day Campers; 167 Residential Campers; LOTS of camper made Krislund Tye-Dye shirts; 150+ Wilderness Leadership Academy Campers; 10+ Harp Camp Campers

129 Events – Quilting, Scrap Booking, Family Reunions, Weddings, Bible Study Groups, etc.; over 3,000 people from these groups

3,527 Retreat Meals served; 5,330 Camper Meals served

Summer Camp Staff – Counselors, Kitchen Staff, Lifeguards, Health Officer, etc.; Full-time staff; Thousands of Volunteer Hours

The Physical Plant that needs constant upkeep and maintenance: 15 buildings and lodges; 28 cabins and bunk houses; 5 shelters and pavilions; 2 amphitheaters; swimming pool; outdoor adventure park; large and small fields for activities.

The above is just a small example of what needs to be supported to bring the quality of programs to participants. As preparations for next summer move along, I am excited at the possibilities. We are hoping to bring back wood working programs and cooking programs. We are discussing new ways to serve the Pastors and the Congregations within the Presbyteries. I am about to drop off all the caps we have pulled together and pick up our new tables. We are looking at ways of mapping our trails so we have good maps for visitors with help from Clearwater Conservancy staff. As well as reviving our Traveling Day Camp program. We have a continued sewer project, Retreat Center roof to replace and ongoing maintenance of the High Ropes course and vehicles.

Please consider how you can help us connect to our community better and if your time and talents are being called to serve in this ministry. We would love to see you around camp. Why? Because we know you have a heart and love for this place like we do. With your continued prayers, support and assistance, Krislund has a bright future ahead!

In 2024 Mission of Mercy served over 2500 medical and dental patients who visited the clinics over 6400 times; dispensed more than 5900 medications; over 150 volunteer medical professionals and lay people provided free medical and dental care at six host sites; received free labs, x-rays and limited surgeries through seven hospitals and/or community partners to assist in diagnosing.

From the Fall PHS Letter: The Presbyterian Historical Society has been busier than ever this year as the staff responds to the growing needs of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.). Our reading room is bustling with researchers and visitors working on a variety of projects. Online requests for information are at an all-time high and deposits of denomination records are happening nonstop. Our archives staff has been traveling around the country to assist congregations and mid councils. The need for PHS has never been greater.

Records are the cornerstone of our work and come from across the church. It is PHS's collaboration with mid councils and congregations that has propelled the growth of our collections in the past few years. Church leaders recognize the importance of preserving records and history. They work diligently, with PHS staff guiding them, to identify the important records to deposit with PHS for long-term preservation.

Once records are safely at PHS, they are available for research use. Just as there has been an increase in acquisitions, there has been a steady increase in the number of visitors to PHS using the collections, which is a testament to the value and accessibility of our holdings.

From Dr. Rex Rogers' October 31, 2024 Letter: Hagar threw her belongings in a bag – clothes, food, anything that could fit. Bombs lit up the black sky as the sixteen-year-old and her family crammed into their car. They drove through the night to cross the Syrian border. *It was not a peaceful, silent night, and they longed for hope*.

People all across the Middle East and North Africa long for an end to war, poverty, and oppression. They desire the gift you and I celebrate this time of year – the Light of the World . . . the Prince of Peace . . . our Immanuel . . . Jesus.

Hagar is not the only one looking for that gift. Since she was little, she wanted to become an actress. Don't you think she should be packing her bag to go to school and achieve that dream? Instead, she was packing her bag and fleeing from her home in the middle of the night.

Truth seekers are longing for hope and connection. An encounter with Jesus through inspiring programming is the best gift they could ask for! For Hagar, it changed her life. One testimony of salvation was all it took to turn Hagar's heart toward Jesus. "Saying 'yes' to Jesus was the best moment of my life," Hagar says. "I was telling every person I met that I'd given my life to Him. I couldn't not! He is so great." Hagar thought her dream of becoming an actress had died. But God brought it back to life. She appeared on the SAT-7 KIDS program *Challenge Acce*pted as a gameshow contestant – and while live on air, the hosts of the show promised Hagar she would star in a SAT-7 drama inspired by her experiences as a girl growing up in war.

God captured the heart of a teenager – who lost her home, hope, and childhood to war – and proved to her that "*all things are possible to those who believe.*" (Mark 9:23) He used the acting dream Hagar thought was dead to restore hope to other youth longing for safety and security in the middle of destruction. "God blessed me so much though SAT-7 KIDS," Hagar says.

<u>What is Advent to us?</u> As we continue to unwrap the gift of 2024, Advent for us is a time of waiting, of preparation, of light, and of hope. We are reminded of God's mystery, his goodness, the unfolding of his plan.

<u>Advent is a season of waiting</u>. For generations Israel's prophets pointed to the coming Messiah, waiting, longing for their deliverer, creating a sense of expectancy. Reflect on the hymn, "*O Come, O Come, Emmanuel*."

