From the Pastor's Desk

### The Book of Order G - 2.0504c Exceptions

The Constitution of our Presbyterian Church U.S.A. is written in the **Book of Order**. This convoluted, difficult paragraph is copied from the section titled Form of Government in the Book of Order:

"A presbytery may determine that its mission strategy permits a minister of the Word and Sacrament currently called as an Associate Pastor to be eligible to serve as the next installed pastor or co-pastor, or a minister of the Word and Sacrament employed in a temporary pastoral relationship to be eligible to serve as the next installed pastor, copastor, or associate pastor. Presbyteries that permit this eligibility shall establish such relationships only by a three-fourths vote of the members of presbytery present and voting."

Our Presbytery of Carlisle in an official meeting on March 15 voted by a margin of 81%, thus surpassing the required 75%, to approve our Session's request for this "exception." Thus the way is clear for our congregation to officially meet, consider and vote for my election as your installed pastor. Our Session has called a meeting of the congregation for Sunday, April 3 for this purpose.

I am gratified by the good work of our Transitional Ministry Team, along with the Session, in pushing through this long process which will come to a culmination with the vote of the congregation. I am grateful for the many members of the congregation who participated in the Congregational Assessment Tool this past November. The results of that survey, including our very high level of participation in it, served as a crucial piece informing the Presbytery's decision. The written report which our Transitional Ministry Team provided to the Presbytery also received glowing praise all around.

### UPDATE ON AFGHAN REFUGEE FAMILY

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The family of 10 was welcomed on February 12, and the community has come together to meet this family's needs. They arrived in New Jersey in the first wave of refugees, in August of 2021, and they were the last to leave the base six months later. A major piece of this was not having housing large enough for such a large family. The "gift" of having access to a 4 bedroom house at a very reasonable rent was the straw that padded their travel for a soft landing in Gettysburg. After touring the house, the father (Awaz) asked a question, expressed through his 18-year-old son, "...is this another temporary place?" A smile replaced the worried look on his face when he realized the place was being prepared for them to stay.

Now, four weeks out, all kids ages 7 to 20 are in public schools or Head Start and they love it. Awaz has a job and is excited about this new start. The kids are getting involved in school, with two doing track, two doing wrestling, and one interested in Art Club when available. It is a very busy household, with some team-mates stopping in to visit and some play dates set for the younger kids.

Family is important to them and there are frequent video calls with relatives in Afghanistan and some in the U.S. The family is always expressing their gratitude. They feel fortunate to be here but are sad about their loved ones remaining in Afghanistan with the humanitarian crisis there and the inability to get out of the country.

Shopping for groceries: While looking at the price per pound for produce, translating the price/lb. for 3 lb. and 5 lb. bags of apples was not something easily explained, but they realized quickly that the bags of apples and oranges were usually the better buy. While we take our weekly or biweekly trips to the grocery store for granted, nothing has been routine about groceries for this family. It takes a lot of groceries to feed a family of 10, with five in the teen years. Walking trips are not possible given the number of bags to transport! Fresh homemade bread is a staple, and it is baked three times a day (possibly 25 lbs. of flour per week with the question of whether that will be enough). Nuts (especially pistachios and almonds) and dried fruits are very popular. Milk, yogurt, eggs (cooked with tomatoes), many fruits and vegetables, rice, bean or pea-based stews, and lots of spices. Don't forget the cilantro and garlic! And tea goes with everything! Halal food stores are 45 minutes in either direction on Route 15. Halal means acceptable according to Islamic law, so the meats and cheeses at the Halal store have been certified that they are prepared in the proper manner. Some helpful

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souls are traveling to be able to provide the goat, sheep, beef, or chicken they enjoy upon occasion. But pork is "haram" or forbidden by Islamic law. Certain other foods are also haram, as they may contain pork products, gelatin, animal fats, alcohol, or certain enzymes and other additives.

Growing food: The family is interested in growing some of their own food, and they hope to take advantage of an offer to get a plot, if available, in the community garden at the Ag Center to grow tomatoes, okra, garlic and hot green peppers. They really miss the okra from their home country. They would also like to grow oregano, basil, parsley, and cilantro but the vegetables will have priority. They have received an amazing offer of garden tools, seeds, plants, and assistance, should the plot be available.

Other plans, with assistance from Healthy Adams Bicycle and Pedestrian, Inc. (HABP) may equip the bicyclists in the family with bikes, helmets, training, safer routes and possibly a bike shelter.

Medical appointments for the entire family have been completed, with volunteer hours provided by some medical personnel in our community. They have a host of ESL providers to help the adults learn English.

Words from the Coordinator of the Partnership: Many people are pulling together to address social, recreational, educational, medical needs, as well as the basics of life! What a group of talented and dedicated volunteers! And so many gifts from the community — we have learned the value of gift cards through some very generous gifts! So appreciated, especially during this time prior to having a paycheck. Gift cards allow them a little independence. This is only a very brief picture of all that has taken place — my head spins with all the planning and actions that have occurred in these 4 weeks.

