A Message from Pastor Mark — Bethlehem is in the West Bank

Bethlehem is in the West Bank, and this year the West Bank is in violent turmoil and very close to all out war. Israel includes two Palestinian enclaves: Gaza and the West Bank. Gaza, after the terrorist attacks, is in all out war which, I fear, will continue through the weeks of Advent. The West Bank, with these same issues, divisions and generations of conflict, is very close to being caught up in this maelstrom of violence and war.

Bethlehem, during more normal and calm years, is a bustling, packed tourist site during December. Christian pilgrims from around the world flock to Bethlehem to ponder that first Christmas night in that most holy of Christian places. In the basement of the Church of the Nativity, in a small, ornate sanctuary, there is a 14 point golden star on the floor. The 14 points refer to the three sets of 14 generations of Jesus' heritage referred to in Matthew 1. The floor all around this star is polished to a glistening brightness from the many Christians who have knelt down lifting up prayers of thanksgiving from this very spot. This is the place where Mary wrapped baby Jesus in the swaddling clothes and laid him in a manger. I knelt and prayed there; kneeling down, with closed eyes and an open heart, shoulder to shoulder with crowds of other Christians, all of us grateful for the birth of Jesus. After a visit to the Church of the Nativity, I walked all around Shepherd's Square enjoying the site of so many Christian tourists, eating some common street food, and shopping in the many shops looking for the perfect manger scene to buy for my grandchildren. A manger scene they treasure to this day, "Handmade in Palestine."

My heart wells up with sadness because this year there will be no Christian pilgrims in Bethlehem; the shops of Shepherd's Square will be empty, and the fear of impending war, more violence, and a deep hopelessness settle down upon the *Little Town of Bethlehem*. And more this year than I have for a long time, I pray for peace. I pray for peace in the name of our Lord Jesus Christ, who was born in Bethlehem. Some day Lord, someday please: Peace in the Holy Land. Peace in the little town of Bethlehem. Blessed Advent!

As we end our year of celebrating this congregation's 275th year of worshiping and serving our God, it is fitting that we look back on what we've accomplished. When we began the year, we wanted to do more than have fun and fellowship together. We wanted to use this mile marker year to raise our profile in the communities we serve, to show our faithfulness in service to God and the people God loves. In doing that, we wanted to invite as many of our church ministry groups as possible to join with us.

So in planning activities, we looked for ways to make our presence known. We made a special effort to communicate our activities through local media, especially the Gettysburg Times, and were rewarded with several nice photos and articles featuring our anniversary year and its events. We invited the public to the Cemetery Walk, the Summer Picnic, and the Ice Cream Social. And we went out into our Gettysburg community at the library's FunFest in June, which kicked off their summer reading program, giving away children's Bibles and a booklet for adults featuring God's promises. All but one Bible was gone midway through the event! At FunFest, we also gave out fliers for another new community service the congregation tried this year—the Diaper Drive. Although it was not sponsored by the 275th Anniversary Committee, the Diaper Drive was another avenue for the church to let the community know about us and we were happy to pass out information to young families at FunFest!

In addition to events that reached out to our community, we suggested to two particular ministries that we set a goal of "275" for their collections. One was Operation Christmas Child. We were hesitant at first about setting the ambitious goal of 275 shoeboxes, but you all amazed us when ALL the shoeboxes were out for filling in just 2 weeks and an extra 30 were asked for. Thank you! We also set an ambitious goal of 275 items for the October "Harvest Home" collection to support the Fairfield food pantry. And you did that, too! We provided 278 items!

We have gathered some momentum to be better at reaching out to the surrounding communities this year and would like to challenge the congregation to find ways to keep this momentum going. The 275th Anniversary Committee worked with Spiritual Life and the Deacons on our events; Interpretation and Stewardship identified funds to support our activities and set up a fund for the 300th Anniversary Committee in 25 years. When we needed help with things involving the grounds, especially the cemetery, Home Ministry provided it. The anniversary focus this year has helped bring our leadership closer together in ministry. May that continue as Lower Marsh Creek "steps up its game" to take the good news of Jesus Christ into our surrounding communities!