We moved to England to join One Another Ministries expecting to help missionaries cultivate what truly matters - abiding in Christ in challenging ministry contexts, primarily through Marriage and Single Intensives. It didn't happen immediately. In fact, the intensives still haven't taken off the way we anticipated. What has happened,

however, are smaller, unexpected aspects of ministry that are harder to measure. At this crossroad, we now see how instrumental these "lesser things" have been. We see Jesus. He is preparing us.

<u>Advent is a season of preparation</u>. A time to ponder the events surrounding Christ's birth, to prepare our hearts, minds, and lives to celebrate God's good gift of salvation in Christ. And we do this together - in community, in worship, in repentance and faith.

God knows what we need and when we need it, building upon the foundation he has laid, filling in the gaps of our 2024 calendar. Opportunities continue for virtual counseling and coaching, representing One Another at two major global conferences, ongoing team building and networking here in England. And we returned to Romania where we continue to develop a dozen Marriage Intensive facilitators. These have been very encouraging. We trust the Lord is preparing for us what he will unwrap in 2025. And he's doing it in the context of local and global community.

Advent is a season of light. "The prophet of the Most High will give light to those who sit in darkness and in the shadow of death, to guide our feet into the way of peace." Mat 1:79

In December here in central England it is dark by 4:00pm! It reminds us of how much darkness there is in the world. Which is why we pray earnestly to the Lord. Why the church sends out laborers into his harvest. Why we make every effort to care for those who help push back the darkness. To strengthen them, to help them stay. "*You are the*

light of the world." Let it shine! Do whatever you can to help keep each other's light shining, so the darkness does not overtake any of us. We need one another. And cross-cultural workers need as much light as they can get.

<u>Advent is a season of hope.</u> As we look back to his first coming, we eagerly expect his second (Heb 9:28). We are always in the season of Advent, because in this life we constantly expect Christ to return. So, while looking back, we eagerly look forward, with hope. God has good works that he has prepared for us to do among crosscultural workers. Pray for those we are walking alongside and supporting. For the irons we have in the fire to collaborate with others like us. For our One Another team that is being built up for a new season. For our new director who begins Jan 1. And pray for our participation in the Shoulder to Shoulder conference in Jan, where we hope to begin the work of setting up Single Intensives. We do not know what 2025 will bring. But we do know the God of 2025 and beyond. He is faithful; he is with us; and he is coming!

Dear friends, As I write this, the election in the U.S. is yet to happen. By the time you read it, the outcome will be known. For some this will bring hope and for others disappointment. As I rode my bike through the city recently, I thought about the vibrancy of the world, literally vibrating it seems sometimes, and how it seems we all carry varying states of hope or perhaps tip toward hopelessness at times. Some of us are wrapped up in the wars that affect family and friends. Some of us may hope the results of an election might bring change. Some feel that hope is a lost cause. I, personally, swing between the two like a clock pendulum, wishing to stay on the side of hope, inevitably some mechanism pulls me back. Perhaps it's the desire not to be disappointed. I avoid the term pessimism and prefer a healthy dose of realism instead, refusing to be too wrapped up in outcomes I cannot change even as

I invest time and energy in trying to do just that in seemingly small ways.

Recently, I remembered where I've buried hope and that it is sometimes, thankfully, possible to dig it up again. Our partner, Berliner Missionswerk, invited me to join their volunteer program group during their seminar week to lead a workshop for the volunteers, some of who have extensive cross-cultural experience already, and others who are embracing their first month in a new context. Looking around the circle of young adults and listening to them each introduce themselves and name their home culture, I felt those perspectives infuse the room. They blended and danced around each other and showed some light into the muted evening tone. I imagined that light as hope in the midst of a very fractured, tenuous global structure. Someone said they thought the whole world had a problem with expressing emotions. It feels like the world has a problem with really seeing or hearing each other most of the time. Hope to me was spending some hours in a room and looking into the faces of the world telling their stories and being heard.

At one point, someone brought out a guitar as we waited for some technical issues to be sorted out. Another person found a drum and backed up the rhythm being picked out. Another backed it all up with Arabic beats played from their phone. A few others joined in singing, sometimes just lyrical nonsense about the day, sometimes a once popular song from the 90s, sometimes just humming. All these different elements, and these different backgrounds could and did compliment each other in harmony. It's an image I soaked in from the background, the one I ended up taking with me from the evening. Harmony is possible out of differences.

Christmas is coming. That's supposed to be a season of hope in the church. I find that hard to match sometimes with the world around. I find that especially hard the last couple of years when so many have died in the place where the church, along with others, claim their origins. Too much of the world stays silent on this. Hope could also be that voices carry and land like lightning, sparking some sort of shift in the global atmosphere. One can hope.

In the midst of all of that, our family sends you greetings from Berlin where we are preparing to welcome the holidays and enjoy the focus on Advent here in this culture. It's a dark time of year this far north, a time that many struggle to cope with as we wait impatiently for more daylight, but there is enough spark to remind us that there is still reason to hope.