Note: Two welcome cards full of signatures from our congregation, along with two \$100 Visa gift cards purchased through MOM discretionary funds and \$50 cash donated by one of our members, were delivered to the partnership coordinator on Sunday, February 13, and it has been reported that they were greatly appreciated!

### Adams Christian Prison Ministries

ACPM is a non-profit organization that offers a variety of ministries and programs to those incarcerated at the Adams County Adult Correctional Complex. Having established a working memorandum with



Adams Prison Board, ACPM provides a full time Chaplain (Reverend Angel Perez) who helps serve and support ACACC staff, inmates and pre COVID-19, oversaw nearly 100 volunteers offering counseling, Bible studies and support to inmates. Lower Marsh Creek supports ACPM through the MOM budget. "Many months ago, I was given a spiritual experience which left me with the absolute knowledge that "heaven is real." Since this experience I began feverously studying my Bible and openly testifying to anyone that God puts in front of me. God has given me spiritual gifts and allowed me to begin using them. James 5:20 sums up what my work is for the rest of my life. The chaplain has answered many requests from supplying me with a prison Bible to arranging a confessional with Father Lyons. There have been

several break-throughs in our prison home. Without knowing, the chaplain has had a part in each and everyone of them. Please pray for each and everyone of us. God bless you all."

"I loved going to Chaplain Perez for Bible study and worship. I hope it starts up again in the library. We got socks and a candy bar, a card at Christmas. Also, I filled out prayer requests for myself and my son because we were both in jail together."

"I arrived in February. I was able to write requests slips to get books from the chaplain's library. To date, I have been blessed to complete 3 books from this list. Having the books available when actually going to a church service is vital for me to stay and keep close to God, especially during these difficult times. I was also blessed with an awesome Bible from the library as well. Because of these resources I have been able to share God's word with other inmates – many who are "just looking," but know they have emptiness that drugs, alcohol, etc. can't fill. I pray they realize only God and his word can fill that space with the Holy Spirit."

"During a time of COVID restrictions, our chaplain and those who support him, have been a tremendous blessing to myself and other believers on my housing unit. Without church services, he has provided us with the devotional material to start and continue a successful daily inmate fellowship. And because of him, we have still been able to access faith-based literature. Please know that all of you that provide so many blessings to us during this time of adversity are thought of fondly and are kept in our prayers. I extend our love to you in Christ Jesus our Lord and wish His many blessings upon you. Thank you."

## Mission Advocate Mailbox Recent Correspondence



### **Bob and Kristi Rice (South Sudan)**



Bob reported meeting three pastors from the distant region of Abyei who had come to visit Nile Theological College. They shared how they were forming churches in remote villages with no church presence and their struggle to travel long distances to reach each of the villages. They recounted how they had started their churches from scratch after Abyei was attacked and burned to the ground - twice. They were struggling to rebuild their church buildings with local resources, and the one in the city of Abyei now had thick brick walls just waiting

for a roof to be put on. Abyei is a disputed region along the border between Sudan and South Sudan. When South Sudan gained independence from Sudan, the people of Abyei wanted to be with South Sudan, but the government in Khartoum wanted their resource-rich land. The attacks and destruction of Abyei by the Misseriya tribe in Sudan are thought to be attempts to claim the land of Abyei for Sudan and chase the people out. Residence in Abyei continue to live in fear of attacks, particularly if they attempt to go to their fields to farm or travel in remote areas. A contingent of UN soldiers is now based in the main town to provide security, but the risk remains in rural areas.

After his first conversation with a counselor, he said: "I feel so much more at peace, and my heart is filled with hope." After two months of regular contact, he told the counselor, "I am eager for our weekly conversations because when I hear God's Word and pray, I am encouraged and gain the strength to carry on. I think God sent you to bring hope into my life." SAT-7 PARS is celebrating its 15<sup>th</sup> year (for Persian people, Iran and Afghanistan).

The lovely season of Spring has finally arrived! We are thankful for the beauty of nature that God has provided for our enjoyment. This means that the joyous day of Easter is quickly approaching, but not without the solemn period that precedes that day of resurrection. The beloved hymn "In the Garden" comes to mind. Several years ago I was given the book "Then Sings My Soul: 150 of the World's Greatest Hymn Stories" from the library collection of Ki Neely, a devoted and beloved member of the choir and congregation. The book describes how C. Austin Miles came to create this beautiful hymn.

"One day in March, 1912...he opened the Bible to his favorite chapter, John 20, the story of Easter. Miles later said, 'As I read it that day, I seemed to be part of the scene...My hands were resting on the Bible, but I seemed to be standing at the entrance of a garden... A woman in white, with head bowed, walked into the shadows. It was Mary. As she came to the tomb, upon which she placed her hand, she bent over to look in and hurried away...Mary reappeared, leaning her head upon her arm at the tomb. She wept. Turning herself, she saw Jesus standing; so did I. I knew it was He." Mr. Miles was so inspired by this experience that he quickly put his thoughts to paper and wrote the lyrics to "In the Garden." Later that same evening he wrote the music. May you be inspired by the story, and the sacred music of the season of Easter!