So thank you to all who participated in our events, especially those who served on or advised the 275th Anniversary Committee to plan for the year's celebrations: Cathy Michaliga, Denise Lockwood, Linda Clark, Sue Welsh, Traci Lower, Tony Golden, Frank Buhrman, Nadja Muchow, Sara Rohr Wade, Roz Santay, Bev Benner. Thanks also to Dirk Grove and Wires and Wood whose musical talents graced our legacy-themed worship several times and to Linda again for her research and notes on the music she chose for Sunday worship. And of course, thanks to Pastor Mark, whose preaching, teaching, and newsletter articles kept us focused on continuing the great heritage God has given us at Lower Marsh Creek PC.

Samaritan's Purse - Operation Christmas Child (OCC) - Shoebox Event

The last phase of our 275th Anniversary theme is "Praying for the Future". Of course, we consider the children of our community, nation, and world to be a significant part of the future. In view of this, the 275th Anniversary Committee selected the Samaritan's Purse Operation Christmas Child shoebox collection as a way to pray for our future. We established a goal of filling 275 boxes. The shoeboxes will go to children all over the world and, along with this gift, the children are prayed for and taught about Jesus as part of the shoebox distribution event. In the fall, the LMCPC Spiritual Life team reached out to various churches and small groups in LMCPC to ask them to help us reach our goal. Participants from our church included the Couples Group, the Ladies Guild, Naomi's Sisters, the Ladies Bible Study group, and many, many individuals who submitted their own boxes.

Starting on September 17th, we began distributing empty boxes, with paid shipping labels inside, to all the groups who planned to participate in this mission. We used the David Scott Youth Fund to pay \$2,750 for the shipping and handling of 275 boxes, as well as the gospel literature that the children receive. Thanks to the Scott family for this generous gift! Continued on the next page . . .

The 275 boxes were quickly grabbed up and we had soon distributed well over 300 boxes. During the ensuing weeks, filled boxes began to arrive and they were stacked in the Fellowship Hall. We partnered with St John's Lutheran Church, the Orrtanna Good News Church and the Mt Carmel Community Church to help us reach our goal. St John's filled 15 boxes, Orrtanna filled 54 boxes and Mt Carmel, along with the Growing Patch Preschool, filled 69 boxes. We also received over \$450 as donations toward the shipping of boxes that weren't paid for by the David Scott Youth Fund.

Elaine Reichl has honchoed the collection of our boxes for many years and did a superb job of publicizing our effort and tracking all the pieces/parts. Thank you Elaine!! She also managed the collection of filled boxes from other churches in the county because LMCPC is a drop off location for this mission area. On Nov 20th, Jim Benner transported a total of 504 boxes to Littlestown for processing by Samaritan's Purse. This included 321 boxes from LMCPC and their partner churches in honor of our 275th anniversary event. Thank you to all who helped us reach our goal!! We also collected 185 boxes from the community and eight local churches who used LMCPC as their drop off point. Please continue to pray for the children who will receive these boxes and learn about the Good News of Jesus Christ. Cathy Michaliga

As of November 13th, LMCPC, along with partner churches, had filled 284 boxes.

The children thought about this for a minute, and then one child asked his grandfather, "Which wolf will win?"



DO YOU KNOW - Shirley Breslin, Nursery Coordinator for LMCPC?

My name is Shirley, otherwise known as Miss Shirley. I am the Nursery Coordinator here at Lower Marsh Creek Presbyterian Church.

I grew up in Dale City, VA not far from Quantico, Fort Belvoir, and Washington, DC. For those who are not aware, my parents are John (Jack) and Jan Breslin who normally attend our 11:00 service. My parents and I moved to Gettysburg in October 2001. I have two older sisters, Jeannie and Kathy, both of whom are married with children.

I graduated from Gar-Field Senior High School where my favorite subjects were choir and creative writing. I earned an Associate's degree from Northern Virginia Community College and then transferred to Mary Washington College in Fredericksburg, Virginia for a Bachelor's degree.

My first jobs besides babysitting were in daycare. I then worked as a receptionist, activity assistant, and companion at Westminster at Lake Ridge, a Presbyterian continuing care community. My jobs in Gettysburg have included Giant (Carryout Cafe), the Eisenhower Inn (front desk clerk and night auditor), and The Lutheran Home (activity assistant).

Since October 2013, I have been blessed to care for the children of this church. Caring for the children is a joy! Besides the nursery, you might see me helping with children in both official and unofficial church capacities. I've helped during activities such as our congregational retreats, VBS, and parents' nights out. I'm also known to entertain a child so parents can have a child-free moment.

Besides the nursery, I am involved in Spiritual Life, Women's Guild, and Stitchers. Outside of church, I volunteer at the library and a preschool. A few hours a week, I sit with a lovely woman who has dementia so her family has time for errands, meetings, and breaks.

Many of you know that I love boxers! My Sweet Molly was my first boxer and my companion for 13 years. My second boxer, Emerald Grace, came into my life four years ago. I call her my Precious Emerald. As an aside, I named her Emerald because I LOVE the color green. But not just any green! Emerald green, Christmas green, kelly green, and similar shades. Teals and other blue-greens are okay but I'm not crazy about the mossy, brownish greens and lime greens. You can say I'm a little picky about my greens!

I was baptized Lutheran as an infant but in elementary school my family went on to join Fairfax First Church of God (later renamed Fairfax Community Church of God), which is affiliated with Anderson, Indiana. I helped in the nursery and taught Sunday school along with my sister, Kathy.

Through my youth group there, I participated in several mission trips including inner-city Philadelphia, Appalachia, El Paso and Juarez, Mexico. But my most memorable trips were to Santo Domingo, Dominican Republic. My first trip, I was part of a group that included my youth pastor and his wife, several other adults, and five teenagers of which I was the youngest. I was barely 15!

I clearly remember my thoughts when we arrived. We got off the plane on the tarmac and were greeted with refreshments. As we walked through the bleak and very unmodern airport, I began to wonder what I had gotten myself into. Why did I come here? If I could have, I might have gotten right back on the plane immediately to go home!

Our group was tasked with painting a small church a color we called Smurf blue. As it turned out, I did very little painting that week. I spent most of my time in the DR with several children: Provy, Berny, Petra, Digna, Joel, and Eliezer. On the worksite, I spent most of my days with 7-year-old Eliezer. I knew little Spanish and he knew little English but we managed to communicate through pointing, drawing, writing, a dictionary, and as a last resort, an interpreter. Since that trip, I've learned some Spanish but am not fluent. Because of Eliezer and those other children, I quickly went from wondering why I was there to crying because I didn't want to leave!

Through my church, I returned to Santo Domingo on four more mission trips. My last DR mission trip was in August of 2001. Since then, I have returned twice on my own for visits: once in 2004 and again in 2011. Each time I leave for home, I cry. Though I haven't seen my Dominican friends in years, I still maintain friendships with several. It would mean a lot to me to return there someday!

As Nursery Coordinator, I am dedicated to providing a loving and safe place for any infant or child whether visiting or a regular LMCPC attendee. Our nursery is open each Sunday for both services as well as Sunday school.

Please stop by and say "hi" or "hola" sometime!

The history of Christmas hymns is even longer than the history of our LMCPC.

- "O Come, All Ye Faithful" The original words of this popular song were written in Latin around 800 years ago. The next time you sing this song, imagine the millions of Christians around the world who have sung this beautiful anthem throughout history.
- "Good King Wenceslas" Based on a 13th century English carol, John Neale wrote the popular song we sing today.
- "Christ Was Born on Christmas Day" Created in the 14th century in Germany, this carol was widely known and sung all over medieval Europe.
- "Good Christian Men, Rejoice" Written circa 1328 by Heinrich Seuse of Germany, this song is still popular, although with an updated title.
- "Between the Ox and the Grey Donkey" Based on the first chapter of the Book of Isaiah, this song was written in France around the 13th century.
- "The Friendly Beasts" Written in France during the 12th century, this is one of the earliest songs that is. still popular today.
- "Of the Father's Love Begotten" This early Christmas hymn was written by Aurelius Prudentius Clemens in a Roman province in modern-day Spain between 348 and 413.
- "Jesus, Light of All the Nations" This earliest of Christmas hymns was written by St. Hilary of Poitiers in France in the 4th century AD, between 310 and 367.

Afghan Family Update

Seema Nasiri, wife and mother in the first Afghan family, recently lost her father unexpectedly. He had gone to the hospital and died suddenly. I have learned that death in their culture is not mourned in the same way as we do. They don't send flowers or cards, but they do appreciate food as they do not do a lot of cooking during the mourning period. I understand that a traditional period of mourning is 40 days, but some may only grieve officially for three days with the belief that the deceased is in a better place and has been relieved of their suffering. As your representative, I delivered a Halal meal to them on Saturday night, November 11, as a way of expressing our condolences.

On October 17, I took three of the Nasiri children (including the baby for the first of a three-shot series), along with Seema, to a Wellspan clinic in Aspers, and on Tuesday, November 14, I took four more of the children (including the baby for her second of the three-shot series), along with Seema, to a Wellspan clinic in Waynesboro to get their Covid boosters. The baby will need to go for a third shot,

but I believe that takes care of the rest of the children.

Missionary Updates

Thomas and Cheri Henry (England)

The Henrys report that they have "all green lights" to move to England, airline tickets are purchased, and they depart on Wednesday, November 29. They are amazed at how the Lord has aligned so many aspects of this transition. The One Another Ministries Director just wrote to the whole company as a praise that he had never seen new appointees get through the hiring process, raise the needed funds, receive UK visas (three-year permits that include public health benefits), and wrap up stateside affairs so quickly. As soon as they land, they will begin to look for a vehicle and for housing in Cannock, England. They have found a property management company to rent their home in Midway, Kentucky.

They are currently in Texas (flew into DFW on Saturday, November 11) and will stay for two weeks. They will represent One Another Ministries at the Mental Health & Missions Conference, November 16-19, in Hurst, TX. Thanksgiving week will be spent with the Henry family in Dallas/Fort Worth. Thomas' dad turns 90 in March and will visit Thomas and Cheri in England in March along with Thomas' brother Timothy and his wife Sharon. On November 24, they will return to Kentucky and then join Cheri's family in Cincinnati for a post-Thanksgiving dinner that night. After that they will stay in Lexington before departing for England on November 29.

Note: I received an email from the Henrys as I was writing this update. They just received news from one of their supporting churches that they are dropping support (over \$500 per month) at the end of the year. They report that they have peace about moving, and that they trust him to make up the loss, either through current donors or those who may be on the fence.

Bob and Kristi Rice (South Sudan)

Excerpts from the Rices' latest newsletter:

"Doug and Judy brought us to their church for the Saturday morning Missions Breakfast. Tables were neatly decorated, and food was prepared and served by a group of dedicated volunteers called Valley Galley. Sixty church members came out on a beautiful fall morning, joining us for a time of sharing and learning about South Sudan. ... This visit with Valley Presbyterian Church in Green Valley, Arizona, is one of many visits over the last several weeks which have taken us to central Montana, central and coastal California, and the San Francisco Bay Area. Earlier this year we were able to visit churches in the Chicago area, western Pennsylvania, and three churches in Ohio. It has been encouraging and invigorating to be with churches again, especially after we had to cancel several church visits in the summer due to health challenges. ... We invite your prayers for the peoples of South Sudan. There is currently unrest in Pochalla, a region bordering Ethiopia, where we have colleagues and friends. We also await elections in December of 2024 with a degree of fear and trembling. Pray with us for a peaceful election and that the voice of the general population will be heard. Lastly, pray with us for the pastors and leaders of our partner ministries in South Sudan. As always, we give thanks to you for your ongoing prayers, love, hospitality (for those who have received us), and your financial support which allows Presbyterian mission co-workers like us and others to stand in love and solidarity in the bleeding places of our broken and fragmented world."

Adams Christian Prison Ministries

As of October 21, 2023, ACPM had \$29,370 cash on hand. Contributions are at 91.4% of budgeted amounts and from individuals are at 83.5% of budgeted amounts. Expenses have exceeded income by \$21,021.

News from the 275 th Anniversary Committee - to celebrate the 275 years of the church's history and service to God


